



emphasized community engagement in local government in his second State of the District address on Jan. 29.

Mahan believes residents working together can have an impact. His office helped create three new neighborhood associations and 10 working groups to advocate for change. The working groups range from mental health care to zoning and city policy on leaf blowers.

The Laura's Law working group helped Mahan's office push the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors to vote to implement it, allowing judges to order outpatient mental health care for homeless individuals with repeated run ins with the law. Mahan said Laura's Law helps end the revolving door between the street, hospitals and iails.

"It was a significant decision," he said, "...and something we're very proud of."

Family and Homes partnered with Mahan's office to work on preserving single-family zoning and defeat Opportunity housing which allowed for fourplexes. Mahan believes building density downtown near transit is a better plan.

The General Plan allows for 120,000 additional housing units by 2040 downtown where there should be more density and people, he said, adding that density in suburbs creates more cars on the road, air pollution and a strain on critical infrastructure. Mahan said the City Council voted to drop Opportunity Housing and limit Sen-

pursued legislation banning gaspowered leaf blowers in the city to eliminate noise and pollution.

To build community, Mahan combined dumpster days with Neighbor Days. At these events, residents can ask Mahan questions about City Hall and do a service project together.

"Our office is working hard through building neighborhood associations, creating Neighborhood Watch groups and putting on Neighbor Days," he said. "We're doing our best...to help build a sense of community and connection."

Mahan said strong neighborhoods and a sense of community are the foundation for a healthy local democracy and an effective and responsive City Hall. Favoring online City Council meetings that enable the public to easily participate, he successfully urged the City to invest in technology to enable hybrid meetings permanently.

Helping residents to connect with City Hall, Mahan includes information on current issues in his District 10 newsletter. He posts previews of City Council meetings on his website and posts a video recap afterwards letting residents know how he and other councilmembers voted and what it means for the community.

Mahan said he wants residents to have the opportunity to shape the votes made at City Hall and have the opportunity to affect impacts on local government.

Through a community survey,

Mahan learned that resident's top priorities include reducing crime and homelessness followed by repairing roads and keeping communities clean and beautiful. Residents also care about supporting schools, small businesses and parks.

To reduce crime, Mahan said police staffing needs to be increased. He said San Jose has 11 officers per 10,000 residents while other major U.S. Cities have 20 to 50 officers per 10.000 residents.

Mahan said he'd also like to see expanded foot patrols in commercial districts.

"The shooting at Oakridge Mall is a reminder that having a visible police presence makes people feel safe and is a deterrent to crime and ensuring a fast response," he said.

Mahan wants the police department to be well staffed well trained and highly engaged in the community.

To end homelessness, Mahan would like to see an expansion of job training and placement like San Jose Bridge, which employs homeless individuals to clean up the city.

"We need to partner with nonprofits and faith-based organizations to help people get work, build skills and have a pathway toward being a part of our economy and getting back on their own two feet," he said.

Mahan said the city needs to invest in addiction and mental health treatment and expand costeffective shelters. He said rather than spending \$850,000 per unit on housing for the unhoused, less expensive prefabricated modular See MAHAN, page 9

units could be placed on government land across the county. He said the city could cost effectively provide safe, clean, individual shelters with a door that locks where people can have their belongings and their pets and take advantage of job programs and mental health and addiction treatment.

He said if government provides cost effective shelters and inpatient services, individuals have a responsibility to use those services.

"I don't think we should be scared as a city to enforce anti-

camping laws," he said, "... as long as we're providing people with a safe place to go ... and programs."

Mahan also worked to increase management strategies for homeless camps. He suggested 150-foot setbacks around schools, day cares,

parks and residential neighborhoods. "None of our children should have to walk through or by an encampment to get to school," he said. He also secured funding for sanitation services with trash pickups, porta potties and hand washing stations at homeless camps.

As speeding and street racing are additional challenges for the community, Mahan secured funding to add four pole mounted radar signs in the district. He said they have been shown to reduce traffic speeds up to 10 miles per hour in residential areas. He also secured funding to do a pilot project for a roundabout for traffic calming at Hillsdale and Vista Park.

Mahan said local service clubs and neighborhood groups are some of the best vehicles for getting involved in the community



and making District 10 a better place to live. "Local government requires the engagement of the community," he said. "It's a government of, by and for the people." 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

### San Jose food pantry raises funds to pay for pricey city permit

#### By Lorraine Gabbert

Article courtesy of San José Spotlight fter facing closure for having to pay San Jose up to \$15,500 for a special use permit, a local food pantry has raised enough funding overnight to remain open.

The Lighthouse Ministries Food Pantry, which serves families, seniors, disabled and unhoused people, was told by the city it would have to raise funds for a permit or cease operations on Feb. 14.

City spokesperson Cheryl Wessling said the cost of the special use permit is necessary for environmental and planning review, public notification and outreach and a public hearing, all which require staff. Complaints from neighbors about driveways being blocked and other parking issues related to the food pantry can be addressed in the permitting process.

The city threatened to charge the food pantry \$2,500 a day until the permit is paid for. If the permit was not paid for by that deadline, the city would charge a reinspection fee of \$231.

A day after San José Spotlight wrote about the potential closure, the GoFundMe cam-

paign to save the food pantry exploded, with one anonymous contributor donating \$10,000. The campaign had raised \$16,662 as of Tuesday night.

A longtime San José Spotlight reader reached out to "Community" actress Yvette Nicole Brown on Twitter, asking her to retweet the article to raise support and funds for the food pantry to her nearly 500,000 followers. Brown retweeted the article, helping to bring more attention to the issue.

The food distribution center, located at E. Julian and

17th streets in San Jose, feeds more than 1,000 people a day six days a week, providing fresh fruit and vegetables, bread, eggs and dairy to those in need. Pastor Ralph Olmos said he couldn't believe the outpouring of support Lighthouse received. Now the food pantry that so many rely on can keep its doors open, he said.

"It's amazing," he told San José Spotlight on Tuesday afternoon. "The people are speaking."

Olmos said the Lighthouse volunteers expressed excitement throughout the day as the GoFundMe total kept rising.

"I want to say thank you to everyone who's taken the time to show support for Lighthouse," he said. "I feel a lot of gratitude in my heart that the people are embracing us."

Olmos said he will use the funding to pay for the permit and improve the look and feel of the farmer's market-style food pantry.

Lighthouse Distribution Center manager Tony Covarrubias said Tuesday it's a blessing that people are willing to step up to help keep the food pantry running. He said they're giving food back to the people who thought they'd have to go without it.

"From the bottom of my heart, I'm really grateful," Covarrubias told San José Spotlight. "There are still people out there who care, who have a good heart to help others who are less fortunate."

### Fatal collision involving a vehicle and 3 pedestrians on Almaden Expressway

fficers responded to the area of Almaden Expressway and Foxworthy Avenue for a traffic collision involving a vehicle and three pedestrians on January 18th at approximately 8:24 p.m.

A 2017 Toyota sedan was traveling northbound on Almaden Expressway in the number one lane in the area of Foxworthy Avenue. The Toyota struck three adult pedestrians that were crossing Almaden Expressway outside of any marked crosswalk. ### Seven biggest trends predicted to influence home projects this year

omeowners expect to invest in features to make their homes more comfortable, livable and sustainable.

High style will take a back seat to comfort and calm in 2022 as homeowners invest in features and projects that foster a sense of renewal and reflect core values around sustainability and self-care, Zillow analysts predict.

Projects and features that foster a sense of well-being and create new space to relax, recharge and work comfortably from home are among the top seven home trends to watch in 2022.

"The pandemic forced a lot of people to reevaluate what's most important in their lives and in their homes." said Zillow home trends expert Amanda Pendleton. "For many, 2022 is the moment to start living those values. That could be investing in sustainable home features, designing a space with wellbeing in mind or leaning into comfort and function over high style."

Zillow crunched its housing data and consulted its experts to help identify the top seven home trends to watch in the new year. Color schemes drawn from nature

When it comes to paint colors, think greens, blues, taupes and browns drawn from nature. Colors that reflect the great outdoors such as Behr's Breezeway, a pale silvery sage reminiscent of sea glass found on sandy beaches, will become prevalent.

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Potential and recent home buyers also appear keen on colors associated with water and blue skies. Zillow's interior paint color analysis found homes with light blue bathrooms could sell for 1.6% more than expected, or nearly \$5,000 on a typical U.S. home. Homes with a bedroom painted a dark, moody blue could sell for a nearly \$1,500 premium.\*

#### Putting values into action

Sustainability is a core value for many homeowners, especially younger generations who will be seeking out home features and products in 2022 that reflect their values.

Sustainable home features such as smart lightbulbs, leak detectors and thermostats can save energy and money — and they are associated with homes that sell faster.

Zillow research found that home listings with descriptions mentioning "eco," "energy efficient" or similar terms sell more than two days faster than expected.

Listings that mention drought-resistant landscaping can sell 13 days faster, while smart sprinkler systems and energy-conserving double pane windows are associated with homes selling more than a week quicker than expected.

#### Old is new again

Secondhand furniture and décor will be in demand, a trend driven by supply issues and the desire to reduce waste by giving used furnishings a new life.

Younger homeowners will put a modern twist on design trends that were prominent during their childhoods. For instance, plaster finishes will replace faux paint finishes, and wallpaper will make a comeback but with bold, contemporary and geometric patterns.

Look for all-wood kitchens too, with cherry cabinets giving way to white oak.

#### Furnishings that feel good

Forget stiff couches, sharp angles and scratchy fabrics. With people spending more time at home, furnishings will become as comfortable and cozy as a pair of flannel pajamas.

Furniture styles are already starting to reflect an easy-on-the eye sensibility, with curved couches and rounded corners dominating the market. Nubby fabric upholstery — as opposed to leather — will be cropping up on all manner of furniture, ottomans will replace sharp-edged coffee tables, and cozy accent chairs that hug the body will become preferred sitting.

#### Renovations that add space

As the home continues to serve as the center of life and work for millions of remote workers, homeowners will be renovating their homes to meet new, evolving needs.

A recent Zillow survey found that nearly three in four homeowners are considering



at least one improvement project in 2022. The most popular was adding or improving a home office space (31%), followed by finishing a basement or attic (23%), adding another room (23%) and putting in another dwelling unit, such as a backyard cottage or guest house (21%).

Supply disruptions in materials and labor shortages also will spur homeowners to repurpose existing spaces. For instance, expect garages to become full-scale home gyms, sheds to become home offices and closets to do double-duty as "cloffices."

Peaceful retreats at home

Homeowners will prioritize retreats within their homes, creating spaces for meditation or reflection, reading nooks and spainspired bathroom escapes. Retreat features, such as a "she shed," can help a home sell for 2.2% more than expected, while a freestanding bathtub can contribute to a home selling for a 2.6% premium.

Homeowners also will be bringing more natural light into their homes, especially home offices and common spaces, while indoor plants will retain their popularity for bringing nature indoors.

More spaces for pets

Pet ownership among recent movers soared over the past year, impacting housing decisions. Nearly three-fourths of home buyers report having at least one pet at home (73%), up from the 64% of buyers who reported having a pet in 2020, according to Zillow research.

Expect those pets to be enjoying new digs as more homeowners design their homes inside and out with their pets in mind and invest in custom feeding stations, built-in pet beds, even playrooms.

Zillow research finds homes with a doghouse often sold for more than expected last year, while homes with a fenced yard or dog run sold faster than similar homes without these features.

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

### Tech Jargon of the week: Voice Recognition

Have you ever stumbled into a conversation where everyone is speaking around this "techie" word – and even after you've broken in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words:

#### Voice Recognition

Voice recognition software is an everincreasing part of our lives, though thankfully not like the sci-fi movies of the 80's or 90's led us to believe. Whether its Siri or Cortana on our phone, or Amazon Echo or Google Home in our living rooms, we are talking to digital assistants more than ever.

Their popularity is derived from the numerous benefits they provide to our professional and personal lives. Using voice recognition software, we can quickly respond to emails, record speeches, surf the internet, get the latest weather updates, and get the latest news, to name but a few. While, for those with physical and visual impairments, this software can assist with everyday tasks, such as reading out messages, playing music and adjusting the lighting and thermostat in the home.

So, what is Voice Recognition and how does it work?

Put simply, voice recognition is an alternative to typing on a keyboard. You talk to a computer, or a smartphone and words 'magically' appear on a screen. The software behind this technology 'takes' the soundwaves in the air and translates them into their digital representation, which a computer or a smart device can understand. Voice recognition is part of the family of 'behavioral biometrics', used to authenticate identity and can be used as an alternative to the traditional PIN and password.

Although this new type of technology has become widely available to the public, the question of how it works is still frequently asked. Voice recognition software programs work by analyzing sounds and performing tasks based on the information that is given to them via voice. Broadly speaking, there are four different approaches a computer can take if it wants to turn spoken sounds into written words:

1. Simple pattern matching (where each spoken word is recognized in its entirety—the way you instantly recognize a tree or a table without consciously analyzing what you're looking at)


2. Pattern and feature analysis (where each word is broken into bits and recognized from key features, such as the vowels it contains)

3. Language modeling and statistical analysis (in which a knowledge of grammar and the probability of certain words or sounds following on from one another is used to speed up recognition and improve accuracy)

4. Artificial neural networks (brain-like computer models that can reliably recognize patterns, such as word sounds, after exhaustive training).

In practice, the everyday speech recognition we encounter in things like automated call centers, computer dictation software, or smartphone "agents" (like Siri and Cortana) combines a variety of different approaches to get the results.

### Santa Clara County plans Major League cricket stadium at Santa Clara County Fairgrounds

Santa Clara County's law makers are moving forward with plans to build a 15,000-person cricket stadium at the county fairgrounds located on Tully Rd. in San Jose.

Major League Cricket (MLC) and the county announced they are in an exclusive negotiating agreement to move forward with lease negotiations and design approvals for a new stadium that will be constructed on a 14-acre site located on the fairgrounds.

"Cricket is a sport that's increasing in popularity in the U.S. and Santa Clara County," said Supervisor Otto Lee in a statement. "The addition of an international cricket venue to the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds would help attract large numbers of visitors from around the world to the region. We look forward to finalizing plans with Major League Cricket to move forward with this exciting development for Santa Clara County."

MLC spokesperson Tom Dunmore said

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

### Why you aren't popular

everyone! We have forgotten one key fact: people can count more than once because friendship is mutual (hopefully). Also, the friendship paradox is based on an average, which can be a very misleading measure. For example, if I took the average of 1, 2, and 3, I would get (1+2+3)/3 = 2. But, if I took the average of 1, 2, 3, and 96, I would get (1+2+3+94)/4 = 25. With just one extra value (an outlier, if you will), the average COMPLETELY changes. Now, this is a very simple example, but you get the idea: your popular friends are to blame for your comparative unpopularity.

Think of your most extroverted, sociable friend, who seems to have people around them all the time. For me, that's my very good friend Andrew Garfield. (Alright FINE, we're not "real" friends in the technical sense of the word, but in my head we're besties so it still counts). Anyways, Andrew knows all the cool celebrities and is literally Spider-man, so he basically has hundreds of friends. Now, think of someone you know who prefers their own company, maybe only has a couple friends (it's okay, you can say yourself). Our social circles tend to have more of the Andrew Garfield type, just because there's a higher chance of being one of their many many friends than being friends with someone who is a little more introverted, though it's still possible! However, the averages often overshadow these friendships with introverts.

This is why the friendship paradox happens: the distribution of your friends is not linear. Most people have a couple close friends, but the small number of people that have TONS of friends is why this average becomes suddenly skewed, making your number of friends pale in comparison. It's a form of sampling bias, because your friends are not an accurate representation of the general population friend counts.

uations, like your Facebook friends have more friends than you have on average, your Twitter followers have more followers than you do on average, and your friends also have more money than you do, say it with me, on average. This is an expected result because of how these networks are connected. Let's just say this isn't very help-

ful for our general happiness levels. That's why it always seems like the people around us are happier, richer, and just doing better than you are, especially on social media where networks are even broad-

er. But don't worry, that's the horrible sampling bias at work! It's like going to the gym for the

first time. You might be distraught by how much bigger muscles the people there have. However! You forgot about the people who don't go to the gym, so you're comparing yourself to a very small part of the population that isn't an accurate representation of the general muscle size. Don't worry, you'll get those big muscles eventually!

So, is the friendship paradox's only purpose to torture me with the knowledge that my friends are popular-er, richer, and better than me? Thankfully, no! Otherwise, I would be squaring up with Scott

Field right now. This paradox can be applied to help prevent the spread of infectious disease! Sound familiar? This makes sense, because "popular" people who meet more of their friends are more likely to catch it and spread it, making them "super-spreaders." The lesson? Don't have friends and you won't catch diseases! (The actual lesson is to be responsible during a pandemic, but that's beside the point.) The friendship paradox can actually detect these outbreaks faster than traditional methods, and caught flu outbreaks two weeks earlier than the old methods.

So, the paradox isn't really a paradox, and you aren't really unpopular. But, even if you are, I'll be there for youuuuu!
