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Equal representation or politics as usual? — School board appointment stirs controversy

Moments before he made the motion to replace Russellville City Schools Board of Education member Bret Gist with Radford Hester, District Five Councilman Jamie Harris said his decision was about fulfilling a promise to the people of his district for equal representation on city boards.

For Gist and his approximately 30 supporters in attendance at the December 6th meeting, the council's action was more about 'politics as usual' taking priority over what's best for the education of the system's 2,500 students.

Harris' motion, seconded by District One Councilman David Palmer, was

approved by a 5-1 vote. Harris, Palmer, District Two Councilman Darren Woodruff, District Four Councilman Dexter Hamilton and Mayor David Grissom voted in favor, while District Three Councilman Gary Cummings was the lone 'no' vote.

Hester, a former teacher, coach, administrator and superintendent of education, will take his seat on the board effective at the next scheduled December 16th. meeting of the Russellville City

School board members are appointed to five-year terms. Board members include Jerry Groce, Kim Clonts, Greg Trapp and Greg Batchelor.

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
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

Russellville City Council authorizes application for federal airport grant

The Russellville City Council authorized Mayor David Grissom to sign an application for a federal assistance grant for the Russellville Municipal Airport in the amount of \$22,000.

The council took the action at its December 6th meeting. If received, the grant funds will be used for costs related to "operations, personnel, cleaning, sanitization, janitorial services and combating the spread of pathogens at the airport, along with debt service payments."

In other agenda items, the council:

—passed a resolution commending the Cotton Flats Cruisers Car Club for its community support which included a \$500 donation to the Russellville Fire Department's Helping Santa Program.

—entered into a professional services agreement with Civil Group, LLC, for the Transportation Alternative Program project, which includes sidewalk improvements downtown.

—entered into an agreement with 3rd Eye Technology to provide cameras on garbage trucks at a cost of \$55/month per truck.



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—approved a low bid for a camera system at the Russellville Police Department from Smart Fox Solutions for \$20,043.97.

—approved the promotion of John Cantrell to sergeant in the Russellville Police Department.

—approved the promotion of Jamie Reeves to Heavy Equipment Operator III in the Russellville Street Department.

—declared two vacancies for Firefighter II in the Russellville Fire Department and authorized promoting from within the classified service.

—declared Thursday, Dec. 23 and Friday, Dec. 24 as municipal holidays for the City of Russellville and Thursday, Dec. 30 and Friday, Dec. 31 as New Year's Eve and New Year's holidays for the City of Russellville full-time Civil service employees.

—approved Leamon Mosley to fill a vacancy on the Russellville Electric Board, replacing board member Arthur Elliott.

The next regular meeting of the Russellville City Council will be December 20, 2021, with work session and 6 p.m., and meeting to follow.

Gist's term expired June 1, 2021, and the appointment of his seat was on the council's May 12, 2021, meeting agenda, but no action was taken at that meeting. Gist served two terms on the school board, dating back to 2011.

Hester will be the lone board member from District Five. Two board members, Trapp and Clonts, reside in District One. Groce is a District Four resident and Batchelor a District Three resident.

"I want to thank Mr. Gist for his decade of service to the Russellville City Board of Education. I was elected by the people of District Five to represent them and we have not had a school board member from our district in more than a decade," Harris said.

"First and foremost, Mr. Hester is a resident of District Five and a close second his extensive experience as a teacher, coach, principal and superintendent of education that he brings to the board," he added.

Hester's appointment ended weeks of speculation as to whether Gist would be appointed to serve a third term. Gist requested to be placed on the December 6th city council meeting agenda. His name appeared on the agenda, but was the final agenda item, after board appointments were to be addressed.

Grissom allowed Gist to address the council during the work session, prior to the meeting, but the fact he was on the agenda after the board appointment was to be decided did not sit well with him.

"They put me on the agenda after the board appointment was to be decided," Gist said. "The decision would already be made. They knew how many votes they had and I don't believe I got a fair shake."

Gist previously sent an email to each council member and the mayor reiterating his interest and willingness to serve another term on the school board. Gist also met with Harris several times this year, he said.

Harris made the motion to appoint Gist to his second term in 2015, even though Gist was a District Four resident. After he was reelected last year, Harris said he was resolved to nominate a District Five resident.

Harris asked that the appointment be taken off the May 2021 meeting agenda in order to have more time to evaluate who he would nominate.

"It's nothing personal. This seat was up for appointment and I wanted to nominate a quality member of my district to fill it," Harris told the *FFP* in May. "I made the motion to appoint Bret Gist (in 2015) so obviously I have no personal issues with him."

Gist is the co-owner and vice-president of Franklin Manufacturing, Road Gear Truck Equipment, LLC and G&G Steel, a Russellville company started by his father in 1975. G&G provides fabrication for multiple private industries as well as the military. The company employs several hundred workers in Russellville and Cordova.

Gist and G&G Steel actively work with local high school Career Technology Programs to help students learn the skills needed for full-time employment after graduation.

G&Ğ employs high school students on part-time basis through an apprenticeship program and several now work for the company on a full-time basis. Gist serves on the board of directors of North Alabama Works and Valley State Bank. He is a RHS graduate and has established technical trade and nursing scholarships in honor of his grandparents.

He is a member of the Bevill State Community College Advisory Committee and active supporter of the Northwest-Shoals Community College FAME Program. He is a board member of the NW-SCC Foundation and NW-SCC ASPIRE Committee for Career Tech. He is a 2018 graduate of the Leadership Alabama program

Gist served on the school board when Heath Grimes was hired as superintendent in 2015.

Russellville City Schools, with 54 percent of its enrollment being Hispanic, has received state recognition for its English Language Learners program and test scores and state grades continue to show the success and growth of the system, even with the challenges of its demographics.

As he addressed the council, Gist asked to continue to be a part of that growth process.

"I come tonight with a heavy heart and ask everyone to really think hard about what is best for the city school system," Gist said. "I think my track record, along with the other board members, speaks for itself.

"I would appreciate the opportunity to continue the growth our school system has seen. My mother taught me about the love of being a servant to others and I work hard every day to help see the continued growth of Russellville City Schools. You see the support we have here tonight for our schools. If you graduated at Russellville like I did, you know what it means to be a Russellville Golden Tiger. I ask you tonight to be reappointed to the school board," he added.

Two board members and Grimes attended the meeting in support of Gist, along with several administrators and teachers.

After the meeting, Gist said he believed the decision was made before the meeting and nothing he said made any difference, but he wanted to publicly state his passion to continue serving Russellville City Schools.

"When something's not broken, don't try to fix it. That can do damage. We are thriving academically and athletically. Our Fine Arts program is thriving and we've done so for many years now," Gist said.

"We are building a new high school addition, have plans to redo our Career Tech facility and have a Career Tech Coordinator doing a great job. It takes a long time to understand the ins and outs of board operations. My heart is with this school system. It's not about me personally. It's always been about our school system. With our unique demographics, officials at the state level speak highly of the leadership we have in our school system. We're willing to go to bat for our students, teachers and it's working," he added.

Gist asked the council to consider their oath of office and what it means when making a decision about the board appointment.

"Ask yourselves are you really considering what you were sworn in to do, which is make the best decisions to the best of your abilities for the City of Russellville. If not reappointing me is the best decision for the city, I think a lot of people might question that," Gist said.

The council also approved another board appointment at Monday's meeting, as former councilman Arthur Elliott was replaced on the Russellville Electric Board by Leamon Mosley.

On Tuesday, Gist said he will continue to support Russellville City Schools, both personally and professionally, something he's not sure the city council is doing.

"Now my position and role has changed, but my drive and passion to improve our school system has not changed," Gist said. "If only we had a mayor and council with the same drive and passion who would make decisions based on what's best for the city and not what's best for them politically. That would make Russellville a better place to live and work."

Woodruff, whose campaign for City Council District Two was based on equal representation for his district on city boards, believes all citizens must be represented in order to improve the quality of education in Russellville. "I want to thank Mr. Gist for all of his years of service to Russellville City Schools. He has been an excellent board member," Woodruff said. "I believe every district in Russellville should be represented on every board. Anything less is discrimination.

"According to school records, District Two has not had a school board member since the birth of the school. Every district deserves to be represented. This was one of my campaign promises," Woodruff said.

Palmer, the District One councilman, told the *FFP* in May he believed the quality of board candidates outweighs what part of the city they live in.

While he still believes the qualifications of a school board member are paramount, Palmer said he now understands his fellow council members' push for equal representation.

"I'm not opposed to equal representation by any means. But what I want is five people who can serve on the board and make the best decisions for the school, or any other agency or entity their board represents," Palmer said. "This involves looking at who can work together and be a partner with the city council and mayor to work for the betterment of the city. I appreciate those who have served on boards and those who are presently serving. It is a sacrifice and I really appreciate what they do," he added.

When it comes to Hester, who has more than four decades as an educator, Palmer said his qualifications as a school board member are evident.

"I talked with Radford Hester. He has more than 40 years' experience at every level of education possible," Palmer said. "His qualifications to serve as a school board member should not be questioned. That was never an issue with me."

RV Utilities officials proactive in resolving delays in billing statements

A problem causing customers not to receive their utility bills on time has been corrected after officials with Russellville Utilities contacted the billing company and brought the problem to its attention.

Amy Rickard, Russellville Utilities Office Manager, said there was a period earlier this year when customers were not receiving their utility bills on time, and in some cases, not until after the due date had passed.

Billing for Russellville Utilities is contracted to Central Services Association (CSA), which processed and mailed customer bills from its Birmingham office until that office closed several months ago.

CSA transferred the Russellville Utilities account to its Atlanta office, and that's where the delays began, Rickard explained.

"They were having trouble getting anyone hired and getting them to stay, so they dropped the ball on getting statements out in a timely manner," Rickard said. "That did happen but it has been straightened out for the last three

The Franklin Free Press was contacted by two customers of Russellville Utilities who said they did not receive bills at all for two months. Those customers said they drove to the Russellville Utilities office and asked what amount they owed so that their service would not be cut off.

Rickard contacted the company's South Carolina office and asked that the Russellville Utilities account be moved there, which it was.

"That has been much more efficient. Now customers are getting them like they used to when they came from Birmingham," Rickard said. "We have had some delays with customers receiving bills late as a result of the post office notice that it may take an additional 5-10 days or more for mail to be deliv-

"The only delay now would be a delay from the post office because our bills are going out like they have for years. During the period of time when they moved us to Atlanta, I called them once a day, sometimes more, checking on that problem," she added.

Rickard said that any customers who contacted Russellville Utilities after receiving a bill late had their late fees waived.

"If it was because the bill came late we took those fees off," Rickard said. When billing and usage information is sent electronically to CSA, Rickard said Russellville Utilities receives confirmation from CSA and most bills are mailed that day.

"As soon as they receive all the information we get a confirmation the same day, usually within an hour," Rickard said.

If your utility bill does not arrive on time, call Russellville Utilities Customer Service at 256-332-3850.

years ago. When he purchased an additional one acre that allowed him to request annexation into the City of Russellville as an adjoining land owner to city property.

Once the property was annexed into the city, Welborn could then petition to sell alcohol on the premises.

But that wasn't the only hurdle Welborn had to overcome. His whole vision for a premier store depended on the State of Alabama's installation of a traffic light at the Highway 24/East Lawrence Street intersection.

Funding for that project was approved seven years ago, then taken away when the project was defunded. Welborn credits Franklin County Engineer David Palmer and the Russellville City Council and Mayor David Grissom with working to get the traffic signal back on the approved list.

'They were pushing for that traffic light already because of wrecks at that intersection, so when we knew it was coming, I started putting my plan together," Welborn said.

The 5000-square foot building houses a convenience store, open 24 hours a day, a package store and shower facilities for truck drivers. Additionally, there are three masters and two satellite pumps for trucks behind the building.

Welborn's vision isn't complete yet. Although the Exxon signage is in place, he's still waiting on signs for the building.

Down the road, although there's no specific timeline, Welborn hopes to have a motel behind the property and possibly a fast food restaurant or something similar to a Huddle House or Waffle House.

"We wanted to have the marguis store on that 100-mile stretch. I look at it like a Love's with smaller parameters. That's how we built the store. I Yogi's Ballpark is equipped with snacks, bevwant to elevate the amenities of what we're erages, and a package store to go along with a able to offer and I looked deli.

at Love's and how they operate their locations," Welborn said.

'The cherry on top of this would be the motel, fast food or a Huddle House, etc.," he added.

Yogi's Ballpark has a deli with hot food available 24 hours a day. Breakfasts include homemade biscuits with fresh sausage or Amish bacon, as well as pastries.

Welborn is excited about what Russellville residents have to look forward to with Huntsville's continued growth to the west and Tupelo to the east.

"Those are among the many positive things that will impact the future of Russellville, our standard of living, education and other improvements that go along with more tax revenue," Welborn said.

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Seven Bobcats named to 3A region 8 all-region team

The 2021 football season was very kind to the Phil Campbell Bobcats. After a 7-3 regular season that saw the Bobcats clinch a second place finish in 3A region 8 and securing a postseason berth.

And as the season came to a close just weeks ago with the state championships being played, the individual accolades are beginning to roll in for the Bobcats.

John Randle Herring was named the 3A region 8 defensive lineman of the year in addition to being selected to the first team for the region. The senior lineman, who also suited up at tight end and running back on the year, put up big numbers for a vibrant Bobcat defense.

Accumulating a staggering 47.5 tackles (4.8 per game) on the season, Herring's biggest performances on the year included an 8.5 tackle game against Lauderdale County and a nine tackle game against East Lawrence.

Offensively, Herring was efficient as well. Carrying the ball 69 times on the season, Herring amassed 354 yards on the ground and three touchdowns.

Herring wasn't the only Bobcat represented on the all-region team as six others were named to the first team.

Blain Goodson, who primarily played at the tight end slot on offense while lining up at cornerback on defense, was also named to the first team. Catching only ten passes on the year, Goodson was extremely efficient as he accumulated 292 yards to go along with five touchdowns. On the defensive side, Goodson made 29 tackles (2.6 per game) and also had one interception on the season.



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A very successful week: Bulldogs go 3-0 against county opponents

It was a very good week for the Belgreen Bulldogs who went 3-0 on the week with all three wins coming against different county foes.

With the three wins on the week, Belgreen moves to an impressive 8-1 with only three weeks left in the year.

Belgreen 69 Tharptown 33

Kicking off their perfect week, the Bulldogs got a win over Tharptown thanks in large part to four Bulldogs who scored in double digits on the night.

Austin James led the scoring charge for the Bulldogs in the first quarter, leading the way with seven points including a three-pointer.

The Bulldogs jumped out to a 19-10 lead as Belgreen got four points apiece from Canaan Stough and Cole King and two points each from Will Bonner and Hadden Taylor.

The second quarter was more of the same from the Bulldogs as they outscored the Wildcats 19-11, bringing their lead to 38-21 at halftime. Will Bonner scored 11 points in the quarter to lead all scorers as Austin James would knock down a pair of three-pointers giving him three field goals from beyond the arc in the half. Adrian Reaves chipped in with two points of his own in the quarter.

The third quarter is where the Bulldogs saw their lead extend by its largest margin by a 26-8 total, giving Belgreen a commanding 64-29 lead headed into the fourth quarter.

Hadden Taylor led all scorers in the quarter, scoring ten points while going 2-2 from the free throw line. Canaan Stough scored six points in the third quarter while Will Bonner scored three points with Braycen Johnson and Cole King scoring two points and one point in the quarter.

A low-scoring fourth quarter saw the Bulldogs close the door on the Wildcats, outscoring Tharptown for the fourth straight quarter by a 6-4 margin to close out the 69-33 win.

Carson Cox scored four points in the fourth quarter with Taylor adding two points.

Will Bonner led all scorers with 18 points while Hadden Taylor (14 points),

Braxton Goodson and Jeitt Traywick all made the first team in 3A region 8 as well for the Bobcats.

Hyde was the epitome of the phrase "Jack-of-all-trades" for Phil Campbell as contributed in meaningful ways on offense, defense and special teams. Suiting up primarily at running back, Hyde totaled 128 carries to accumulate 812 yards (6.3 YPG) in addition to 12 touchdown carries. In the receiving game, Hyde was targeted seven times on the season, catching all seven targets for a total of 84 yards and two touchdowns.

Suiting up at cornerback primarily on defense, Hyde made nine tackles on the year with one interception to his credit. An excellent kick returner, Hyde returned seven kickoffs for 206 yards including a 98-yard touchdown return.

Green, one of four seniors to make the first team, carried the football 38 times for 221 yards (5.8 YPG) and three touchdowns on the ground. Through the air, Green also hauled in nine passes for 281 yards to go along with three touchdown receptions.

Defensively, Green was a force for the Bobcats as well. A five tackle performance against Clements en route to a 30 tackle season for Green also went along with three interceptions for the senior.

Swinney was a solid defensive staple for the Bobcats as well as on the punt return team. Seven tackles, a season-high for Swinney, against Danville was the exclamation mark on a season that saw Swinney account for 34 tackles on the season

In terms of punt returns, Swinney returned nine punts for 252 yards.

Braxton Goodson, the lone sophomore to make the first team for the Bobcats, was a key part of the defense for Phil Campbell.

Against Lauderdale County, Goodson accounted for 9.5 tackles which was his season-high followed soon by an eight tackle performance in the Bobcats' playoff game against J.B. Pennington. Goodson totaled 61 tackles on the season (5.5 per game) to go along with three interceptions.

Traywick also was an important piece of the defense for head coach Kevin Barnwell and his staff as he (Traywick) totaled 57.5 tackles (5.2 per game) in addition to two interceptions on the season.

Honorable mentions for the 3A region 8 team included: Tyler Osborn, Jackson Clark, Austin Douthit, Cole Pace, Kyle Pace and Cooper Riddle.
