a B.A. in International Politics and Economics from Middlebury College in Vermont, where she spent a semester in Costa Rica. While in Costa Rica she started a Junior Achievement chapter at a high school in Panama that promotes economic and educational opportunities for women and girls.

After college Bellows served as an AmeriCorps volunteer, working to promote educational and economic empowerment for youths in Nashville's largest public housing project.

Bellows is the former executive director of the Holocaust and Human Rights Center of Maine and LearningWorks in Portland. She also ran Bellows & Company, a communications consulting firm.

After representing District 14 in the Maine Senate, she was selected by the State Legislature to serve as Maine's Secretary of State. She's the 50th person and the first woman—to serve as Maine's Secretary of State, a role that involves overseeing state elections as well as the Bureau of Motor Vehicles and the Maine State Archives.

WICASSET, ME (June 10, 2022) -- Wiscasset residents will be commemorating their first Juneteenth on Wiscasset's Common, Sunday, June 19, from 1 to 3pm, with an informal BYO picnic, music, and storytelling. In the tradition of Juneteenth celebrations around the country, it's a day of sharing stories and food, embracing loved ones, and never forgetting that the price of freedom is high and dear.

Juneteenth began in 1866, a year after federal troops marched into Galveston, Texas, announcing that all enslaved people were free. This was more

than two years after Abraham Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation, which declared that slaves in Confederate states would be free. The day became a 'Jubilee Day' of celebration by newly freed African Americans in Texas and, with migration, was quickly embraced in other states.

Juneteenth is now celebrated throughout the U.S. with family gatherings, prayer, music, and remembrance of the hard fought struggle for emancipation. In Maine, Juneteenth became an official state holiday in 2021, the same year the U.S. designated the day, June 19, a federal holiday. Both holidays are being celebrated in 2022 for the first time.

Everyone is welcome to come to the Common and celebrate our shared humanity together. Wiscasset Juneteenth attendees are encouraged to bring stories about heritage, pivotal moments, personal history, lost loved ones, new births, and whatever makes your heart full and for which you are grateful.

## Maine DOE Awards \$2.5 Million to Support Education Innovation

AUGUSTA, ME (June 9, 2022)—The Maine Department of Education (DOE) today awarded \$2.5 million in Rethinking Responsive Education Ventures (RREV) funding to support education innovation in twelve school administrative units (SAUs)

across Maine. These funds will be used to support educational research and design projects focused on alternative education strategies, interdisciplinary/ experiential learning, environmental stewardship, Wabanaki culture and heritage, outdoor education, and internship opportunities, as well as supporting unique approaches to remote learning.

Awardees for this third round of RREV funding include Lee Academy, Brunswick, Kennebunk in RSU 21, Maine Indian Education, Bath in RSU 1, Brewer, Belfast in RSU 71, MSAD 6 - Bonny Eagle, Bucksport in RSU 25. Falmouth. Searsport in RSU 20, and Kittery. The first round of RREV investments were made last fall, a second round in March, and total RREV investments now near \$6 million.

"RREV investments help fuel educational research and design and the innovation and creativity of Maine educators," said Education Commissioner Pender Makin. "We're excited to invest in these educator-led efforts to deepen student engagement through interdisciplinary learning, expand learning beyond the traditional classroom to include the outdoors and environmental stewardship, explore Wabanaki culture and heritage, expand alternative education strategies, and allow students to explore career paths that fuel their passions."

The Maine DOE was awarded \$16.9 million from the U.S. Department of Education's Rethink K-12 Education Models Funding. As one of 11 States to receive funding, Maine created RREV to support the work of visionary educators to develop innovative pilot programs around remote and outside of the classroom learning, including professional development and pilot design classes. Courses in innovative design process are available through several of Maine's public and private universities at no cost to Maine educators who wish to participate. In addition to the innovative pilot development classes, the Department is also offering asynchronous, innovative principles webinars which are available to all educators in self-paced, independent modules.

"RREV has not only helped us to reinvent how we deliver instruction but how we look at changing education as a whole," said Renita Ward-Downer, Director of Instruction in Brewer.

"Maine Indian Education's RREV pilot project will allow us to build a connected and immersive, community-based middle school experience that empowers students to always put first their Wabanaki knowledge," said Beth Clifford, Curriculum Coordinator for Maine Indian Education. "We are eager to develop placebased and project-based educational experiences that connect learning and communities to increase student engagement and academic outcomes, promote partnerships and collaboration, and deepen our understanding of the world around us. Wabanaki history, culture and life will be a core element of programming."

# Acadia Wilderness Lodge Opens for Inaugural Season

**TREMONT, ME** (May 20, 2022) – Acadia Wilderness Lodge officially opened for the season Thursday morning, with a ribbon cutting ceremony and tours of the grounds.

"This day has been a long time coming," said Kenya Hopkins, who owns Acadia Wilderness Lodge with her husband, James. "This idea hatched about five years ago, and we're so excited to be open and ready for guests."

The 2-acre resort includes 8 yurts, all of which are named and themed after elements associated with nature. The yurts have two bedrooms, a kitchen with a full size refrigerator, a living room space with a smart TV and gas fireplace, and individual outdoor cooking and seating areas with a gas grill and outdoor fireplace. There is also a full bathroom in each yurt, complete with luxury soaking tubs, and aromatherapy, hydrotherapy, and relaxation therapy products available. The village itself includes a community fire pit for guests at the lodge; a game area with ping pong, cornhole and other fun games; an apple orchard and a garden with fresh herbs.

## **CCAC Presents Outdoor Concerts from David Mallett & Mount Eerie**



BATH, ME (June 6, 2022) -- The Chocolate Church Arts Center (CCAC) will present two outdoor concerts in June

on the shipyard at the Maine Maritime Museum at 243 Washington Street in Bath.

On June 18, sing-

er-songwriter David Mallett will perform. In a career spanning four decades, Mallett has recorded 17 albums, and has written the classic American folk song "Garden Song (Inch by Inch, Row by Row)." Mallett has performed in clubs, concert halls and festivals across the US, Canada and Europe, and has appeared on numerous broadcasts, including NPR's A Prairie Home Companion. Known for his carefully written, poetic offerings, his body of work has provided material for an eclectic list of artists that includes Alison Krauss, Pete Seeger, Hal Ketchum, Emmylou Harris, John Denver, and the Muppets.

June 19 will be a show with Phil Elverum, who has released critically acclaimed music both as Mount Eerie and as The Microphones. Elverum, who hails from the Pacific Northwest town of Anacortes, is known best for his stunningly original and emotionally resonant music, from early tape experiments in the 1990's to the immersive "sound-diary" sound of The Microphones. His recordings represent just a portion of his artistic output, which has ranged from running a label and co-organizing festivals to self-publishing books, photography, and painting.

Elverum's music has been a favorite among critics and journalists for over a decade. Mount Eerie's 2017 album A Crow Looked At Me was written after the death of Elverum's wife (the artist

## **Goodwill Offers \$3 Furniture to Support Sustainability Work**

**NEW ENGLAND** (June 9, 2022) -- All furniture will be \$3 at Goodwill on Fridays starting June 10. The Furniture Friday deal will continue through September 30, during the nonprofit's busiest furniture donation season.

"Shoppers will get a great deal on nice furniture pieces, but there are other reasons for this deal - sustainability and employee safety," said Kossi Gamedah, Senior Vice President of Retail Operations. "Furniture is one of a few items we can't usually recycle. That means unsold furniture must go to landfills, which is the last thing we want. The \$3 price point isn't revenue-generating, but it helps the Earth, which is a huge part of why we made this decision."

The sustainability move will also cut transportation costs and the related fossil fuels because unsold furniture gets toted to the nearest Goodwill warehouse, where it has another chance to be sold for even steeper discounts, down to 25 cents.

June through September is furniture donation season for the local nonprofit. Furniture tends to be the largest, heaviest items at Goodwill. That means when a few donations of couches, tables and wardrobes come in, the back rooms of the store can fill quickly. By offering the furniture at [operational] cost, Goodwill hopes to



keep backrooms of stores clear and safe for all employees.

"We're incredibly grateful to this community for their continued support by donating their furniture, shirts, shoes and more," Gamedah said. "Revenue from stores funds Goodwill's mission to invest in people who need support achieving their work and life goals — including our own employees. We can't do it without these donations."

This move is one of many recent investments in

sustainability by Goodwill Northern New England. In January 2017, the Northern New England based nonprofit voluntarily banned single use plastic bags from its stores. In February 2021 it upgraded its fleet of tractor trailers to improve its transportation fuel efficiency and reduce its carbon footprint. In 2022 it announced a multi-year, 3-phased logistics and supply chain optimization initiative, which included replacing boxes and wood pallets with more durable materials to reduce waste.

Anthony was a professor and administrator at Bates College and his wife was a 1911 graduate of the college. When the Stanton Bird Club was formed 1919, it was named in memory of Professor Jonathan Stanton, who had been well-known throughout New England for his knowledge of birds.

Over the last two years, Thorncrag has been a resource for community members, young and old as people have coped with the pandemic. Families have found a place to relax and learn about nature by participating in the scavenger hunts provided, essential

From a child with mind control powers, to an amoeba struggling for life, to a cosmonaut cast helplessly adrift in outer space, this show presents original narrative with physical precision and deep feeling.

Through expert visual storytelling, *Magical Exploding Mime* transcends the need for speech altogether. The *Chicago Reader* called Evans's performances "ingenious, brain-teasing works." *Newcity* called the show a "showstopper piece," and named Evans one of its top 50 players.
