



Letter to the Editor: Resident Ralph Wilson Turns 99

To the Editor,

Gorham resident Ralph Wilson turned 99 years old on May 28, 2022. A few neighbors got together to sing Happy Birthday to Mr. Wilson and wished him well, presenting him with cards and an apple pie, which turned out to be his "favorite" pie.

Mr. Wilson was born in Presque Isle, Maine and recalls growing up on a farm with hard working parents--no conveniences like today. His dad Henry had 2 big horses to work the potato fields; his mom Edna took care of

the home and the family, and when every child was old enough, the children pitched in and did chores. Mr. Wilson--at 12 years old--was tasked with milking cows, a chore he liked better than hauling buckets of water from the barn to the house--a distance of 800 feet. Every member of the family worked hard on a farm, you had no choice according to Mr. Wilson. Although he said his family was "poor" they didn't have problems; no fighting over toys one did not have; life was pretty fundamental in those days and "Everyone got along."

Ralph Wilson is also a proud WWII Veteran. He served in the US Air Force as part of the ground crew for Salvage and Reclamation in Darwin, Australia and the Philippines. He also attended the Memorial Day parade and service in Gorham with his son Vaughn. It was a full weekend for Mr. Wilsonfrom celebration to solemn remembrance—and to good old-fashioned apple pie!

MaineHealth Videographer Earns Regional Emmy

PORTLAND, ME (June 8, 2022) - A video capturing the thoughts and emotions of Maine Medical Center (MMC) ICU nurses as they cared unvaccinated tients during the Delta COVID-19 surge won MaineHealth videographer Charlie Berg a Regional Emmy® Award at Boston's Wang Theater Saturday night. The story, entitled "Inside View of Maine Medical Center ICU Nurses Caring for Unvaccinated COVID-19 Patients," was posted on the Maine-Health YouTube page and other social media channels on September 2, 2021 to encourage vaccination against COVID-19, and has now been viewed more than 750,000 times.

Berg shot, edited and produced the video, but he credits its power to the ICU nurses who opened up to him about the toll the surge was taking on them and their community. He went to the ICU that day expect-

ing the focus of his story to be an unvaccinated patient whose experience with COVID-19 left him wishing he had chosen vaccination. As he began speaking to nurses Chani Marcoux, RN, Britney Meunier, RN, Danielle Poulin, NP, and Kimberly Matheson, RN, he knew their stories were just as important because they not only were speaking for themselves, but for the patients they lost.

"The truth is I showed up for one day with a camera and the nurses and the front line care teams have been doing this for two years, putting their lives on the line," Berg said. "It was important to them that people see the needless pain and suffering that patients, families and care teams were going through when effective vaccines were available. It was important to me that that story be told."

When the Regional Emmy® was announced, Marcoux, Meunier, Poulin

and Matheson took the stage with Berg to receive the award. Berg introduced the nurses, who received a standing ovation.

"Charlie really was able to portray and capture the message of what it's like to be an ICU nurse during the pandemic and the importance of vaccination," Meunier said. "Inviting us to be part of the Emmy ceremony was so special."

"Just being acknowledged, not only that night but also with the number of times that video has been seen was emotional for us," Marcoux said. "To us, this award is for the patients we lost, those who passed away without their families with only us there. They're always on our minds."



Wiscasset Celebrates Its First Juneteenth



To celebrate the first state and national Juneteenth holiday, Wiscasset residents will host a picnic on Wiscasset Common on June 19 from 1-3pm. Bring a picnic and a family story to share.

WICASSET, ME (June 10, 2022) -- Wiscasset residents will be commemorating their first Juneteenth on Wiscasset's Common, Sunday, June 19, from 1 to 3pm, with an informal BYO picnic, music, and storytelling. In the tradition of Juneteenth celebrations around the coun-

try, it's a day of sharing stories and food, embracing loved ones, and never forgetting that the price of freedom is high and dear.

Juneteenth began in 1866, a year after federal troops marched into Galveston, Texas, announcing that all enslaved people were free. This was more than two years after Abraham Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation, which declared that slaves in Confederate states would be free. The day became a 'Jubilee Day' of celebration by newly freed African Americans in Texas and, with migration, was quickly embraced in other states.

Juneteenth is now celebrated throughout the U.S. with family gatherings, prayer, music, and remembrance of the hard fought struggle for emancipation. In Maine, Juneteenth became an official state holiday in 2021, the same year the U.S. designated the day, June 19, a federal holiday. Both holidays are being celebrated in 2022 for the first time.

Everyone is welcome to come to the Common and celebrate our shared humanity together. Wiscasset Juneteenth attendees are encouraged to bring stories about heritage, pivotal moments, personal history, lost loved ones, new births, and whatever makes your heart full and for which you are grateful.

Maine DOE Awards \$2.5 Million to Support Education Innovation

AUGUSTA, (**June 9, 2022**)—The Maine Department of Education (DOE) today awarded \$2.5 million in Rethinking Responsive Education Ventures (RREV) funding to support education innovation in twelve school administrative units (SAUs) across Maine. These funds will be used to support educational research and design projects focused on alternative education stratinterdisciplinary/ egies, experiential learning, environmental stewardship, Wabanaki culture and heritage, outdoor education, and internship opportunities, as well as supporting unique approaches to remote learning.

Awardees this third round of RREV funding include Lee Academy, Brunswick, Kennebunk in RSU 21, Maine Indian Education, Bath in RSU 1, Brewer, Belfast in RSU 71, MSAD 6 - Bonny Eagle, Bucksport in RSU 25. Falmouth. Searsport in RSU 20, and Kittery. The first round of RREV investments were made last fall, a second round in March, and total RREV investments now near \$6 million.

"RREV investments help fuel educational research and design and the innovation and creativity of Maine educators," said Education Commissioner Pender Makin. "We're excited to invest in these educator-led efforts to deep-

en student engagement through interdisciplinary learning, expand learning beyond the traditional classroom to include the outdoors and environmental stewardship, explore Wabanaki culture and heritage, expand alternative education strategies, and allow students to explore career paths that fuel their passions."

The Maine DOE was

awarded \$16.9 million from the U.S. Department of Education's Rethink K-12 Education Models Funding. As one of 11 States to receive funding, Maine created RREV to support the work of visionary educators to develop innovative pilot programs around remote and outside of the classroom learning, including professional development and pilot design classes. Courses in innovative design process are available through several of Maine's public and private universities at no cost to Maine educators who wish to participate. In addition to the innovative pilot development classes, the Department is also offering asynchronous, innovative principles webinars which are available to all educators in self-paced, independent modules.

"RREV has not only helped us to reinvent how we deliver instruction but how we look at changing education as a whole," said Renita Ward-Downer, Director of Instruction in

"Maine Indian Education's RREV pilot project will allow us to build a connected and immersive, community-based dle school experience that empowers students to always put first their Wabanaki knowledge," said Beth Clifford, Curriculum Coordinator for Maine Indian Education. "We are eager to develop placebased and project-based educational experiences that connect learning and communities to increase student engagement and academic outcomes, promote partnerships and collaboration, and deepen our understanding of the world around us. Wabanaki history, culture and life will be a core element of programming."

Acadia Wilderness Lodge Opens for Inaugural Season

TREMONT, ME (May 20, 2022) – Acadia Wilderness Lodge officially opened for the season Thursday morning, with a ribbon cutting ceremony and tours of the grounds.

"Tremont is a very special part of Mount Desert Island," said Hopkins. "The town has been great, and we are being very respectful of the natural beauty and elements of this space."







(June 9, 2022) -- All furniture will be \$3 at Goodwill on Fridays starting June 10. The Furniture Friday deal will continue through September 30, during the nonprofit's busiest furniture donation season.

"Shoppers will get a great deal on nice furniture pieces, but there are other reasons for this deal - sustainability and employee safety," said Kossi Gamedah, Senior Vice President of Retail Operations. "Furniture is one of a few items we can't usually recycle. That means unsold furniture must go to landfills, which is the last thing we want. The \$3 price point isn't revenue-generating, but it helps the Earth, which is a huge part of why we made this decision."

The sustainability move will also cut transportation costs and the related fossil fuels because unsold furniture gets toted to the nearest Goodwill warehouse, where it has another chance to be sold for even steeper discounts, down to 25 cents.

June through September is furniture donation season for the local nonprofit. Furniture tends to be the largest, heaviest items at Goodwill. That means when a few donations of couches, tables and wardrobes come in, the back rooms of the store can fill quickly. By offering the furniture at [operational] cost, Goodwill hopes to





keep backrooms of stores clear and safe for all employees.

"We're incredibly grateful to this community for their continued support by donating their furniture, shirts, shoes and more," Gamedah said. "Revenue from stores funds Goodwill's mission to invest in people who need support achieving their work and life goals — including our own employees. We can't do it without these donations."

This move is one of many recent investments in

sustainability by Goodwill Northern New England. In January 2017, the Northern New England based nonprofit voluntarily banned single use plastic bags from its stores. In February 2021 it upgraded its fleet of tractor trailers to improve its transportation fuel efficiency and reduce its carbon footprint. In 2022 it announced a multi-year, 3-phased logistics and supply chain optimization initiative, which included replacing boxes and wood pallets with more durable materials to reduce waste.





To gain understanding and appreciation for the trail network, land, and people that make it possible.



Collins, King Announce \$54.5 Million Contract to Bath Iron Works



WASHINGTON, D.C. (June 9, 2022)—U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King announced today that the U.S. Navy has awarded Bath Iron Works (BIW) a \$54,527,203 contract modification to a previously awarded contract for Planning Yard Services for the DDG 51 Class Guided Missile Destroyer

program.

"Arleigh Burkeclass destroyers are the workhorses of the Navy, defending our national security and protecting our interests around the globe," said Senators Collins and King in a joint statement. "This funding will allow BIW's engineers, designers, and planners to continue providing technical expertise to the Navy and strengthen Maine's economy. The hardworking and highly skilled men and women

at Bath Iron Works build the world's highest quality ships, and we will continue our efforts to ensure they have the resources they need."

This funding is a cost-plus-award-fee modification to a previously awarded contract for planning yard services. The majority of the work will

be performed in Bath and Brunswick and is expected to be completed by June 2023.

Senator Collins is a senior member of the Appropriations Committee and the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. Senator King is a member of the Armed Services Committee.

UMaine and Lobster Industry Team Up to Map Fishing Effort

ORONO, ME (June 1, 2022) -- The University of Maine is leading an innovative new research project to collaborate with Maine's lobster industry to explore the potential to use data owned by commercial lobstermen to map fishing effort. These data may be used to minimize conflict from potential future offshore wind development.

The state of Maine has set an aggressive goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and achieve carbon neutrality by 2045 and is looking to floating offshore wind development in the Gulf of Maine to supply renewable power, as well as economic benefit.

Participants Maine's commercial fisheries are concerned that offshore wind development could result in lost fishing grounds and pose significant navigation and safety concerns. While Maine's lobster fishery accounted for 82% of the value of Maine's commercial seafood landings in 2021, there are no comprehensive data on where and when Maine lobstermen fish. To minimize the impact on Maine's lobster fishery, better data are needed on the location, type and intensity of fishing activity in the Gulf of Maine.

Kate Beard-Tisdale is leading this collaborative project to use data already



being collected by commercial lobstermen to fill these data gaps.

"Right now, published maps suggest that lobster fishing is occurring everywhere. We hope through this effort to provide more spatial specificity about the most important fishing locations - where fishermen spend more time and effort," says Beard-Tisdale, UMaine professor of spatial computing in the School of Computing and Information Science. "This spatial specificity could result in protecting fishing areas or designating areas best avoided for wind turbine placement."

Beard-Tisdale will work closely with project partners from the Maine Lobstermen's Association and Responsible Offshore Development Alliance and its Fisheries Knowledge Trust, as well as the University of Maine's Lobster Institute. The project aims to develop a method to show where Maine's lobstermen do their work throughout the year by aggregating navigation and chart plotter data from individual fishermen who

have equipment that records a sequence of coordinates and documents where the boat travels. Not only would the data provide a spatially accurate picture of where fishing is taking place, but it would also be less expensive to monitor the small fishery's activity this way than with the high cost systems used in other fisheries.

The project also will ensure that it is possible to maintain the confidential nature of individual fisherman's data contributions. "Fishermen have a proprietary interest in where they fish and, by extension, in their plotter data, so we want to be really careful in terms of how we anonymize and combine their data such that individual fishing data are not revealed," Beard-Tisdale

Ultimately, the researchers aim to build a software system that will aggregate and parse the data from various commercial systems in order for the lobster industry to be able to best inform regional energy development, fishery stock assessments,





protected species management and other pressing management issues.

Moreover, if the project is successful in both data collecting and anonymizing, it could build



trust among fishermen, scientists and fishery managers in further developing fine scale spatial data for use in decision making.

"The Fisheries Knowledge Trust is a really valuable tool, as it provides legal and technical support for fishermen to be the holders and managers of their collective data," says Beard-Tisdale. "The Knowledge Trust can empower fishermen by giving them control over their data. There is oversight by a board of advisors so that data products are created that the fishermen trust and that have also met the approval of the advisory board. Ideally it creates a win-win situation for improving marine spatial planning if the process gives everyone confidence in the data. If the idea takes hold it can extend to give fishermen of all types a more direct voice in marine planning activities."

Beard-Tisdale's research was one of six projects across the Northeast selected for funding by

the Northeast Sea Grant Consortium in partnership with the U.S. Department of Energy's Wind Energy Technologies Office and Water Power Technologies Office and NOAA's Northeast Fisheries Science Center. The funding is meant to catalyze research for the coexistence of marine energy, including wind, current, tidal and wave energies, with Northeast fishing and coastal communities. Beard-Tisdale's research was awarded \$192,924.

"My husband worked a season on a lobster boat back in the '70s. His boss was a strong advocate for more collective effort in managing aspects of the fishery — owning their own wharf. I see a similar situation here. Individual lobstermen have less bargaining power in these situations of competing for marine space. Collectively, by building a database that they can trust, hold and manage, they have a stronger voice for conveying their interests," Beard-Tisdale says.


