Great Falls Forum with David Chittim and Steve Collins





Lewiston Teen to Benefit From Fontaine's Virtual Auction

LEWISTON, ME (April 11, 2022) -- Fontaine Family - The Real Estate Leader will be hosting their 8th Annual Bid For Wishes Virtual Auction on their Facebook business page May 16-23, 2022. Along with Make-A-Wish Maine, this year's auction will also benefit Johnathan Morin, a sophomore at Lewiston High School. Johnathan first started experiencing pain in his leg in the summer months of 2021. When he collapsed in pain at school in early November, family members knew something wasn't right and brought him


to the emergency room. After multiple

ing a concerning MRI on November 11th, Johnathan was referred to Boston Children's Hospital. At a follow up appointment on December 1st, Johnathan and his family got the news that he was officially diagnosed with Ewing's Sarcoma in both his pelvis and lungs, and is inoperable due to its location. The treatment plan includes 14 cycles of chemotherapy, with radiation beginning halfway through receiving treatment at The Barbara Bush Children's Hospital. Johnathan has a long road ahead of him, but he is prepared to fight cancer with all his might. Anyone who has had the pleasure of knowing him can attest that he has a mental strength far beyond his 15 years. Given the nickname "Rocket" by former hockey teammates and coaches, we are now using #teamrocket and asking the community to rally

around Johnathan and his family as he undergoes the fight for his life. Johnathan's wish is to go to Hawaii for a vacation with his family after his journey is complete and he's feeling better.

Since 2009, starting with Walk for Wishes, each year the entire Fontaine Family Team participates in their largest fundraising event benefiting Make-A-Wish Maine and has been able to raise enough money to grant the wishes of 9 seriously ill Maine children to date. In 2013, Fontaine expanded their efforts by creating Bid for Wishes, which is their online virtual auction event collecting donated items from local business owners to be auctioned off. Their 2021 online auction event was the biggest yet, auctioning off nearly 300 items and raising over \$20,000. Half went to a Lewiston High School student, Emersyn Rowles, for her dream trip and the other half to a Make-A-Wish child in Durham. The team goal is to grant two wishes again this year.

nature and outdoor skill activities across the state. Teens to Trails Executive Director, Alicia Heyburn comments, "Sharing time outdoors provides essential nourishment, inspiration, and wholeness in the lives of our youth who are the future stewards of our land. We are thrilled to offer Outdoor Explorer programs for middle school students in partnership with recreation departments across Maine."

Healthy Androscoggin looks forward to creating a Story Book Trail at the Park Avenue Elementary School in Auburn with the Health Options' funding. "The trail will encourage physical activity for students and community members while reading their favorite stories through the school garden and orchard," says Emily Smith, Health Promotion Coordinator.

Tree Street Youth, Inc., also in the Androscoggin area, looks forward to building more programs outdoors for children and teens. Julia Sleeper, Co-Founder and Executive

Director remarks, "These funds will go towards supporting our youth to get outside and create opportunities for them to explore, learn, and foster healthy lifestyles beginning at an early age."

Similarly, in West-"Funding brook, enable the Intercultural Community Center to offer no-cost, structured opportunities for physical activity to immigrant, low-income, and historically families", marginalized says Christopher Feely, youth program director for the center. "Youth and adult students will be able to engage in a wide array of fun and healthy activities, such as swimming, basketball, gymnastics, hiking and aerobic exercise."

A Maine non-profit focused on veterans'

wellbeing will also benefit from a Health Options' grant. At Operations Reboot Outdoors, the organization's president, Nicole White, states, "We believe in the healing powers of the outdoors as a critical weapon in the battle against the Veteran Suicide Epidemic. The Community Health Options Grant will help fund our Fly-Fishing and Fly-tying seminars, allowing us to bridge the gap between military and civilian life for an additional 80 Veterans, Service Members, and Law Enforcement Officers each year."

Health Options will hold another grant cycle in the Fall supporting small community-based programs that encourage physical activity as a way to improve overall health and wellbeing.

Expanded Nursing Begins at Maine's Community Colleges

AUGUSTA, \mathbf{ME} (May 3, 2022) - Maine's community colleges are adding new night and weekend nursing programs, expanding the number of seats available, and ultimately doubling the number of nursing graduates, thanks to \$2.5 million in new state funding that is being matched by the state's two largest healthcare providers.

The new state allocation was included in the supplemental budget signed by Governor Janet Mills on April 20.

"Some of our nursing programs have hundreds of applicants that are turned away because classes are full. At the same time, demand for nurses is at a crisis level. This expansion is key to increasing the number of skilled nurses in Maine," said David Daigler, president of the Maine Community College System (MCCS). "We are so grateful for the state's investment in nursing, and to our longtime, valued partners, MaineHealth and Northern Light Health."

The \$2.5 million, matched by the healthcare providers, allows Maines' community colleges to double the number of nursing program graduates from approximately 240 people per year to 480 per

Northern Light Health and MaineHealth are matching the state's \$2.5 million.

"Northern Light Health welcomes partnering with the Maine community college nursing programs along with MaineHealth to increase the number of nursing graduates," Northern Light Health President and CEO Tim Dentry said. "While Maine has made progress increasing nursing education capacity, we continue to be challenged by a munity College: Adding

shortage of nurses who are needed to meet patient care needs throughout Maine. This immediate action will show results; the most exciting thing is this will open doors to the great profession of nursing to so many people."

MaineHealth Chief Executive Officer Andy Mueller, M.D., agreed the effort would help.

"These funds to expand the nursing programs in the Maine Community College System are a significant investment in addressing the nursing shortage in our state. Training the next generation of nurses and providing the educational support to help them succeed in this important career path is a win-win for everyone," Mueller said.

Among the highlights of the planned nursing expansion:

Central Maine Com-

40 new nursing students annually, by using the existing lab space on nights and weekends. Hiring eight new nursing faculty, simulation tech and simulation coordinator positions.

Eastern Maine Community College: Adding 12 new students at WCCC, up to 12 new students at Pen Bay Medical Center in Rockport, and another 24 new students in expanded summer start and evening programs. Hiring two fulltime faculty, two adjunct faculty, and simulation lab staff. Purchasing equipment.

Kennebec Community College: Adding eight new students in fall 2022, and an additional eight students in fall 2023, for a total of 56 seats. Hiring additional faculty and a clinical coordinator.

Maine Northern Community College: Adding eight new students in 2022-2023, and an additional eight students in students to enter the new 2023-2024, for a total of WCCC program. The new 48 seats. Hiring additional nursing program anticipatnursing faculty members, ed launch date is 2023 at simulation operations the Calais location.

specialist, and purchasing additional equipment for the simulation laboratory. Adding support for students to increase retention.

Southern Maine Community College: Adding 42 new students in a new evening nursing program at the South Portland campus and hiring six new nursing instructors. Doubling nursing capacity at the Midcoast Campus in Brunswick, with a new nursing cohort starting every year instead of every other year.

Washington County Community College: Building a new WCCC nursing program while partnering with EMCC to provide an opportunity for a cohort of 12 students starting next academic year. Hiring at least two new nursing instructors, and immediately adding a new health occupational certificate program to prepare future nursing

York County Community College: Launching new nursing program with 32 seats in fall 2022. Hiring four full-time fac-

The nursing programs at Maine's community colleges are top-ranked, with EMCC recently ranked as #2 in the Northeast for two-year nursing programs NursingProcess.org. Our colleges consistently post among the highest pass rates on the NCLEX, the national licensing exam. The seven colleges also offer many other healthcare programs, training medical assistants, physical therapy assistants, community mental health workers, child care and gerontology specialists, front-office staff, and more.

DHHS Launches New Resources for Child Abuse Prevention

AUGUSTA, ME (April 26, 2022) — The Maine Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) announced today the launch of an online resource for Maine families and the pilot of a new tool for mandated reporters to submit concerns about child safety during Child Abuse Prevention Month in April.

In proclaiming April as Child Abuse Prevention Month in Maine as part of a national awareness campaign, Governor Janet Mills urged Maine people to dedicate themselves to improving the quality of life for all children and families by working together to increase awareness of abuse and neglect and promote activities that support children's social and emotional wellbeing.

"Maine people share the goal of ensuring that children grow up in a safe and stable environment that provides them with every opportunity to succeed," said Governor Janet Mills. "My Administration is working with partners throughout the state to address the underlying issues that often contribute to child abuse and neglect and to support child protective caseworkers on the front lines in our communities. Prevention is the best way to protect children and strengthen families and succeeds when Maine people work together."

"There is no higher priority for the Department and for the people of Maine than keeping children safe," said Health and Human Services Commissioner Jeanne Lambrew and Office of Child and Family Services (OCFS) Director Todd Landry. "Together, we can work towards preventing child abuse by strengthening programs and resources that support healthy and thriving families. We look forward to continuing to collaborate with Maine people, the Legislature, and the many partners throughout the state who are devoted to this critical

Ensuring that parents and caregivers have the knowledge, skills, and resources they need helps promote the social and emotional well-being of children and prevent child maltreatment within fam-

ilies and communities. "Protective factors" that reduce the risk for neglect and abuse and support positive outcomes for children, youth, and families include knowledge of parenting and child development, parental resilience, social connections, and concrete supports.

To that end, the DHHS Office of Child and Family Services partnered with other Department Offices and state agencies to develop and launch this month Access Maine, an online guide of programs and resources tailored for families to connect them to services and resources. Access Maine includes information about meeting basic needs, such as nutrition and child care, as well as domestic violence support, mental health and substance use resources, and other programs, complementing Maine's 211 directory.

Access Maine is part of OCFS' Federal Family First Prevention Services Act plan, which expands prevention services to help keep children and families healthy and safe and prevent the need for children to come into the care and custody of the State. In September 2021, Maine became the first New England state to gain approval to implement Family First and will receive approximately \$2.4 million in additional Federal funding annually.

Additionally during this Child Abuse Prevention month, OCFS is piloting a new online portal for selected mandated reporters to submit reports of suspected child abuse and neglect. The portal is available only to those categories of mandated reporters who are permitted under statute to make non-emergency reports electronically: medical professionals, hospitals and hospital staff, school personnel, and law enforcement personnel. OCFS is promoting the new portal with these professionals, with plans to expand the tool to all mandated reporters in the

Anyone in Maine, including mandated reporters, may continue to call the 24-hour Child Protective Hotline at 1-800-452-1999 to report suspected abuse or neglect.

The Mills Administration has upgraded the child protective hotline system as part of systematic improvements at OCFS, including replacing the decades-old Maine Automated Child Welfare Information System with a new system, Katahdin, in January 2022 on time and on budget, streamlining work and saving caseworkers' time. The Administration also established a Background Check Unit to improve investigations and has made major changes to the intake process.

The new supplemental budget includes key initiatives and over \$10 million to bridge gaps in the child welfare workforce, fill key staffing gaps, and implement recent child welfare recommendations from a range of experts. These recommendations align with the Maine Department of Health and Human Services' Child & Family Services Strategic Plan to improve policies and practices to ensure child safety.

Recognizing that child safety is impacted significantly by forces outside of the child welfare


system, the Mills Administration has also worked to address systemic challenges facing Maine. Upon taking office, Governor Mills prioritized responding to the opioid epidemic, expanding work to prevent drug use and enhance the availability of treatment and recovery resources important initiatives as the pandemic has worsened the opioid epidemic both in Maine and across the country. Governor Mills also reestablished the Children's Cabinet, which has made significant strides in supporting early childhood development as well as successful transition of youth to jobs and educa-

As part of Child Abuse Prevention month nationally, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Children's Bureau, and several partners have developed the 2021/2022 Prevention Resource Guide which provides more information for stakeholders and families and highlights examples of innovative prevention approaches being implemented by communities across the country.

Since then, Neokraft Signs has been responsible for some of Maine's most iconic signage, including Portland's Time and Temperature Building and the production and installation of the Bates Mill #5 "Hopeful" sign by Maine artist Charlie Hewitt.

The goal is to have the letters completed by Lewiston and Auburn's Liberty Festival on Sunday, July 3. "People can think of it as a pushpin on a map. You are here. In Lewiston. And we make things happen."

Lewiston Crosswalks Receive Visibility Improvements



PORTLAND, ME (May 5, 2022) -- Numerous crosswalks in Downtown Lewiston will receive visibility improvements this week, the Bicycle Coalition of Maine (BCM) Jim Tassé. announced Thursday.

On May 6, beginning at approximately 9 a.m., BCM staff will add flexible plastic delineator posts and red paint to crosswalks at three intersections in Lewiston: Central Avenue & Vale Street, Pine Street & Blake Street, and Pine Street & Bartlett Street.

combination of posts, signs, and paint, known as a 'gateway treatment,' aims to visually narrow roadways in order to calm traffic approaching the crosswalks," said BCM Assistant Director

The location on Central Avenue will also involve a project-based learning initiative to engage students from Lewiston Middle School, who will assist with the demonstration project installation.

All locations are associated with the High Visibility Pedestrian Safe-Education initiative launched by the BCM,



the MaineDOT, and VHB Engineering in the fall of 2021

The installation is also part of the Bicycle Coalition of Maine's Imagine People Here program, which tests whether lowcost, temporary infrastructure can enhance pedestrian safety by lowering traffic speeds to comply with posted limits, and to study whether these changes impact yield rates.

This is the first Imagine People Here project in Maine this year. The BCM is holding discussions with nine other communities



about traffic-calming installations for this spring See Crosswalks, page 14





editorial page editor for the Sun Journal, Judith Meyer was named Maine's Journalist of the Year in 2003 and was inducted into the Maine Press Association Hall of Fame in October 2021. She serves as vice president of the Maine Freedom of Information Coalition and is a member of the Right to Know Advisory Committee to the Legislature. She also serves on the New England Newspaper & Press Association Board of Directors and the board of the New England First Amendment Coalition, and was the 2018 recipient of the Judith Vance Weld Brown Spirit of Journalism Award in New England.



David Chittim is a professional land surveyor and engineer who was beguiled by local history after he began a retirement project researching the 200-year-old home he and Penny bought on a handshake in 1977. He consulted Doug Hodgkin, Lewiston's de facto historian, who re-introduced him to the Androscoggin Historical Society. David was elected Treasurer of the Society in 2013 and seems fated to remain so until a volunteer arises. His interest in local history far outweighs his knowledge, so each exploration brings new insight. David eschews "history by rote" and favors immersing himself in the attitudes and events surrounding a particular occasion. An admitted "enlightened Luddite," he draws more comfort from the 19th century than

the 21st. A daily journalist since 1987, Steve Collins has served as the State House Reporter for the Sun Journal since 2016. Among his awards are the Society of Professional Journalists' 2016 Ethics in Journalism Award and the I.F. Stone Whistle-Blower Award in 2015. Collins is co-founder and board president of Youth Journalism International, a charity based in Auburn that teaches students around the globe about news writing, media literacy and issues of the


