

### Local schools return for spring with 'manageable' COVID-19 numbers

John Pilati Franklin Free Press

Both locally and statewide, COVID-19 numbers have taken a nasty upward turn since Christmas, but Franklin County and Russellville City Schools students either have, or will, return as scheduled from their holiday break.

In the seven-day period from January 3-10, 2022, there were 190 new COVID-19 cases in Franklin County, out of 539 total residents tested. So far in 2022, 292 Franklin residents have tested positive, and that's less than one-third of the way through the first month of the year.

The county's death total from

COVID is 113, with 60 of those coming in 2021. There have been no COVID related deaths so far this year, according to the Alabama Department of Public Health.

Russellville City Schools students returned to class January 5<sup>th</sup>. According to RCS Superintendent of Education Heath Grimes, the system's COVID-19 numbers were in the range of what he expected.

"We came back with some definite COVID absences, but it's not really much different than other times. It's not unmanageable or high enough where you have to consider the remote learning option," Grimes said.
As of January 10<sup>th</sup>, RCS had 95

### **Britt visits Russellville as part of** busy campaign schedule for U.S. Senate

students/faculty/staff out with quarantine, Grimes said. Of those 95, 29 were confirmed positive for COVID-19.

In order to consider a return to virtual or remote learning, the system would need to meet a threshold of at least 15 percent positive, and the numbers are far from that level.

"As we have said all along, it's important to our board, our administrators and me that we want to be in school as much as possible," Grimes said. "There are times we've pushed the limit when the numbers climbed, but that generally mirrors projections of what we're seeing in this state."

Franklin County students will return to class this Friday, January 14<sup>th</sup>. This is the second consecutive year Superintendent Greg Hamilton and his board have extended the Christmas break an additional two weeks as a response to an expected spike in post-holiday COVID numbers.



"It worked effectively last year, so when we did our calendar for this year last February, we approved a COVID-19 calendar. We moved up the beginning of school, starting the first day of August," Hamilton said. "We can extend the end of the school year or lessen Fall Break. There are different ways of getting the required number of hours (1,080) in."

Faculty returned to work Monday. Hamilton said he had received one report of a faculty members absent due to COVID.

In addition to mitigating the risk of COVID, the delayed return for the spring semester also helps with the risk of flu, Hamilton explained.

"There is a flu aspect to this. Before COVID, the flu was rampant when we came back from Christmas break, and this has helped with that. But our primary focus now is COVID," Hamilton said.

the exploitation of others. Victims of human trafficking can be men, women or children of all races, nationalities and socioeconomic backgrounds.

To garner support, mayors across the state have been asked to sign proclamations in observance of National Human Trafficking Awareness Month in January. Thus far, municipalities who declared January 2022 as Human Trafficking Awareness Month via proclamations were Aliceville, Brundidge, Gadsden, Grove Hill, Monroeville, Orange Beach, Tarrant, the Town of Hodges, the Town of Ohatchee, the Town of Pisgah, the Town of South Vinemont and the Town of Susan Moore. Alabaster, Athens, Huntsville and Madison will be signing proclamations later in the month.

Several municipalities have also been designated Trafficking Free Zones as defined by the U.S. Institute Against Human Trafficking. Trafficking Free Zones are an initiative focused on reducing the demand for trafficked victims via organizational training, signing a written pledge, enacting policy changes and publicly sharing the commitment to help end trafficking. Lee County as well as Alexander City/Dadeville, Birmingham, Camp Hill, Center Point, Cullman, Gardendale, Homewood, Hoover, Irondale, Mountain Brook, Northport, Opelika, Oxford, Pinson, Trussville and Vestavia Hills have been declared Trafficking Free Zones.

# Tim James formally kicks off third attempt to win Republican gubernatorial nomination

Greenville businessman Tim James officially kicked off his campaign for the Republican nomination for governor at a ceremony held on the steps of the Alabama Capitol Wednesday morning.

James, the son of former Gov. Fob James, ran unsuccessfully for the position in 2002 and 2010.

James' platform calls for Alabama to become a national leader in 'preserving America's godly heritage while also focusing on key issues to transform our state into an economic powerhouse.'

Although his formal announcement didn't come until this week, James began stumping across the state in December, and he has a familiar face working with him on his campaign, former Alabama Republican Party Chairman Bill Armistead.

In an interview with the Alabama Daily News in December, James said his strategy will focus on what he believes are mistakes by the state's Republican leadership, including passing a medical marijuana bill as well as attempts to expand gambling legislation.

"This (2021 medical marijuana) law is nothing more than a vehicle to sell marijuana in Alabama," James said.

While the legislation forbids the use of recreational marijuana, James believes it will have the effect of making it easier for recreational users to get marijuana into their hands.

James said he stands ready to protect Alabama small businesses and working families against modern 'woke' efforts to "wage a culture war on the bedrock elements of America's foundation: faith, family and freedom."

The most recent Republican Primary, in 2020, saw just under 725,000 Alabamians cast ballots. James said he will conduct a grassroots effort in his campaign, which is expected to be significantly underfunded when compared to Ivey's campaign funds.

His message to voters is that the state's Republican leadership is broken, and he is the best candidate to fix it.

"The Republican leadership in large part are what we call RINOS (Republicans in Name Only) or Democrats disguised as Republicans," James said to the Alabama Daily News last month.

real. And there was no better way to spend the first six months of my campaign than listening to people affected by these issues," she added.

Britt, a Coffee County native, is married to Wesley Britt, a former University of Alabama lineman who went on to play for the New England Patriots. They live in Montgomery with their two children, Bennett and Ridgeway.

Britt served as deputy press secretary and Chief of Staff for Shelby. A graduate of the University of Alabama School of Law, she practiced law with Butler Snow, LLP, a position she left to serve as Shelby's deputy campaign manager and communications director in 2015.

Britt visited Franklin County Monday, including a campaign stop in Russellville at the Best Western Inn. Britt's grassroots campaign has seen her make several campaign stops in Franklin County so far. Red Bay City Councilman Brad Bolton introduced Britt at Monday's campaign rally.

"You will not find a more business friendly, pro-business candidate than Katie Britt," Bolton said. "My heart lies with community banking and there's no better protector of the community banking model than Katie Britt.'

Britt grew up near the United States Army's Fort Rucker, where she learned to appreciate the contribution of our country's military.

"Every day I saw the sacrifice of the men and women serving our country," Britt said. "We need leaders who will never leave behind our soldiers on the battlefield.

"When they return home, we must treat our veterans like the first-class citzens they are. These men and women gave us their very best—now it's our turn to give them ours," she added.

Britt spoke to a room full of supporters for just over 20 minutes. She shared the issues she's learned are important to Alabamians and discussed ways to solve them. She discussed the border crisis, the nation's opioid crisis and the dangers of vaccine mandates.

"I never thought we'd live in a country where the President says in order to work and provide for your family, you have to have a shot in your arm," Britt said. "Is he requiring those coming across the border to get the vaccine? No. What about welfare recipients? He says there's a federal nexxus with workers. Well, what about welfare recipients? There's definitely a federal tie there. Do they have to receive the vaccine? Once again, no.

"We have leaders today governing through fear and control. I choose faith and freedom," Britt added.

As she contemplated whether to enter the 2022 Republican Senate race, Britt already knew Rep. Mo Brooks would be in the mix, complete with his endorsement from President Donald Trump. Early numbers showed her trailing Brooks by a wide margin, but as her campaign built momentum, those polling disparities declined significantly.

A December 2021 poll has Brooks at 31 percent, Britt at 26 percent and Mike Durant at 15 percent. What once was a 25 percent margin between Brooks and Britt is now five percent.

"I decided, through prayer and with my family, there was too much at stake for our state just to sit on the sideline. It was clear we need someone who will fight for our values and also make sure the hard-working people of Alabama have a seat at the table," Britt said. "People are sick of do nothing, ineffective career politicians. They want someone who will actually get something
