Absentee Ballots Available for June 14th State **Primary Election**

LEWISTON, ME (June 1, 2022) -REMINDER: The State Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, June 14. Absentee ballots for this election are currently available for Lewiston residents from the City Clerk's Office. Registered voters needing an absentee ballot may call the City Clerk's Office, order online from the city's website, mail in an application form, or come into the City Clerk's Office, located on the second floor of City Hall. Office hours are Monday - Friday, 8:30am - 4:00pm.

Since the purpose of a primary election is for members of political parties to select their nominees to run in the November general election, only registered voters enrolled in the Democratic or Republican parties are eligible to vote in this election. Voters who are not enrolled in one of these political parties cannot vote.

Every race on both party ballots is uncontested with the exception of Representative to Congress on the Republican

The following candidate races will be appearing on the Lewiston ballots: Governor, Representative to Congress, State Senate, State Representative for Districts 93, 94, 95 and 96, Judge of Probate, Sheriff, District Attorney, County Commissioner for Districts 2 and 3.

Collins Pushes to Assist First-Generation, Low-Income Students

Washington, **D.C.** (June 2, 2022) – U.S. Senators Susan Collins (R-ME) and Jon Tester (D-MT) led a bipartisan group of 56 Senators - including Senator Angus King (I-ME) - in advocating for robust funding for Federal TRIO Programs in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education Appropriations bill. Senators Collins and Tester are the

Co-Chairs of the Congressional TRIO Caucus.

Nationally, there are more than 3,100 TRIO programs serving more than 800,000 students. In Maine, 30 TRIO programs serve almost 7,600 students all over the state.

TRIO programs help to ensure that underserved students have equal access to a college education and the support they need to prepare for, succeed in, and graduate from higher education. These programs provide crucial support to low-income students, first-generation students, students with disabilities, homeless youths, students in or exiting foster care, military veterans, English learners, unemployed adults, and students in rural communities.

created "Congress the TRIO Programs because it recognized that low-income, first-generation students often face significant financial and societal obstacles to accessing and achieving success in higher education. Without TRIO's individualized counseling, advising, and support, many of these students may lose opportunities for a better life," said Senator Collins. "When we lend a hand to those who have the motivation to pursue higher education but lack the means, they give back to their communities. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I am proud to be an advocate for these important and often life-changing programs."

Governor Mills Promotes Free Community College

BANGOR, (May 30, 2022)—Governor Janet Mills today visited Eastern Maine Community College in Bangor to promote her recently-passed plan to provide two years of free community college to pandemic impacted students.

During her visit, Governor Mills surveyed construction of EMCC's nursing simulation lab, which is being funded in part by the Mills Administration and will help provide training to future nurses. The Governor then visited two of EMCC's workforce classes - one on surgical tech and the other on commercial driving – that are supported by investments through the Governor's Maine Jobs & Recovery Plan.

Overall, the Governor's Jobs Plan includes some \$300 million in workforce investments, including \$105 million for programs at Maine schools, community colleges, and universities; \$50 million for affordable and workforce housing; \$20 million to expand Pre-K and childcare infrastructure, and more.

"With the strong bipartisan support of the Legislature, we are ensuring that high school students whose aspirations for higher education were impacted by the pandemic have the opportunity to get a tuition free education and enter Maine's

workforce with a reliable, good-paying, and in-demand job," said Governor Mills. "From nursing and surgical tech programs, like those I toured today at EMCC, to construction and commercial driving and more, students will be able to obtain the skills and credentials they need to help solve Maine's biggest workforce challenges. I want young people to know that the future belongs to them, and that we will help you embrace it."

"These key investments from the state are meeting a tremendous need for students at Maine's community colleges. Free college in particular is a game changer, and expanding nursing and short-term workforce training will significantly boost the number of skilled workers in the state for these high-demand jobs," said David Daigler, president of the Maine Community College Sys-

Approximately 8,000 young Maine people are expected to be eligible for free community college and as college graduates, they will have higher earning power, enter a career track faster, be more "recession-proof," and earn significantly more money over their careers than high school graduates. Many of these students will enter the workforce in their early 20s, now with high value degrees and certificates and with specialized skills and abilities in high-demand areas.



What You Should Know about the \$850 Checks

(June 3, 2022) --Over the last few months, Mainers have faced skyrocketing costs at every turn. Whether it be at the grocery store or at the gas pump, it's clear that rising prices are putting a strain on folks' wallets. This year in the Legislature, my colleagues and I knew we had to take action to provide some direct relief. That's why in the bipartisan budget we passed back in April, we voted to send \$850 relief checks directly to over 800,000 Mainers. You've probably heard of the \$850 checks at this point – and by the time you read this, some of you may have already received yours – but I know there are a lot of people out there who still have questions or are unsure if or how they'll be receiving a check. I wanted to share with you some important info about the checks and what you need to do to ensure that you receive yours.

So who qualifies to receive a check? Well, as I mentioned, over 800,000 Mainers will be receiving one, which is a large majority of our population. Folks who earned \$100,000 or less, and joint filers who earned \$200,000

includes Mainers who receive Social Security and Social Security Disability benefits. The only other requirement to receive a check is that you file your state income tax, 1040ME form, by Oct. 31, 2022. Now, here's an important caveat I don't want you to miss: Even if you are not required to file your state income tax for whatever reason, you must do so this year in order to receive the \$850 check. If you haven't filed yet, there's no need to worry. You have until the end of October to do so, and once completed, your check will begin getting

or less, are eligible. This processed and sent out to includes Mainers who re-

I understand that some people may feel uneasy about having to file their state income taxes - especially if they haven't had to do it in years. The good news is that help is available to you! We have a great organization in Maine called CA\$H Maine, which has a team of volunteers ready to help folks get their taxes filed through October in order to receive the \$850 check. To get help filing your taxes, contact our local L-A CA\$H coalition by calling (207) 739-6530 or by emailing Laca\$h@

community-concepts.org. You can also call 2-1-1 to get connected with free tax help. In addition to getting your check, an added benefit to filing your taxes this year is that you may discover that you've been missing out on tax credits that you're eligible for. For example, lots of people miss out on the Maine Earned Income Tax Credit each year, despite qualifying to receive it. Simply put, this is money that could be going back into your pocket each year. You don't want to miss out on

As the relief checks continue rolling out to

Mainers in the coming weeks, I hope you find the money to be helpful for you and your family. I'm proud to know that my colleagues and I in Augusta were able to provide such a direct form of relief in this difficult time. LEWISTON, ME (June 2, 2022)—The Franco Center on Lewiston's Riverfront will host La Rencontre at 10 a.m. Thursday, June 23. Featured that day will be displays about St-Jean-Baptiste Day, recognized as a national holiday in Canada. Tickets for this event are on sale through the Franco's box office and must be purchased by noon on June 20 as tickets will not be sold at the door.

St-Jean-Baptiste Day was so widely supported in Lewiston and Auburn by the Franco community that two parades were held on the same day one year. The last float in the parade was always of a little boy dressed as a shepherd representing the patron saint of Canada. The last parade in Lewiston-Auburn for this special day was held in 1966.

Laurence Gagnon, from the Quebec Delegation in Boston, will be in attendance to offer a few words about St-Jean-Baptiste. The Franco-Collection at the University of Southern Maine's Lewiston-Auburn College has provided a display of vintage photos and artifacts from its archives featuring members of the local Franco community.

La Rencontre, which translates to "the gathering," is similar to an old-fashioned French-Canadian kitchen party with socializing, food, and music

The 11:30 a.m. lunch will consist of chicken pot pies, cole slaw, and whoopie pies, and will be followed by musical entertainment provided by Don and Cindy Roy. Known for their Franco-American traditional music, the Roys have performed across the country together for over 40 years, Don on fiddle and Cindy on piano and step dancing.

Support for this event is provided by TV5Monde. Doors will open at 9:30 a.m. Purchase tickets online at www.francocenter. org or by phone at 207-689-2000. The box office is open from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays for walk-in ticket purchases before June 20.

The ticket price of \$15 includes meal and entertainment. The Franco Center on Lewiston's Riverfront is at 46 Cedar Street. Parking is available in the mill lot; handicap parking is located near the elevator entrance in Lincoln St. Alley.





Navigating the Iconic Machias River Part Two: Little Falls to Machias

(May 30, 2022) --Ken Gordon and I were beginning the third day of our five day outing on the Machias River in Washington County. Paddling expedition kayaks, two seniors not acting their ages had completed a little less than half of the 55 mile journey and were camped at the foot of Little Falls.

We awoke to bluebird skies and light winds. The paddling day began with a stretch of flatwater to Mopang Stream which entered on the right. Around the bend was the two mile sector of whitewater called Wigwam Rapids.

The protracted first

Wigwam began with a steep pitch replete with unappealing holes. After scouting, we successfully navigated left before proceeding through the rollicking runout. Stimulating rapids introduced second Wigwam which entailed cautious maneuvering around two ledge drops. A horizon line indicated our approach to third Wigwam. After careful scrutiny, we plunged down the left side while managing to avoid breaking waves, boulders, and a wide powerful hole at the bottom. Our exhilarating visit with the Wigwams

finished with a Class II de-

scent through large waves

in the final pitch.

ter paddle to Holmes Falls was delightfully interrupted by a deer swimming in the river. The portage around the hazardous falls began by catching a tiny moving eddy just above the onset that required precise execution to safely land. We broke up the demanding carry by camping about halfway through the portage trail at a site overlooking the turbulent cataract.

Day four began with sunshine and warmer weather. A short paddle through easy rapids brought us to Deadman's Island located a short distance above Little Holmes Falls. We stopped on the island to visit a stone monument dedicated to the memory of Obadiah Hill, an early Machias River pioneer. and to scout the entrance to the falls. Little Holmes is a complex rapid that isn't easily reconnoitered and concludes with a Class IV descent left of an island and a technical Class III to the right. After proceeding through an approach rapid, we ferried hard right to an eddy to investigate the right side and set up safety. The technical twisting descent was negotiated without incident.

The excitement of


Little Holmes behind us, a long expanse of flatwater followed. Near the confluence with Old Stream, we enjoyed an entertaining encounter with a young bear foraging next to shore. The startled little bruin scurried into the woods when we were detected.

Following lunch at Getchel Riffles, we battled a strong headwind while persisting to Great Falls. the longest rapid on the river. From the portage trail, it was apparent the waves were more substantial than most of my prior visits. The best location to view the falls is from the top of gigantic boulders high above the extensive rapid. After careful inspection, we decided to portage gear and carry kayaks around the top half of the falls. A spirited plummet dodging rocks in the lower section followed. We ended our day enjoying sunshine and a warm gentle breeze at an idyllic campsite next to the falls.

We were up early for our final day hoping to avoid rain forecasted to begin mid-morning. Despite our hurried efforts, showers started while breaking camp. We launched in light rain.

The precipitation subsided during our six mile paddle to the old logging community of Whitneyville. The ubiquitous open banks of that circuitous section of river are the result of a former lake created by a dam since removed. The view of a church steeple announced our arrival in Whitneyville where a rousing Class II rapid carried us under a bridge at Route 1A.

Shortly after, we

passed the site of the former U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) river gauge. Inexplicably, it ceased operating several years ago. Why the USGS continues to maintain a gauge for the minor tributary of Old Stream but neglects one for the largest watershed in the area is bewildering.

The remaining five miles to Machias consisted of flatwater with sporadic easy rapids to more substantial whitewater in a gorge beginning shortly before entering town. The long feisty rapid was the perfect way to end our journey on one of Maine's finest tripping rivers.

"We are so excited to be here celebrating the opening of An Angel's Wing second location to-day. I fully support their cause - I have seen the work that it does for recovery, and the way that impacts our workforce and employers," remarked Shanna Cox. "Their prod-

ucts are great, and you can feel good shopping here, knowing that the dollars you spend are helping people right here in LA".

An Angel's Wings mission is to ensure each individual has the opportunity to live, learn, and recover from substance use disorder - and they will do whatever it takes to get people into recovery and stay in recovery.

"There is no one in our community, in the state, or in the country who hasn't been affected by tragedy; especially tragedy that can be prevented and remediated. We thank you Debra for your work supporting those battling substance

use disorder and supporting their recovery," said Mayor Levesque.

An Angel's Wing is a non-profit organization and thrift store that sells new and used clothing, accessories, furniture, and household items. All of the proceeds from sales at its two locations go toward funding the fight against substance use disorder and offering support to people in recovery. The organization also operates an addiction resource center, including locating treatment and covering those costs, setting up furnished sober living homes, and supplying clothing and other items needed for individuals at

no cost.

"We have partnered with St. Mary's, Blue Sky Counseling, Avalon Counseling, and Tri-County Mental Health to open Androscoggin's first community non-profit detoxification unit," announced Executive Director Debra York. "Finding a bed at a detoxification center is near to impossible in the state of Maine. We have spent hours on the phone trying to locate a bed for one individual who was ready for treatment, but there wasn't one available. With this new venture we will open up so many possibilities for those who are in search of treatment."
