Blood and Platelet Donation Appointments Still Critically Needed Amid First-Ever Red Cross Blood Crisis

(January 25, 2022) — While there has been a significant and encouraging response to the dire need for blood across the nation, the American Red Cross needs more people to give in the weeks ahead to recover from its worst blood shortage in more than a decade. Those interested in helping are urged to schedule the earliest-available blood or platelet donation appointment in their area to help ensure accident victims rushed to the emergency room, those being treated for cancer and others who count on blood product transfusions can receive lifesaving care without delay.

Since the Red Cross issued its first-ever blood crisis alert, severe winter weather has further complicated efforts to rebuild the blood supply. Hundreds of blood drives have been canceled across

PORTLAND, ME the country due to winter storms in January, forcing about 6,500 blood and platelet donations to go uncollected.

Employment volunteer opportunities available

During this challenging time, the Red Cross is also actively recruiting blood collection employees and blood drive volunteers who play vital roles in supporting the nation's blood supply. The Red Cross encourages those interested to join us at a Red Cross hiring event on February 10, from noon to 6 p.m. at the American Red Cross Blood Donation Center, 524 Forest Avenue, Portland, Maine.

Based in Portland, Red Cross Mobile Phlebotomists help operate blood drives throughout the community. Applicants will need a valid driver's license, a good driving record, proof of COVID-19 vaccination and must be willing to travel to blood drives throughout Maine. No experience is necessary for entry-level positions.

The Red Cross provides a paid training program. We also offer health & dental benefits, 401K, paid time off – plus a \$1,000 sign-on bonus. Blood drive safety

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and infection control, and additional precautions - including face masks for donors and staff, regardless of vaccination status - have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive.

Save time during donation

Donors can also save up to 15 minutes at the blood drive by completing a RapidPass®. With RapidPass®, donors complete the pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of donation, from a mobile device or computer. To complete a Rapid-Pass®, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood. org/RapidPass or use the Red Cross Blood Donor

To donate blood, individuals need to bring a blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification that are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also must meet certain height and weight requirements.

Health insights for

At a time when health information has never been more important, the Red Cross is screening all blood, platelet and plasma donations from self-identified African American donors for the sickle cell trait. This additional screening will provide Black donors with an additional health insight and help the Red Cross identify compatible blood types more quickly to help patients with sickle cell disease who require trait-negative blood. Blood transfusion is an essential treatment for those with sickle cell disease, and blood donations from individuals of the same race, ethnicity and blood type have a unique ability to help patients fighting sickle cell disease.

Donors can expect to receive sickle cell trait screening results, if applicable, within one to two weeks through the Red Cross Blood Donor App and the online donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org.

FEBRUARY -BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Black History Month is a month set aside each year across the United States (and many other countries) to celebrate the achievements made by African Americans in our country's history. It is a time to recognize their central role in making Americans who we are today, all of us. Black History Month has been celebrated officially by our country's presidents since 1976 (Gerald Ford was the first) but its origins date back well before then.

The story of Black History Month actually begins in 1915 when historian Carter G. Woodson and minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH). This group sponsored the very first Black history month in 1926. From the very beginning, the focus of Black History Month has been at the community level, encouraging schools and communities nationwide to organize lectures, history clubs, performances and more - all focused on celebrating these essential contributions of African Americans.

There is no question that Black history is American history, but Black History Month offers us all an opportunity to dig a little deeper. Our schools teach our student's American history in developmentally appropriate ways from grades K all the way through 12th grade. Teaching the standards and skills associated with understanding our country's history is something we do every month, but the month of February helps us draw a more focused lens. For example, our students may:

- Watch documentaries and films
- Review primary source materials
- Connect art and music to African American History
- Discuss applicable current events
- Read books about the African American Experience
- Learn about prominent African American figures

These things can be done across our schools in big ways like projects or papers, or in little ways like a story read aloud. The bottom line is that Black History Month allows us all to take a little step deeper. To talk about history. As teachers and as parents this is important. So I thought I'd share a few high quality resources with families who might also want to use this coming month to engage children in these important conversations. Here's a few resources

ONE MORE ADJUSTMENT TO MAINE CDC's STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES (SOP) THAT INEED TO MAKE FAMILIES AWARE OF...

I had hoped we would go more than 1 week before any further adjustments were made by the state on the SOP, but alas, that is not the case. We have one more adjustment based on a notification sent earlier this week. You can view the full notification by going to this blog online, but the biggest adjustment families should be aware of is quoted from the notice below:

and as of today is advising that students who have returned to school no days 6-10 of isolation or quarantine DO need to mask outdoors. The Maine CDC has done additional research and as of today is advising that students who have returned to school no days 6-10 of isolation or quarantine DO need to mask outdoors. What does this mean? This means that students who have tested positive, and are returning to school after five days of isolation under the revised SOP must now wear masks for days 6-10 outside on the playground in order to be able to return to school. This is significant shift in practice from our previous procedures, but the MCDC sets the min. standards for how we deal with positive cases and this is now part of the new SOP. We can put additional procedures in place that are more restrictive, but we cannot elect not to follow minimum standards of practice. We will begin enforcement of this new standard on Monday, Jan. 24, 2022

Maine Forest Service Launches Browntail Moth Awareness Month



Webs can look like fist-sized clumps of leaves tied together tightly with silk, or like single leaves hanging onto twigs.

AUGUSTA. \mathbf{ME} (January 27, 2022) -- February 2022 has been recognized as Browntail Moth Awareness Month in Maine

to encourage people to take advantage of the dormant season of the insect and join together to reduce im(BTM).

BTM populations in Maine have been in an outbreak phase since pacts from browntail moth 2015 and the pest cannot

host tree populations such as oak, apple, crabapple, pear, birch, cherry, or other hardwoods, are at risk of infestation by the caterpillars. While long-lasting tree defoliation and branch dieback are major concerns, BTM's microscopic, toxic hairs can cause trouble breathing and skin irritation similar to poison ivy from a few hours up to

Comprehensive BTM information and tools compiled by MFS, Board of Pesticides Control, Maine Center for Disease Control, the University of Maine and other partners including research, infestation tracking, FAQs, and educational resources for communities, municipalities, businesses, and healthcare providers, are available on maine.gov/dacf/knockoutbtm.

Follow the Four Rs to "Knock Out BTM" In Our Communities and Reduce the Itch!

Recognize: Learn how to tell if the trees where you live, work, and play have BTM. Their winter webs can look like single leaves hanging onto twigs or fist-sized clumps of leaves tied together tightly with silk. Knowing where the nests are in your yard or town can help inform your management decisions. Learn more by participating in the BTM Awareness Month events included below.

Remove: With permission, use hand snips or extendable pole pruners to remove webs within reach from the ground and away from hazards such as

powerlines. Protect your eyes and skin from hairs that might be present from past caterpillar activity. After removal, destroy webs by burning or soaking in soapy water for several days, then dispose of the nests in the trash.

Recruit: Hire professional help to treat webs out of reach or near hazards on the property you own or manage. Line up help during winter. Licensed Professional Arborists can remove BTM webs in larger trees and shrubs in the winter. In trees where the caterpillars' hairs cause a nuisance and where it is not practical to remove the webs, Licensed Pesticide Applicators may be able to use insecticides during the growing season to manage

Reach Out: If you find BTM in your neighborhood, let your neighbors and town officials know. The more neighbors, businesses, and others get together to respond to the problem, the better the results.

Encounters with hairs from BTM caterpillars can cause mild to severe rashes and respiratory issues. Some people say they experience itching with fewer than ten webs per tree or shrub; others say they have no symptoms from heavier

In large, heavily infested trees like these oaks removal of webs may not be practical because of time and cost involved in this approach. In trees like this that are a concern from the standpoint of human health or nuisance, licensed pesticide applicators may be able to use insecticides to help reduce impacts from browntail moth.
