Open Enrollment Medicare for Veterans 64 and Beyond, Part III

As a Veteran, I understand the importance of knowing how you are covered and what you are covered for. Veterans who have coverage through the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) or TRICARE may think that this is simply enough, however, there are instances in which you will want to ensure that you have the right support and coverage needed even for the unexpected.

The Veterans Health Administration (VHA) goal is to collaborate and facilitate joint healthcare activities with the Department of Defense (DoD) to bring about the awareness and access to its Veterans. TRICARE is the regionally managed health insurance program utilized by the Department of Defense (DoD) for retirees and their families, as well as, our uniformed service members.

Eligibility is determined by the military services (see below under Did You Know?). CHAMPVA is a VA program that covers the healthcare costs for the spouse, surviving spouse or a child of a Veteran who has disabilities or who is deceased

Creditable coverage is any healthcare coverage that is as good as Medicare. When you have creditable coverage, you and your beneficiaries can delay your enrollment in Medicare without fear of being penalized and later paying an



It is recommended that veterans neither decline nor cancel coverage under Medicare or any other healthcare insurance programs because they have services provided for by the VA. Veterans can choose to have private insurance, through yourself or spouse, as a supplement to your VA healthcare benefits.

enrollment penalty. Having coverage through the Veteran Administration (VA) is considered creditable coverage for Medicare Part D (prescription drug) only. Your VA benefits are not considered creditable coverage for Medicare Parts A and B. Only insurance

from an employer can be utilized in lieu of Medicare Part B. A premium is usually associated with Part B, you must meet yearly deductibles and pay 20 percent for the cost of your care. There is no limit to your out-of-pocket costs each year. Having VA benefits will not affect Medicare costs; you can qualify for premium-free Medicare Part A.

It is recommended that veterans neither decline nor cancel coverage under Medicare or any other healthcare

insurance programs because they have services provided for by the VA. You can choose to have private insurance, through yourself or spouse, as a supplement to your VA healthcare benefits. Although there is a cost associated with having Medicare Part B, veterans who do not qualify for dental care from the VA will benefit from this coverage.

Accountability was evident in Arbery's case but no justice

The justice system worked, in the Ahmaud Arbery case after 74 days, because it was forced and pushed to do its job. There is very little to be satisfied with from the judicial system when two District Attorneys, Jackie Johnson and George Barnhill, have worked with one of the suspects on a daily basis, and they prevented the police from doing their job. Former District Attorney Jackie Johnson has been charged with breaking her oath, but for 74 days the entire Glynn County prosecutors' office was not executing their responsibilities.

For two and a half months three murderers were allowed to walk around free and brag about their actions. The system only worked because thousands of protesters, truth tellers and national activists forced and pushed the system to expose the truth. There also was a video that was leaked, which forced the county to take action.

In a fair system, three killers would be charged immediately. The District Attorney would not be allowed to investigate a case where they had worked with the charged individual on a daily basis. It was obvious that the District Attorney would not be impartial and prevented the police from doing their job.

When we think of justice in America, this case was an example of why the system is broken and flawed and must be reformed. Instead of working to expose the truth, the first two District Attorneys were fighting to protect their friends and hide the evidence. Initially, it appeared that the dead Black man *was the killer and the criminal* and the three White men had acted in self-defense, and it was not necessary to have a trial. In this case, the killers were comfortable telling the investigators that they said, "Stop you know, I'll blow your f...ing head off!"

There is something in the White men psyche that they believe there is nothing wrong with killing Black men/people, because they have a badge, gun and uniform. On February 23, 2020, these three White men were going hunting for a Black man and they had their shotguns.

In America, there are hundreds of cases on a yearly basis, where police and local citizens are not charged because they are White or a policeman and the persons they kill are Black. Many times, there is no video or factual evidence and there is a big cover up. Ninety percent of the time, the legal system works for White Folks and they expect it to work one hundred percent of the time.

Many of these murders are modern day lynchings and the evidence is swept under the rug. Ahmaud Arbery's death was a case where one such incident existed. In this case there were three White men: Travis McMichael, 35, son; Gregory McMichael, 65, father; and neighbor, William Bryan, 52. In this case according to the District Attorney, it was not necessary to create a crime scene, or do a criminal investigation, because the three men were innocent.

As pressure mounted from across the country, internationally, and the federal government, the three men were charged with murder and aggravated assault. Even though many around the country are calling this trial a victory for justice, with a different judge the killers could have got off free.

There was a jury with 11 Whites and one Black, which many in the country thought was racist and the defense kept asking for a mistrial. The defense used reverse racism for the White killers and tried to claim the criminals could not get a fair trial.

It is very difficult to consider this trial a win for the justice system and the legal system. This trial was a win for accountability and exposed the corruption in the judicial system. Racism is alive and well in Glynn County and there is a need for more organizations to fight corruption— and help reform the legal and justice system— all over America.

In his November 11 column, "Climate Change is Real! But is Global Warming a Blessing or a Curse?," Peter Bramble argues that the effects of policies to curb climate change are more harmful to communities of color and to the world's poor than climate change itself.

He claims that climate change will improve agricultural productivity and make our lives easier, and that we can simply avoid the inconvenient effects of increased flooding and extreme weather events by moving to less-impacted areas.

I wish it were that easy. Unfortunately, Bramble's claims just aren't true. Rising sea levels; more frequent and severe storms; droughts and destructive storms in agricultural areas; supply chain disruptions—all of these are already disrupting millions of people's lives and will only get worse. And, it is simply incorrect to downplay the danger of climate change to poor and disadvantaged peoples. As in Hurricane Katrina in 2013: Hurricanes Irma and Maria in Puerto Rico in 2017; Super storm Sandy in 2019; and the California wildfires of 2021, poor communities and people of color are sacrificed while the rich escape the deadliest effects.

Maybe the world's billionaires can relocate to protected areas away from flooding coastlines and river deltas, but can the rest of us? Even if we could all somehow move, in the long run there is no escape from the crisis. Humans do not live in a vacuum. From the bacteria and fungi that nourish the soil, to the trees that purify the air, to the plankton that generate oxygen we breathe, we depend on the interrelated web of life on earth. Disrupting the systems on which these life forms depend will make the planet unlivable for us.

I encourage anyone who is curious, to research the problem for themselves. One excellent and sobering starting point is an article called "The Uninhabitable Earth" by David Wallace-Wells (New York Magazine, 7/9/2017), which can be found free online with a quick Internet search.

I understand the desire for an easy answer. It's tempting to say that the problem is not real. In fact, the problem is even worse than is typically reported in the media. The world's elites may be talking a good game on climate change, as they claim to be taking action to save us, but the reality is that their policies are designed to protect corporate profit and are hugely insufficient to address the problem. Our challenge is to find a way to protect the earth while meeting human needs. It's a difficult question, but the only way to start is by facing the truth.

buyer— spends billions of America's tax dollars on goods and services each year.

An equitable federal procurement strategy that prioritizes small, disadvantaged businesses will help level the playing field and rebuild our economy from the bottom up and the middle out.

Mayor Gavin Buckley sworn in for second term in Annapolis

A swearing-in ceremony was held to mark Annapolis Mayor Gavin Buckley's second term on Monday, December 6, 2021. To celebrate the installation of the city's 137th mayor, there was a parade from Calvert Street on to West Street, hosted by the city, before the ceremony in Maryland's capital.

Eight city council members were also sworn in, including: Alderwoman Eleanor Tierney (Ward one); Alderwoman Karma O'Neill (Ward two's new member); Alderwoman Rhonda Pindell Charles (Ward three); Alderwoman Sheila Finlayson (Ward four); Brooks Schandelmeier (Ward five); Alderman DaJuan Gay (Ward six); Alderman Rob Savidge (Ward seven); and Alderman Ross Arnett III (Ward eight).

Inclusivity to bring the city together as "One Annapolis" was a recurring theme, while a host of speakers delivered remarks at the 2021 Mayoral Inauguration.

"So today we get started on another four years, and for that I highly thank the voters of the City of Annapolis. The voters resoundingly asked for us to continue this work, and I'm proud to have received support from Democrats, Independents, and Republicans," said Buckley, referring to his reelection. "What began four years ago was a beginning of a journey to act on a bold vision for Annapolis; a dream for the city that we all love. Many of our plans are in the cue. In our second term, it will be our priority to see these efforts through."

The West East extension (which includes the extension of a bicycle and pedestrian path of Poplar Trail); the rebuild of the Hillman garage; flood

mitigation on Compromise Street; water access and stormwater improvement; renovation of the Burtis House near the City Dock; rebuilding public housing; and green effort continuation were among projects Buckley identified as items on the city's past and continuing agenda. He also mentioned that improving aging infrastructure and coming up with ample plans for addressing unexpected situations are additional priorities. Achieving success for all residents who are a part of "One

Annapolis," and working to unite partisan division to support goals which benefit them, underscored more elements of Buckley's results-driven plans.

The Annapolis mayor also cited COVID-19 losses, gun violence, drug overdose issues, and the EF-2 tornado that ripped through the city. Despite the challenges mentioned, Buckley remarked that he aspires for Annapolis' current era to become known as progressive and resilient. A plan to

renovate City Dock is also on the agenda, according to officials.

"We are moving forward," Buckley said. "We can model solutions— smart city solutions, grassroots solutions. We can't be afraid to try new things. We can't be afraid to dream. We will continue to be a model for innovation. I know that new ideas will come our way, even with the plans we have, and the surprise fate has in store for us."

United States Senator Ben Cardin recognized Buckley's contributions while offering his congratulations.

"Mayor Buckley has provided visionary leadership for this historic city that has such an incredible legacy and such a bright future, under the leadership of Mayor Buckley," said Senator Cardin. "He's welcomed all, and he's found solutions to people's problems, and he's been able to overcome major obstacles. No more difficult obstacle than COVID-19. And through his leadership, we have seen how the resiliency of this city and its people have moved forward, even during COVID 19."

William Rowel, who is a Senior Advisor at the Mayor's Office of the City of Annapolis, served as the Master of Ceremonies. He mentioned Buckley's historic commitment to bring business owners, community leaders and residents together to develop ideas and economic opportunities for a constantly evolving city.

"His vision is for a vibrant, sustainable and inclusive Annapolis with infrastructure, services and events that make it a wonderful place to live, and a wonderful place to work for all of us. The future looks bright under his leadership, Mayor Gavin Buckley," Rowell said, before Buckley was sworn in for a second term.



B&O Unveils Model Train Gallery

Exhibition Forever Captures 1997 Baltimore

Calendar year 1997 in Baltimore included the Orioles winning the American League Division Series against the Seattle Mariners, and *Silver Charm* winning the Preakness Stakes at Pimlico vying for the Triple Crown. These unforgettable moments along with attractions which include the Inner Harbor, downtown Baltimore, and across the city north to the suburbs are all captured in an exciting new exhibit at the B&O Railroad Museum.

The Model Train Gallery was unveiled to the public on Monday, December 6, 2021, and is a permanent exhibit. The exhibit features a HO scale (a model train layout 3.5 millimeters to one foot used especially for model toys such as automobiles or trains) and is modeled to precision with standard gauge tracks and trains.



BMA to unveil official portrait of the beloved late Congressman Elijah E. Cummings

Baltimore— Maya Rockeymoore Cummings and the Baltimore Museum of Art (BMA) announced that the unveiling of the official portrait of Elijah E. Cummings, will take place at the museum on December 21, 2021, during an intimate event that celebrates the beloved Congressman's life and enduring advocacy for social justice.

The portrait was commissioned by Rockeymoore Cummings in March 2021 and painted by Jerrell Gibbs, a Baltimore-based artist recognized for his evocative portraits of Black life and identity. Gibbs was selected from a short list of three Baltimore-based artists that also included Monica Ikegwu and Ernest Shaw, following a multi-phase process led by Rockeymoore Cummings and a selection committee of BMA and local community leaders.

The portrait, which serves to honor Cummings' many achievements and unwavering commitment to his home city of Baltimore, will be on public view at the BMA from December 22, 2021, through January 9, 2022, before it is permanently installed in the U.S. Capitol.

Additional details about the Washington, D.C. display will be announced at a later date.

"In life Elijah and I enjoyed supporting the diversity of artists and events hosted by the Baltimore Museum of Art. It is providence that I was able to bring Elijah's official portrait to life in partnership with the BMA's transformational leader Christopher Bedford and his team of world-class experts, as well as community arts leaders and wonderfully supportive donors," said Rockeymoore Cummings. "We are exceedingly pleased with the result. Jerrell Gibbs is a masterfully expressive painter and his stunning portrait perfectly captures Elijah's essence and majesty. It is a timeless masterpiece."

Elijah E. Cummings was born in 1951 in a segregated Baltimore and grew up facing profound racism from white communities that brutally resisted integration. Despite the discouragement he faced when he was labeled special education in his early

school years, Cummings graduated with honors from City College, Howard University, and the University of Maryland School of Law. He served for 14 years in the Maryland House of Delegates, where he became the first African American to be named speaker pro tem, before running for Congress in 1996. For more than two decades, he served in the U.S. House of Representatives on behalf of the people of Maryland's 7th congressional district, which includes parts of Baltimore City, Baltimore County and Howard County.

Cummings rose to become one of the most powerful and respected voices in Congress, championing social justice, fairness, and a democracy that serves all Americans. In 2019, he was appointed Chairman of the House Oversight and Reform Committee and leveraged the role to lead investigations into the administration of Donald Trump. Throughout his historic career, he remained committed to his home city and governed with a sensibility that acknowledged the incredibly negative effect that systemic racism and classism have on people's lives.

Following his death in October 2019, he became the first African American legislator to lie in state in the U.S. Capitol, and he continues to be remembered for his profound influence on the contemporary fight for civil rights and the preservation of our democracy.

"Working on a painting of such great importance meant so much to me. I am extremely honored to have been considered and selected to paint the official portrait of The Honorable Elijah Cummings," said Gibbs. "A very special thank you to Maya Rockeymoore Cummings, Christopher Bedford, Asma Naeem, as well as the entire portrait committee. This experience has been a once in a lifetime opportunity and I will forever cherish this monumental moment. I hope I made Elijah proud."

The portrait, which will be installed in the center of museum's historic John Russell Pope building, will open to the public on December 22, 2022, so that the community that Cummings so loved can enjoy and experience it before it travels to its permanent home in Washington, D.C.

The countless injuries accumulated by the Baltimore Ravens have made life quite difficult for the team this season. Things got even more difficult after last week's game when the Ravens lost star cornerback Marlon Humphrey who suffered a season ending chest injury last Sunday against the Pittsburgh Steelers.

According to an ESPN article, the Ravens have placed a total of 22 players on injured reserve. The 8 and 4 record isn't a glaring example, but John Harbaugh has coached one of his better seasons this year.

right decisions, is not properly formed and developed. It is now time to develop, publish and teach a common code of ethical behavior for all Americans, whatever their ethnic, religious or cultural origins. No society can cohere without a common shared culture: a shared way of speaking, thinking, hoping, acting and behaving. We need to develop a social conscience—the mind of man making the right decisions, in our people.

There needs to be guidance in the area of morals. This is where criminal and civic decisions are nurtured and eventually chosen or rejected. The law makers and the legal professionals need to immediately focus on developing the moral code, the summary of the laws which are now in place and have those taught to the entire culture in such a forceful manner that the criminal behavior that seems to be taking over this country can be stemmed.

The ability to distinguish between what is right and wrong must be established and taught in the schools at every level. Doing what is right should be praised and doing what is wrong must be shamed and banished from civic society for the good of the society, as a whole. The ancients knew this very well that concepts of right and wrong must be taught, and in ancient cultures codes of ethics were developed and taught to the children as part of the established rights of passage. For centuries, the Judeo-Christian ethics guided the morality of the Western Civilizations and helped them to grow and prosper.


Today, ethics based on Jewish and Christian thought are not universally accepted on religious grounds. Even though most of the tenets of that morality were universal, teaching them somehow became objectionable. Even basic thoughts like "do unto others as you would have them do unto you" cannot be taught because such is coming from someone's religion and can be seen as a secret way of proselytizing. So, although the moral teaching is good for the society, it has been rejected because

of its religious source. No one stops to think that those religions were most likely developed to introduce the concepts of right and wrong; good and evil. Take a reread of Genesis chapters one through three to discover that Genesis was most likely written to introduce the concepts of good and evil, rather than to deal with the geological beginnings. Those chapters were written to introduce concepts of good and evil, morality, into the human condition. (But that is for another column.)

Returning to the modern day need for the establishment of an acceptable moral code to guide the society in matters related to behavior, right and wrong, we believe that the law schools that developed Critical Race Theory need to spend some time developing what we want to call Critical Moral Theory (CMT) that can take the place of religious morality in a modern world where religion is being rejected.

The society desperately needs to develop morals to guide the society. If those are not to come from the churches. many of which seem to have lost their influence by their bad behavior over the centuries, then we need to develop a respected source for creating moral guidelines for the society at large. The religious leaders can still do their religious thing for their members. But society must find a way to gather the basics of morality and codify them in simple, easy to learn tenets that can underpin the laws of the land, criminal and civil. These must then be universally taught in schools, colleges and through movies and the arts so that the entire society could inculcate them and be guided by them.

Decades ago, through this column in The Baltimore Times, we offered a listing of what could become the basis for a Universal Moral Code for all peoples. This was done through the process of deducing, as best as we could, from the vast number of laws on the books the tenets that underpin matters criminal and civic, fundamental tenets, that could be taught to undergird those vast tomes of law. Nobody can



memorize all those laws. But everyone can remember simple tenets like: "keep your promises," "do not steal" and "respect the dignity of every human being." So, we developed a modern code of 10 universal tenets. We will list our ten, again, below. But who are we to do such a thing? That is why we need the law schools and the law makers to examine these tenets and critically review them. Add, to them, modify them, source them, but in the end authenticate some code of behavior that can be enthusiastically taught to all members of the society.

The great philosopher, Plato, raised this question to his student Nemo: "tell

me Nemo, can virtue be taught?" We answer, "yes, and it must be taught." But in our divided society we must come to some agreement about what can be universally taught, without controversy. Here are our ten universal tenets. The law makers, lawyers and preachers should critically look at these, add or remove what are not acceptable, so that after a robust examination the results of our Critical Moral Theory can be codified and taught universally.

In the interim period, please download and share as a Christmas present this "Code of Ethics for all Civilized People."


