After two years, San Jose celebrates Lunar New Year in person at San Jose History Park

undreds of people flocked to San Jose's History Park Saturday morning, January 30 to ring in the Year of the Tiger at one of largest Lunar New Year festivals in the South Bay after two years of virtual celebration.

"It's a blessing to be able to gather and celebrate the new year again with the community," Ai Duong Truong, member of the Association of Vietnamese Elderly of the Bay Area, told San José Spotlight. "I just love this traditional and important holiday."

Lunar New Year, or Tết, is one of the most culturally significant holidays in the Vietnamese culture. The holiday is also celebrated by several other Asian countries, including China, Laos, Singapore and Korea. The first day of Tết was Feb. 1 this year.

The family-friendly event was organized by nonprofit Vietnamese Cultural Tết Committee 2022. The festival featured more than 50 booths by local businesses and community groups, Vietnamese food, live performances, traditional dress (áo dài) competition and lion dances were among other events. The Viet Museum, which is located in the park was also open to fairgoers who want to learn and honor Vietnamese history.

California lawmaker pushes for 4-day work week

California lawmaker is pushing to reduce the current standard 40-hour work week to 32-hours.

The reasoning, says Congressman **Mark Takano** (D-Riverside, inset), is that the pandemic has highlighted the fact that most people spend more time at work and less time with loved ones.

"After a nearly two-year-long pandemic that forced millions of people to explore remote work options, it's safe to say that we can't – and shouldn't – simply go back to normal, because normal wasn't working," said Takano, who introduced the legislation last month.

Takano says people were spending more time at work, less time with loved ones, their health and well-being was worsening, and all the while, their pay has remained stagnant.

The legislation would reduce the standard work week from 40 hours to 32 hours by lowering the maximum hour's threshold for overtime compensation for non-exempt employees under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Productivity and service remained the same or improved across the majority of trial 4-day work places in several countries, according to recent released reports. The report revealed that the wellbeing of workers "dramatically increased across a range of indicators, from perceived stress and burnout, to health and work-life balance."

Takano's legislation is currently awaiting a vote.

Mahan still leads in fundraising for San Jose mayoral race

s San Jose's mayoral race heats up, campaign fundraising is following suit with

A paign fundraising is following suit with the four leading candidates collectively raising more than \$1.4 million in one month.

Three councilmembers—Dev Davis, Matt Mahan and Raul Peralez—and Santa Clara County Supervisor Cindy Chavez are all vying for the job.

All contributions and donor information are based on campaign filings as of Jan. 31, for the period between Dec. 9-31. Donations to mayoral candidates are capped at \$1,400 per individual.

To date, Mahan is the leading fundraiser, with 894 donors contributing \$504,169 in December. As of Tuesday, Mahan has surpassed 1,000 total donors. Contributions to Mahan's campaign averaged \$548 per person, and he reported spending almost \$48,000 on the race.

"The powerful showing in our fundraising efforts shows the growing demand for greater common-sense from government at every level," Mahan told San José Spotlight. "Voters are tired of the old excuses from the entrenched politicians."

Mahan opposes SB 9 and on issues such as mental health, he pushed the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors to not opt-out of assisted outpatient treatment, also known as Laura's Law. The law requires mandatory mental health treatment under a judge's orders for those suffering from severe mental illness. Mahan wants the city to invest in addiction and mental health treatment and expand cost-effective shelters for the unhoused.

Chavez raised \$479,346 through the month of December, and reported spending almost \$43,000 on the race. Of the 730 major donors, contributions averaged \$630 per person. Chavez has 963 donors in all, with 233 contributing \$100 or less, said Ed McGovern, a political consultant for Chavez.

The campaign is "pretty happy" with the results, McGovern said, as they expected to raise \$400,000 and exceeded that amount. Chavez will continue to fundraise toward a goal of \$1 million by June. Chavez returned six donations which exceeded the \$1,400 limit.

Known for her support of local labor movements and roots in Working Partnerships USA and the South Bay Labor Council, Chavez said she doesn't favor SB 9, which allows property owners to build additional units in single-family neighborhoods, because it will not help renters, and cannot be effectively monitored.

She also opposes noncitizen voting rights

because the policy paper is too broad. She previous told San José Spotlight, "I have a long history of fighting for real paths to citizenship for those in our community who seek that goal."

Peralez, who was the first candidate to announce his intentions to run for the 2022 mayoral seat, is the son of an immigrant and the first of his family to graduate from college. Peralez is the only candidate to voice support for SB 9

Davis and Mahan joined Chavez in opposing the controversial state housing bill.

Peralez raised about \$267,544 through contributions averaging \$647 per person across 397 donors. He's spent the least amount on the race to date, about \$16,000.

"We are very pleased with our fundraising numbers and are looking forward to the next few months," he told San José Spotlight. "I'm happy with where I'm at and confident we'll raise sufficient funds to run a successful race."

Peralez and Chavez are competing for the labor vote. He said he differs from Mayor Liccardo on how the city budget and services should be allocated, especially for residents most in need. He also supports a recently approved ordinance requiring residents who own firearms to maintain liability insurance and pay an annual fee for gun harm reduction services.

Davis, the fourth candidate in the race, votes with the city's business interests. Davis wants to tackle homelessness and help the city recover economically from the COVID-19 pandemic. Her goals are to reduce government red tape for affordable housing projects and increase staffing for the police department.

Davis raised \$169,971 for the mayoral race. She had 223 donors with contributions averaging \$669 per person. Davis spent a little more than \$42,000 on the race.

"Our poll puts us in a very good position," she told San José Spotlight. "Since the poll, there have been two major votes at council that have caused a surge of contributions and supporters for me (noncitizen voting and gun control measures). Money doesn't always win elections. This is about the people of San Jose and what they care about, not about who can raise the most money."

Three lesser known candidates—Former Nevada congressional candidate Jonathan Royce Esteban, former marriage counselor Tyrone Wade and political unknown Brian Smith—have yet to disclose their campaign finances.

In Memoriam

Richard William Highlander, Evergreen Valley

Feb. 17, 1940 – Jan. 24, 2022 Served as editor of the Evergreen Times

Bill Highlander was born on February 17, 1940 in Beckley, West Virginia to Ronald and Lucille Highlander. A graduate of Woodrow Wilson High School, he was an All-State football player and graduated with high honors. After a year at the Greenbrier Military Academy, he accepted a scholarship to Rutgers University where he was a brother of Chi Psi fraternity, a member of Rutgers 1961 undefeated football team, and Cadet Colonel of the ROTC.

As a Distinguished Military Graduate in 1963, he was commissioned as a Regular Army officer and served more than 21 years, retiring as a lieutenant colonel. His awards and decorations include Legion of Merit (2 awards), Bronze Star (3 awards),

Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal (2 awards), Army Commendation Medal (4 awards), Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, Combat Infantryman's Badge, Ranger Tab, and Airborne Wings. In 2016, he was inducted into the US Army Public Affairs Hall of Fame.

Bill married Ida M.(nee Canterbury) on June 26, 1965 and in 2020 celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary. He is survived by daughter Alison, son-in-law Jonathan Curtis, and two grandchildren, Rylee and William Curtis.


Bill also was graduated from the University of Georgia with a Master's degree in journalism and was awarded a prize for his thesis which was the first in the history of the Grady School of Journalism.

After retirement from the Army, he joined FMC Corp. as Director of Corporate Communications, then was vice-president of United Defense, and later vice-president of public relations for Calpine Corp. He also later became editor of the Evergreen Times, a community newspaper for two years. He authored three history books.

He is a good son, a good soldier, a good husband, a good father, and a great man.





Report: Top 10 Valentine's Day candy by state

nce we love data and candy is a fun S and relevant holiday topic, we put together data on purchased candy in the U.S.A. You may find this candy information and underlying trends very inter-

Last year, Covid-19 struck Valentine's Day hard, according to the National Retail Federation. Spending was down more than 20% from the previous year's alltime high. People were struggling and there was a once in a lifetime worldwide pandemic. It was understandable.

This year, things are picking back up. The NRF is expecting a near-record breaking year with consumer spending for Valentine's Day up nearly 10% and reaching \$23.9B.

The number of people buying candy is expected to be at a new record high with 56% of consumers planning to buy candy for Valentine's Day. Expected candy sales volume is also up and at \$2.2B would be runner up only to 2020 (\$2.4B).

Using sales data from the past 14 years from our online bulk candy store and industry partners, CandyStore.com compiled sales data to determine the most popular Valentine's Day candy.

Here are some of the key takeaways from the data

It was a rough couple years for Sweethearts conversation hearts candy. After Necco got ripped apart and its brands sent off to various bidders, Sweethearts' new owner took more time than anticipated to get their feet under them. In fact, Sweethearts weren't available in 2019 at all. As the most popular brand of conversation hearts (Brach's makes them as well), the sales of conversation hearts overall were down over 24%.

Two years ago, printing got blurry on candy hearts

In 2020, they were back but only a limited supply was available. As new owner Spangler hurried to get them out, they ran into some printing issues and the cute little sayings written on them were distorted and blurred. Quite a few of them were blank - no words at all.

All new sayings now printed clearly on Sweethearts

Last year was the breakthrough. With Spangler introducing all new sayings on Sweethearts, conversation hearts made a heroic comeback in 2021. Finally overtaking their arch-nemesis Heart-Shaped Boxes of Chocolates.

M&M's keeps moving up

 $M\&M\space{-0.05em}{'s}$ continue to gain traction. They made gains in several states throughout the country, landing a new #1 spot in Ver-

Since introducing the Cupid's Message M&M's in 2017, we've seen a rise in M&M's sales for Valentine's Day. Cupid's Mix of Valentine's Day colored M&M's has also been very popular. The re-introduction of White Cheesecake M&M's helped boost them as well.

Cupid Corn Resurgence?

Just when we thought they were fading away, cupid corn made a comeback last year. It even claimed a new #1 state in Nebraska. Also up one spot to #2 in Michigan after falling to third place the prior year.

Big city mayors announce program to employ underserved youth

Californians For All Youth Jobs Corps to recruit 8,000 young Californians

hief Service Officer Josh Fryday and the mayors of California's 13 largest cities have launched the #CaliforniansForAll Youth Jobs Corps, a California Volunteers-led program to employ underserved youth across the state in critical issue areas.

The #CaliforniansForAll Youth Jobs Corps is an innovative partnership between the State of California and local government to help underserved youth find employment.

Through the program, young people in cities across California will gain critical job skills while making a positive, lasting impact in their communities. Included in Governor Newsom's 2021 budget, the #Californians-ForAll Youth Jobs Corps includes \$150 million dollars for youth workforce development in the 13 largest cities in California and \$35 million dollars for programming in counties and smaller cities around the state.

"California is investing in our youth by bringing people together in service," said Chief Service Officer Josh Fryday. "As communities across the state invest in COVID-19 recovery and fighting climate change, this program will allow underserved youth to find employment, gain valuable job skills, and give back to their communities to build an ethic of public service."

The program was created to help build opportunities for California's young people between the ages of 16 and 30, with a particular emphasis on youth who are low-income, are unemployed and/or out of school, are justice involved, are in or transitioning from foster care, and/or are engaged with mental health or substance abuse systems.

Starting in February, cities will begin recruiting and hiring underserved youth to tackle local priorities, with a focus on climate change, food insecurity, and COVID-19 recovery. Cities may hire youth directly or grant the funding out to community-based organizations. All participants will receive at least \$15/hr and many will have access to wrap around services like case management, resume preparation, job training, and other benefits. Applications for cities with a population under 300,000 and all counties will remain open through February 15th.

As part of the '21-'22 Governor's California Comeback Plan, the state will invest the following amounts to the 13 largest cities:

- \$53,249,641 to Los Angeles
- \$19,151,293 to San Diego
- \$13,976,741 to San Jose
- \bullet \$11,876,095 to San Francisco
- \$7,421,049 to Fresno
- \$6,998,984 to Sacramento
- \$6,348,277 to Long Beach
- \$5,911,024 to Oakland\$5,393,613 to Bakersfield
- \$4,797,453 to Anaheim
- \$4,497,514 to Santa Ana
- \$4,401,597 to Riverside\$4,355,097 to Stockton

"The energy and talent from our young San Joséans in the Resilience Corps are helping us tackle many of our greatest challenges--from the pandemic to climate change to widening gaps in educational and economic outcomes," said San José Mayor Sam Liccardo. "With state funding from the #CaliforniansForAll Youth Jobs Corps program, we can continue to expand paid opportunities to young residents with a passion for community service. I am thankful to Governor Newsom and Chief Service Officer Josh Fryday for investing in our future."



Historically, floods have followed droughts. The 2017 Coyote Creek flood followed a five-year drought with heavy rainfall, un-

leashing Santa Clara County's worst torrent since 1997. Valley Water's work on projects that reduce the risk of flooding is ongoing.

We are excited to share that the completed construction of Valley Water flood protection projects in Lower Silver Creek in East San Jose eliminates the mandate for thousands of homes and businesses to car-

ry flood insurance. In 2021 we also completed the Permanente Creek Flood Protection Project which benefits the City of Mountain View, an effort nearly two decades in the making.

We invite you to take steps to prepare for the risk of flooding in your home or business. Visit valleywater.org/floodready to see if you are located within a flood-prone area as designated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. If you are in the flood zone please review our emergency

preparedness guide, download apps that will alert you of any imminent flooding, and investigate flood insurance. Please watch our stream gauges during upcoming rains if you live near a creek by visiting the abovementioned website. Obstacles in creek beds can increase the risk of flooding, so we encourage all residents to report any blockages to us via our Valley Water Access System, also located at valleywater.org.

Remember, climate change has made extreme weather the new normal, and we all must be ready for more extended droughts and heavier floods. Don't get caught off-guard; be flood-safe even during dry years!



You might be thinking, "What friends?" It's okay, I'm your friend, and one is better than none! <3

But seriously, the phenomenon of the number of friends of your friends being, on average, greater than your friends is known as the friendship paradox. This paradox was first introduced by sociologist Scott Field in 1991. (I heard that, by 1992, his friend count went down to 0. Wonder why...)

How in the world is this true? It seems like we would run out of people at some point, right? If my friends have more friends than me, but their friends have more friends than them, and their friends have more friends than them. won't we need an infinite number of friends? No! We have forgotten one key fact: people can count more than once because friendship is mutual (hopefully). Also, the friendship paradox is based on an average, which can be a very misleading measure. For example, if I took the average of 1, 2, and 3, I would get (1+2+3)/3 =2. But, if I took the average of 1, 2, 3, and 96, I would get (1+2+3+94)/4 = 25. With just one extra value (an outlier, if you will), the average COMPLETELY changes. Now, this is a very simple example, but you get the idea: your popular friends are to blame for your comparative unpopularity.

Think of your most extroverted, sociable friend, who seems to have people around them all the time. For me, that's my very good friend Andrew Garfield. (Alright FINE, we're not "real" friends in the technical sense of the word, but in my head we're besties so it still counts). Anyways, Andrew knows all the cool celebrities and is literally Spider-man, so he basically has hundreds of friends. Now, think of someone you know who prefers their own company, maybe only has a couple friends (it's okay, you can say yourself). Our social circles tend to have more of the Andrew Garfield type, just because there's a higher chance of being one of their many many friends than being friends with someone who is a little more introverted, though it's still possible! However, the averages often overshadow these friendships with introverts.

This is why the friendship paradox happens: the distribution of your friends is not linear. Most people have a couple close friends, but the small number of people that have TONS of friends is why this average becomes suddenly skewed, making your number of friends pale in comparison. It's a form of sampling bias, because your friends are not an accurate representation of the general population friend counts.

This paradox translates to very similar situ-

ations, like your Facebook friends have more friends than you have on average, your Twitter followers have more followers than you do on average, and your friends also have more money than you do, say it with me, on average. This is an expected result because of how these networks are connected.

Let's just say this isn't very helpful for our general happiness levels. That's why it always seems like the people around us are happier, richer, and just doing better than you are, especially on social media where networks are even broader.

But don't worry, that's the horrible sampling bias at work! It's like going to the gym for the

the spread of infectious disease! Sound familiar? This makes sense, because "popular" people who meet more of their friends are more likely to catch it and spread it, making them "super-spreaders." The lesson? Don't have friends and you won't catch diseases! (The actual lesson is to be responsible during a pandemic, but that's beside the point.) The friendship paradox can actually detect these outbreaks faster than traditional methods, and caught flu outbreaks two weeks earlier than the old methods.

So, the paradox isn't really a paradox, and you aren't really unpopular. But, even if you are, I'll be there for youuuuuu!

he Silicon Valley Biz PAC (Political Action Committee), which represents local business interests, endorsed two San Jose City Council candidates in the upcoming 2022 contest for Mayor of San Jose.

As stated on their website, the motto for the Silicon Valley Biz PAC is, "Help us advocate today for a better tomorrow."

The PAC is supporting both Councilmembers Dev Davis and Matt Mahan in the contested mayoral race. San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo terms out this year.

The organization is also endorsing San Jose Downtown Foundation Board President Ramona Snyder for District 1, small business owner Irene Smith for District 3, San Jose Planning Commissioner Rolando Bonilla for District 5, San Jose Fire Captain

Bien Doan for District 7 and Councilmember Pam Foley, who's running uncontested for District 9.

"COVID really showed us what type of leadership the San Jose business community needs," said PAC executive director, Victor Gomez during a recent interview with San Jose Spotlight. "Many businesses in Silicon Valley have been hanging by a thread since the pandemic began. We're looking for candidates that certainly understand how important small business is to the San Jose community."

The Silicon Valley Biz PAC, formed in 2019 by former members of the now-disbanded Silicon Valley Organization's PAC.

PAC, which has a long history of endorsing candidates with business-friendly backgrounds, has raised \$125,000 for this cycle so far, according to Gomez.

Vietnamese flag-themed attire.

Many residents dressed up in colorful áo dài, embellished with beads and pearls, with red envelopes in hands. Giving and receiving red envelopes is a tradition that symbolizes good wishes and luck for the new year. With music and laughter filling the air, festival-goers posed in front of three-wheel bicycle taxis, or cyclos (xích lô), and photos of famous Vietnamese destinations such as Chùa Một Cột and Chợ Bến Thành.

Tết festivals were previously hosted at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds, which often drew thousands of people from the South Bay and nearby regions. Since the pandemic started upending community gatherings in 2020, San Jose residents have opted for virtual celebrations for the last two years.

Saturday marked the first time people could gather in person—many still donning masks and carrying hand sanitizer.

"The pandemic really robbed us of opportunities to come together these last few years," Cao Hong, one of the event organizers, told San José Spotlight, "I'm grateful that we can celebrate again, especially here in Viet Museum, because we have fun but also look back at our history and the sacrifices of our older generations."

San Jose is home to some 180,000 Vietnamese residents, making it the largest in any city outside of Vietnam.

Jenny Tran, 4, couldn't wait to see the Tết festival in person for the first time. Donning

a yellow ao dài, Jenny ran ahead of her parents, Phong and Uyen Tran, from one booth to another.

"Happy New Year!" she said with excitement.

The family has shown her pictures of previous festivals, Uyen Tran said, and Jenny became obsessed with the Tết music.

"She loves this

time of the year with all the decorations, the flowers, the music, the dance—all of it," Uyen Tran said. "We've been to Autumn Festivals, but not for Tết."

Phuong Anh Le and her son Ethan, 3, flew in from New York to celebrate Tết with their family in San Jose.

"There's not a big population of Vietnamese where I live, so it's always nice to be in San Jose during this time of the year," Le said. "I just got to the festival, but I'm excited to see all the booths here. I love the food during Tết."

Organizers also hosted a traditional ceremony, where members of the Association of Vietnamese Elderly of the Bay Area pay respect and homage to Vietnamese ancestors in prayers. The ceremony also dedicated a moment of silence to commemorate those who fled Vietnam after the fall of Saigon in 1975 but died in their journeys to the United States.

For Tran Byrne, who lives almost three hours from the South Bay, the holiday could be a bittersweet time. Byrne grew up in Vietnam and immigrated to the U.S. by herself several years ago.

"I always get homesick this time of the year," Byrne said. "I missed the food, the atmosphere, everything."

This is the second time Byrne and her husband, Gregory, attended such festivals in the U.S. They went to a celebration in Orange County three years ago.

"This is much more relaxing," Gregory Byrne said. "This feels a bit like home."

Coming Soon: Community Budget Meeting

Addressing the shortfall and softening the blow on our residents and first ever opportunity for Zoom (over the internet) voiced public comment at Community Budget Meeting

s we await the official release of the City of San José's proposed 2022-2023 Operating Budget, the Mayor's Office is checking in—reminding our residents and workforce that while many areas of economic activity have recovered since 2020, we aren't out of the woods yet.

The City experienced solid revenue growth this last year, and projections are im-

proving; however, the budget still faces a structural shortfall when considering the number of important, community-serving initiatives that were funded on a one-time basis in response to the pandemic.

We will need to make some tough decisions in the weeks ahead to develop a bal-

anced budget that sustains the City's delivery of core services and continues pandemic-era programs that lack ongoing funding. The need for community engagement is critical to solicit feedback and offer insight into the budget process as we work together to identify community priorities.

Due to the recent surge in Omicron cases, we will offer the first community budget meeting by phone, website through Zoom and Facebook. In addition to the date and time listed below, please find unique options for sessions dedicated to Vietnamese and Español language. For






