3 Mural Celebrates Ulle





n April 16, 2021, downtown Fayetteville got a little bit brighter. A mural, painted at the corner of Market and Main Street, was finally finished and dedicated to Fayetteville. "Greetings from Fayetteville" was created to celebrate the rich history of Fayetteville as a town, while giving a picture of what the present looks like.

Above the "Greetings from Fayetteville" mural is another mural, the 14th mural in the campaign by the University of Tennessee to paint a UT mural in all 92 of Tennessee's counties. Chanse and Catherine Bartlett, who both graduated from UT, were nominated by Lincoln County Mayor Bill Newman for a mural that reads 'Everywhere you look, UT.' Below it, the Bartletts commissioned a mural of their own from the same artist: Troy Freeman of Free Sky Studios.

"I've always loved murals. We love to travel, so we see them all over the US – and I've always loved the postcard-type retro murals," Catherine Bartlett said. "The university paid for Troy to do the Everywhere UT. Their campaign was like, 'We'll bring the paint, you provide the canvas,' but they allowed us to cultivate a relationship beyond just that so we paid Troy to stay beyond."

Before they started the mural, the Bartletts spent time asking people – friends, family, visitors, and strangers – what they thought of when they thought of Lincoln County. The final result highlights 13 major pieces of Lincoln County, from the courthouse (painted prominently at the top) to the Slawburger (depicted in the last E.) Some of the locations are old and no longer exist, like the Stone Bridge, and others

are over a hundred years old and still going strong.

"I like how it all ties together," Bartlett said. "It matches, to me, with our Fayetteville motto: where tradition meets tomorrow. So it's highlighting historic things while bringing in what a snapshot of today looks like."

The mural is not only a piece of art, however. It also functions as an educational tool for visitors to the area. The Bartletts worked with Vince Beyer and fynyty.com to create a website, paintthefaytown. com, that gives information about each location chosen for the mural and why it is important to the community. Bartlett said that they want to grow as downtown Fayetteville grows, while still maintaining its traditional beauty and charm.

"It's our gift to downtown Fayetteville," Bartlett said. "Downtown Fayetteville and Lincoln County give us so much, so it was us giving back."



SOLAR POWER IN LINCOLN COUNTY





The Elora Solar Project powers Huntsville while boosting Fayetteville's economy. Here's how.

incoln County is soon to welcome the completion of a new solar farm by NextEra Energy Resources - the largest solar farm to date in Tennessee," said the planning and zoning director for Lincoln County, Nancy Harris. The Elora Solar Project will use approximately 500,000 solar panels over 1,500 acres, making it a 150-MW project that will provide power through the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) to Facebook's data center in Huntsville, Alabama. "The enormity of the project required the county to secure Croy Engineering to provide civil inspections and site monitoring throughout construction," said Harris.

The project was first announced in 2018 and is finally nearing completion. While providing several benefits to the Lincoln County community, TVA's agreement with Elora Solar LLC will last 20 years.

"Over the life of the project, Elora will provide the local community with millions of dollars in new tax revenue. Construction of the project began in October 2020 and, at its peak, created nearly 250 construction jobs providing indirect benefits to the surrounding area," said spokesperson of NextEra Energy Resources, Matt Eissey.

"Multiple factors came together to make this solar field possible. The property chosen was perfect for the job, being close to TVA transmission lines and having a basically level topography," said Harris.

"In this case, Elora made sense, thanks to good availability of solar energy, landowners who partnered with us, and a customer like TVA who is investing in clean energy projects such as this one," said Eissey.

TVA provides electricity to nearly 10 million people across seven states. It is expected that investing in renewable energy will attract high-paying jobs as well as introduce more competitive rates for energy.

Leadership Lincoln began in 1987. The program has produced leaders who are actively involved in community organizations, local government and civic groups, all working toward improving the quality of life for our county. - The participant must live or work in Lincoln County. Leadership Lincoln will provide you with meaningful personal interaction and a learning experience for yourself and Lincoln County.



DRIVER'S LICENSE

Tests for Driver's License and/or permits are given at the Driver's License Station, 4110 Thornton Taylor Pkwy. every Monday - Friday from 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m., all testing is finished by 3:30 p.m. You must furnish the car for taking the test.* You can obtain a manual to study before you take the test by going by the Driver's License Station. Applicants must show proof of U.S. citizenship; proof of any name change; two proofs of TN residency with name - NO P.O. BOXES; proof of social security number.

PET LAWS

The ordinance regarding pet laws within City Limits of Fayetteville states that dogs must be confined or controlled by a leash and all pets should be given rabies shots and must wear tags indicating they have had these shots. If, for any reason, an animal needs to be picked up off of the street, one can call the Animal Control Office number, (931) 433-3726. Rabies clinics are sponsored by the Health Department during the spring of each year and are announced in the newspaper and on the local radio stations. Rabies shots are given by any of the veterinarians in the City throughout the year.

VOTING LAWS

Newcomers to the City and County may register to vote after living in the state of Tennessee as soon as they become residents. Tennessee is the only state that has no durational requirement for becoming a resident. The Election Commissioner's Office is located at 208 E Davidson Drive. Anyone who is 18 years of age or who will be 18 on the day of the next election, can register to vote. The books for voter registration are closed 30 days before an election. The hours of the Election Commission Office are 8 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Any registered voter can vote early.

Property taxes are due on the first day of October of each year, and are delinquent as of the first day of March. There is a 1.5% interest rate per month and a penalty charged to any delinquent taxes. City taxes are payable at the City Clerk's Office in the Municipal Building in downtown Fayetteville. County property taxes are payable in the Trustee's Office, Room 103, at the County Courthouse.

If you have moved to this area from outside of the state, you need to apply for a title and a Tennessee license plate. You should make the purchase as soon as possible. These licenses may be obtained from the County Court Clerk's Office, Room 102, in the Lincoln County Courthouse. The office is open Monday – Friday 8 a.m. – 4 p.m., and open the last Saturday of the month from 9:00 a.m.–Noon. You must also purchase a wheel tax sticker, which is \$110 per year. Registration and proof of insurance must be in the glove box of the vehicle at all times.

incoln County has a rich agricultural heritage. With 40 Century Farms in the county, the oldest established in 1818, agriculture has been a way of life for generations of families. The Lincoln County Fair is a celebration that honors agricultural producers - past, present, and future. Throughout the seven-day event, there are livestock shows, horse races, carnival rides, pageantry, and much more. At the last fair, there were even dinosaur races!

The Darrell Hale Agriculture Building and Creative Living Building features exhibits by local 4H and FFA students, farmers, and gardeners who have worked hard all year to grow, sew and create works that showcase their talent and skills. Competitors vie for blue ribbons and other awards in a wide array of categories from creative writing, cartooning and computer technology to field crops, sewing, and canning.

At the Farmer for a Day display, children ages 8 and under can learn what it's like to be a farmer, and where some of their food comes from. Children can collect eggs, milk "Daisy" the cow and gather produce, sell

their crops and spend the proceeds on a well-deserved snack.

The Lincoln County Fair is the only harness race track in Tennessee and it is sanctioned by the United States Trotting Association, the governing body of harness racing. People travel great distances for the chance to see these graceful horses run the half-mile track. This form of horse racing dates back to 1889. In a harness race, a Standardbred horse harnessed to a two-wheeled cart, called a sulky, carries a driver (not to be mistaken for a jockey). Together,

they travel at speeds averaging 25–30 miles per hour. The beauty of these horses in full stride is a sight to behold, one that will have you coming back to the fair year after year.

The grandstand events begin on Saturday night, Sept. 17, with a concert by a major touring music act and close on the following Saturday, Sept. 24 with the loud roars and bangs of the Demolition Derby. The midway provides hours of fun for the whole family. Try your luck at the game booths or take a ride on one of the carnival attractions that are just your speed. A rainbow of sweet treats such as cotton candy and caramel apples are sure to satisfy your sweet tooth. For something more substantial, there are plenty of opportunities to feast at the fair.

There is something for everyone to enjoy at the Lincoln County Fair. Whether it is watching the rodeo; demolition derby; tractor pulls; monster truck show; livestock shows; pageants; big-name stars on the entertainment stage, or holding the winning ticket for one of the big giveaways, it's always exciting and fun. There is also a shuttle service available for people who are in a wheelchair, small children, handicapped individuals, and seniors.

Through the years and the changes, one thing remains true, the Lincoln County Fair is community. It's a place to meet new friends and rekindle old acquaintances. It also serves as a homecoming for many families. 

Buckley Farm

Growing a farm, growing a family

ess than two miles from the Fayetteville square, a 50-acre farm provides local products to the Lincoln County community. Eli and Jessica Buckley, owners of Buckley Farm, are native to Fayetteville and after a few years away, chose the city as the place to grow both their family and their business.

The Buckley's wanted their children to appreciate where food comes from and how it is grown; so despite neither of them having a past in farming, they decided to start a farming family.

"I wanted to farm, not the conventional way," Eli said. "We just started slow. We started... just with a few chickens."

While they started off just farming for their family, the Buckleys quickly discovered there was a need in Lincoln County for locally raised meats as well as handcrafted products. In 2019 they made farming their full time job, starting a farm store out of their home that was open every Thursday. The store did well enough that in the fall of 2021 they opened a new store – The Market at Buckley Farm.

Instead of just one day a week, The Market is open Tuesday through Saturday. It offers a variety of products from pasture-raised meats to handmade goat milk soaps to prepared dinners made in their commercial kitchen, as well as local artisan's goods like honey and pottery. The farm has grown from a few chickens

to about 200 laying hens, as well as hogs and cattle.

The farm is not just a commercial endeavor. The Buckley's have raised all four children on the farm. The children are involved in the farm's day-to-day functions, and learn how to do the work alongside their parents as much as they are able.

"I think it's a lifestyle of just being around Eli and following along and just naturally learning how to do those things with us," Jessica said. "I'm so thankful that we get to do it as a family. I'm thankful that my children get to experience this way of growing up."

The Buckley Farm practices regenerative farming and focuses on traditional livestock breeds. Those concerns, along with the size of the operation, set the farm apart from others in the area.

"There's a lot of different ways to farm, you know. It's not just big fields and row crops, it's not just big cattle farms – you can do it very small scale," Eli said. "It's not what you see on Pinterest either."

The Buckley's said they are completely honored to be raising their family and running their business in Fayetteville, a place which is so kind and so supportive of small family-owned businesses.

Sheriff Murray Blackwelder

More than just a sheriff

P or the past 16 years Lincoln County has had one man diligently working to keep the county safe. Murray Blackwelder, sheriff of Lincoln County, was recently named Elected Official of the Year – and it seems well-deserved.

Having lived in Lincoln County since he was 6, Blackwelder knows the community well. He grew up working in body shops and running businesses, and he decided to make his home here where he knew the community and they knew him. He said that he appreciates the consistency of the citizens of Lincoln County as well as their care for each other.

"People take care of people – so your neighbors know each other," Blackwelder said. "I don't want to live where I don't know the people down the road."

Before becoming sheriff, Blackwelder spent time working in law enforcement – he has been a reserve officer, a member of the mounted posse, and a judicial magistrate. He said that he didn't decide to be sheriff so much as it was a calling he couldn't get away from.

"I had been a deputy sheriff before, and I had gotten out and never... got completely away from law enforcement regardless of what I did," Blackwelder said. "Running for sheriff got on my mind at about 2:00 one morning and wouldn't go away."

He was elected in September of 2006, after his second bid for the position, and he's been overseeing the sheriff's office ever since – as well as being a part of the Tennessee Sheriff's Association. Blackwelder is a former president of the association, and he is still an active member.

One person who has known Blackwelder for years is Bill Stovall, who ran the body shop that Blackwelder worked at as a teenager. When Stovall first heard that Blackwelder was planning to run for sheriff, he wasn't supportive because of Blackwelder's previous record of never sticking with a job – but after seeing the impact he's made and the drive he has to do the job well, he changed his mind.

"He finally found what he really wanted to do," Stovall said. "That's a blessing in life, if you ever find what you really want to do and you get to do it."

According to Stovall, Blackwelder is transparent about what he is doing, and he's professional even with the hard cases. Whether he runs again or not, Lincoln County has been impacted for the better by the more than a decade of work Blackwelder has put in, and Blackwelder is grateful to the community for their support.

"It's been an honor to... be the sheriff," Blackwelder said, "And it's really an honor to be the Elected Official of the Year."

Junior's House

Helping Lincoln County One Child at a Time

In 2003, Junior's House, Inc. began with one staff position in a building rented from Lincoln County. Their mission was to create a safe space for abused children to begin the healing process. It was an amazing success. Now the organization has eight staff positions, uses three buildings, and operates across four Tennessee counties: Lincoln, Marshall, Moore, and Bedford. "Much of this growth is because of the constant support of the Lincoln County community," said Executive Director of Junior's House Crystal Guess.

"We've grown continuously," Guess said, "And this community is a big reason why – because Lincoln County always steps up, and the schools, and the government, and just the community members too."

Junior's House offers many services, including a body safety program in Lincoln County schools where staff go to schools and help guidance counselors

teach kids about body safety. They also offer therapy, counseling, and advocacy services free to the community, as well as forensic interviews in partnership with law enforcement. "All told, the organization serves over a thousand children in schools and across the county every year," said Guess.

Guess said that when COVID first hit, and all of the regular fundraisers were shut down, Lincoln County community members stepped up to make sure Junior's House could still run.

"We had people calling us making sure that we were okay, that we had what we needed," Guess said. "We had donors step up and say, 'you know, we know that a lot of your fundraisers have been cancelled this year, and... we want to make an extra donation to you guys this year'."

Most of the fundraisers for Junior's House take place in Lincoln County. Guess

said that people in the community had the fundraisers through the mail even without the events. They are always willing to help out the kids that Junior's House serves in any way they can – whether that be by donations or by bringing snacks and drinks when needed.

"This community just has a real heart for us and really takes care of us every time we've ever needed anything," said Guess.

Fayetteville and Lincoln County have had an excellent relationship with the staff and volunteers at Junior's house for many years, and Junior's House continues to give back to the community that supports it.

"It's an honor to get to work with these kids," Guess said, "But it's especially good to work... in a community that understands how important that is."

Experience Tennessee boosts local tourism

The SCTTA branch has helped Lincoln County for more than 20 years.

E xperience Tennessee, the forward-facing branch of the South Central Tennessee Tourism Association (SCTTA), has had a long and fruitful relationship with Lincoln County, bringing visitors to Fayetteville and the surrounding area.

SCTTA was founded in 1973 and is one of nine officially recognized regional tourism organizations. Experience Tennessee is a branch of that organization aiming to market Tennessee to visitors across the region, state, and neighboring states.

"We're able to promote each other regionally where we don't have boundaries of county lines," Executive Director of the Lincoln County Chamber of Commerce Carolyn Denton said. "We want people to come and enjoy all of our area."

The Chamber of Commerce has been working with Experience Tennessee for more than 20 years and has participated in multiple projects that feature Lincoln County, including the websites ExperienceFayettevilleTN.com, BecomeATennesseean.com, and DowntownTennessee.com. The websites help visitors find and enjoy destinations across Tennessee, like downtown Fayetteville.

Over the past two years there has been a major uptick in outdoor activities across Tennessee, Executive Director of SCTTA Ryan French said. A lot of that traffic is new to such outdoor activities. French said that the Elk River is an amazing natural asset to Lincoln County, and the hope of the Blueway project is to increase the usage of the river as well as enhancing the experience.


"They don't have a lot of experience on the river," Denton said. "It's a lot more to it than putting a canoe on the water and taking off."

Because of that need, safety tips and tools are heavily involved in the Blueway project, which also involves building a brand around the Elk River and putting up better signage along its banks. Experience Tennessee and the Lincoln County Chamber of Commerce won't stop with the Elk River. One of the current projects is the creation of a photo library as well as video promotion of tourist destinations in the county. Those, as well as other programs, are expected to have a good impact on Lincoln County.

"The beautiful part of our responsibilities is the constant development and support of programming that will help move the needle for the communities that we serve," French said. "Lincoln County has a diverse market with several opportunities to develop. One of the things I am most excited about is our organization's efforts with Agritourism. In 2022 and 2023 we are launching a program called "Farm to Tennessee" that will showcase family farms, creameries, lodging, and farming destinations."

The tourism and hospitality industry is the second largest industry in Tennessee, according to French, and while COVID-19 had an impact on the industry as a whole, it continues to grow in rural communities.

"We have amazing partnerships in Fayetteville and Lincoln County," French said. "The Blueway and Wells Hill Park projects are perfect examples of a community pivoting with the current travel data and supporting the movement to the outdoors and developing safe recreational opportunities."

For over two centuries, Tennessee has been recognized as "The Volunteer State," and for a good reason. Tennesseans have a long history of rising to the occasion. Whether it was the overwhelming response to a call for military service during the War of 1812 or lending a helping hand in the aftermath of a tornado, they are known for showing up in a time of need. Volunteering is a way of life passed down through the generations.

One of the earliest known gatherings of "Tennessee volunteers" took place at Camp Blount, two miles south of downtown Fayetteville. In 1813-1814, Camp Blount served as the location of a military training encampment. It was also a rallying point

Who were those early volunteers who answered the call? The First Volunteer, a beautiful bronze statue handcrafted by sculptor Wayne Hyde, features exquisite details that give us a few clues. With a bedroll slung over his shoulder, a canteen, and a rifle modeled after David Crockett's rifle, he was ready to serve. The volunteers were brothers, sons, and fathers attempting to carve out a way of life for themselves and their families. They were men of resolve and determination who were ready to take action, even if it meant risking their lives. Dr. Farris Beasley, the co-chair of the Camp Blount Historic Site Association (CBHSA), comments, "According to the state, there Jackson; Sam Houston; David Crockett; and Gov. William Hall. The War of 1812 Trail and the Creek War Trail offer additional insight into the timeline of events that would later write history. Plans are also in the works for a park-to-park pedestrian trail which includes a bridge spanning the Elk River, connecting the Camp Blount Historic Site with Stone Bridge Park. Two log cabins, one of which is the historic Greer cabin, are presently undergoing renovations and will soon be relocated to the site. Joseph Greer served at the Battle of Kings Mountain in 1780. After delivering the news of the American victory to the Continental Congress in Philadelphia, he became known as the "Kings Mountain Messenger."





for soldiers like Sam Houston and David Crockett. Camp Blount is where General Andrew Jackson mustered troops for the Battle of Horseshoe Bend in March 1814 that ended the Creek Indian War. Once again, Jackson gathered troops for the march to New Orleans in December 1814 to participate in winning the Battle of New Orleans on January 8, 1815. Camp Blount originally encompassed approximately 200 acres. Situated adjacent to the Elk River, the site was ideal for a large gathering with access to water and plenty of room for encampments, including hundreds of horses.

is no other statue in the state of Tennessee dedicated to the Tennessee Volunteer."

Today, Camp Blount Historic Site encompasses 40 acres of the original site and is Tennessee's 8th historic site. The First Volunteer statue, which can be seen from a distance, draws visitors into the Volunteer Plaza. Flags waving from nearby flagpoles, a replica War of 1812-era artillery piece, and a nearby pavilion offer up a standing invitation to take a walk through history. From there, several trails wind through the historic grounds. The Volunteer Trail highlights key historical figures including, Gov. Willie Blount; Andrew

Understanding Lincoln County's place in the story of America sheds new light on our development as a nation and the significant role of Camp Blount. History informs us how and why things change. The First Volunteer is a tribute to all volunteers - past, present, and future. It also stands as a reminder that building a strong community requires working together. Although Lincoln County may look different than it did in the 1800's when those first volunteers came together, one thing remains true. All change begins with one person, one volunteer.

FAYETTEVILLE ART CENTER GETTING STARTED AGAIN

ayetteville holds a hidden treasure that so far has gone largely unrecognized. The Fayetteville-Lincoln County Arts Center has been impacting the community since 1963 with the conception of the Fayetteville and Lincoln County Art League. In recent years the center has been perceived more as a museum than a community center, according to President of the Arts Center Jen King-Pierce. That is no longer the case.

"Our vision and goal is that it'd be a community center, and we're making traction

with that now," Pierce said. "We really are doing the very best we can to build up the art center; offer more to the community."

The mission, as stated on the Arts Center's website, is to enhance the quality of life for the Fayetteville-Lincoln County community through the presentation, education, and promotion of all art disciplines including visual, conceptual, and performing arts. Pierce believes such promotion is important – especially during these times – because creativity is a mental health benefit for people of all ages.

"It's just important for development and self-expression," Pierce said. "Especially children – you know if you give it to them in their younger years, they might... just completely have a passion and find a piece of them that they just didn't know they had."

Among other things in pursuit of that goal, the Arts Center is offering monthly classes in 2022 over several mediums of art. The first four classes are already up on their website: calligraphy, jewelry making, cigar box guitars, and ceramics. Pierce has also been working with the Resurgence



Behavioral Health Rehab Center to begin offering monthly workshops to their residents.

With all the good the Arts Center is doing at the hands of the active committee of member volunteers, it still needs volunteers and help with funds. The Arts Center needs significant repair work. The committee is looking for people who can either help with the repairs or donate so they can afford the repairs. They hope to eventually reach ADA compliance, which means safer sidewalks and the installation of handicap lifts that will allow all people access to the classroom downstairs and the gallery upstairs.

"We don't have any funding sources that involve the local government, like the city or the county," Pierce said. "I've applied every year since I've been in this position for funds, but given the pandemic they weren't accepting any new folks for their distributions. So we don't have support that way - we rely solely on the membership fees, which are not very much, and sponsorships, and donations, and fundraisers."

Since her election in 2019, Pierce has made huge changes to the center, including addressing outdated bylaws and designing a new logo, and the Arts Center is preparing to do even more.

"We've got huge wishlists, huge dreams, huge goals," Pierce said. "We're just getting started."

Facilities: Tennis Courts, Gun Range, Skate Park

The tennis courts are available to the public 24 hours a day. You are asked, if using the courts at night, to make sure you turn off the lights when leaving the courts. The gun range has three different shooting areas: two are for pistols only, one roughly 30 yards and the other roughly 50 yards. The rifle targets are roughly 100 yards. Shotguns cannot be shot at our targets, and you must bring and set up your own targets. Keys can be purchased at the Recreation Center, during business hours, to go to the range.

Kid's Park

Located next to the Kiwanis Baseball Field, Kid's Park is an enclosed space that offers many different types of outdoor equipment for children to enjoy. This park became available due to numerous contributions from the community, along with a state recreation grant. This park has pavilions and benches throughout the perimeter of the park to help parents keep a good view of their children.

Kiwanis Park

The Kiwanis Park is nestled in the sub-divisions of Fayetteville, right behind Ralph Askins Elementary School. This area provides easier access for children to play after school, and has a wide area away from any major roads. The park offers wide spaces and event pavilions, with access to public restrooms.

Kiwanis Recreation Field

There are two baseball fields at this facility. One is a Little League field and below it is the Pee Wee field. Around and below the field is an asphalt, lighted, walking track that circles them and kids park. There are restrooms located at the facility as well as a batting cage and skateboard park.

Municipal Swimming Pool

The pool opens in May and is open Monday through Saturday 1 p.m. until 5 p.m. Admission is \$5 per person, while kids ages three and under get in free. Multi-visit punch cards can be purchased at the pool for a cost of \$40 that will last for 10 visits. Pool parties can be booked by calling the pool at (931) 433-1612.

S.J. King Park



TN Promise & tnAchieves

Clearing obstacles and leading the way to a brighter future

N Promise provides every graduating high school senior I in the state the opportunity to attend a local community or technical college tuition-free with mentor support. Students apply during their senior year, attend two mandatory meetings and complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to remain eligible for the scholarship. According to Melanie Hanson with educationdata.org, Tennessee students accepted more than \$454 million in student aid in the last year. Only seven states— California, Texas, New York, Florida, Georgia, Virginia, and New Jersey- get more student aid than Tennessee.

TN Promise is one initiative of former Gov. Haslam's Drive to 55 Alliance — a mission to get 55 percent of Tennesseans equipped with a college degree or certificate by the year 2025. As reported by the state of Tennessee in The Tennessee Higher Education Commission's report, while college attendance dropped in 2020 as expected due to the pandemic, 84.4% of students filed the FAFSA in the 2020-2021 school year as compared to 75.1% overall for Tennessee. Twenty eight percent of Lincoln County adults ages 25-64 have at least an associate's degree. Data from the first year of the program indicates that TN Promise students are graduating at a rate almost three times their peers at the same institutions.

Program administrators believe eliminating the financial barrier, coupled with support from a mentor, is the reason students are graduating at significantly higher rates.

Most of the TN Promise applicants will be the first in their family to go to college. Understanding that many obstacles can exist for first-generation college students, each applicant is assigned a volunteer mentor. Volunteer mentors provide the guidance and encouragement students often need to be successful. tnAchieves mentors support students as they navigate the college-going process and provide the nudges many need, to earn a college credential.

tnAchieves Director of Data Management Matthew Otero reported on a Zoom call that Lincoln County was just around 50 volunteers short of every student having a local mentor. The time commitment is small, only about one hour per month, but the impact is significant. New volunteers are needed every year. The organization provides a one-hour training session, a handbook, and weekly communication to ensure the mentor is fully equipped to serve his/her students.





The Tennessee College of Applied Technology (TCAT) Shelbyville is one of 27 technical colleges located across the state of Tennessee. The TCAT Shelbyville Lincoln Central Academy extension campus is one of four off-campus locations available to residents of Lincoln County and surrounding areas.

The TCAT Shelbyville Lincoln Central Academy extension campus is located on the north end of Lincoln Central Academy on South Main Avenue. This building is a well-known location throughout the county as it was once a high school, a junior high school, and in later years, a ninth grade academy. TCAT Shelbyville moved into the location in January 2020 after offering classes at the Don Sundquist Center for Advanced Technologies, Motlow State Community College Fayetteville campus.





Most Motlow State Community College has a longstanding reputation for offering quality education at a great value. A comprehensive audit conducted by the Tennessee Comptroller of the Treasury resulted in zero findings. While this is not unheard of, it is extremely rare.

"To achieve a zero-findings State Audit is a testimonial to the degree that the business/finance unit strives for to be accountable for student tuition dollars, grants, fundraising, and State appropriations," said Hilda Tunstill, executive vice president for Finance and Administration at Motlow.

College is an important decision, and the cost of obtaining an education should not be a barrier to learning skills that can improve quality of life and career opportunities. Motlow helps ease that barrier with multiple tuition-free opportunities through dual enrollment, Tennessee Promise, and Tennessee Reconnect. The College develops public/private partnerships and philanthropic grants to fund makerspaces to fuel and

inspire the deep learning required for highwage, high-demand technology careers.

"I am extremely proud of the business/ finance unit and realize that all our campuses helped achieve this zero-findings audit," added Tunstill.

Student success and workforce development are central to Motlow's mission. The needs of citizens in the community are the college's priority. Motlow prepares students for employment, career advancement, entrepreneurship, or to be prepared to transfer to a university, all while mitigating tuition debt.

Motlow offers certification and training for non-degree seekers. Students can earn credentials and education in less than two years. There are several more ways the college saves students money, including open education resources, where students do not need to purchase textbooks. Nontraditional students can earn credit for prior learning st a fraction of the price of taking a course.

The Financial and Compliance Audit Report reviewed financial statements for two recent years. It involved performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including assessing the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether because of fraud or error. The areas reviewed in the audit included business office functions, financial aid, foundation office, and information technology.

"We are being very intentional about crafting our reputation for embedding emerging technologies into every aspect of learning," said Dr. Michael Torrence, Motlow president. "Student success is the rudder that pilots Motlow's mission. Every vision, plan, and investment we make pivots on our ability to advance student success. Emerging technologies are a market reality in industry. That means all Motlow students must demonstrate technical acumen."

The College opened in the fall of 1969 with 551 students. In the fall of 2019, Motlow set a new enrollment record with over 7,000 students,

Motlow is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges.
