Llewellyn said it turned out to be just what she and her group needed, also.

"Some in our group have lost loved ones this year, so this just made our Christmas perfect," she said.

Losing the War for **Our Children**

t is always humbling to learn something new. Life is, by design, a continuous journey from the unknown to the known, from the old to the new. My most recent learning experience

occurred last week, when I learned of the travesties befalling our country's youth.

We often read depressing headlines, such as "100,000 individuals died of drug overdoses last year," but seldom pause to consider the people behind these statistics.

Over the past two decades, so-called designer drugs have infiltrated the U.S. from South America and China, harming, poisoning, and killing our country's youth in droves. MDMÅ, ecstasy, fentanyl and other opioids provide a rapid escape for young people from the reality of the world around them. Tragically, for far too many, that escape becomes permanent.

Something particularly distressing that I discovered is the impact that unnecessary procedures have on children. Around 80% of knee operations performed each year are

ON YOUR DEBT

While there are time limitations on with your regular payments. You for receiving a second discharge, in bankruptcy there are other ways to protect your home under the bankruptcy code. After successful completion of your Chapter 13 personal reorganization, you should be completely current on your mortgage and can continue

Hypothermia is a widely misunderstood condition that might be life-threatening. It is caused by prolonged exposure to cold temperatures. The winter months present a greater risk for hypothermia. Normal body temperatures average 98.6 degrees, but with hypothermia, your core temperature can drop below 95 degrees.

Insurance Insights

How Exposure to Cold Causes Hypothermia

Our bodies naturally lose heat during exposure to cold. This is why it's so important to dress properly, and in layers when possible, during outdoor activity in the cold weather. Most of our heat loss - up to 90% - escapes through our skin. The rest is exhaled through our lungs. All of this heat loss escalates when our skin is exposed to wind or moisture. Exposure in cold water occurs 25 times faster than exposure to the same temperatures on dry land.

Our brain has a temperature control center called the hypothalamus. It works to preserve and maintain that average 98.6 degree body temperature. When we're exposed to cold temperatures, we naturally shiver to activate muscles to protect and raise body heat. We also preserve heat through the temporary narrowing of blood vessels.

Most of our body's heat is generated through the activity of

our heart and liver. However, when core body temps drop, these vital organs go into a "protective" mode to preserve heat and protect the brain. As our body temperature falls, our brain activity, heart rate and breathing all slow as well.

This is why a person's inability to accurately understand what's happening occurs - confusion and fatigue set in and it becomes more difficult to process just how to get to safety.

According to Mayo Clinic, The Symptoms of Hypothermia Include:

shivering, slurred speech or mumbling, slow, shallow breathing, weak pulse, clumsiness or lack of coordination, drowsiness or very low energy, confusion or memory loss, loss of

consciousness, bright red, cold skin (in infants) Some Common Causes of Hypothermia:

- staying out in the cold too long
- being unable to get out of wet clothes or move to a warm, dry location

How to Prevent Hypothermia:

- Cover your head. Wear a hat or other protective covering to prevent body heat from escaping from your head, face and neck. Cover your hands with mittens instead of gloves.
- Don't overexert. Avoid activities that would cause you to sweat a lot. The combination of wet clothing and cold weather can cause you to lose body heat more quickly.
- Dress in layers. Wear loose-fitting, layered, lightweight clothing. Outer clothing made of tightly woven, waterrepellent material is best for wind protection. Wool, silk or polypropylene inner layers hold body heat better than cotton does.
- Keep dry. Stay as dry as possible. Get out of wet clothing as soon as possible. Be especially careful to keep your hands and feet dry, as it's easy for snow to get into mittens and boots. Specifically for kids:
- Dress infants and young children in one more layer than an
- adult would wear in the same conditions. • Bring children indoors if they start shivering - that's the first
- sign that hypothermia is starting. • Have children come inside frequently to warm themselves
- when they're playing outside. • Don't let babies sleep in a cold room.

Dear Savvy Senior.

Can you decipher the different types of housing options available to seniors, and recommend some good resources for locating them? I need to find a place for my elderly mother and could use some help.

Overwhelmed Daughter

Dear Overwhelmed. There's a wide array of housing options available to seniors,

but what's appropriate for your mom will depend on her needs and financial situation. Here's a rundown of the different levels of senior housing and some resources to help you choose one.

Independent living: If your mom is in relatively good health and self-sufficient, "independent living communities" are a top option that can offer a sense of community. Typically available to people over age 55, this type of senior housing is usually apartments or town homes that are fully functional. In addition, many communities also offer amenities such as meals served in a common dining area, housekeeping, transportation and a variety of social activities.

To locate this type of housing, contact your Area Agency on Aging (call 800-677-1116 to get your local number), or use an online search tool like *Caring.com*. Most of these communities are private pay only and can vary greatly in cost ranging anywhere from \$1,500 to \$6,000 per month.

Assisted living: If your mom needs some help with daily living chores, she'll probably need an "assisted living facility." These facilities provide help with the activities of daily living – like bathing, dressing, eating, going to the bathroom – as needed, as well as meals, housekeeping, transportation, social

activities and medication management. Many facilities also offer special "memory care units" for residents with dementia. Costs for assisted living usually run between \$3,000 and \$6,000 per month depending on location and services needed. Most residents pay for assisted living from personal funds, while some have long-term care insurance policies. And many state Medicaid programs today also cover some assisted living costs for financially eligible residents.

Another similar, but less expensive option to look into is "board and care homes." These offer many of the same services as assisted living facilities but in a much smaller home setting.

Your Area Aging Agency is again a good resource for finding assisted living facilities and board care homes, as is Caring.com.

Nursing homes: If your mom needs ongoing medical and personal care or has very limited mobility, a nursing home, which provides 24-hour skilled nursing care is the next option. To find a good one, use Medicare's nursing home compare tool at //Medicare.gov/care-compare. This tool will not only help you locate nursing homes in your area, it also provides a 5-star rating system on recent health inspections, staffing, quality of care, and overall rating.

But be aware that nursing home care is very expensive, costing anywhere between \$4,500 and \$13,000 per month for a semi-private room depending on where you live. Most residents pay from either personal funds, a long-term care insurance policy or through Medicaid after their savings are depleted.

Continuing-care retirement communities (CCRC's): If your mom has the financial resources, a "CCRC" is another option that provides all levels of housing (independent living, assisted living and skilled nursing home care) in one convenient location. But these communities typically require a hefty entrance fee that can range from \$20,000 to \$500,000 or more, plus ongoing monthly service fees that vary from around \$2,000 to over \$4,000. To search for CCRC's visit Caring.com.

Need Help?

If you're not sure what your mom needs, consider hiring an aging life care expert (AgingLifeCare.org) who can assess your mom and find her appropriate housing for a fee – usually between \$300 and \$800. Or you can use a senior care advising service like A Place for Mom (APlaceForMom.com) for free. They get paid from the senior living facilities in their network.

Medicare Minute "Medicare OEP 2022"

In 2019 Medicare authorized the return of the Medicare Open Enrollment Period or OEP. Prior to 2019, anyone enrolled in a Medicare Advantage (MA) plan, with or without drug coverage, could disenroll from that plan and return to Original Medicare and a prescription drug plan. In the past, this disenrollment would have had to happen between January 1st and February 14th. The 21st Century Cures Act eliminated the above disenrollment period and replaced it with a new Medicare Advantage Open Enrollment Period (OEP). OEP will take place from January 1st through March 31st annually.

What does this mean for the Medicare beneficiary? OEP now allows individuals enrolled in a MA plan to make a one-time election to go to another MA plan or go to Original Medicare (with or without drug coverage). Any change made during the OEP would take place the first day of the month after the change is made.

When would a Medicare beneficiary want to consider a change? Not only can you change your MA plan during OEP, you can also change MA plan companies. For example, if you are enrolled in a MA plan with Company A and find out your provider no longer accepts your plan, you can change to a MA plan your provider accepts. Another reason may be that you have been prescribed a prescription drug that your current MA plan doesn't cover, but another MA plan would. Or you may just have the desire to return to Original Medicare.

What changes are prohibited during OEP? There are two major changes that are prohibited during OEP. First, a person cannot change from Original Medicare to a MA plan. Second, a person cannot change from one Prescription Drug Plan to another Prescription Drug Plan. The only changes that can be made must begin with a person being enrolled in a MA plan.

Does this mean the hundreds of television commercials will stop running? Unfortunately, no. Although companies cannot market OEP specifically, the commercials will continue to run. Sorry!!

entirely unnecessary.

"Do you want cheese on that?" the disembodied voice asked from the drive-through speaker. It reminded me of another cheese incident several years ago.

The customer in front of me had a coupon and presented it to the lady at the counter. But he grew agitated when she rang up

his order. "You charged me for cheese, and the coupon said 'with cheese,' he said. She patiently went over his charges and explained why the register was right. He would have none of this. never fully understood his argument, nor why he was so concerned over what, she explained, was a ten cent differential. I should've contributed the dime to make him happy and to speed the line along. Scripture says a lot about money. For good or ill it plays a large role in our lives. Our attention to it can be wise or foolish. We can be foolish to argue over ten cents at the hamburger counter, but we also can be foolish to spend on small

things whose total over time can be a large amount of money. Financial counselors speak the obvious to those

in trouble with money: "You must manage your money and decrease your spending." So they talk about small things that make a difference. Specialty coffee can cost several dollars per cup and eating out every day at work can amount to a big amount of money every month. And how many colas must we drink each day when water is free? As Dave Ramsey famously says, "rice and beans, beans and rice" can be a pretty nutritious menu when a family in debt is trying to save money!

Many struggle with impulse buying made easy with credit cards. Ramsey counsels not to use cards since the average family in America owes \$5,525 in credit card debt, paying 18 percent or more interest. Responsible consumers consumers use credit cards as a convenience and keep debt in check by paying the balance each month. But those who wrestle with the temptation to spend impetuously should listen to Ramsey and forego the cards.

f ASK the **ATTORNEY**

> I was in an automobile accident and the insurance company tells me they will give me money only after I finish with the doctor, but they won't pay for me to go to the doctor. What should I do? How much money will they give me now?

Laken, Sheffield, AL

It's natural to look for answers after an injury. People ask every day how much their case is worth, what their rights are, what happens next. I can give you an overview of how the process works but no lawyer should try to tell you what the value of your case is.

We have to prove three things in every car wreck case. 1. We have to prove that someone else was at fault.

2. We have to prove that because of their negligence you were injured. 3. We have to prove the extent and nature of your injury.

The severity of the injury must be considered. Did or do you need surgery? Will there be scarring, or do you have permanent restrictions in your body's ability to function?

Other factors to consider are whether or not the other driver was under the influence of alcohol or whether the insurance company is going to argue that you were in some way at fault in causing the accident.

You must also consider which insurance company you are dealing with and whether or not the driver was in a company vehicle. Obviously, my law firm handles car wreck cases. Most often cases are resolved through negotiation, but it seems lately that more cases are filed with the court system and are resolved through mediation or trial.

One thing is certain. The other party's insurance company will not advance you money so that you can have medical treatment that you need. You may have some medical payment insurance that was applicable to your car that is available to pay for your medical bills or you may have health insurance.

My advice to you is to get the medical help you need and to do what your doctors ask you to do. Be sure you tell them the truth and that includes how you were hurt, when you hurt and how you hurt. It is important but not obvious that difficulties you have as a result of your injuries both at work and at home are noted in the medical records.

I know this is frustrating, but if we can help you, call.
