

Dear "Speak Out,"

I am writing in response to Lauren Berger's well composed letters in the January 23rd and January 30th Shoppers which give us all points to ponder.

We know these issues are extremely complex and cannot be "solved" in a format like this, let alone REALLY influence people to change their minds about deeply held beliefs, opinions and biases but we can hear each other out. I know that Christians do tend to come across as negative, judgmental and narrow-minded rather than as generous, loving and supportive – our words speak louder than our deeds.

But our deeds are nothing to brag about over the centuries either, considering our history with the Inquisition from the 5th century and many following, the Crusades in the Middle Ages, and more recently the conflict in Northern Ireland.

I was really struck by Lauren's questions, "What would Jesus want to know....?", a variation of "What Would Jesus Do?" (hence the letters WWJD, which were so popular as a slogan, taken from a book written by Garret Sheldon, a modern re-write of "In His Steps", by Charles Sheldon in the 1800's).

I am the first to admit that it is not easy to discern what Jesus would do, despite James 1:5 telling us, "If any of you lack wisdom, ask and.... It will be given to him liberally." Our receptors are not receiving clear signals. I just know that Jesus didn't do what people expected him to do. He acted unpredictably, compassionately, always with the best interest of the other person in mind.

Let me digress and put in a plug for a fairly new video series that has come out in the past couple years which is easily accessible on Youtube, called The Chosen. Of course there is "poetic license" taken in producing them, but the portrayals I see here of Jesus are compelling, personal, faith enriching, relevant, relational, and so much more. Not a namby-pamby Jesus who goes around telling people what they shouldn't be doing, but One who compels people to want a relevant, purposeful, God-honoring life, with His help.

But even the disciples got it wrong on many occasions, with Him right there! On the other hand, it cannot be denied that Christians have been at the forefront in making life better for millions around the world. It is Christians who are the champions of compassionate medical care in remote areas where even the presence of a doctor is rare. Christians are there in promoting better education as well for children who have no access.




