



Fishing, picnics, kayaking, and camping

A trip to the beautiful Duck River is a trip worth taking, and Mark Thomas is working to make it safer.

S PANNING 284 miles long, with 87 miles landing in Bedford County, the famous Duck River is where visitors and locals alike enjoy fishing, family picnics, and kayaking, among many other activities. According to Executive Director of Tennessee Duck River Development Agency Doug Murphy, the river is a freshwater system that contains 153 species of fish and 54 species of mussels, making it the most biologically diverse river in North America.

He said, "It's worth a trip just to see the beauty of Duck River and enjoy the wildlife." As a young child, Fire Chief Mark Thomas said he remembers fishing at the river in the 70s and said, "It's always been a very attractive river."

Thomas said he would often go to the river to fish, enjoy the peace of the river, and see its creatures. Along with its peaceful and calm surroundings, the river is a safe environment for families to enjoy. Thomas reports that Duck River is a class one river, which means there aren't a lot of rapids, and for the most part the water is calm, but it is important to note that after a flood, the river changes. They have set a limit to 500 Cubic feet per second (CFMs). Once it gets above 500, they consider it too dangerous for beginners to kayak on the river. Under 500 CFMs are deemed to be normal flows. Thomas said visitors should be aware of low-head dams that lead kayakers to dangerous territory. Thomas reports they are working with legislation to fund a signage and trash pick-up program. They would also like to develop an app that notifies visitors when water flow hits more dangerous levels. Visitors need to have proper water equipment and let loved ones know where they are when visiting the river.

Thomas said that cell phones are the best means of communication for river tourists. The next plan is to mark the bridge and create signage to notify visitors about how long it will take them to get from one point of the river to another.

The SBCF and Bedford County Public Safety partnered with Art teachers Megan Straub and Angie Jackson to create the artwork for the River Life Project: A specialty license plate honoring the Duck River. The funds raised from the sale of the specialty license plate will help fund the river rescue program. **-GN**




Whiskey, Horses, and History: Nathan "Nearest" Green

Visit the renowned Uncle Nearest Distillery.

R OOTED IN African American History, Uncle Nearest Distillery is more than a place for tourists to try new drinks; it is a historical monument and reminder of an incredible moment when a skilled man left a lasting legacy for generations to come.

Nathan "Nearest" Green was born into slavery around 1820 in Maryland. After moving to Lynchburg, Tennessee, he became a recognized distiller of fine whiskey, on the Dan Call farm.

A young neighbor boy, Jasper "Jack" Daniel, who worked for Call, showed such an intense interest in Green's whiskey-making process that he became a student and friend of the distiller. When Jack Daniel initially opened his distillery, he made Green, now a free man, his first master distiller. Nearest would later become the first known African American master distiller.

Moved by Uncle Nearest's story, author, historian, and entrepreneur Fawn Weaver founded Shelbyville's renowned Nearest Green Distillery in 2019. The distillery is located on a historic 323-acre Tennessee Walking Horse farm.

Guests can book a tour where they can expect a heart-warming countryside experience and sample Uncle Nearest Premium Whiskey. The distillery has become the most prominent African American-owned spirit brand in American history.

Uncle Nearest Distillery tour guide Sylvia Pinson said, "Tourism has always been my middle name, considering my professional career in recreation and parks for 40-something years." Pinson also serves on the Shelbyville Tourism and Advisory Board. She said she loves what she does and prides herself on being a community connector.

Nearest Green Distillery tours are available Thursday through Sunday. Each tour lasts approximately one and a half hours.

The tour begins in the welcome center, proceeding to the concession stand where guests learn about Tennessee-originated tasty treats such as cotton candy, Moon Pies, Little Debbie snack cakes, Goo Goo Clusters, and Mountain Dew.

The tour continues to the speakeasy for a brief history of Tennessee's role in women's rights, concluding with a poignant video of the story of Nearest Green.

Other points of interest consist of tasting enriching whiskey flavors at the horse-shoe-shaped bar, known as the Family

Tasting Room. At the closure of the tour, guests are encouraged to shop in the retail area and view the historical walls located in the welcome center.

Visitors will not want to miss Tennessee's finest barbecue at the Barrel House BBQ II restaurant. The menu features chicken, pork, ribs, and the famous "grilled cheese on crack" sandwich, with all the fixings. Open seating and stalls are available for dining in the restaurant.

INETEEN HIGH school seniors from Bedford County Youth Leadership visited the state Capitol on their annual State Government Day trip on Wednesday, March 16, 2022. The purpose of the trip was to expose the youth, participating in youth leadership, to what it's like to work for the state government.

Each month the students travel to a different area within the county to learn about various careers. They have special days each month like "Public Safety Day," "Medical Social Services Day," "Education Finance and Real Estate Day," and "Industry Day," among many other activities.

be a leader. "I feel like my experience at the Capitol has further prepared me to become a leader by allowing me to see that not everything is a one-person job; everyone needs help and a team to provide support and give more of an impact to a community."

Arnold said the most exciting part of the experience was learning about the history of the Capitol building and the history of the state leaders, and artists who helped create Tenneessee's heritage. State leadership positively impacted the students' lives, but the students also made an impact on some of the city's most outstanding leadership.

Impressed by the students' engagement and interactive questions during Local Government Tourism and History Day, Bedford County Mayor Chad Graham invited several students to talk on the monthly "Local Government Talk Show" radio program.

Garrette said the students' ability to ask questions and engage with leadership was telling. "I thought that was telling and illustrative how these youth have stepped up to think, engage, question, and explore, through this program."

Garrette said that the Leadership Bedford class is different from other leadership programs because it combines youth and adult classes, which provides both groups with the ability to learn and grow from one another.

Garrette encourages community members to continue to support the Bedford youth by supporting the chamber of commerce and allowing their employees to serve on the Leadership Bedford board. "The chamber and the chamber board support go hand-in-hand in developing our young and adult leaders." -GN

Only two spots remained. Her knees were weakening. She drove her heel into the stage floor for stability.


"Tennessee's Fairest of the Fair's first runner-up is Jayden Jackson!" the emcee announced.

"Competing in pageants has definitely helped me in many different ways. It has given me a sense of confidence as a young woman, that I don't think I could have experienced without it. It has helped me so much with communication skills, getting to speak with different judges and young girls who have similar, but different, interests. You get to learn so much about yourself as a person, what drives you and makes you want to be successful in all you do," Jackson said.

The pageant created a connection that resulted in her being invited to Fashion Week in New York this year.

Jackson said, "It was such an amazing opportunity. I got to meet so many great people, but one of the best parts of going to Fashion Week was seeing such diversity. All of the fashion and the models there were super cool."

She will crown the 2022 Fairest of the Fair Queen in July. Although she will retire her crown at that time, her work with the pageant and her connection to its people will continue.

Although her Nannie has passed away, Jackson feels her ongoing encouragement and presence.

Jackson began showing when she was 5 years old and won her first world championship at the age of 6. She's

won 14 world championships and two world grand championships and will be showing three of her horses in this year's Tennessee National Walking Horse Celebration.

Jackson and her five-year-old brother, Wylder, show together in the lead line class. Their time together at the barn and in the ring is more than a shared passion for horses. It's Wylder's therapy. Jayden has seen Wylder, who has autism, benefit from his involvement with the horses.

"It's very calming. You learn to appreciate the small things. He's my best friend," she said. She's committed to looking out for Wylder and others with his diagnosis. As an ambassador for Autism Speaks for two years, Jayden and the group's mission is "enhancing lives today and accelerating a spectrum of solutions for tomorrow."

Jayden will be a sophomore at MTSU in the fall, having just finished her freshman year majoring in biochemistry. She plans to apply for the physician's associate program upon graduation.

"I'm just an ordinary girl who's decided to take extraordinary opportunities," she said.



HILE WE envision lives filled with companionship and cuddles, the reality of homeless dogs and cats is much more problematic than we imagine. Significant progress has been made locally, due to the Middle Tennessee Spay & Neuter Clinic (MTSNC) and its staff. As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, they are committed to lowering the number of dogs and cats euthanized by offering affordable sterilizations to all Middle Tennessee residents.

Locally, outside (community and/or feral) cats make up the largest population of animals at shelters and create overpopulation and public health issues. MTSNC's services have successfully aided in lowering the numbers of both dogs and cats in shelters and their overbreeding as strays. Regardless of pet parents' financial situations, low-cost veterinary services are available to all clients. Those on low income are eligible for assistance.

February is National Spay Awareness Month, and the last Tuesday in February is World Spay Day when MTSNC provides free feline fixes for community cats through grant funding from The Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee.

In October, for Feral Cat Day, MTSNC fixes feral cats for free in its Trap and Release (TNR) program. Underserved, due to the need to trap them for spaying, feral cats are often left to continue reproducing. Because of this, MTSNC offers traps and instructions on using them. For a small deposit, traps may be obtained from MTSNC. Rescuers then trap the feral cats and oversee their recovery after neutering. Then the cats are released, and the cages are returned for a full refund of the deposit.

Kimberly Warren, MTSNC's executive director, said the sameday clinic has performed over 32,000 sterilizations since its

founding in January 2010, with one-third of the animals' owners receiving grant assistance. These procedures leave only a small incision, resulting in reduced recovery time. MTSNC's veterinarians, Dr. Alex Simon and Dr. April Pinelli, are specially trained in high-volume, high-quality spay and neuter procedures, enabling MTSNC to perform an average of 25+ surgeries a day, three days a week.

While in the clinic for these procedures, dogs and cats receive their vaccinations and are examined for other issues that may have been otherwise undiscovered; for example, untreated abscesses that can lead to more serious issues, including death. MTSNC can provide these services through a grant from Tito's Handmade Vodka. They also treat the animals' parasites, such as fleas, ticks, and intestinal worms. Heartworms, a terrible and preventable disease, are expensive to treat and seriously damage an infected animal's heart. Clinic clients can get a heartworm test for their dog, and if negative, will receive a prescription for necessary preventatives. Cats may also get feline leukemia/aids tested, and if negative, will receive a leukemia vaccination.



DOTTIE IN BELL BUCKLE

ROM HER DESK ON THE FRONT ROW,

Dottie willed her foot to stop tapping as she watched the clock on the office wall, longing for the last bell. The days crawled – even the halls yawned. She closed her doodle-covered notebook filled with her wonderings and slid it toward her bookbag. She could write what she couldn't say aloud. It eased her mind, if only for a while.

Mama glanced at her watch as she put the last load of clothes into the dryer. Almost 3:00; it came so fast, and she wasn't ready. Dottie used to have so much to tell her about her day; the house was alive with chatter. She said so little now, and Mama wanted Dottie to enjoy this time. It was passing so quickly.

The back door slammed as Dottie followed the hall to her room, barely looking at Mama. Had she slowed down, she'd have seen Mama's longing for the light to come back to Dottie's eyes and the pep back to her step. But Mama couldn't bring back her old friends or stop the rumors of a new high school. Dottie had lost her appetite and collapsed onto her bed for the rest of the day. It was a temporary escape; morning always came so soon.

"Dottie, wake up! Wake up!" her mother screamed, pulling Dottie to her feet and pushing her toward the door. "The school's on fire! It could spread!"

The sky blazed so brightly that Dottie had to look away. Of all the things she should worry about, she had only one thought: she didn't remember making it home with her notebook. Her worries had gone up in smoke.





A FIRE, A FIGHT, AND A FUTURE

Northeast Bedford County school blaze put change on the fast track.



PRIL 12, 1972, THE BELL BUCKLE SKY was indeed ablaze. The school that housed grades 1–12 was fully engulfed and a total loss.

Bell Buckle students finished the school year at Wartrace School. In the fall, the schools merged into a single student body in the Wartrace building until final plans could be approved.

The impact of the Bell Buckle School loss was two-fold. Due to the declining rural population and the quickly deteriorating condition of the county's schools, the rebuilding needed to address consolidating area schools. In particular, it was being considered that Bell Buckle, Wartrace, and Normandy unite, but the communities were hardly united.

From spring 1972 until early 1975, the issue was highly debated. Both Bell Buckle and Wartrace communities wanted to retain their own schools. School board members were fighting for more than a new school, as residents clung to local traditions. The resolution would not be an immediate one.

While the construction of a new school moved slowly through the systems, students and faculty joined together in the Wartrace School under a new name, Cascade School. Cascade Springs supplied water to Normandy, Wartrace, and Bell Buckle. It was something that connected the communities. A similar mindset determined the school's colors and mascot.

After four years of debate and conflict over rebuilding the county's rural school system structure, a unified program was realized. In 1976, students moved into the new Cascade School building located at the corner of Fairfield Pike and the Bell Buckle-Wartrace Road. Former rivals are now family at the crossroads.

46 years later, the school's website reads, "From 1972 until present day, Cascade has striven to provide a learning environment that enriches, challenges, and nourishes students. Because of the students, teachers/staff, and community, Cascade is a special place to be."




Whether it's relaxation or adventure you're seeking, you don't have to look far to find it. Middle Tennessee's waterways will refresh and restore you.

A hike will inform you of archaeological landmarks and artifacts while amazing you with the vistas and viewpoints. The crackle and pop from the firepit will punctuate the laughter and conversation of friends and family. The options in our area are endless. You can plan for a weekend or a week and never run out of things to do and see.

Plan to explore our waters and their surrounding areas. Take advantage of the amenities offered by our state parks, including hiking trails, camping, fishing, floating, swimming, golfing, bird-watching, and a year-round schedule of activities and events. Make exploration of your home state a summer tradition.



PADDLING ON THE DUCK RIVER



Puck River float will carry you away.

According to nature.org, the Duck River is one of the state's most scenic waterways and North America's most biologically diverse freshwater river. It is located entirely within the state of Tennessee and originates in the Barrens on the Highland Rim, flowing through seven Middle Tennessee counties. Its long deep pools and shallow stretches of mini-rapids wind 269 miles through Middle Tennessee.

Rentals are available in many locations and offer drop-off and pick-up services. Fill a cooler with snacks and drinks and launch your kayak or canoe at one of the many access points along the Duck River. Wood ducks, mallards, kingfishers, and songbirds serenade you. Expect to see deer, mink, and the shells of the once-endangered mussels. Look overboard for bass, channel catfish, and darters. Watch out for logs, limbs, gravel bars, and tricky drops that sometimes appear out of nowhere.

End your float with dinner at a nearby restaurant or cook over a campfire near the river. An overnight stay under the canopy of starlight is just what you need.


The **Elk River** trout are calling.

Located below Tims Ford Dam, the Elk River is popular for panfish and trout fishing. The tailwaters below the dam are about 50 feet wide with gravel bars and intermittent deep pools. For approximately 15 miles, brook, brown, and rainbow trout await you whether you wade, fish from a boat, or fish from the bank.

Wade into the river's pools as the morning's mist still hangs sleepily over it. A turtle splashes as it jumps clumsily from the fallen log. Squirrels chatter among the branches. Cicadas are waking. The day is already heating up, but you're not worried about checking the time. You have all the time in the world.

Take your catch back to your cabin at Rivers Edge and prepare a dinner of fresh trout and grilled veggies. Top off the evening in an Adirondack chair by the fire pit. Life is good.


Trap and Skeet Shooting


What questions do you have about cannabidiol (CBD) and hemp? The retreat provides the perfect opportunity to have them answered and to experience first-hand the products offered by Ron and Malinda Tuggle.

There are often misconceptions about CBD and hemp. Many people's first thoughts are of marijuana, getting high, and legal troubles. While the two plants share a common ancestor, hemp allows you to access the health benefits of the cannabis plant without the psychoactive elements. Hemp is a common name for a variety of the plant Cannabis sativa. The 2018 Farm Bill established the official definition of hemp, compared to marijuana. The bill limits the amount of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) content in hemp to no more than 0.3% as opposed to marijuana which is 30%, a thousand times more THC. They both are varieties of cannabis and are more like cousins than siblings, according to whatishemp.com.

The Tuggles explained, "Around 1930, men began to genetically modify and increase the THC content of the cannabis plant, creating what we know as marijuana. In today's hemp farming, using the whole plant, known as full-spectrum use, the plant in its original format does not alter your capacity for anything. It just has







the healing properties to naturally relieve the things that are bothering you."

We've answered the hemp question. Now, what is CBD? CBD is a naturally occurring compound found in the resinous flower of cannabis. It's one of more than a hundred phytocannabinoids that give the plant its therapeutic properties. Consuming a phytocannabinoid-rich product can help the body produce more medicinal effects and trigger therapeutic responses.

So, CBD and hemp are legal, safe, and non-impactful on mental processes. They

The cheese sticks are massive and filled with melty cheese, served with a hearty marinara sauce. The chicken wings come



N MAY of each year, the town of Shelbyville starts filling up with King Ranch trucks with massive horse trailers in tow. License plates are caked and covered in dust, as many of these vehicles have journeyed across the country to get here. Walking horse enthusiasts, owners, riders, and trainers alike, are all headed to the Spring Fun Show held at the Calsonic Arena located on the Celebration Showgrounds. The Spring Fun Show marks the first of three horse shows exclusively managed by the Celebration itself. Each August the official Celebration Show, as many people are aware, is the biggest of the three horse shows and is held over a span of 10 days. A lot is on the line at that show, as competitors contend for World Grand Championship titles. The Spring Fun Show in May,

on the other hand, is exactly what it sounds like! It is a more lighthearted competition where many world class equestrians and their horses compete without all the pressure of attaining a crown. Let's just think of it like a practice round!

On April 8, 2022 the Celebration delivered an official press release sharing their selected panel of judges. Unlike years past, this year's Spring Fun Show will have three judges instead of one. The Walking Horse National Celebration (TWHNC) has selected Leah Boyd, Derek Bonner, and Jamie Bradshaw to judge the 52nd Annual Spring Fun Show. Warren Wells, CEO of TWHNC shared, "We are excited to have this panel judge our show. We receive a lot of feedback from our exhibitors about the lack of variety in the judging panels across the industry, so the Celebration feels it is vital to do what we can to help grow the list of experienced judges while also providing the most competent panels for our exhibitors to show before."




