

Gov. Mills Declares Feb. 21-28 Maine Unclaimed Property Week

AUGUSTA, 2022) (February 16, -- Maine Treasurer, Henry E.M. Beck today announced that Governor Janet Mills has officially declared February 21-28, 2022 Maine Unclaimed Property Week through a proclamation put forward by the Maine Office of the State Treasurer (OST). The proclamation builds on the National Association of State Treasurers (NAST) celebration of National Unclaimed Property Day on February 1st and coincides with a telethon during Maine Unclaimed Property

manages Maine's unclaimed property program. Unclaimed Property consists of money and other financial assets that are considered lost or abandoned when an owner cannot be located after a specified period of time of inactivity. It includes items such as bank accounts, uncashed checks, life insurance policies, unpaid wages, stocks and dividends, refunds, and safe deposit box contents. Unclaimed Property does not include real estate, animals or ve-

Each and every year, tens of millions of dollars go unclaimed by Maine residents. These financial assets are turned over by thousands of national and local businesses and organizations by a law called

MRSA Title 33, Chapter 45: Maine Revised Unclaimed Property Act. http://legislature.maine.gov/statutes/33/title33ch45sec0. html. The Treasurer's office holds these assets, free of charge, until claimed by the owner or heir. The State is currently holding over \$292,000,000 in unclaimed property. In the month of December alone, 3,001 claims were made against unclaimed property totaling \$1,572,332.99

Treasurer said of the proclamation, "Maine continues to play a leading role among states in reuniting people with their unclaimed property," he said. "The Governor's proclamation recognizes and amplifies our commitment to the process, providing us a perfect launching pad for increasing awareness of unclaimed property in Maine." he said.

The Office of the Treasurer of State is established in Article V, Part Third of the Constitution of the State of Maine. The core duties of the Treasurer's Office are debt management, cash management, trust fund administration and unclaimed property administration. Other major tasks assigned to the Treasurer are directorships on many of Maine's quasi-governmental debt issuing agencies and distributions under the Municipal Revenue Sharing Program.

Free Help this Tax Season

(March 4, 2022) -- It's hard to believe that it's already March. We've made it through the darkest days of winter, and we even got a preview of some warmer weather in recent weeks. If you're like me, you're anxious to plan some outdoor activities and day trips for the coming months. Before we get too far ahead of ourselves, though, we have to remember one important task: filing our taxes!

Most of us look forward to our refunds but don't particularly enjoy filing our taxes. It can be a time-consuming process, and these days most folks don't have extra time to spare. Filing your taxes can also be a daunting task for some. You might worry about missing an item you were supposed to report, or just leaving money on the table. If you find yourself feeling overwhelmed by the prospect of doing your taxes this year, there might be help available to you at no cost.

Thanks to a group called CA\$H Maine, lots of Mainers are eligible for free tax prep each year! CA\$H Maine is a coalition of about 50 nonprofits across the state that help residents achieve longterm financial stability. Tax preparation is a large part of that mission, but they also offer great resources to help set up your budget, reduce debt and build savings. To qualify for free tax assistance you must have a combined household income of \$58,000 or less per year; not have lived or worked outside Maine in the last year; and not been an active military member. There also are some other requirements. This year, CA\$H Maine affiliates are helping with tax prep in-person and online, and there is a location in your area. To get started, visit

www.cashmaine.org/coalition/lewistonauburn, email laca\$h@community-concepts.org, or call 207-333-6419. All of the assistance folks receive for their taxes is provided by dedicated, Maine-based volunteers who are experts in their field. I'm grateful for their hard work and the help they provide.

Getting help with your taxes can ensure that you're not losing out on money you deserve. One example of this is the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). It helps working Maine families keep extra money in their pockets. But just because the EITC is available doesn't mean all folks who are eligible take advantage of it. In fact, about 20 percent of those eligible for the EITC don't claim it on their tax forms. Mainers who are eligible and claim the credit save \$2,107 on average, which is too much to let pass you by if you qualify! In the biennial budget we passed in the Legislature last year, we even increased and expanded the Maine EITC to cover more Mainers. Just because you haven't qualified in the past doesn't mean that's still true. It's time to check again.

This tax season, don't hesitate to reach out to those folks who are there to help if you find yourself needing assistance. CA\$H Maine is one of the best resources we have available to us as Mainers, and they have proven to be incredibly valuable year after year.

SeniorsPlus Announces Dementia Care Workshop Series to be Presented Remotely

This series of virtual webinars is designed to educate and connect care partners of a person living with dementia. It is presented in conjunction with Positive Approach® to Care, the international program founded by the world-renown occupational therapist Teepa Snow. The five-part series is free and will be offered remotely Thursdays beginning March 17 and ending April 14, from 5:30pm – 7:00pm. Registration is required by calling 1-800-427-1241.

There is no fee for

the program, but participants will need to commit to participating in ALL five sessions from a quiet room with a computer/laptop/mobile device with a microphone and camera, and internet and email access. All participants will be asked to attend a short orientation a few days prior to the first session in order to work through any technical challenges.

Teepa Snow specializes in dementia care and dementia education. Her life mission is to shed a positive light on dementia. Led by Positive Approach Certified Consultants and Trainers, the series will run for five 90-minute weekly sessions. Teepa Snow videos, filmed at the Lewis-Mason-Thurston Area Agency on Aging, will be viewed

in each session to generate awareness, provide knowledge, and stimulate discussion. The series is progressive and includes such topics as Facing Dementia, Skills and Coping, The Long Haul, Taking Stock - Taking Care of You, and Putting It All Together. The series is conducted using a virtual meeting room. Participants will be able to see and converse with each other. These sessions are designed to help caregivers with real life situations, to guide them with troubleshooting, and provide the skills and knowledge that are unique to the program.

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Maine Has Chance to Lead by Ending Sale of Flavored Tobacco

(March 1, 2022) - Flavors Hook Kids Maine, a coalition of organizations focused on ending the sale of flavored tobacco products in Maine, is applauding the news that the Food and Drug Administration has sent their proposed rules to the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) to prohibit the sale of menthol cigarettes and flavored cigars. The proposed rules would end the industry's predatory targeting of Black

communities with menthol cigarettes, and will keep President Biden's promise to follow the science and put America's kids, and racial and health equity, at the center of his agenda.

"While this is very welcome and encouraging news nationally, we have the opportunity to lead locally," said BJ McCollister, campaign manager for Flavors Hook Kids Maine. "The FDA process could take years to fully come to fruition. Here in Maine,

Bangor and Portland have already passed laws that will end the sale of flavored tobacco products on June 1. Our state is well positioned to take the lead and move forward with ending the sale of flavored tobacco products statewide. There is a bill before the legislature that is good policy and will show Maine's leadership. While the news from the FDA is great, we can't afford to wait for the rules to take effect, which could take years. The time to act in Maine is

The Flavors Hook Kids Maine coalition is urging not only the OMB to expedite their review so the FDA can finalize and implement the necessary regulations, but also urging the Maine Legislature to pass LD 1550, An Act To End the Sale of Flavored Tobacco Products. If enacted, it would end the sale of flavored tobacco products such as candy- and fruit-flavored e-cigarettes, sweet flavored cigars and menthol cigarettes, throughout Maine.

"The Biden Administration is standing up to the tobacco industry and proposing a lifesaving policy that will protect kids from tobacco addiction and safe lives," said McCollister. "The Maine Legislature and Gov. Mills have the opportunity to lead the way and take similar action here. Now is the time to take the steps necessary and to set the example for good poli-

have come together in support of the effort, including the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, the American Heart Association, the American Lung Association, the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network, the Christian Civic League, the Maine Children's Alliance, Planned Parenthood of Northern New England and a variety of local organizations. American Legion: Veteran Homes Closures are a Breach of Faith

(February 28, 2022) The American Legion Department of Maine is vehemently opposed to the closure of the Maine Veterans Homes (MVH) in Caribou and Machias.

This closure affects a third (two out of six) Maine Veterans Homes in the State. These closures will affect the most vulnerable of Maine's Veteran popula-

Along with The American Legion, all four

members of Congress, as well as the current and past Governors of our State have appealed to the Maine Veterans Home board to rethink this abhorrent decision and its cascading negative effects on our elderly and disabled veteran popu-

Every effort must be made to ensure continued funding, and adequate staffing of these vital facilities, especially given the lack of options for all seniors in Maine, and in Aroostook and Washington Counties in particular.

The Caribou MVH has provided assisted living/residential care, long term care, short term skilled nursing care, rehabilitation, therapy, and dementia and memory care and respite care since its opening in

The Machias MVH provided has assisted long-term and residential care and dementia and memory care since 2005. These services are vital to our veterans in these two counties.

Authorized by the Legislature in 1977, with the first home having been built in Augusta in 1983, according to its website, "MVH has a special role to promote and improve Veterans' long term health care benefits. MVH will serve as a bridge between Veterans and various organizations to create access to afford-

able and appropriate longterm care and rehabilitative services, both directly and through cooperative relationships."

In the eyes of The American Legion Department of Maine, the closing of these two homes does not meet this commitment. The time for talking has passed, it is time for the MVH Board, the Federal Government (VA), the Legislature of the State of Maine (DHHS and DVEM) to put their collective heads together and determine how these vital homes will remain open and operational.

As we say in the military "Deeds not words." Now is not the time to break faith with those who served from WWII through Post 9-11 operations. We, the veterans, stepped up to serve our country and citizens. Now it is time for the MVH Board, the State of Maine, and the VA to do the same. It is the right thing to do!

Two-Thirds of Mainers Support Ending Sale of Flavored Tobacco Products

PORTLAND, ME -January 3, 2022 -- Nearly two-thirds of Maine voters support a law that would end the sale of all flavored tobacco products in Maine. The poll, released today, finds that more than half (53%) strongly favor such a law, and three-quarters (76%) are concerned about young people becoming addicted to tobacco prod-

"This poll re-enforces what we know to be true: most Mainers understand that flavored tobacco products are being marketed to kids with the intent to get them hooked early," said Rep. Michelle Meyer, who has sponsored statewide Maine to end the sale of flavored tobacco products. "The health and safety of our children is paramount for Maine people, and it is time that a law be passed to end the sale of all flavored tobacco products in Maine."

Support for the new law had nearly universal support in the poll, across all demographics, education levels, political parties and parental status.

The most powerful argument in favor of ending the sales of flavored tobacco products centers on the priority of protecting Maine children. Three times as many voters think

legislation (LD1550) in it is more important to end the sales of flavored tobacco products to help prevent Maine youth from starting and becoming addicted to these products over a statement that it is more important to protect local small businesses and their ability to employ members of the community by selling flavored tobacco products.

Central Maine Power (CMP) Grants \$50,000 For Statewide Technology Literacy

The Covid 19 pandemic significantly highlighted the need for technology literacy across Maine. Maine Literacy Volunteer programs understood the significant inequalities that caused people with limited understanding of technology and limited access to technology devices such as computers, tablets and smart phones to struggle in a new virtual world. Many Literacy Volunteer programs had to severely limit tutors meeting face to face, which impacted learner's goals of learning to read, getting a high

school diploma, getting a working with his own driver's license, learning English for the first time, or getting a job.

To address this dilemma, Literacy Volunteers of Kennebec (also known as Literacy Volunteers of Greater Augusta) initiated a Technology Access Program which provided tutors and learners with tablets and internet connectivity, so our learners could be more informed about technology in addition to meeting their learning goals.

One of our tutors, recognized the importance of this program, learner over zoom on the tablet and encouraged our program to apply to Central Maine Power (CMP) where he is employed, to help sustain this project and take steps to address the need statewide.

CMP clearly recognized the importance of giving back to the community by meeting one of the most relevant and prevailing needs in Maine of increasing digital/technology literacy. We are very pleased to announce that CMP awarded Literacy Volunteers of Kennebec (also known as LiterAugusta) \$50,000.00 to expand technology literacy in Maine.

Prepare Now for Spring Severe Weather

(Grassroots Newswire) (March 2, 2022) -- According to the National Weather Service, March marks the start of the spring severe weather season: "...three months of danger that can imperil the unprepared."

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

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


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UMaine Advanced Structures and Composites Center Produces World's Largest 3D-printed Logistics Vessel for U.S. Department of Defense



ORONO, ME (February 25, 2022) — The University of Maine Advanced Structures and Composites Center has achieved a groundbreaking milestone in composite manufacturing with the production of two 3D-printed prototype logistics vessels for the U.S. Department of Defense.

Marine Corps Systems Command's Advanced Manufacturing Operations Cell (AMOC), in collaboration with the UMaine Composites Center, used advanced manufacturing techniques to successfully develop the expendable polymeric composite ship-to-shore vessels. The longer of the two vessels, the largest ever 3D-printed, simulates ship-to-shore movement of 20-foot containers representing equipment and supplies. The second vessel can transport a Marine rifle-squad with organic equipment and three days of supplies. The prototypes can be connected, maximizing the transport capability of a single-tow vehicle.

The ship-to-shore logistics vessels align with the 38th Commandant of Marine Corps Gen. David Berger's vision to "seek the afford-

pense of the exquisite and few when conceiving of the future amphibious portion of the fleet," due to relatively low-cost, speed and ease of production.

"Our national security and economic security depend on an innovative and robust American manufacturing base," said Barbara K. McQuiston, director of Defense Research and Engineering for Research and Technology, Office of the Secretary of Defense. "I applaud the University of Maine's Advanced Structures and Composites Center for their pioneering work in the field of additive manufacturing. The advancements made here will bolster domestic manufacturing and ultimately support our warfighters in the field."

Joining McQuiston for the unveiling Feb. 25 at the UMaine Composites Center were U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King, U.S. Department of Defense leadership and University of Maine offi-

"In 2019, UMaine unveiled the world's largest 3D-printed object — a able and plentiful at the ex- 25-foot patrol boat. Today, we celebrated the creation of 3D-printed vessels that will be more than twice as large and represent the next remarkable leap in innovation by UMaine," said Senators Susan Collins and Angus King and Representative Jared Golden. "This accomplishment is a prime example of how UMaine is leading the nation in largescale additive manufacturing technology. These new boats continue the Composite Center's contributions to our national defense and will help fuel new breakthroughs in advanced manufacturing that will create good jobs here in Maine."

Using traditional materials and methods, landing craft utility vessels can take over one year to produce. The UMaine Composites Center printed and assembled one of the two vessels in a month. The vessels were produced using the world's largest polymer 3D printer, which the center commissioned on Oct. 10, 2019, earning three Guinness World Records.

To demonstrate the printer's capabilities, the Composites Center 3D-printed a 5,000-pound boat, 3Dirigo, in 72 hours, and printed a U.S. Army communications shelter in 48 hours. The printer, with both additive and precise subtractive manufacturing capabilities, enables rapid prototyping for both defense and civilian applications.

This project demon strates the art of the possible and the potential for AM to fundamentally alter how we think about connectors and their role in mobility and distribution within a contested environment," said LtGen Edward Banta, Deputy Commandant - Installation & Logistics, U.S. Marine Corps.

"As the Marine Corps seeks to modernize logistics to better respond to current and future conflicts, advancements in additive manufacturing will ensure we remain agile, lethal and expeditionary," said William Williford, executive director of Marine Corps

Systems Command.

The latest project to create the two 3D-printed logistics vessels is a significant milestone toward demonstrating advanced manufacturing techniques to rapidly constitute critical DOD assets closer to the point of need. The previously successful prototype was 3D printed in 2020, made from 25% aluminum. The vessels manufactured by the UMaine Composites Center are multimaterial composites with engineering polymer and fiber reinforcement.

"The University of Maine is at the forefront of cutting-edge research and high-impact technologies, including advanced manufacturing, AI and 3D printing important for industries in Maine and beyond," said University of Maine System Chancellor Dannel Malloy. "These prototype vessels are the latest innovations from the Composites Center that demonstrate the future of manufacturing. This is an exciting time for Maine's Carnegie R1 research enterprise. Congratulations to the talented group of faculty, staff and students for this milestone achievement."

"The leadership, vision and innovation of the Advanced Structures and Composites Center continue to make a difference in Maine and worldwide," said UMaine President Joan Ferrini-Mundy, vice chancellor for research and innovation for the University of Maine System. "The center's research and development capacity in collaboration with partners in Maine and beyond, its problem-solving capabilities and focus on workforce development are an important part of our Carnegie R1 top-tier research institution.'

"Two years ago, we demonstrated that it was possible to 3D print a 25foot patrol vessel in three days. Since then, partnering with the DOD, we have been improving material properties, speeding up the printing process and connecting our printer with high-performance puters that can monitor the print. With these tools in place, we have now printed a prototype vessel that will be tested by the U.S. Marine Corps (USMC). The Advanced Structures and Composites Center is at the cutting edge of advanced manufacturing research and development, advancing state-of-the-art technologies like large-scale additive manufacturing and high-performance computing to develop practical, rapidly deployable and cost-effective solutions for defense and civilian applications," said Habib Dagher, executive director of the UMaine Composites Center. "We thank our partners at the DOD, USMC, U.S. Army Engineer Research and Development Center (ERDC) and our Congressional delegation for their continued support. Today's groundbreaking achievement couldn't have been possible if not for the tremendous effort of our dedicated team of 260 ASCC faculty researchers, staff and students."

"These demonstration vessels represent an initial step toward defining future forward manufacturing capabilities, and also a balance between expendable system cost, performance and ease of manufacture," said Kyle Warren, UMaine senior program manager and principal investigator on the project.

The Advanced Structures and Composites Center is a world-leading interdisciplinary center for research, education and economic development, encompassing material sciences, advanced manufacturing and engineering of composites and structures. Housed in a 100,000-square-ISO-17025-accredited facility, the center has been recognized nationally and internationally for cutting-edge research programs leading impacting new industries, including offshore wind and marine energy, civil infrastructure, biobased composites, large-scale 3D printing, soldier protection systems and innovative defense-related applications.

The Marine Corps' AMOC, established in 2019, conducts testing, experimentation and analysis to source innovative techniques and leverage advanced manufacturing technology. AMOC also provides 24/7 3D printing help desk support for the Fleet Marine Force and all equipment program offices.


