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
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Welcome to Franklin County, Tennessee






DECHERD

SUNSETS AND THE HOMETOWN FEEL.



SHERWOOD


LOST COVE CAVE, CROW CREEK VALLEY, AND SINKING COVE.

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
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

SEWANEE: THE UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH




TWIN CREEKS AREA ON TIMS FORD LAKE

Give Twin Creeks on Tims Ford Lake a call as you're planning your time in Franklin County. Twin Creeks provides something for everyone; go on walking tours of the premises and see housing options—or visit the public marina. Park your boat and visit the on-site store to get everything for your boating needs. The store offers gas, beverages, sunscreen, apparel and so much more. Then, make a stop at the Bar & Grill restaurant, which was voted as the "Best Meal on Tims Ford Lake."

BEAR TRACE GOLF COURSE

This golf course in Franklin County is just a quick hour-and-a-half away from the great city of Nashville. "The course at Tims Ford features Champion Bermuda greens and 419 Bermuda fairways," Tennessee State Parks explains. "The opening holes are a blend of links-style creations that gently roll across former pasture land, then gradually transition to wooded sites dominated by giant oak trees." Bear Trace rests near the Tims Ford Reservoir, and several of the holes interact with the reservoir. This offers a unique golfing experience while also providing a gorgeous backdrop.





TEMPLETON LIBRARY IN SEWANEE

The Templeton Library, named after the late John Templeton, is a gorgeous stop while in Franklin County. The building has an interesting and quite mysterious history and auroma. There are stories of tragedy and mystery that pique the interest of explorers everywhere. Add this location to your itinerary and research the stories that revolve around the Templeton Library.

FALLS MILL

Falls Mill is listed on the national registry for historic places. The mill is nearly 150 years old and has changed hands and purposes many times over the past century. The 32-foot waterwheel powers the building today, which is the Museum of Power and Industry, Inc. This location encapsulates true nature and true beauty. Guests from across the country visit the mill and it never ceases to amaze.

SEWANEE INN VIEW

Book a stay at the Sewanee Inn. It offers a view of the marvelous beauty in Franklin County. In the fall, the autumn colors pop from east to west and make an image only seen best from the Sewanee Inn. The Inn is a casual, but elegant solution to those visiting the area.

CIRCLE E GUEST RANCH



WINCHESTER CITY PARK

Bound on three sides by the beautiful Tims Ford Lake, the City of Winchester offers and maintains an additional City Park. The park includes an indoor and outdoor swimplex; a one-million-dollar minor league baseball facility; a multitude of softball fields; Babe Ruth baseball facilities; and several little league practice fields. The Winchester City Park also offers walking/jogging trails; tennis courts; outdoor and indoor public pavilions; boat launch ramp to Tims Ford Lake; two handicapped accessible fishing piers; children's playgrounds; disc golf; and camping facilities.

BLUECROSS HEALTHY PLACE AT HUNTLAND CITY PARK

After raising local money, the community of Huntland applied for a grant from BlueCross BlueShield of Tennessee Foundation. The Franklin County community was successful in receiving the grant and was able to build a fenced playground with additional seating for parents. This allows an outdoor and safe environment for the children of the community. While you're in town, swing by and let your children enjoy this city park!

But more than just the events, Circle E Guest Ranch offers dinner and



















MARINAS

Holiday Landing Marina



Tims Ford Marina

Best of all, it is only a few short miles to Tims Ford State Park where more adventure awaits.





TIMS FORD STATE PARK

Nestled on 3,546 acres, Tims Ford State Park is a perfect space for outdoorsmen of all skill levels to escape. A novice who may want the beauty of nature, but the comfort of home would fit well in one of the 20 cabins available. For those who are desiring to get more in touch with the earth, the RV park, primitive camping sites, or the backcountry camping sites would be more suitable.

The park has over 20 miles of hiking trails, as well as seven miles of paved biking/hiking trails that connect all the major areas of the park. The paved trail is a wonderful feature for those who have a harder time getting around or for families with young children who prefer to use a stroller.

Not a fan of hiking or biking? Let's tee off at Bear Trace Golf course instead. It is an eighteenhole golf course within the state park itself. It is situated on a peninsula with glimmering water each way you look—this golf course is one of Middle Tennessee's best-kept secrets. If golf is not your thing, feel free to stroll down to the Lakeview Marina (also located within the park) and rent a pontoon, canoe, or kayak for a little water play. In addition to the many recreational activities at your fingertips, the park rangers do a great job at providing southern hospitality to travelers by hosting seasonal events all year long. Local Fishing

Of all of the leisurely activities to do on Tims Ford Lake, fishing is what keeps locals and visitors toting down the boat ramps all year long. Tims Ford is well known for largemouth, spotted, and smallmouth bass. The lake is stocked annually and the cold tailwaters below the dam are stocked numerous times each year. On any given foggy morning you can find anglers suiting up to fish for both brown trout and rainbow trout in the Elk River tailwaters or gassing up their Bumblebee® fishing boats getting ready to troll the treelines on Tims Ford Lake. If you are planning to fish in any public waters and are above the age of 13, make sure to obtain a Tennessee Fishing License. If you do not have one, you can purchase one online at license.gooutdoorstennessee.com/ Licensing/CustomerLookup.



Small Town, Big Fun -The Downtown Square

The city of Winchester is bursting with life, and the downtown area is proof. The area recently underwent a few renovations, all of which are aiding in preserving the history and exciting the surrounding community. There are a wide variety of activities that can be found within the city's square. While walking around, you will bear witness to beautifully painted murals, unique shops, locally-owned restaurants—and if you're lucky, you may even get to attend one of the many community events hosted annually. The downtown area centers around the Franklin County courthouse built in the Art Deco style of the early 1900s. The downtown area is full of interesting things, whether it is watching the newest movie at the theatre, eating a meal at one of the many amazing restaurants, or shopping for a unique item, you are guaranteed to have an amazing time.

The University of the South

The University of the South, also known as Sewanee, is an Episcopal private liberal arts college. Consisting of 13,000 acres, it is situated on top of the Cumberland Plateau. With an enrollment of around 1,800, they teach students from 45 different states and 30 countries. Located right in the center of the campus is All Saints Chapel, which is a place of worship for those who belong to the Episcopal faith. It just so happens that it is also a beautiful historic building with the history of the university being able to be read on the chapel's stained-glass windows. Outside of the main campus area, you can find a multitude of hiking trails and scenic destinations of the like that are ready to be explored. The campus has many breathtaking sites, some of which are located right in the heart of campus and some require venturing outside a bit-regardless, you are guaranteed that your visit to Sewanee will be one for the books.

Branchwater Distillery

Branchwater Distillery was founded years ago by Dave Johnson. It is believed you need three things in order to be a successful moonshiner: ingenuity, patience, and luck. Dave had all three, so he launched a business. The characteristic of ingenuity was put into action when the threat of law officials finding out his operations seemed nearby. Dave devised a plan where he would use a strong branch and pulley system to keep the equipment suspended high above everyone else. This is how the name Branchwater was born. Since then, the business has been passed down and is currently owned and operated by Bud Kelly. The tradition of the past is still alive and well. At Branchwater, all of the cooking is done in the old copper still which is now fittingly named Dave after his grandfather. The goal of Branchwater is to not only create a good product, but to also create an experience along with it. They hope that with every sip, the feeling of the past flutters back in.

Franklin County Farmers' Market

The Franklin County Farmers' Market, located in downtown Winchester, is home to many types of fresh goods from local farmers, bakers, and even artists. To name a few of what the market has to offer, it features things








such as produce; eggs; baked goods; crafts; meats; jams; and canned goods. However, the market also offers a slew of other items besides these few. The Franklin farmers market is one of the many joys Franklin County has to offer. If you find yourself in need of fresh goods, wanting to support local farmers or desiring to have fellowship with the community, then the farmers market is the perfect place.

The Sewanee Memorial Cross

In August of 1922, a symbol of remembrance was constructed. Today it still stands tall-60 feet tall to be exact—and its beauty is something everyone should witness. The Sewanee Memorial Cross is a monument designed in honor of those who died in "the war to end all wars." It sits on the edge of the campus of The University of the South. At the base of the cross, you can find dedication plagues outlining specific groups that the cross commemorates. The cross's location also offers a view of the valley that is unmatched; a nearby hiking trail will take you to another overlook. You cannot go wrong with adding this to your must-see list.











Falls Mill

A towering sentinel of the past, powered by the rushing waters of Factory Creek, Falls Mill is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It's home to a museum as well as a country store. Falls Mill began serving its community in 1873, and has been a thread, cotton, woolen, and grist mill. A printing press and a variety of weaving looms, spinning wheels, and wool carding machines are exhibited in the Museum of Power and Industry. Visitors may want to consider an overnight stay to enjoy bed and breakfast accommodation in the 1895 log cabin on the grounds. Falls Mill is located in Belvidere.

Cowan Railroad Museum

Cowan's railroad history started in the mid-1800s and proudly prevails in this museum, which is housed in a 1904 depot building and surrounded by a landscaped park area. Outside exhibits include a caboose, a 1920 steam locomotive, and a General Electric Diesel switch engine. Around 1,000 artifacts are on display, many of which have been donated or loaned from individual collections. Visitors can glean intriguing information about Cowan's railroad history, and can view scale model trains (a number of which are richly detailed and created by hand); maps; tools; photographs; and even hear modern freight trains rumbling close by. A gift shop offers railroad-related items for sale.





Polly Crockett's Grave Site

Born in Hamblen County in 1788, Polly Finlay wed David "Davy" Crockett in August 1806 at her parents' home. They lived in that area while their two sons were born. The Crockett family then moved to Middle Tennessee to "Kentuck," a homestead they established near Belvidere around 1813, where they had a daughter, Margaret. After Davy returned from the Creek War, Polly died in 1815. She was laid to rest in a small cemetery overlooking Beans Creek. Davy later became known as a legendary frontiersman and remarried. The Tennessee Historical Commission erected a historical marker along U.S. 64 in Belvidere and placed a large stone monument at Polly's grave.



Old Jail Museum

Winchester is home to the Franklin County Old Jail Museum, which is one of the Tennessee Civil War Trails sites, as well as being listed on the National Register of Historic Places. This brick jail dates back to 1897 and was in use until the early 1970s. There are eight rooms in the jail, which include a restored jail cell, and displays including handcuffs; leg irons; Civil War and Native American artifacts; weapons; and farming implements. Other exhibits portray information regarding World War I and II, and about the famous singer and actress Dinah Shore, who was born in Winchester in 1917.



Hundred Oaks Castle

One of very few American castles, Hundred Oaks in Winchester is imbued with a rich and romantic history. Its construction as a plantation-style farmhouse began in 1830 for railroad tycoon Benjamin Decherd. Then it was acquired in 1860 by Albert Marks, who later became the 21st governor of Tennessee. For more than half a century, the castle was a monastery for Paulist Fathers, and in more recent times, the castle served as an Adult Activity Center. Lovingly restored by the Kent Bramlett Foundation, Inc. after a horrendous fire in 1990, Hundred Oaks Castle's splendor is reflected by elegant furnishings and paintings, and neatly-manicured gardens.

Natural Bridge

In the midst of lush hardwoods and moss-covered boulders, a 25-foot tall and 50-foot wide sandstone arch is the namesake of the three-acre Natural Bridge area. Located within the larger South Cumberland Recreation Area south of Sewanee, the bridge was owned at one time by the University of the South, which donated it to the Tennessee Conservation Department. This amazing formation, shaped by Mother Nature's tireless elemental forces, is operated by Tennessee Parks. It's a short hike from the parking area to the Natural Bridge, and those inclined to venture across the top of the bridge can see Lost Cove.







Tims Ford State Park

Sprawling over more than 3,500 acres in the midst of the nearly 11,000-acre Tims Ford Reservoir, those who thrive in the great outdoors can enjoy a wide variety of activities available at this park, including: fishing, boating, biking and hiking, camping, and swimming. The marina has boat rentals and supplies; there are cabins for rent; a conference center; and those who enjoy a picnic outing will find more than 40 tables and grills available. Daily family activities are offered during the summer season, and the 18-hole Bear Trace Golf Course is a popular venue. The vast lake was formed when the Tims Ford Dam was built on the Elk River.

BlueCross Healthy Place at Huntland City Park Huntland City's town center boasts a community park which features a basketball court and bleachers, fitness equipment and a walking track, and a playground with seating. Of special note is the fact that the playground equipment (such as the merry-go-round and see-saws) may accommodate children of all needs and abilities. Picnic tables, grills, and water fountains are in the park as well as a pavilion. This thoughtfully-designed and well-equipped park is primarily funded by a \$936,000 grant from BlueCross and BlueShield of Tennessee Foundation. Popular among local residents, this welcoming outdoor area has served as a community gathering place since 2019.

Winchester City Park

Occupying 100 acres and adjacent to Tims Ford Lake, this park offers a variety of recreational opportunities. Winchester residents may enjoy a nearly 2-mile trail that loops through a woodland setting; playing disc golf on a dedicated course; utilizing an indoor/outdoor swimming complex; baseball facilities and little league fields; softball fields; and tennis courts. Public pavilions are available, and a boat launch ramp and fishing piers facilitate access to the lake. Additionally, Independence Day activities and



outdoor performances such as live music are held at the park; as well as an annual Kansas City Bar-B-Q cook off; and fishing tournaments.

Taylor Creek Greenway

This interesting recreational property near Estill Springs encompasses 54 rambling acres which include a variety of natural environments. Hiking/walking paths with bridges lead visitors through an open area bordering Tims Ford Lake; a wetlands area ecosystem; a woodland area through which two spring-fed creeks run, and a hilly area which is accessible by more primitive trails. Along the way, covered swings and benches provide places to rest and reflect upon natural beautiful surroundings. An historical marker placed within the forested creekside portion highlights native Tennessean Miss Will Allen Dromgoole, whose appreciation of this peaceful area was memorialized in her poetry.

Harvey's Garden

This floral garden near Winchester offers a soothing and relaxing environment for all to enjoy a colorful, blossoming respite from the hectic pace of life. Named for Harvey Templeton, who wanted to establish and share a flourishing garden with the public, it was his son and daughter-in-law, Handly and Becky Templeton, who began creating the garden in 2003 as a memorial to Harvey. Work is ongoing, and more than 30 acres feature meandering grassy pathways bordered by stones. While strolling along, visitors are treated to the delightful sights and scents of a wide variety of blooming perennials, bushes, and trees.

Dennis Parm Panter Park

This small town park in Estill Springs has picnic pavilions with benches, tables, and grills, which are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Some playground equipment is in the park, as well as





baseball fields, which are used at times by the local little league. Occasionally, events such as horse shows may be held at the small track. Flanked by a railroad track on one side and Tims Ford

Lake on the other side, visitors may fish from the shoreline. A few primitive camp sites exist. The park was named as a memorial tribute to teenager Dennis Parm Panter.









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HIKE BEAUTIFUL TRAILS

Explore the many gorgeous hiking locations in Franklin County.

Sewanee Perimeter Trail

The Sewanee Perimeter Trail is a private mixed-use mountain top trail of 20 miles owned and maintained by the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. Open year-round, the trail difficulty is easy to moderate and includes Thumping Dick Cove, Sewanee War Memorial Cross, Green's View, and Morgan's Steep.

The trail follows the perimeter of the Cumberland Plateau bluff line and encircles the campus of the University and will take you to scenic overlooks, waterfalls, and bluffs. Open for use by students, faculty, and alumni of the University as well as local Sewanee residents, the trail includes mixeduse sections suited to hiking, running, horseback riding, and mountain biking.


There are 10 designated trails, and access points are found at the Memorial Cross, Lake Cheston, Green's View, and the University Gates, with signs noting hiking and camping policies of the property at the access points.

Tims Ford State Park

The 3,546-acre Tims Ford State Park sits in the shadows of the Cumberland Plateau in south central Tennessee. Its lake is considered one of the most picturesque in the state and regarded as one of the top bass fishing and recreational lakes in the Southeast.

Cabins; boat rentals; campgrounds; The Bear Trace at Tims Ford, a Jack Nicklaus-designed golf course; marinas; dining; birding; hiking trails; biking; picnic pavilions; and playgrounds invite visitors to experience nature and the beauty of the seasons. Hunting is allowed by permit on Tims Ford's huntable lands.

The multiple lodging opportunities include completely equipped cabins, two campgrounds for tent or RV campers, and



tent campers may camp on any of the six islands on the lake or at Turkey Creek area. Tims Ford State Park Fairview Camp Store or the State Park's Visitors' Center Gift Shop offer gear, snacks, accessories, and something special to remember your trip to the park.


Walls of Jericho

The Walls of Jericho Trailhead is a 7.5-mile out-and-back trail located near Belvidere, Tennessee, on the border of Tennessee and Alabama.

"Walls of Jericho" refers to narrow canyons, about a half-mile long, with 200-foot-high vertical limestone bluffs on each side. The hike culminates in the impressive geological feature that forms a large bowl-shaped amphitheater with unique water features from which water drips and spouts. Turkey Creek drains through the Walls and has been an active geological force in creating the amphitheater.

An itinerant preacher performing baptisms there gave the Walls their biblical name in the late 1800s.

There are two trailheads hikers can take to the Walls: from Alabama Highway 79/ Tennessee Highway 16, one on each side of the state line and about 2.25 miles apart. The hike from the Tennessee trailhead is less steep than the Alabama Trail. Either way involves an approximately 1,000-foot descent in and climb out.


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

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

The tent-only primitive campsites are located nine miles north of the main park with 20 tent-only primitive sites. There is no water or electricity. Each site is limited to two tents and six people.

EVANS LOOP BACKCOUNTRY CAMPSITE

570 Tims Ford Dr. Winchester

This campsite is located on the Evans Loop Trail and is a hike-in or paddle-in campsite. The hike is approximately six miles with no water or electricity.







USING LOCAL TALENT TO HIGHLIGHT LOCAL LEGENDS




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
