### Have a seat? Canida says no chairs available for public at REB meeting

After a Russellville resident asked Russellville Electric Board Manager Charles Canida if the REB has a program in place to allow elderly or fixed income customers to make partial payments in order not to have their power disconnected, Canida told her he'd 'get you something back on that.

Florence Randolph appeared on the agenda of the REB's March 21<sup>st</sup> meetina.

"Is there a way to put something in place where the elderly, or folks on fixed income, can not get their lights cut off because they couldn't pay it all, but pay some of it?," Randolph asked. "Or people who have small children. Is there anything like that in place?"

Canida's response to Randolph's inquiry indicated he did not know whether such a hardship policy exists with the Russellville Electric Board.

"I can get back with you and we'll see," Canida said.

Randolph said there are a lot of people struggling to pay high electric bills and she's concerned about children getting sick or having to go to the hospital. Once again, Canida's response was brief.

"I can get you something back on that." Canida said.


Randolph was one of nine citizens and/or media members present at the meeting. There were no chairs provided for the public, and that didn't sit well with Randolph, a 71-yearold disabled grandmother.



## Books fit for royalty: plenty of options to appease your royal itch

Bridgerton on Netflix has enthralled viewers with the glamorous opulence of the bon ton during the Regency era.

The Regency, officially the period from 1811 to 1820, occurred when George, Prince of Wales, governed Great Britan and Ireland as Regent during the illness of his father, King George III. While vast social inequalities and political turmoil existed, many works of fiction focus on the social aspects of the period and the antics of the social elite.

For your youngest readers, there are several fun books that are inspired by Jane Austen. Lit for Little Hands: Pride and Prejudice adapted by Brooke Jordan and illustrated by David Miles is a fantastic choice for early introduction to a classic work. The illustrations are colorful, and the story stays true to the original version. The interactive elements will engage motor skills as well.

Lit for Little Hands has many additional classics in the series. Pride and Prejudice: A BabyLit Counting Primer Jennifer Adams and illustrated by Allison Oliver is another fun take on the story of Lizzie and Darcy. Readers will count their way to ten as they stroll through one English village and meet two wealthy gentlemen. Be sure to check these out if you want to share one of your favorite works with a young audience.

For slightly older readers, Little People, Big Dreams: Jane Austen by Maria Isabel Sanchez Vergara and illustrated by Katie Wilson is a biography that highlights her literary achievement is portraying young women making their own choices.

Additional titles in this series highlight important feminine figures and their impactful achievements. Another fun series, Wicked History, looks at America's relationship with King George III. King George III: America's Enemy simplifies the events around the American Revolution and provides a look at King George before his incapacitating illness. There are additional titles in this series that examine notorious figures throughout history.

Young Adult readers will enjoy Julie Klassen's The Tutor's Daughter. The hero of the story, Emma Smallwood, accompanies her father to his new position in Cornwall, England where he will become the tutor of four brothers. When they arrive, things become **SEE 'BOOKS,' page 6**



"Don't you have any chairs in here?," Randolph asked Canida moments before the meeting began.

"No ma'am we do not," Canida replied.

According to at least two sources, there are hundreds of folding chairs at the Electric Board Warehouse, the location of the meeting and the location of the REB's chili/stew cookout where seating is provided for more than 200 guests.

Randolph informed Canida she is disabled and that federal law requires seating accommodations for disabled residents and reasonable accommodations for the public must be made in order to avoid a hostile environment for government meetings.

Canida told Randolph she should have mentioned her disability when she called and got on the agenda.

Canida told board members there have been numerous calls the past month from citizens concerned about higher utility bills. He said Russellville Utilities Office Manager Amy Rickard told the callers it was their gas bill that increased.

"Most everyone that called she was able to point out to them it was their gas. Their electric went up relatively small amounts and their gas was actually what went up and increased," Canida said. "And most all of which apologized for calling because they did not realize that. And we're glad they called so we could set that straight because some just didn't know."

Board member Bill Jackson brought up the issue of board compensation and said he had heard another utility board went up on board members' monthly payments to \$600/month.

He asked Canida to look into compensation for the city's other utility boards. "It's been brought to my attention one board raised its compensation to \$600/month," Jackson said. "If they have, I think we should do the same thing."

The next meeting of the REB is set for April 19, 2022, at 6 p.m., at the Electric Board Warehouse.

Rhonda Gore has qualified to run for the Democratic nomination for United States House of Representatives, Fourth Congressional District of Alabama. Gore will face Franklin County resident Rick Neighbors in the May 24, 2022 Democratic Primary, with the winner challenging Rep. Robert Aderholt, the Republican nominee, in November.

Gore has taught in DeKalb and Marshall Counties and worked at Johnson's Hosiery in Fort Payne. Gore believes she has built a solid relationship with the residents of District

Four. Gore graduated from Ider High School and Northeast Alabama Community College. She earned a Bachelor's Degree in Social Science from Jacksonville State University, where she was a member of a leadership fraternity, Omicron Delta Kappa.

Gore is certified to teach English as a member of Sigma Tau Delta, an English honor society.

Gore earned her Master's Degree in Political Science from the University of Alabama, graduating with honors.

She has served in various positions within the Alabama Education Association and on the Alabama Democratic Executive Committee.

"I will work to improve our infrastructure, ensure safe and clean communities and to broaden high speed Internet to rural Alabama," Gore said.

She also plans to bring back town hall meetings to make sure people are well informed of what's going on in Washington, D.C.

'The time has come that District Four needs a full-time Representative, not just when it's election time," Gore said. "Aderholt lives in Arlington, Virginia, and after 26 years, he has lost touch with the common people and their needs.

"I'm here and I've heard what the people want-someone to listen to them and they want a voice in Washington. I'm that person!," she added.

Gore has one son, Tyler Dennis, a graduate of Plainview High School who now lives in West Hollywood, California.



Phil Campbell (9-5, 1-0) had just one extra-base hit (a double by Hunter Baker) but took advantage of 14 walks issued by East Lawrence pitchers. Three of those walks came in the top of the first, helping the Bobcats grab an early 3-0 lead. Habada and Cole Pace each had an RBI single in the inning, and Baker was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to force home another run.

Habada worked around a hit batter and a single in the bottom of the first, striking out three. He then came through with his second RBI single of the day in the top of the second and later scored on a steal of home to push the lead to 5-0.

The Eagles took advantage of an error and a sac fly to get on the board in the bottom of the second and then cut the lead to one in the bottom of the third. Habada hit the first two batters of the inning, and then a bunt single loaded the bases. A wild pitch and two errors allowed East Lawrence to score three runs and make it a 5-4 game.

With the tying run on second, Habada struck out three consecutive batters to end the inning and keep Phil Campbell in front. That started a dominant finishing stretch during which the senior lefty retired the last 12 men he faced. Habada (5-1) retired the Eagles in order in the fourth, fifth and sixth before turning things over to reliever Eli Taylor in the seventh.

With their lead down to a single run, the Bobcats scored four times in the top of the fifth to regain control. Baker led off the inning with a double to center, and Jacob Barnwell singled to right. Anthony, the team's junior catcher, followed with an RBI single, and Mason Swinney walked to load the bases. Two runs scored when Habada reached on an error, and Swinney came home on a wild pitch to make it 9-4.

Phil Campbell added two more runs in the top of the sixth, getting an RBI single from Sage Raper and a bases-loaded walk by Habada. The Bobcats tacked on two more runs in the seventh to finish off the scoring.

Habada allowed four runs (one earned) on two hits in six innings, striking out 10 and walking one. He threw 67 of his 104 pitches for strikes and now has 58 strikeouts on the season in 27.2 innings. Habada improved to 8-1 in his varsity career with 82 K's in 46.2 innings.

Anthony went 4-for-4 with four runs scored and also walked twice, reaching base all six times he came to the plate. He's now batting .324 (12-for-37) on the year with a .583 OBP, thanks to a team-high 21 walks.

#### Phil Campbell 11 East Lawrence 1

Mason Swinney came within one out of throwing his second career no-hitter for Phil Campbell on Saturday, finishing with 11 strikeouts in a one-hitter as the Bobcats wrapped up an area sweep of East Lawrence with an 11-1 win.

Making just his third appearance on the mound this season, Swinney (3-0) dominated the visiting Eagles from the start. The senior right-hander, who has signed with the University of Alabama as a shortstop, buzzed through the first four innings on Saturday, retiring all 12 batters he faced and striking out eight of them. He was especially impressive in the top of the second, striking out the side on just 11 pitches.

Trailing 9-0, East Lawrence got its first base runner of the day on an error by the Bobcats (10-5, 2-0) to open the top of the fifth. Swinney walked the next batter on four pitches, and a sac bunt followed by a wild pitch got the Eagles on the board.

Swinney, who struck out 14 batters in a no-hitter against Vina as a freshman in 2019, closed out the fifth inning on Saturday with a groundout and a strikeout to keep the no-hit bid intact. He then got a strikeout and a fly-out to start the sixth before Dawson Terry, the No. 2 hitter in the Eagle lineup, lined the first pitch he saw to center for a single.
