Real estate: When to sell a property 'as is'

: We are going to be listing our home for sale. In the basement there are a few rod-holes that have leaked and a crack that has leaked. Should we have them repaired or is it no big deal and just sell the house as-is?

: Remember, selling As-Is will get you an As-Is sales price. Unless you have financial constraints, I recommend to make necessary repairs as long as it adheres to my rule of thumb; if you spend a dollar, you better get more than a dollar in return. Buyers really don't want to buy a house with a leaky basement. It's usually perceived that it has a problem bigger than what it actually is. Have it professionally repaired and provide the buyers with a paid receipt and warranty from the company that made the repair. Look at it this way; if you were going to sell a used car, would you get more money for one that had an oil leak or one that didn't have an oil leak?

: We bought a home and gave the Sellers 45 days occupancy after closing until they give us the keys. The hot water heater stopped working 20 days after closing and the Sellers contacted us to repair/replace it. Should we have to pay for the repair or is it their responsibility since they still live there?

A: This is a question that comes up once in a while. It depends on the language in your purchase agreement. This is something all Buyers should pay attention to before they sign a purchase agreement. A good purchase agreement, like the one my brokerage uses, spells it out; "Seller is responsible to keep property in substantially the same condition as of date of Agreement, Seller is responsible to maintain grounds and keep all systems in working order until property is vacated and keys are surrendered by Seller except for conditions disclosed in Seller's Disclosure Statement or conditions discovered by Buyer as part of inspections." If you have this language in your purchase agreement then the Sellers would be responsible to repair/replace the hot water heater. This is the norm in our market. I have seen however, especially on for sale by owner transactions, where the correct language is not used and one or both of the parties involved get tangled in a mess because an issue arises. Another question would be did the Sellers provide you with a one year home warranty policy coverage at clos-

MARKET UPDATE

December's market update for Macomb County and Oakland County's housing market is as follows. In Macomb County prices were up by more than 11% and Oakland County prices were up by more than 11% as well for the month. Residential home/ condo on market inventory was down again. Macomb County's on market inventory was down by almost 13% and Oakland County's on market inventory was down by more than 25%. Macomb County average days on market was 26 days and Oakland County average days on market was 28 days. Closed sales in Macomb County were down by almost 9% and closed sales in Oakland County were down by almost 17%. The closed sales are down as a direct result of the continued low inventory. Demand still remains high. We are currently averaging less than a 11/2-month supply of homes for sale; a 6-month supply is considered a balanced supply. (All comparisons are month to month, year to year.)

Ask the Financial Doctor: What is a Qualified Charitable Distribution?

e : My full retirement age (FRA)is 66 but I started receiving my Social Security benefits at age 62 and I am still working. What is the maximum amount that I can earn without losing any Social Security benefits in 2022?

A: If you are under your FRA, the maximum earnings limit is \$19,560 for the year 2022. If you earn more than \$19,560 then for every \$2 above the limit you lose \$1 in Social Security benefits. In the year of your FRA, the maximum earnings limit is \$51,960. After reaching your FRA there are no earnings limitations.

: When is the due date for filing my 2021 personal tax return?

A: The due date is Monday, April 18, 2022. As long as you have the postmark, April 18, your tax return is considered on-time. Taxpayers needing an extension have until Monday, Oct. 17 to file but must send a payment by April 18th if they owe money.

: What is a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)?

A: A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distributions(RMDs) for the year, as long as certain rules are met. You must be 70 ½ or older and the QCDs are limited to the amount that would other-

wise be taxed as ordinary income, this excludes non-deductible contributions. The maximum annual amount that can qualify for a QCD is \$100,000. This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year. (If, however, you file taxes jointly, your spouse can also make a QCD from his or her own IRA within the same tax year for up to \$100,000.) For a QCD to count towards your current year's RMD, the funds must come out of your IRA by your RMD deadline, generally Dec. 31. Contributing to an IRA may result in a reduction of the QCD amount you can deduct. (The aggregate amount of deductible IRA contributions you make to your IRA after you turn 70 ½ will reduce the amount of the QCD that is not includible in your gross income.) If the IRA receives the RMD and writes a check to the charity, this contribution does not qualify as a QCD.

Q: Did the annual gift amount increase for the tax year 2022?

A: Yes, the annual gift amount is \$16,000, an increase of \$1,000 from last year. Each person can gift \$16,000 to another person without any tax forms. The donor does not get a tax deduction and the recipient does not report the gift as taxable income. Taxpayers that file as married filing jointly can annually gift \$32,000.

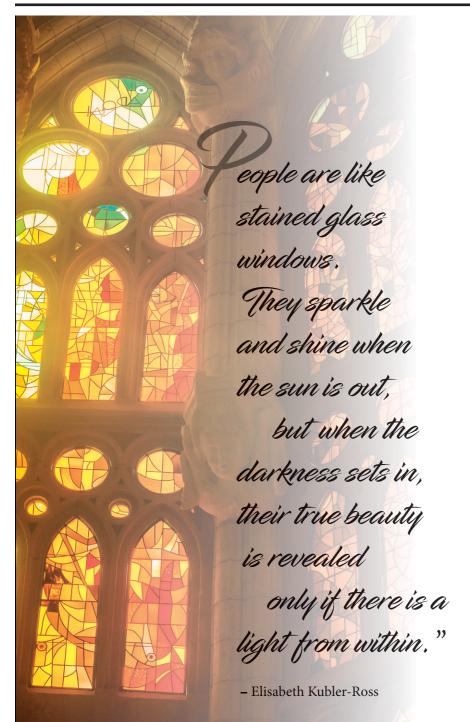

Memoir writing offers mental health benefits

Ready to write your memoirs? With several weeks of winter ahead — and a pandemic still howling outside the door — it's the ideal time to grab a pen and begin.

While your life stories probably won't top the NYT bestseller list, the practice of writing about your experiences can boost your mental health and improve your outlook on life.

Several studies, including one published in the Journal of the American Medical Association Psychiatry, found that writing about stressful events provided therapeutic benefits for adults with posttraumatic stress disorder.

Recording our experiences in a notebook or on a laptop not only provides catharsis but also helps us make sense of them, explains Alison Armstrong Taylor, who co-authored How to Save Your Life: One Chapter at a Time with her husband, Tom Taylor (picturesandstories.com).

"Just the act of organizing your past into a system, whether chronological or otherwise, can help you see your life in a different way," says



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Armstrong Taylor. "According to neuroscientists, it can even change your brain's organic structure."

But our life stories are more than "hardships and challenges," she adds. Memoir writing also helps us rebuild a sense of gratitude for our strengths, achievements and blessings. At the same time, looking back at the past "helps you realize what you still haven't done and what priorities you have moving forward," Armstrong Taylor says.

Later on, you can decide whether to publish your memoir for others or keep it to yourself. Either way, you'll reap the therapeutic benefits of reviewing and writing about your experiences.

Mining for buried treasure

Like tourists returning home with a stash of souvenirs, most new memoirists are overwhelmed or paralyzed by the thought of choosing which stories to sional writers craft their work. Ask your librarian for share. The following tips will get you started and help break through writer's block along the way.

1. Silence your inner critic and write freely. Your first order of business is to get words on paper or on the computer. Worry about editing and packaging the final product after you've written a first draft.

2. Narrow your focus, one story at a time. Start with a series of short personal essays, each on a different experience. Gathered together, these could become chapters in your book.

3. Become a family archeologist. Unearth old memories while exploring keepsakes and heirlooms. it and what it means to you (or a loved one).

write down the memories it stirs. Your Irish grandmother's shortbread recipe, for instance, might rekindle memories of her old-country rituals and holiday gatherings.

5. Brush up your interview skills. Ask friends and family members to share memories of you, or fill in the details you've forgotten. Record them on your iPhone.

6. Use sensory detail and proper names to enhance your writing. Turn to family photo albums and scrapbooks if you need visual reminders of former homes, cars, furniture, and clothing styles.

7. Avoid aimless rambling, no matter how poetic. Aim to make a point. Your memoir will be more engaging if it imparts a life lesson or hard-earned familv wisdom.

8. Read published memoirs; observe how profesrecommendations.

9. Polish your gems. Proofread your final draft to catch errors of fact, spelling or grammar.

Once you've committed a few memories to the page, be proud of your accomplishment. And keep writing. As memoirist Mary Karr notes in The Art of Memoir (HarperCollins), it takes courage to share our true experiences: "None of us can ever know the value of our lives, or how our separate and silent scribbling may add to the amenity of the world, if only by how radically it changes us, one by one."

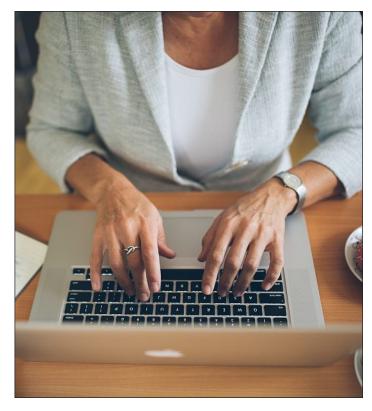

HEARING MATTERS: WHAT TO EXPECT FROM A HEARING AID EVALUATION

Have you been having trouble hearing for a while, and have finally taken the leap and scheduled a hearing test? Here is what to expect...

If you find yourself in this position, we say congratulations! Taking that first step to schedule a hearing evaluation can feel pretty daunting, but with the right hearing healthcare professional at your side, it should be a positive experience and an opportunity to improve your own quality of life.

Your initial appointment will start with a case history. Following this conversation, the provider will perform otoscopy to check your ear canals for any blockage or signs of infection. The next step is audiometry, also known as a hearing test, to assess your hearing acuity and discrimination. This assessment includes the traditional pure tone or "beep" test as well as word testing at various levels.

Once all information has been collected, the provider will explain the results to you. This explanation should include the degree or severity of hearing loss, as well as the type of hearing loss. If your results indicate that a medical or surgical intervention may resolve the hearing loss, the hearing healthcare professional will provide a referral for you to see a physician to discuss treatment options. In the case that hearing aids are the appropriate treatment for your hearing loss, the provider will discuss the various level and style options of hearing aids available (look out for upcoming Hearing Matters articles about these options). This discussion will include pros and cons of different options, as well as costs you can expect based on your insurance coverage or other funding sources available to you. If you choose to pursue hearing aids, you will begin a minimum 30 day trial period on the day of the fitting, with your hearing care provider guiding and supporting you along the way to give you the best experience and outcome possible.

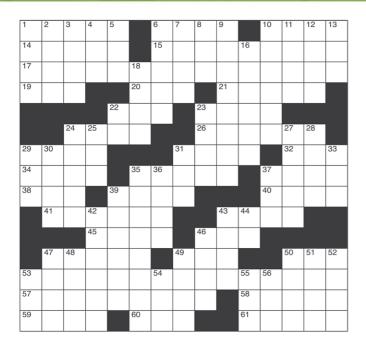

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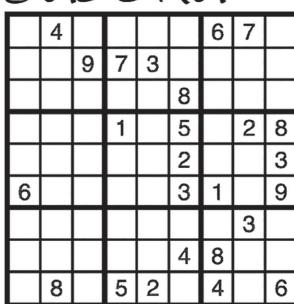

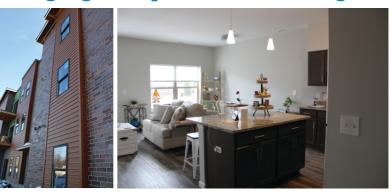
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
