### **REB** approves policy limiting citizens' time, frequency to address board

The Russellville Electric Board adopted a new policy regarding rules for citizens who wish to address the board at its monthly business meetings, including limiting a citizen to one five-minute appearance every three months.


The board unanimously approved the resolution at its May 24 meeting.

The restrictive policy requires "individuals desiring to make an oral presentation to the Electric Board of the City of Russellville, Alabama," to "contact the Office of the Electric Board of the City of Russellville, Alabama, by noon, a minimum of three business days prior to the meeting...and request to be on the agenda.'

The resolution also provides a fiveminute maximum speaking time and limits any individual to "one appearance per quarter/one appearance every three months for the purpose of making an oral presentation ... '

Last month, three citizens addressed the board including Russellville resident Sasha Franklin, who was also on the May 24 agenda. The three citizens posed several questions to board members, but received no response on any inquiries.

Franklin referenced Manager Charles Canida and his board's refusal to answer citizen inquiries. See 'REB,' page 3

## Oliver wins big in bid for fourth term as Franklin Sheriff

After seeing his wife and father pass away within two months of each other last year, Shannon Oliver realized how important the people of Franklin County are to him.

"If not for the people at my job and in this county, I'm not sure I would have made it," Oliver said Tuesday, after winning a fourth term as Franklin County Sheriff. "Things were very tough, but that support sure made it a lot easier to go through."

Oliver defeated challenger Joe Fike in the Republican Primary by receiving more than 83 percent of the vote (4,054-808). With no Democratic candidate, Oliver's victory earned him another term that will begin next year.

As he campaigned, Oliver said much of citizen feedback he received was positive. On the down side, though, Oliver said he had several citizens voice concerns about how/why defendants get out of jail so soon after arrest, something he explained was outside the control of the sheriff.

"As sheriff, all we can do is make the arrest and turn in the case for prosecution," Oliver said. "Bonding is out of our control. People have a constitutional right to a bond. You're innocent until proven guilty so we don't control whether someone makes bond."



Those questions centered around board approval of expenditures including an \$84,000 luxury SUV for Canida, a private fishing boat charter, \$3,000 dinners on beach conference trips and Canida's purchase on a REB credit card of thousands of dollars of fine chocolates.

Franklin spoke for approximately two minutes Tuesday.

"I appreciate the opportunity to address you. It looks like I won't get another one for at least three months," Franklin told the board.

"If all you're doing is legal and legitimate, why not answer any questions people had last month? Your silence speaks volumes," Franklin added.

A visibly frustrated Franklin left the meeting with doubts his words would be heeded by Canida or the board.

"I'd like each of you to go home to your nice house tonight and remember there are a lot of people in our community who have to make a choice to take medication or eat," Franklin said. "When you're spending all that money on these trips. I understand you have to go to some conferences for education but there are a lot of you taking these as vacations for your family. If none of this bothers you, I just pray God has mercy on you."

Business items approved by the board included:

—renewed a \$1 million line of credit with CB&S Bank in place for emergency situations. REB Accountant Tiffany Holt said the board has never drawn on the line of credit, but bank officials require the board to renew it at a meeting each year.

—approved an action that will provide a lump sum payment from the Retirement Systems of Alabama to all REB retirees and beneficiaries of deceased retirees. The payment will be in addition to each retiree's October 2022 regular retirement payment and will be approximately \$2 for each month of service with REB.

—heard a request from Canida to hire Russellville Police Officer Chad Sheffield as a First Period Tree Trimmer at a starting rate of pay of \$20.96/hour. Sheffield will fill a vacancy created by former tree trimmer Gabe Wallace entering the IBEW Apprentice Program. Canida said Wallace will 'transition' into the line crew.

—approved a \$10,000 expense to help sponsor the City of Russellville's annual Fourth of July Jam on Sloss Lake. Canida read a letter from Russellville Mayor David Grissom asking the board to support the event in the same amount it sponsored in previous years.

—Canida read the municipal court order entered in the Criminal Trespass, Third Degree case against Dwight Jackson. Jackson was found guilty in a trial earlier this month. The evidence showed Jackson went to pay his utility bill at the main office after being served in 2019 with a no-trespass order.



### Jackson found guilty of trespass after paying bill at RV utilities office

A former Russellville Utilities employee has been found guilty of Criminal Trespass, Third Degree, after going to the Russellville Utilities office to pay his electric bill in February.

Dwight Jackson, a former meter reader who retired in 2016, was found guilty by Russellville Municipal Court Judge Roger Bedford, Jr.

Criminal Trespass, Third Degree, is a violation under Alabama law that carries a fine and possible jail sentence up to 30 days.

The charge against Jackson was initiated by Russellville Electric Board Manager Charles Canida, who signed a complaint against Jackson after he paid his bill at the customer service window on February 10, 2022.

Jackson had previously been served with a no trespass notice by Russellville Police on August 7, 2019, which stated he was "not allowed to enter or be on the property, premises or outbuildings located at 721 Jackson Avenue South, Russellville," the address for the Russellville Utilities building and the main office of the Russellville Electric Board.

The building provides for walk-in and drive-thru payments of utility bills.

Bedford imposed a fine of \$250, along with court costs and fees totaling \$662. There was no jail sentence imposed.

Jackson said Monday he would appeal the conviction to Franklin County Circuit Court, where the matter would be heard by a Franklin County jury. Once Jackson files the required appeal documents, the conviction is set aside and the charge is refiled in Circuit Court as a 'trial de novo,' meaning there will be a brand new trial with no reference to Jackson having been found guilty in Municipal Court.

Jackson did not have an attorney at the May 2<sup>nd</sup> trial, instead choosing to represent himself. He told the *FFP* he plans to retain an attorney for the jury trial.

New Russellville Municipal Court Prosecutor Eddie Beason prosecuted the case for the City of Russellville. Canida and RPD Captain Jake Tompkins testified as witnesses.

Bedford's order states "the issue of whether or not this was a valid and properly executed Trespass Order against the Defendant was not the issue before the Court."

Jackson contended the no trespass notice, which also stated Jackson was not "to have any contact with any employee of the Russellville Electric Board," was unlawful because it banned him from a public building where Russellville residents go to pay their utility bills.

"There was no reason to ban me from the building. I hadn't been in there since I retired in 2016," Jackson said.

Bedford issued a written order dated May 20<sup>th</sup>, which stated Jackson "admitted that he could have mailed his payment or have someone else send it or deliver it for him, but he decided he would do it himself and it was his personal decision."

Canida's history with Jackson also includes filing a police report against him last December alleging Jackson came onto private property to take photos of Canida and REB employees cutting trees at a residence on North Jackson Avenue.

Police investigated the incident and found no crime had been committed, according to RPD Chief Chris Hargett.

Jackson said he's never been arrested before the Criminal Trespass charge and his only involvement with the court system was a traffic ticket.

#### It's Your Choice, **'OLIVER,' from page 1** to the men and women of Franklin County's other law enforcement agencies, as well as state officials, for the positive working relationship among the departments.

We all work together very well and get along well. Everything we do is toward one common goal-to get the bad guys off the street," Oliver said. "There would be no way to do that effectively if there was infighting among law enforcement agencies.

"We're like a baseball team. When you go out on the field, the entire team needs to be working toward the same goal," Oliver added.

Elected as a Democrat in 2010, 2014 and 2018, this was Oliver's first reelection bid as a Republican candidate. When he announced the party change last year, Oliver cited concerns about the national Democratic Party positions on important law enforcement issues and said he could no longer "align himself" with those extreme views.

### Murphree wins BOE 4 nomination, will face Oliver in November

Although she and her husband Jimmy have been fixtures at Rockwood as poll workers, Carol Murphree put her name on a ballot for the first time this spring when she decided to seek the Republican nomination for Franklin County Board of Education District Four.

Murphree's maiden voyage was successful at the first level Tuesday as she defeated Heath McKee 449-233. She will now face Democratic incumbent Shannon Oliver in the November 2022 general election.

Murphree, a retired educator whose teaching career spanned three school systems, including Russellville City Schools, was all smiles after learning she would be the Republican nominee.

"I was real surprised. You just can't get a read on everything when you're campaigning. I thought I'll run and maybe I'll get to serve the children of this county and that would be great, but I had no expectations from there," Murphree said. "I really am surprised and thankful."

Murphree said her experience as a former educator would bring a different perspective to the BOE, similar to that of former Russellville City Board of Education member Judy Pounders.

"If I'm elected and can be half of what Judy Pounders was that would be a success," Murphree said. "She was a retired educator representing the teachers on the board. She's gone now (Pounders died in 2021) but she'll always be someone I admired and loved."

Murphree said her campaign (and that of McKee's) was about sending a positive message to the voters of BOE District Four, which has Belgreen High School as its anchor school.

"I really wasn't running against Heath McKee and it won't be that way in the fall. I'm running for our children. I have nothing negative to bash anyone over," Murphree said. "I want to help solve problems, be honest with people and those are my plans if elected."

Jason Miller didn't take much time to celebrate victory after winning his bid to earn the Franklin County male seat on the Alabama Republican Party State Executive Committee (ARPSEC).

Instead, Miller laid out the goals he will have as the county's voice at the state level of the political party that owns an essential monopoly when it comes to Alabama politics.

"My job will be to always be able to represent Franklin County values at the state level. With all that's going on at the national level with the Democratic Party, there are a lot of things we need to keep out of Alabama," Miller said.

Miller defeated long-time State Executive Committee member Lowell Moore of Russellville with 3,118 votes to Moore's 1,251.

Miller, who represents District Two on the Franklin County Commission, said he'll be 'approachable' when it comes to matters of the Republican Party. He also plans to keep Franklin County residents informed as to what's happening at the state level of Republican politics.

"We need to do a better job of informing Franklin County residents about what's going on with the Republican Party across Alabama, and that's what I plan to do," Miller said.

Miller also took aim at the Franklin County Republican Executive Committee, saying the committee needs to be represented by someone who lives in the county. Miller's comment referred to Franklin County Republican Executive Committee Chairman Jerry Mays, whom Miller says lives in Muscle Shoals.

"We need to elect a chairman who resides in Franklin County to really move forward. We need a leader who lives here and who makes Franklin County a priority," Miller said.

Mays, who spoke with the *FFP* Tuesday evening at the Franklin County Courthouse, said he has always made Franklin County his priority and there's nothing wrong or improper about maintaining 'dual residences' in two counties, something he said many residents and elected officials do.

Mays, the former mayor of Phil Campbell, has served as Franklin County GOP Chairman dating back to before the county elected its first Republican of the new century, in 2012.

Miller believes the local party must be more active and involved in order for the party to continue to grow, and he questioned how the local party can sustain growth with a chairman who's not a Franklin County resident.

### Welborn narrowly defeats Baker, will serve fourth term on county BOE

If Terry Welborn ever has the opportunity to speak to the children he represents on the Franklin County Board of Education, he'll have an important message for them when it comes to politics—*every vote counts!* 

Welborn saw that adage first hand with his narrow win over Curtis Baker in Tuesday's Republican Primary for Franklin County Board of Education District Three. Welborn won by 14 votes, 397-383.

"I'm so thankful for everyone who went out and voted," Welborn said. "It just meant everything that they went out and took the time to vote, especially when you consider the low turnout at the local and state level."

Welborn, who was first elected to the BOE in 2010, defeated Baker for the second consecutive election, although Baker ran as a Democrat in 2018. This year's margin was considerably closer. Welborn's strong vote in Phil Campbell (209-152) was the difference.

With no Democratic candidate, Welborn's primary win means he will serve a fourth term.

"I'm very blessed. I told my when I was going to run for the first time that I was hesitant. I didn't know what to do. And God said to me 'I want you to run.' I prayed again when Curtis announced he was running (four years ago) and asked God 'are you sure?," Welborn said. "The people close to me were very reassuring, and I'm so thankful for

that." Welborn attributed his victory, in large part, to a policy of transparency in

government that is important to him and his fellow board members. "We try to be transparent and put every school at the forefront. The better

we can make each school, the better we are as a county," Welborn said. "That's what this board does—look at each aspect of each school and try to push those needs. We have to have great teachers and they make it work."

One goal Welborn said the board and Superintendent Greg Hamilton have worked hard to accomplish is bringing Franklin County Schools out of the red to where the system now operates with a one-month reserve operating budget, something required by the state Department of Education.

Welborn said he will remain accessible to all citizens who want to address concerns or issues with the school system.

"You want someone you can come to on any subject and feel that person will be fair. And we've done that. That goes for Mr. Hamilton and the entire board. Being fair and respectful to everyone helps me know God has me where he wants me to be—living as a Christian and a board member," Welborn said.

## Dale victorious in quest for State Democratic Executive Committee seat

At 81, you wouldn't think Charles Dale would be ready for work. But after his victory in the House District 18 State Democratic Executive Committee (SDEC) race, that's exactly what Dale wants to do—get to work for his party and the people of Alabama.

Dale defeated Rick Neighbors in the HD 18 State Democratic Executive Committee race with 314 votes to Neighbors' 270. HD 18 is comprised of Franklin and a portion of Colbert Counties.

In Franklin County,

Neighbors won by a 13vote margin, 162-149. But Dale's strong showing in Colbert County (165-108) carried him to victory. Seats on the SDEC are elected by House districts, but there is no compensation for serving.

Each House District in Alabama is represented by one male and one femal resident on the SDEC.

Dale is a veteran of Democratic politics whose civic involvement dates back to the historic Selma Bridge Crossing 57 years ago. He's been active in Democratic politics on the local level for years, serving on the Franklin County Democratic Executive Committee.



Dale said his mission as a SDEC member will be one of accountability of elected officials in both parties.

"My job will be in large part to make sure politicians in elected positions hold up their end and are there for the people they represent, and not for prestige or their pockets," Dale said.

With all but one of Alabama's state and federal offices held by Republicans, there's nowhere to go but up for Alabama Democrats.

"Our message is still there. It's just that people are looking at things from the Republican Party standpoint," Dale told the *FFP* last week. "They're saying the things people in rural areas are wanting to hear. Same with the things Donald Trump is saying. But it's not reality. It's just what they want to hear. They think Republicans will solve our problems but they won't."

Neighbors did score a political victory Tuesday, as he defeated Rhonda Gore for the Democratic nomination for United States Congress for Alabama's Fourth Congressional District. He will face Rep. Robert Aderholt, the Republican incumbent, in the November general election.

The AHSAA recently announced that it was putting a hold on the reorganizing of baseball and softball into region play instead of area play.

Doing so would have mirrored the structure of the football formatting but instead, the AHSAA board elected to hold off on making the change for now.

However, there were some changes that did come out of the association recently as the spring sports alignments were released and there are some noteworthy changes for the upcoming spring 2022-23 athletic season involving teams within Franklin County.

The changes are as follows...

1A baseball and softball remain the same with Belgreen and Vina remaining in area 13 along with Hackleburg and Phillips for another stint.

In 2A baseball, Tharptown (formerly of area 14) and Red Bay (formerly of area 10) now move into the same area (area 16), along with Lexington, Sheffield and Mars Hill.

Red Bay and Tharptown softball will also jump and join areas together in area 13 along with Winston County to set up a three-team area in 2A. One of the more notable changes in the realign-

ment of area play comes in 3A area 15 baseball.

The Phil Campbell Bobcats will compete with Colbert Heights and Colbert County in the same area after the Bobcats dominated 3A area 15 play in recent years with East Lawrence, Danville and Vinemont as their area foes.

Russellville baseball will have a new area opponent coming into the mix as the formerly three-team area will bump up by one team.

Jasper High School will be moving into 5A area 14 beginning next season along with the Golden Tigers, West Point and Lawrence County on the diamond.

The Lady Golden Tigers saw one change in their area as they bid goodbye to West Point and welcomed in Ardmore to take their place in the threeteam area in area 16.

But these guys buy in to what we do and that's how we've gotten to where we are today."





that," Oliver said.

One of the bats headed to Langston's initial recruiting class possesses some of the best raw power in the state in Nathan Brockway and if he finds a way to take that next step in his progression at the plate, opposing pitchers will surely have Brockway on notice every time he steps to the dish.

As he celebrates winning a championship ring for the second straight year, Brockway is already anticipating the start to his college career and has high hopes for what the next two years entails.

"It's just a special night to all of us. We got to celebrate as a team and then for five of us to move on to play at the next level and we're all just really excited about it and we're all just ready to get started," Brockway said. "Being able to go play college ball with people you already know is so big. It feels more like home when we get there and we already know coach Langston so we are going to be comfortable around him. We are all just ready to get there and get started for sure."

As for Samuel Pace, who got the win for the Golden Tigers in back-to-back game threes in the semifinal and championship rounds, the decision to continue his baseball career didn't take long for him to make.

And to hear the former Golden Tiger put it, being a Golden Tiger has made quite the impact on him that will carry for a lifetime.


