King received his bachelor's degree from UNA in **Business** Administration and was a devoted alumnus to the University. He was a recipient of the UNA Alumni of the Year award, served as chairman for the UNA President's Cabinet and UNA Foundation Board, and was an instructor for Economics in the business school. King's wife, Janice, passed away in 2020. Mrs. King was a graduate of Florence State College and received her bachelor's degree in Economics.

Enrollment Up at Heritage

FLORENCE -Enrollment is on the rise for the seventh semester at Heritage Christian University. It marks the fourth straight year in which spring enrollment is higher than the previous fall. Prior to the fall of 2018 and spring of 2019, this has never happened before in the university's 54-year history.

Another record for the university is most credit students since the spring of 2003. Out of the 136 credit students seeking a degree in biblical studies this spring, 30 are undergraduate campus or commuter students, 50 are undergraduate distance learning students, and 56 are graduate-level students. An additional 50 students are currently enrolled as audit students.

'We have seen seven semesters of growth and we are on track for another increase in the fall," said HCU President, **Kirk Brothers**. "In addition to these students, we have over 60 women signed up for our spring ladies' classes. God is doing great things at Heritage Christian University!"

LT. KATHLEEN **DIAL COILE**

(Plaque reads) Recipient of the Purple Heart and the Distinguished Flying Cross for her heroics as a



injuries to save others.

Born in Tuscaloosa, AL in 1914, Kathleen and her family moved to the Shoals area in 1920. Her father, Julian Sidney Dial, got a job as a station operator at the switch house at Wilson Dam, and her family moved to Florence. By 1940, Kathleen was working as a file clerk for the Bureau of Printing and Engraving in Washington, DC. She later married Lt. Henry Gibson Coile, Jr., USAAF in Sydney, Australia, on April 16, 1944.

During the war, Flight Nurse Lt. Kathleen Dial Coile flew 150 missions and racked up 700 hours of flight time. On June 10, 1944, she survived a crash-landing of her ambulance plane at Port Moresby, on Fisherman's Island, Papua New She sustained Guinea. serious injuries, including multiple fractures of the right shoulder, а dislocated hip, and a severe brain concussion. The only one on the flight to be injured, she still managed to secure the 18 mentally ill and stretcherbound patients to their stretchers and remained close until the evacuation planes arrived. She supervised the patients' safe removal from the wreckage before her own triage in Port Moresby. For her heroism and attention to duty, she was awarded the Purple Heart, the Air Service Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Distinguished Flying Cross. This is said to be the highest award ever given to a woman in uniform.

Kathleen Dial Coile died on January 6, 2002 in Palm Bay, Florida and is buried Greenview Memorial at . Garden in Florence, AL near her mother.

DR. AUGUSTINE UZO MOKWUNYE

(Plaque reads) As Director of the United Nations University for Institute Natural Resources in Africa, 1996-2004, Dr. Mokwunye capped a career of service to farmers and others in his native Nigeria and in many other African nations.

Augustine Uzo Mokwunye was born in Onicha-Ugbo, Nigeria, on December 24, 1941. Growing up, he helped out on his family's farm and worked odd jobs while attending school. Based on his work ethic and overall excellence academic and in extracurricular activities, he was selected as one of six students, nationally, to receive a full government scholarship to attend Edo College (High School).

In 1963, he was awarded a USAID full scholarship

to continue his education in the US. It was during this period

that met married his wife, Elaine, and started a family. In 1972, Dr. Mokwunye

Mokwunye returned to Nigeria as the Head of the Soil Science Department at the Institute of Agriculture, Ahmadu Bello Üniversity. In 1979 he and his family moved to Florence, Alabama, where he joined the International Fertilizer Development Center (IFDC). Soon thereafter, he helped establish IFDC Africa (Togo) where, as a division head and eventually Director, he blazed a trail for commercializing industry-grade fertilizers and capacity building among small-hold farmers.

1996, he was In appointed Director United of Nations University-INRA. He also served as Chairman of the Board of Directors at ICRISAT (India), a research center for the Consultative Group on International Agriculture Research (CGIAR), and as Chairman of the Committee of Board of the Chairs at CGIAO. He passed away on December 11*.* 2020.

BRIGADIER GENERAL JAMES NOLES

(Plaque reads) In a military career spanning 25 years, Brig. Gen. Noles was awarded two Silver Stars for valor in combat

in Vietnam. He later served as Chief of the U.S. delegation to the Kuwait-U.S. Defense Review Group.

James (Jim) Noles was commissioned Second Lieutenant of Armor upon graduation from Florence State University (University of North Alabama) in August, 1967. He served in a number of positions: an Armor

officer, а Foreign Are a -Officer, and culminating as Assistant Commandant of the Armor Noles

School in Ft. Knox, KY.

Jim's military career spanned three decades: from the Vietnam War (during which he was awarded two Silver Stars for valor) to Kuwait in the wake of Desert Shield/ Desert Storm. Through his military experiences, learned Iim various languages of the Middle East and, because of that knowledge, was able to negotiate with Middle Eastern sheiks on behalf of the United States military. Following retirement from the Army, Jim worked in the energy field with emphasis on the Middle East. He currently lives in Florence, Alabama, with his wife, Jackie, and continues to build upon his legacy of service to the community.

Beginning in the 1960's orbert Putnam, an Norbert accomplished bassist, played for decades with most of the big names in the world of popular music.

While Norbert Putnam made history as part of the original Muscle Shoals rhythm section, playing bass on hits by a slew of Top 40 artists. By the mid-60's, he and the other members of the Muscle Shoals rhythm section had made the move to Nashville. The bassist became part quickly of a group of younger musicians who were first called when the growing number of rock, folk, and R&B recordings were being made in Music City.

Putnam made the jump from sideman to producer and found platinum success with many artists. Over the next decade or so, Putnam brought his magic touch to records by many top artists. In the early 80's, Putnam retired from the music business. However, he has since returned with a recently published musical memoir of his life in the world of music, "Music Lessons Volume One." Norbert Putnam and his wife reside in Florence.

A bronze plaque with a picture of each inductee and a brief inscription of their accomplishments has been placed on the Walk of Honor monuments in the park. The public is invited to visit the site. More detailed information on these individuals is available in the Local History and Genealogy Department at the Florence-Lauderdale Public Library.

was admitted to the Alabama Bar the same year. She began working as a law clerk for the Circuit and District Court Judges of Colbert County in March of 2002. Angela read a multitude of motions and researched the law to assist the judges in making their decisions. While working as a law clerk, she benefited from observing Gary Alverson who was District Attorney at the time. Analyzing the methods and words he chose to prosecute cases, Hulsey filed those away in her mind for future use.

After her time as a law clerk, Hulsey began to actively seek employment as an Assistant District Attorney. She was hired by Bryce Graham in 2005 for that position in the Colbert County District Attorney's Office. Overstepping Their Authority

etiring state representative Lynn Greer of Rogersville has presented a bill that would authorize the Lauderdale County Agricultural Center Authority to distribute the county's TVA in lieu of tax proceeds as it sees fit. Granted, the bill is supposed to apply to any

of the north Alabama counties in the TVA region that have an agricultural authority. I scoured online pretty well, but I couldn't find another one in north Alabama other than Lauderdale County.

HB362 is in the House Ways and Means General Fund Committee as of this writing.

The bill would shift responsibility for distributing the money from the elected representatives in those counties to non-elected boards. The seven member body in Lauderdale was appointed by a combination of the legislative delegation and the county commission.

The Ag Center Authority is overseeing the construction for a \$45 million project that includes an Agricultural Event Center, Expo Hall, Workforce Development Center, and Lauderdale County Schools Innovation

Wouldn't we all like to leverage our commitments with taxpayer money on the front end and the back end?

Accountability is further diminished with Greer, as a retiring lame duck representative, being the one to file the bill. He doesn't have to answer to the voters this year.

North Alabama counties have been receiving the lion's share of TVA's in lieu of tax money since the late 1970's. Prior to that, those proceeds were distributed evenly across the state. Greer's name was on the bill when it went to Governor George Wallace for his signature. It's one of the hallmark moments in Greer's long and respected career in public service. However, many of us will remember former state senator, Oscar Ray Peden, doing most of the negotiating on that landmark legislation. As I recall, Peden went in with demands that 100% of the funds come back to north Alabama's TVA region - where they rightfully belong - while hoping to salvage at least 50%. Today's Teens May Be More **Money-Wise Than You Think**

Teens who completed a personal finance class in high school would rather put \$500 in the bank than buy a smartphone. You read that right.

Consider In An On The Job **Injury Settlement**

Workers compensation pays for medical bills related to an on the job injury, temporary total disability benefits, vocational disability, future medical services and permanent partial or permanent total disability.

Those are a lot of issues to consider. Often there are other issues that an employer will want to consider such as a voluntary resignation and occasionally confidentiality of the terms of the settlement. Another consideration is the inclusion of "social security

language" which can and does protect social security benefits from being reduced if the injured worker obtains social security disability also.

It seems difficult and overly complicated, and it can be. One of the difficulties that lawyers occasionally encounter are judges who have different standards for approving a settlement. Some judges just will not close future medical benefits and other judges require future medical benefits be handled by a third party administrator. All judges advise injured workers of their rights in a settlement. Some judges do it very simply by telling the injured worker that if they get better, they keep the money, but if they get worse, they don't get any more and advise them about their rights to keep their future medical benefits open for life. I've never seen a judge do a bad job, but I have seen different standards applied by different courts.

In my opinion, sometimes it's extremely advantageous to close future medical benefits simply because there is no future medical treatment related to the injury. If someone is on expensive medication or has hardware that can potentially cause problems, then absolutely leave medicals open. On the other hand, the next time somebody has a fall or a car accident, the workers compensation carrier will deny treatment and the injured worker won't get medical treatment and may not be entitled to it.

There are other ways to get settlements approved, but the important point is that the injured workers understand their rights and make the decision that is best for them.

Ukraine's Zelenskyy Shows the World What It Means to Be a Man

"The fight is here; I need ammunition, not a ride.'

These words from President Ukrainian Volodymyr Zelenskyy to Washington, in response to the Biden administration's offer to evacuate him, will resound as some of the most iconic of the 21st century.

Zelenskyy, braced for the worst in Kyiv in the hardest of times, is reminding his country and the rest of the world what fearless courage, steadfast leadership, and authentic manhood look like.

What is happening during Russia's invasion of Ukraine is tragic and heartbreaking. Yet Zelenskyy is testifying to what it means to be a man, draw a line in the sand, and fight for what is his. The response

response to Zelenskvv's televised image and words from the public outside Ukraine has been one of shock and awe, at least in some regards. And it's no wonder. America, and the rest of the world for that matter,

seem simply stunned to see a man act like one. Yes, we have seen

striking examples of male leadership in the past. British Prime

Minister Winston Churchill's urging fellow citizens to "Never surrender" to the Nazis and President Ronald Reagan's demand Soviet "Tear his that counterpart down this wall" live on in the history books as examples iconic male of leadership.

the DEL GUIDICE However, stand taken bv Zelenskyy is arguably the first time the current former podcast generation has witnessed a world

leader, who is also a male, espouse what it means to be a man, say no to the enemy,

and fight back—literally. Zelenskyy has not used rhetoric to deflect, he has not evacuated or walked away from a stressful situation, and he has not hidden behind excuses.

Instead, the Ukrainian president's stand against Russian President Vladimir Putin and his vast army is a testament to authentic manhood and leadership. Men fight for what is theirs, they don't take the easy way out, and they are prepared to give their lives—if that is what the fight demands.

Most of the world apparently didn't see this coming from Zelenskyy, 44, a former comedian, actor, and businessman elected in 2019 to lead Ukraine.

Society has forgotten hat authentic male what authentic male leadership looks like because there has been a severe lack of it. The overwhelming response of shock and then profound respect for Zelenskyy respect for Zelenskyy testifies to the reality that much of the modern world just hasn't understood authentic male leadership.

Perhaps this is due in part to the epidemic of rhetoric on "toxic masculinity," the notion that cultural masculine standards are harmful to men, women, and society overall. These undoubtedly lies have negatively affected men's

understanding of manhood and their desire to simply walk in that manhood.

Masculinity is not toxic. Any person, man or woman, who abuses their power and influence can be toxic. But men, inherently, are not toxic, and authentic

masculinity certainly not.

Men were created psychologically and biologically to stand in the gap, to confront danger, to fight, to persevere in the most trying of circumstances, and to give their lives if the mission demands it. Their physical structure is stronger

than that of women. It's biology. Perhaps the authentic male l e a d e r s h i p displayed daily by

Zelenskyy is best described by a paragraph in Steven Pressfield's novel "Gates of Fire," which is about the battle of Thermopylae and how a small number of Spartans and allies stood against the hordes of the Persian Empire:

A king does not abide within his tent while his men bleed and die upon the field. A king does not dine while his men go hungry, nor sleep when they stand at watch upon the wall. A king does not command his men's loyalty through fear nor purchase it with gold; he earn's their love by the sweat of his own back and the pains he endures for their sake. That which comprises the harshest burden, a king lifts first and sets down last. A king does not require service of those he leads but provides it to them. He serves them, not they him.

Volodymyr Zelenskyy is one of the first men in modern times to display such selfless leadership and resolve.

May he not be the last.

Dear Savvy Senior, Because of back pain and knee arthritis I'm interested in getting a power lift recliner for my living room that's easy for me to get into and out of. Does Medicare cover them? Can't Get Up

Dear Can't,

Yes, Medicare does indeed provide some coverage for lift chairs, provided your doctor prescribes it for a medical reason, but they won't cover the entire cost of the chair. Medicare will only pay for the motorized lifting mechanism, which is considered durable medical equipment (DME), and is covered under Part B. The other parts of the chair the frame, cushioning, and upholstery – are not covered. Here are a few more details you should know.

What Is a Lift Chair?

First, for those who aren't familiar with them, lift chairs, which look like traditional recliners, have motorized lift mechanisms built in that aid with standing up and sitting down for people with limited mobility. With the push of a button, a lift chair hoists a person from sitting to a position where they can comfortably stand up. It also works in reverse to help a person gently take a sitting position.

Medicare Coverage Requirements

If you're a Medicare beneficiary, to find out if you qualify for coverage, you'll need to get a prescription and a "Certificate of Medical Necessity" from your doctor that indicates your need for a lift chair. The conditions you'll need to meet include:

• That you have severe arthritis of the hip or knee, or a severe neuromuscular disease.

• That you can't stand up on your own from a regular chair.

chair. • Once standing, you can walk independently or with the aid of a walker or cane.

• That you do not reside within a skilled nursing facility, hospice or nursing home facility.

You'll also need to purchase your lift chair from an equipment supplier that's enrolled in Medicare. To find and compare Medicare approved suppliers in your area go to //Medicare.gov/ medical-equipment-suppliers, type in your Zip code and "Seat Lift Mechanisms" in the equipment box.

If you do qualify, Medicare will pay 80 percent of the approved cost of the chair's motorized lifting mechanism, after you've met your Part B annual deductible. You, or your Medigap supplemental policy (if you have one), will pay the remaining 20 percent of the lift mechanism. You will also pay 100 percent of the remaining cost of the chair. You should also be aware that if you do buy your lift chair from a Medicare supplier, you will likely pay for the total cost of the chair upfront and can then seek reimbursement from Medicare. Lift chairs can run anywhere from \$400 to \$2,000 or more depending on the fabric, options and upgrades. The reimbursement is usually between \$250 and \$300 depending on the state

vou live in.

Advantage Coverage If you happen to get your Medicare benefits through a private Medicare Advantage plan, they too provide lift chair coverage, but they may impose different rules and will likely require you to see an innetwork supplier. You'll need to contact your plan directly for details.

Other Helpful Options If you find that Medicare won't cover your lift chair or if you're looking for something less expensive, there are assistive products you can add to your current furniture like the Stander EZ Stand-N-Go (Stander.com, \$140), which has adjustable support handles that can be used on any sofa or recliner to help with sitting down and standing up.

Another way to make your furniture more accessible is by increasing its height with "furniture risers." These typically range from 2 to 5 inches in height and are inserted under the legs of your furniture.

Dear Athletic Support: Recently, we had a parent approach a coach after a basketball game to discuss some issues he had. This happened right down on the court. It did not get out of hand, but it seemed inappropriate. What advice would you have for parents who have issues with a coach, and the proper time to discuss it?

— Take A Chill Pill

Dear Pill: The twentyfour-hour rule works well here.

A parent should give it at least that long before contacting a coach. The idea is that cooler heads will prevail after that amount of time. Back when I was coaching football, I always urged parents to wait until Monday before contacting me after a Friday night game.

Notice that I said "contact." I didn't say barge into my office and demand answers, or even cold

call me out of the blue Monday morning. Treat your coach like the professional he is. You wouldn't walk into

a doctor's office and demand an appointment as soon as you showed up. The same holds true for coaches. A text or

A text or email should be sent prior to any verbal communication. This gives your coach a chance to schedule a meeting. Coaches are crazy busy. If they had to stop what they were doing every time a parent wanted to talk playing time — they'd never get anything done.

Óne last thing: I always urge parents to let their kids have a chance to talk to the coach before they do. If the issue involves a player, I'd wait until he/she has had a chance to resolve it before stepping in.

Dear Athletic Support: You hear more and more about college baseball players having to get Tommy John surgery, which is basically caused from overusing of the arm. With kids starting to play year-round now at earlier ages, this isn't really any surprise. I hate to be a cynic, but it seems like some coaches just figure if one arm goes down, they'll find another one.

hey'll find another one. Somewhere along the line, don't kids need to have some rest built in? It's hard when coaches want kids playing all the time.

— Give Them A Break

Dear Break: It's usually a combination of coaches and parents that want the kids playing all the time. From what little I know of travel-league baseball, it scares the heck out of me. There are tournaments every weekend for almost the whole year. It doesn't have to be

like that. And it's not just the coaches who are pushing for so many games.

For whatever reason, travel-league parents are extremely diehard. I don't know if they think that's what it takes for their kids to get scholarships and eventually make it to the MLB, or if they just don't enjoy slow weekends.

Medicare Minute "Mail, Calls and Door Knocking"

WARNING!! If you are turning 65 over the next few months you will be inundated with mail, phone calls and sometimes people actually knocking on your door. These are just three of the ways companies market Medicare health and drug plans. Over the next couple of weeks, we will look at different marketing methods and what the companies are trying to accomplish with each.

Phone calls – Supplement companies are well known for making out bound calls to people turning 65. Once they have you on the line, they're only objective is to sell you a Medicare plan. It's perfectly ok to sign up over the phone but, if you have a problem with the plan you enrolled in, your agent may be in Florida or California and unwilling to help you. Also, if you ever fill out a request for information online, that request is immediately sent out to several agents and the phone calls will double.

Door knocking – I've never understood why anyone would buy something as important as their Medicare health plan from someone who showed up unannounced at their door. People who market door to door are usually out of town agents. They will buy the same list that direct mail companies buy and literally find your house and knock on your door. It is not a good idea to buy this way for a couple of reasons. First, are you willing to trust someone who shows up at your door with your personal information, such as Social Security number and checking account information. Secondly, it can be dangerous!! Any law enforcement person would advise you to never allow someone you don't know into your house.

The solution to this is to find a local agent that can help you. They will make sure you get the right plan and you'll be able to find them if you need them.

Dear Savvy Senior.

Can you recommend any resources that offer help to family caregivers? I've been taking care of my 86-year-old mother and could use some help.

Burned-Out Brenda

Dear Brenda,

Caring for an aging parent or other loved one over a period of time can be very challenging both physically and mentally. Fortunately, there are a number of tips and services you can turn to that can help lighten the load. Here are several to consider.

Assemble a care team: A good first step is to put together a network of people including family, friends and even neighbors that you can call on to help out when you can't be there or need a break.

Tap local services: Many communities offer a range of free or subsidized services that help seniors and caregivers by providing things like home delivered meals, transportation, senior companion services and more. Call 211 to find out what's available in your community, or call AARP's caregiving resource center (877-333-5885), which provides referrals to local resources.

Use respite: Respite services can provide short-term care to your mom so you can take some time off. To locate services in your area, try the ARCH National Respite Network and Resource Center at *ARCHrespite.org*.

Hire in-home help: You may want to consider hiring a parttime home-care aide that can help with things like preparing meals, housekeeping or personal care. Costs can run anywhere from \$12 to \$30 an hour depending on where you live and the qualification of the aide. To find help through an agency, use Medicare's search tool *//Medicare.gov/care-compare*. Or to find someone on your own, which is a more affordable way to go, try websites like *Care.com* or *CareLinx.com*.

Use financial tools: If you're handling your mom's finances, you can make things easier by arranging direct deposit for her income sources and set up automatic payments for her utilities and other routine bills. Also, consider setting up your mom's online banking service at her bank so you can pay her other bills and monitor her account anytime. If you want or need help, there are professional daily money managers (see *AADMM.com* to locate someone) that can do it for you. They charge between \$60 and \$150 per hour.

Also, if your mom is lower-income use *BenefitsCheckup.org*, a free, confidential website that will help you locate financial assistance programs that can help pay for her medications, utilities, health care, and other needs.

Get insurance help: If you have questions about what Medicare or Medicaid covers, or about long-term care, your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) provides free counseling on all these issues. Call 877-839-2675 or visit *ShiptaCenter.org* to locate a nearby counselor.

You can also get help at Medicare.gov or by calling 800-633-4227, and through the Medicare Rights Center, which staffs a helpline at 800-333-4114.

Tap other resources: There are a number of other organizations you can draw on for additional information like the Family Care Alliance (//Caregiver.org/family-care-navigator), which provides a state-by-state listing of caregiving programs and services; Caring.com, which offers caregiving advice, senior housing information and online support groups; the Alzheimer's Association (//ALZ.org/care), which provides information unique to the challenges of dementia caregivers; and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (www.caregiver.va.gov), which offers caregiver support services to veterans and even spouses of veterans.

And, if you happen to be sharing care responsibilities with others, sites like *LotsaHelpingHands.com* and *CaringBridge.org* can help you coordinate together.

Take care of yourself: Make your own health a priority. Being a caregiver is a big job that can cause emotional and physical stress and lead to illness and depression. The only way you can provide the care your mother needs is to make sure you stay healthy.
