
Did you know that 1 of every 5 persons over the age of 65 become seriously injured due to falls each year?

Dear "Speak Out"

What Made "The Greatest Generation" Great? Part 2
The Greatest Generation was great because they formed groups to support each other and to demand better treatment by their bosses and to demand that the government, which is supposed to represent the will of the people, help them out. The 1930s saw more marches and protests than the 1960s. The marchers were usually blue-collar workers. They marched for the right of workers to organize and to be treated fairly. They marched against child labor and predatory capitalism. They marched for fair pay and for protection against the negative consequences of the business cycle. People joined together in workers' councils and food co-ops. They participated in penny- auctions and barred banks from foreclosing on people's homes.

People of the Greatest Generation joined unions in record numbers. Membership rose to 35% of the workforce. Today, it's about 10%. The greatest generation was about stepping up to help each

other out because we're all in this together.

Many people, and the representatives they elected, came to realize the shocks of the business cycle could be buffered if the government did three things. First, regulate market abuses. Second, give farmers, workers & consumers a voice. Third, create jobs when businesses can't so the 99% have money to stimulate the economy through spending.

Roosevelt's predecessor was more dogmatic than Roosevelt. Herbert Hoover believed in trickle-down economics- that if you give businesses more money they use it to create jobs. This doesn't work because businesses are only going to increase production, and thereby create jobs, if demand is there. Demand only exists if people have money to spend and they don't have money to spend if they don't

President Hoover also believed people's economic suffering should be solved by voluntarism. Hoover encouraged private charities to help the destitute, but charities were overwhelmed and could only help the few not the many. Also, they weren't always interested in doing what was the best for everybody. Unlike the government of the era, charities weren't subject to the will of what the people wanted. Charities didn't have to help anyone they didn't want to. So the government had to step in. It stepped in with programs that became known as the New Deal.

The new government promised to heal the nation by lending people "A hand up, not a hand out". FDR wanted everyone to have the right to a decent job, a decent wage, decent health care, a decent education and protection from the economic fears of old age, sickness, accident, and unemployment. He wanted people to have freedom from war by uniting the nations of the world to cooperate and respect each other's needs and concerns. He was prodded and helped in his efforts by a congress that actually did it's job. They didn't accomplish all of their goals, but they made many laws that transformed our nation and made it more fair and equal.

Since it wasn't driven by the need to make a profit, the government stepped in to create jobs. They paid people to build millions of roads, bridges, parks, electric lines, airports, schools, post offices and other public buildings. They paid artists to decorate these buildings and they paid actors and musicians to perform all over the country. They put young men to work in the Civilian Conservation Corp protecting our natural resources. More national parks and protected lands were

created during the New Deal than at any other time. The government also created social security- which gave people some money while they were out of work and created a retirement savings system for people in their old age. Now people would have some money to spend. With increased demand, businesses could start to make stuff again and then they would hire people back. The idea was that, at this point, the economy would be doing well and the government would stop giving people jobs.

Where did the government get the money for these programs? Did they borrow from the rich with interest like they do now? No, they taxed the rich. The historic truth is this; between 1940 and the early 1970s, when corporations and the rich paid the highest taxes on their top earnings (as high as 90% in the 1950s), we had what everyone agrees was our greatest era of overall prosperity. We have the Greatest Generation to thank for that

While the New Deal ended the severely depressed conditions the country had been suffering for years, it didn't bring us the prosperity that people remember from the post-war and the 1950s and 1960s. It was during WW II that the government really ramped up the amount of jobs and demand for products when they had to pay businesses and people to make tanks and planes and guns and bombs for America and her allies to fight Germany, Japan and Italy. (Continued)

This giant government spending program (and business subsidy) brought prosperity back. Large union membership and regulations kept that prosperity going for about 30 years.

World War II was a fight against the fascist powers of Germany, Japan and Italy by the socialist-leaning countries of the US, Britain and the USSR. Socialism, like any political/economic system, comes in many forms and can be democratic or totalitarian. In the USSR it was totalitarian. In the US it was a form of democratic socialism- although that couldn't be admitted at the time. By the end of the war, Britain threw out Churchill and elected an openly socialist government that transformed their society just as the New Deal did ours.

So if we want to accomplish what the Greatest Generation did we have to join unions, oppose militarism & fascism and make America more socialist again. Plus protect our natural resources, tax the rich a lot more and regulate wall street & big business. Of course, if we do that, in 30 years or so Wall Street and big business will probably roll back those changes just like they have over the past 40 years. But at least we'll have 25 or 30 years of prosperity for the common people again.

Dear "Speakout",

Remember Our Veterans on Memorial Day! You do not have to wait for a national holiday to show your gratitude to our military service members. Any day is a good day to support veterans either through a charity or by giving a heartfelt "thank you" to those who served.

The old saying "Gone but not forgotten" is a very appropriate saying regarding our veterans. "Thank you for your service!" is a simple and short, but to the point salutation and will communicate your gratitude.

Too often in modern day America, we think only of ourselves and today. Memories are some of the greatest treasures which we have much more valuable than the material possessions which we so cherish.

If it were not for the sacrifice of the lives of our servicemen and servicewomen, our present-day America would be a very different place in which to live. My father said that if he and other men and women had not defended our shores against aggression during World War II that we would be speaking another language as our primary one and would not possess the freedoms which we so often take for granted. He also told me that those who have served over the years did not take those liberties for granted but were willing to place their lives on the line for their families and friends back home.

Whenever you look at all the American flags flying in the breeze, it should make you proud to be an American. Part of what we should remember is the history of Memorial Day. Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day. On Tuesday, May 5, 1868, General John Alexander Logan, acting Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR), issued General Order No. 11 designating May 30 "for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion." Each of the former Union states had adopted a Decoration Day by 1890.

As time went on, "Memorial Day" began to supplant "Decoration Day" as the name of the holiday, and it soon became a day to honor all fallen American troops, not just those from the Civil War.

On Saturday, May 5, 1866, the Town of Waterloo in Seneca County, New York, shuttered its businesses and took to the streets for the first Decoration Day. On Monday, March 7, 1966, New York Governor Nelson Aldrich Rockefeller proclaimed Waterloo as the "birthplace of Memorial Day'

In May 1966 President Lyndon Baines Johnson signed legislation passed by the United States Congress declaring the tiny upstate village of Waterloo as the "official" birthplace of Memorial Day.

Today, Memorial Day is observed on the last Monday of May. Memorial Day is one of the few days on which flags are ordered to fly at half-staff and then full staff. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings, and participating in parades. Congress passed legislation in 2000 which encourages all Americans to pause for a "National Moment of Remembrance" at 3 P. M. on Memorial Day afternoon. I would respectfully suggest that you take time at 3 P. M. on Memorial Day afternoon to honor our veterans.
