Portland Conservatory Announces **Dimensions in** Jazz Lineup

PORTLAND, ME (January 28, 2022) -- The Dimensions in Jazz concert series, sponsored by the Portland Conservatory of Music, is bringing significant names in contemporary jazz to Portland this year! The winter/spring lineup includes seven concerts running from February through April.

The performances will be held at the Portland Conservatory's new building at 28 Neal St. in Portland's West End, unless otherwise noted.

The series kicks off on February 5th, at Cove Street Arts with "Nihco Gallo and the Bad-Year Society" for an evening of improvised music with influences from around the world. Vibraphonist Nihco Gallo is joined by tap dancer Ayan Imai-Hall, drummer Zak King, and bassist Ross Gallagher.

On April 22nd, 2022 South African jazz musician McCoy Mrubata (Tenor Saxophone) returns to Portland, Maine in his fourth tour of the US and will be performing in quartet alongside his friend Gary Wittner (Guitar), Shakeel Curtis (Bass) and Lumanyano Mzi (Drums).

"I never studied music formally as we (black people) did not have music schools and music colleges before our independence in South Africa. I learned from family records, getting odd lessons from older musicians. Music always plays a great role in our communities . . . music education is important," says McCov Mrubata. Today, he has been featured on NPR Live Sessions and also won the South African Music Award for Best Jazz Album.

Each year, PCM is proud to present the "Steve Grover Memorial Concert" celebrating jazz musician Steve Grover's compositional brilliance and his many contributions to the cultural landscape of the state he loved.

Other exceptional performances include the "Brian Shankar Adler Band" presenting a new program of electro-acoustic music for improvisers, "Travels in the Electronosphere" with R.J. Miller on Drums and Sampler and Jeremy Udden on Lyricon, the "Titus Abbott Collective" featuring PCM Jazz Studies director Titus Abbott performing original jazz compositions alongside percussionist Michael Sarin and bassist Sean Conly. In addition to the Dimensions in Jazz Concert Series, PCM's innovative Jazz Studies Division teaches students how to improvise and to understand contemporary and classic jazz. Visiting jazz artists host workshops for students and the public that bring this American musical art form to life. Doors open at 7:30pm, show starts at 8:00pm. Tickets are \$5 for students, \$15 for seniors, \$20 in advance, and \$25 at the door. 133rd Engineer Battalion Receives National Supply Award

Dean Preston, Maine's land component commander, presented the Army Chief of Staff's Supply Excellence Award (SEA) to Chief Warrant Officer 2 Peter Houghton, Sgt. 1st Class Shannon Trepanier and Staff Sgt. Patrick Purcell, all members of the133rd Engineer Battalion at the Brunswick Armed Forces Reserve Center.

Houghton, Trepanier, Purcell, former property book officer Chief Warrant Officer 2 Jennifer Paradis, and other key logistics staff members worked tirelessly towards this recognition of having the top program in the organizational level property book officer category.

"The 133rd Engineer Battalion is proud," said Lt. Col. Shanon Cotta, commander of the 133rd. "It is a testimony of the S-4 team's commitment to excellence and the support of our Maine Army National Guard leaders." The SEA program was established in 1984 by the U.S. Army Quartermaster School to recognize supply excellence at the various unit and organizational levels. It is open to active Army, Army National Guard and Army Reserve units nationwide.

The objectives of the program are to enhance logistical readiness of all Army units, enforce supply discipline, provide a management tool to ensure system standardization, perpetuate group competition and increase public awareness of supply excellence within the U.S. Army.

"The engineer community hopes to continue the momentum with the SEA evaluation, phase II, in 2022 with the 133rd's Forward Support Company," said Cotta. "The leadership team believes this program enhances readiness of our Maine Army units and improves the command supply discipline program."

The 133rd Engineer Battalion continues the long line of success the Maine Army National Guard historically has in the SEA competition. Maine units have placed in the regional or national level several times since 2010, including the 133rd's Headquarters and Headquarters Company, the 488th Military Police Company, Joint Force Headquarters, the 286th Combat Support Sustainment Brigade and Charlie Company 1-126th Aviation Regiment.





Thomaston Place owner and auctioneer Kaja Veilleux said: "This auction presents an interesting balance of traditional and modern objects that

will appeal to virtually all collecting and design interests."

Leading the painting category is a beautiful and delicate work by Jessie Arms Botke (CA/IL, 1883-1971) depicting two white peacocks among amid a garden of exotic flowers. "Spring Tide" a dynamic oil on canvas seascape by Frederick Judd Waugh (NJ/ MA, 1861-1940) will also be featured, along with paintings by James Edward Buttersworth (NJ/NY/UK, 181-1894), Thomas Moran (PA/CA, 1837-1926), Ralph Eugene Cahoon, Jr. (MA, 1910-1982), and Karl Albert Buehr (IL/VT/ France, 1866-1952).

Two Andy Warhol (NY, 1929-1987) Campbell's Soup limited edition serigraphs from 1968 will be offered - Campbell's Soup I (Tomato) and Campbell's Soup I (Green Pea) will be offered along with three outstanding "outsider art" watercolors by folk artist Bill Traylor (AL, 1854-1947).

School work of a young brother and sister, an infant child with cat by Aaron Dean Fletcher (VT/NY, 1817-1902), and a pair of husband and wife portraits by E.E. Finch (ME, active 1832-1850). Other folk art items include five weathervanes, six carousel animals (including rare moose and sea monster figures), plus groups of ship models, decoys, theorems, early signs, baskets, and treenware.

The sale will present a mid-19th Century British soldier-made quilt composed of thousands of wool geometric pieces, probably from military uniforms. centered by UK and US flags and assorted symbols. Another historic treasure to be sold is a 1795 appointment signed by President George Washington.

Featured among the over 200 lots of fine furniture will be: a round walnut dining table purchased by Marilyn Monroe for her Brentwood, CA home; a circa 1700 red painted Deerfield blanket chest; a rare maple William & Mary drop-leaf butterfly table; New England rampant tiger maple chest on stand; plus many other early painted and inlaid pieces, and custom designer items by Thos. Moser, Mies Van Der Rohe, and Nils Jonsson.

The large pottery and glass collection will include: two lots of 18th Century German free blown stemware; pottery by Brother Thomas Bezanson (Canada/VT, 1929-2007), Martin Brothers, Pablo Picasso, and Doulton Lambeth; early porcelain by Coalport, Derby, Wedgwood, and Worcester; plus selections of early stoneware, redware and mocha

There will be over 130 lots of Asian antiques and artifacts, led by a Chinese inlaid rosewood pedestal display table from the 1939-40 New York World's Fair, a set of 18 Chinese late 18th Century carved ivory Buddha disciple figures, multiple lots of early Japanese tsuba, and an early Thai gilt cinnabar Buddha figure.

Other items of interest include: a men's 2005 Rolex Submariner wristwatch, an early 20th c. Italian micro-mosaic portrait of a standing musketeer from the Vatican Studio, a circa 1800 tall case clock by Nathan Hale (son of the Revolutionary War pa-

triot), selections of early barometers, and a large group of fine boxes and tea caddies.

The auction will begin at 11:00 a.m. EST each day. All lots can be viewed at Thomaston Place Auction Galleries' website, www.thomastonauction. com.

Maine Air National Guard Supporting Afghan Allies

AUGUSTA, (February 10, 2022) (readMedia) -- For over five months members of the Maine Air National Guard have supported Operation Allies Welcome at Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, New Jersey. The airmen are there as part of Task Force Liberty, which supports housing, medical, transportation, and logistical operations for vulnerable Afghans as they arrive in the United States. A number of these Afghans worked alongside U.S. forces in Afghanistan for the past 20 years.

Operation Allies Welcome, the name of the overarching efforts at multiple locations across the country, was established by the Department of Homeland Security on Aug. 29, 2021. A key factor in OAW's mission includes screening and vetting of the Afghans and completing the Special Immigrant Visa process for resettlement in the U.S.

Task Force Liberty is a team of DHS and Department of State personnel, Department of Defense service members and civilians, resettlement partners and affiliates and non-governmental organizations united for a common purpose. The task force makes various accommodations and services available to the Afghans arriving at Joint Base Mc-Guire-Dix-Lakehurst after departing Afghanistan.

"This mission is very important to the Maine National Guard," said Maj. Gen. Douglas Farnham, Maine's adjutant general. "Afghans and their families resettling through Operation Allies Welcome personally helped Maine National Guard members during their deployments in Afghanistan."

The first members of the Maine Air National Guard joined Task Force

ME Liberty in mid-September. (re-Several other rotations have five followed. In all, about 20 the MAINEiacs have assisted during tours lasting 6-10 weeks. The airmen have worked at various levels throughout Liberty Village, The the area at the base supporting the Afghans.

"We arrived on Sept. 16 and there were about 9,000 Afghans already on the base," said Capt. Joseph White, who served as the Joint Operations Center Liaison Officer to the non-Department of Defense agencies. "In addition to the Afghans, there were about 2,000 U.S. personnel there and it was amazing to see what a large-scale effort this was by all agencies."

White, from Brewer, joined Task Force Liberty with two other Maine Air National Guard members including Tech. Sgt. Nisajith Welikadage, originally from Colombo, Sri Lanka, and now residing in Alton.

"I volunteered for this mission because I witnessed enough wartime strife on the civilian population during the 1983-2009 Sri Lankan civil war," said Welikadage, who supported safety efforts a Liberty Village. "I saw an opportunity to assist another community facing a similar issue and wanted to help." Welikadage likely saved an infant's life while working in Liberty Village. The infant was choking on a piece of plastic and the airman quickly jumped into action, successfully performing back blows and chest thrusts to dislodge the plastic, reestablishing the child's airway.

"That's an experience that I will never forget," said Welikadage, who works full time as a logistics plans specialist for the 101st Air Refueling Wing in Bangor. "We were there to do the best we could to support these people, and that was just something I was able to help with."

As Operation Allies Welcome continues, so does the Maine Air National Guard's support. The MAINEaics currently have 12 airmen working in various capacities within Task Force Liberty.

"I'm amazed at the scope of the mission," said Lt. Col. John Kayser, who served as the task force's engineering branch chief. "At one point there were over 13,000 guests and support personnel there, which would make it one of the largest towns in Maine. Being a part of this operation in helping these families begin their lives in the United States is something that we all know makes a difference."

Kayser, of Scarborough, arrived at Liberty Village in November and completed his mission this week. His civilian experience as a professional engineer and project management professional were quickly put to use by working with contractors and agencies to provide vital services to the small city.

"The National Guard is an incredible resource for operations like this as many of us carry additional skills and training we acquire in our civilian careers," said Kayser. "It isn't your typical military mission, but walking down the street after a 12-hour shift while being greeted by smiling Afghan children is something I'll always remember."

The Maine Air National Guard plans to provide more airmen to the mission in several weeks, with those currently there returning in February. Eventually, Operation Allies Welcome will draw to an end through the transitioning process for the Afghans. For thousands, the support provided by the Maine Air National Guard will be remembered as creating a warm welcome to their new home.



Maine Beer Company Gift Creates "Brewing Up Opportunity" Program at the University of Southern Maine

PORTLAND, ME

(February 8, 2022) -- The University of Southern Maine (USM) Foundation has received a \$100,000 gift from Maine Beer Company to create a unique Brewing Up Opportunity Internship & Scholarship Fund. The gift establishes a pilot program for USM students that includes a paid internship with Maine Beer Company and a scholarship award of up to \$5,000 per academic year upon completion of the internship. The program's goal is to promote diversity and inclusion within the craft beverage industry by providing access to education, on-the-job training, and mentoring to help develop a new generation of beer industry profession-als.

The Brewing Up Opportunity fund will be used to support USM students who wish to pursue careers within and connected to the craft beverage industry, with internship-scholarships awarded to individuals from traditionally underrepresented populations, first-generation college students, or students coming to Maine from an international location.

Paquette said, "This collaboration showcases the growing capacity of

USM's Career & Employment Hub, led by Director Andy Osheroff, to deliver on critical programs for employer partners and students alike. Through the Brewing Up Opportunity program, more of our students will have the ability to consider these powerful learning opportunities. As the most diverse institution of higher learning in the state, this is of critical importance."

The program looks to broaden the definition of beer studies and training to be inclusive of all the fields represented within the brewing industry. Severe Winter Weather Intensifying Red Cross Blood Crisis

PORTLAND, ME (February 8, 2022) — As severe winter storms continue to move through the country, the American Red Cross asks those in areas unaffected by weather to schedule the earliest-available blood or platelet donation appointments in their community.

Dangerous snow and ice conditions have contributed to over 500 blood drive cancellations since the beginning of the year, resulting in about 17,000 uncollected blood and platelet donations.

Since the Red Cross issued its first-ever blood crisis in January, thousands of generous donors have come forward to give, but patient care remains at risk. The threat of winter weather continues – as well as ongoing complications posed by the omicron variant – and could further complicate efforts to rebuild the blood supply.

More donors are needed to make appointments now for the weeks ahead to help ensure accident victims, cancer patients and new mothers

Red Cross is screening all blood, platelet and plasma donations from self-identified African American donors for the sickle cell trait. This additional screening will provide Black donors with an additional health insight and help the Red Cross identify compatible blood types more quickly to help patients with sickle cell disease. Blood transfusion is an essential treatment for those with sickle cell disease, and blood donations from individuals of the same race, ethnicity and blood type have a unique ability to help patients fighting sickle cell disease.

Donors can expect to receive sickle cell trait screening results, if applicable, within one to two weeks through the Red Cross Blood Donor App and the online donor portal at RedCrossBlood.org.

Blood drive safety

Each Red Cross blood drive and donation center follows the highest standards of safety and infection control, and additional precautions - including face masks for donors and staff, regardless of vaccination status - have been implemented to help protect the health of all those in attendance. Donors are asked to schedule an appointment prior to arriving at the drive. How to donate blood download Simply the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org, call 1- 800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor

card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCross-Blood.org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.


Holocaust & Human Rights Center of Maine Invites Public to Share for Yom HaShoah Exhibit
