

BANGOR, ME (May 17, 2022) - Dirigo Reads, a program that aims to put a book in the hands of every Maine first grader each month during the school year by 2025, received a helping hand this month from associates at Kohl's.

Normally, Dirigo Reads works with vendors to direct ship books to about 1580 first graders throughout Maine at 51 different schools. Books for the month of June were generously donated by Disney Books. The donation meant that books will be shipped to schools from Dirigo Reads, which also involved sorting, packing, and labeling packages to go to each participating school throughout the

"We are incredibly thankful to work with vendors to direct ship books to schools," said Karen Cashman. "But when Disney Books stepped forward and offered to donate about 1580 books to this program, we couldn't pass it up. Dirigo Reads' mission is to improve the health and wellbeing of children in Maine through literacy and share a little optimism along the way. This is accomplished by giving first graders in participating schools a brand new book to keep during every month of the school year. By the time the school year is finished, first graders in each of these communities will have ten new books to add to - or start - their own home library. Over three school years, Dirigo Reads will have distributed more than 26,000 books to first graders in participating schools.



(June 10, 2022) -- What a school year it has been! Ups and downs, challenges and celebrations!

The 2021-22 School Year has had it all! But over this past year, we have had far more to celebrate than anything else here in the Gorham Schools!

Don't take my word for it...see it for yourself in the final set of pictures I've included (Since it is the last one, I shared twice as many pictures)! Pictures sure do say 1,000 words! Now on to the important updates!

UPDATED PRO-POSED FY 23 SCHOOL **BUDGET INFORMA-**TION

(After Town Council Vote on June 7)

It is always difficult to keep up with the proposed budget process this time of the year. On Tuesday night, the Town Council voted to reduce the School Committee's proposed FY 23 school budget by almost \$1.6 million dollars.

It certainly wasn't the best of possible outcomes, but it also was not the worst.

The proposed budget now stands at \$46,427,320.00 which is an overall expenditure increase of \$2,159,177 over FY 22 or a 4.9% overall increase in expenditures. This is <u>down</u> from the originally proposed FY 23 budget of an 8.46% increase.

As you know, the role of the School Committee is to make decisions, including budget decisions, that are focused on meeting the needs of the children of this community. I believe the School Committee did a tremendous job in putting together their FY 23 proposed budget that was passed on April 13 by a vote of 5-2 in favor.

The Town Council's role is to determine what level of funding the community of Gorham can bear. This is an equally important role, and one that at times can clash with the role of the School Committee to provide for the best interest of students. The Town Council listened intently to our budget presentations, and they asked great questions to better understand the core components of our proposed budget, but at the end of the day what they felt the community could bear was less than what the School Committee requested by that \$1.6 million dollars.

That same night, the School Committee then worked diligently to reduce specific items to meet this requirement. The reductions will have negative impacts, but the reductions have been made in a manner that minimizes these impacts to the best of our ability.

Although we may not "like" this revised budget, it is a budget that I believe is workable. It doesn't allow us to fully address the priorities we set out to accomplish in this process, but it does allow us to continue to move forward in meeting the needs of our students...just not as far forward as we had hoped.














MORE! AND

We have ten THREE pieces of pretty darn good news recently regarding expanding opportunities for our high school students to participate in extended learning opportunities (ELO's). The first I have already shared with you and was announced about 1 month ago. That is that the Gorham Schools received a three year grant in an amount of \$680,000.00 to expand pre apprentice and apprentice opportunities for our young adult learners ages 16-24 in four key areas:

- 1. CNA
- 2. CDL Drivers
- 3. Early Childhood instructors

Educator pathways (i.e. Educational technicians and teachers)

You'll be hearing more on this in the fall as we work with our partners (Gorham Adult Education, SMCC, USM, and others in this important work so stay tuned!

The second piece of good news was just announced on Monday of this week. It is good news that comes from what was opportunities they seek to learn! There is a little back story to this one so let me provide the context...

When students began signing up for courses at GHS this late winter and early spring, we had a very large number of our incoming junior class indicate that they wanted to participate in Career and Technical Education (CTE) learning opportunities at either Westbrook Regional Vocational Center (WRVC) or Portland Arts and Technology High School (PATHS). Our guidance counselors worked and worked and were able to "wheel and deal" to get many students into the programs they wanted, but at the end of the day we still had 35 juniors that we were unable to place in CTE programs at either WRVC or PATHS due to seat limitations. We quickly determined we needed to find another way to provide these students with meaningful workplace learning experiences that were credit bearing. An idea was born!

The vision entails enrolling these students into a semester long and/ or year long internship program that would allow

operated this kind of program for smaller numbers of students over the past two years, but now was clearly the time to take this work to the next level for our students. The biggest problem that needed to be solved was capacity! We needed to add staff to coordinate these programs and guide students in ensuring these experiences are meaningful, both for them and for their business mentors. We decided to apply for funding from the Maine Department of Education to expand our ELO programming. Extended Learning Opportunities (ELO's) is a large umbrella term that encompasses any credit bearing work place learning experience. This can range from internships to pre apprentice and apprenticeships to co-op programs and independent studies.

We were just notified on Monday that we received the grant award for \$250,000.00 a year for the next two years to kick start this program! We are so excited to be able to move in this direction and to find more opportunities for our students to experience meaningful, real world, authentic learning opportunities as a result! More to come on this as we prepare to open the 2022-23 school year!

The third piece of good news we just became aware of on Wednesday. The Maine Department of Education recently awarded the Jobs For Maine's Graduates (JMG) program a \$6 million dollar award at the state level. The goal of these funds requires that the state-wide JMG organization finds a way to pay

4,200 students each year a "paycheck" for 40 hours of work place learning experiences calculated to be \$500.00 per participating student. These hours can be earned in one week, or over the course of two weeks, or over the course of a whole year. Because of our strong relations with JMG and because of our successful Aspire Gorham program and the already existing infrastructures we have built here in Gorham to support increasing these authentic learning experiences for our students, JMG made the commitment to Gorham High School that EACH AND **EVERY MEMBER of next** year's Junior and Senior class will be eligible to receive this \$500.00 check payable directly to them as long as they can document these 40 hours. Not only that, but they further committed that the Junior and Senior classes for the following year (2023-24) will ALSO be receiving these direct payments for their workplace learning experiences! WHOOT WHOOT!

To be clear, this would issue each GHS Junior (about 200 students) and each GHS Senior (about 200 students) a direct payment for their workplace learning experiences in the amount of \$500.00 each for the next two years. That is an investment of \$200,000.00 each year DIRECTLY to our students!

INCREDIBLE!

All of this work aligns so very well with our Aspire Gorham program and our ultimate vision that eventually our See Superintendent, page 11

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Seniors Not Acting Their Age

Paddling Remote Ross Stream and the Allagash River Part One: Ross Stream

(June 11, 2022) -Remote, infrequently paddled, Ross Stream is a tributary of the Allagash River
that enters the iconic waterway from the west at Long
Lake. Chemquasabamticook is its Native American
name. Given the difficulty
I have spelling and pronouncing it, I'm begging
the pardon of my Wabanaki
ancestors and using Ross in
this narrative.

Paddling Ross has been on my bucket list for many years. Since there is no U.S. Geological Survey gauge on the stream, determining when there is adequate water for a trip is problematic. My source of information for the Allagash watershed is venerable outfitter Norm L'Italien, owner of Pelletier Camps in St. Francis. During our winter conversations, he predicted mid-May would likely be a good start time. A trip beginning May 16 was planned. When our group arrived at Pelletier Camps the evening before, Norm reported his inspection of Ross earlier in the day indicated it was at a good level to paddle. The trip was on.

When you're old, getting invited on exciting river trips is a concern. The antidote is to organize them yourself. I assembled a team of seven experienced paddlers that included my son, Adam, and a combination of seniors and youngsters. I easily qualified as the group's ancient mariner. We consisted of two tandem canoes, two solo canoes, and I paddled an expedition kayak, a concession to old age.

Earl, one of Norm's experienced shuttle drivers, transported us by van and trailer through a confusing labyrinth of logging roads to a bridge over Ross Stream on Poulin Road just a short distance downstream from the outlet of Ross Lake. We were thrilled to find sufficient water to meet our needs. The addition of sunshine

and light winds provided the perfect beginning for our journey.

From the outset, the narrow twisting stream was a delight to paddle. Initially, we navigated through a series of easy rapids to a section of slack water where the stream was jammed with debris in three locations. Our resolute band was able to forge through or around each impediment without the need to portage. Several miles of exhilarating rapids followed

Once entering calm water a few miles upstream of Clayton Lake, we started hunting for a reputed campsite near Kelly Brook. our intended destination for the night. Despite a determined effort, it was never located. Our progress was complicated by two confusing channels that didn't appear on our maps. Substantial exploration resulted. A benefit of our wanderings was sighting a cow moose and her calf, the first of several moose encounters during the voyage.

After reaching scenic Clayton Lake, we fought a strong headwind during our traverse to the outlet. Reentering Ross Stream, our search for an adequate campsite continued. A location that could accommodate six tents was finally discovered in a sparsely

wooded area on river left. Since the forecast called for heavy rain, an extensive tarp city was erected. The decision was a good one as rain soon began and continued through the night.

The precipitation ended during breakfast the following morning and skies gradually cleared. While launching from our improvised tent site, a large moose crossed the river just above us. Miles of entertaining whitewater followed to a dead water where the stream turned abruptly east. After a brief paddle, we joined Long Lake in the Allagash Waterway. My book, Maine Al Fresco: The Fifty Finest Outdoor Adventures in Maine relates the details of an expedition down Musquacook Stream, another significant tributary on the east side of the Allagash.

The rarest of all winds, a tailwind, helped propel us north to a superb campsite next to the remains of washed out Long Lake Dam. A steady gale provided an excellent opportunity to dry gear dampened by rain during the previous night. Two groups passed while we were establishing camp. One lined the whitewater descent where the dam once existed while the other plummeted through the sizeable waves.

Watching the excitement stimulated several in our group to spend time playing in the rapid created by the pitch. Despite a herculean effort, no one was able to surf the substantial wave at the top.

Forty-five miles remained on the Allagash Waterway. The water level was high and many more adventures were anticipated. Picturesque Round Pond was our goal for day three where we hoped to climb Round Pond Mountain if weather conditions permitted.



mailed to participants at no cost.



Maine Child Nutrition Programs Continue Beyond School Year

Augusta, ME (June **8, 2022)**—As the school vear comes to an end. Maine children can access nutritious meals through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Summer Food Service Program, administered by the Maine Department of Education (DOE). These meals are available at hundreds of sites across Maine and will be listed on the Maine DOE's Hot Lunch Summer website.

"No child should worry about going hungry when the school year ends," said Education Commissioner Pender Makin. "Hot Lunch Summer ensures that Maine children continue to receive the healthy, nutritious meals they rely on during the school year and we thank the schools and organizations that have stepped up to make the distribution of these meals possible."

The Summer Food Service Program may be offered statewide in areas or at sites where more than


50 percent of the children are eligible for free or reduced meal benefits under the National School Lunch Program or where census track data supports the need. Eligible sponsoring organizations include schools, nonprofit residential summer camps, government agencies, and tax-exempt organizations including faith-based organizations.

The Maine DOE launched a statewide ad campaign to raise awareness that the Summer Food Service Program exists and clearly explain the logistics of where, when, and how Maine children and adolescents can access complementary meals. The multi-media campaign includes a fun, original song entitled 'Hot Lunch Summer' for broadcast radio, an accompanying sing-along video in several lengths including a 30-second broadcast and streaming television ad, a series of colorful shareable



USDA Offering Nationwide Waiver for Infant Formula

D.C. (June 6, 2022) – The U.S. Department of Agriculture is offering nationwide waivers to increase access to infant formula for families in need as states receive and distribute imported infant formula made available by the Biden-Harris Administration's Operation Fly Formula.

USDA is leveraging new authority from the recently passed Access to Baby Formula Act to offer this flexibility.

"USDA is committed to providing our WIC families with nutritious foods, and while we continue working with our many partners to bring the infant formula shortages to a speedy conclusion, we're also going to keep looking for ways to help families here and now," said Stacy Dean, USDA's deputy undersecretary for food, nutrition, and consumer services. "We're maximizing flexibility, encouraging action, and providing ongoing support so we can all overcome this obstacle together."

The action builds on existing flexibilities to provide widest access to available infant formula for WIC families. Within days of the recall, USDA offered WIC state agencies waivers to maximize formula options for WIC participants and ensure they could exchange or return any recalled formula. To date, USDA has approved well over 250 state waiver requests.

In addition, Food and Nutrition Service recently encouraged state agencies to work with their infant formula manufacturers to identify and implement temporary flexibility in their contracts to allow WIC participants to purchase alternate sizes, forms, or

WASHINGTON, brands of infant formula during the ongoing shortage. North Carolina and its formula manufacturer, Nestle Gerber, are the first to have put this into action by agreeing to a contract modification that expands access to formula for WIC participants in the state.

> "When formula supply began to tighten, we looked at all avenues to ensure safe and nutritious options for North Carolina babies and families," said North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Kody H. Kinsley. "We immediately began working with our federal partners and with our contracted WIC manufacturer, Nestle Gerber, to give families in the WIC program the flexibility to choose different sizes, types and brands of formula during the shortage. We negotiated and implemented these changes as quickly as possible to relieve some of the stress that WIC-participating families felt."

> Food and Nutrition Service is encouraged by the action taken by North Carolina. "We are grateful for the leadership and teamwork of North Carolina and Nestle Gerber to increase formula access for WIC families in their state," said Dean. The agency recently shared best practices with WIC state agencies to help them establish contract flexibilities that will help WIC participants access the formula they need.

> USDA continues to work closely with HHS and FDA and the administration to support WIC families through this challenging time and to bring to a swift end to the shortage. Recent USDA actions include:

> Coordinating cross-government to rapidly

transport safe specialty formulas into the country for babies with special medical needs through Operation Fly Formula. More shipments, including regular formula, are on the way in the coming days.

Calling on states to take advantage of all available WIC flexibilities that could help those they serve. Since May 13, when USDA wrote to state health commissioners on this issue, more than 50 new waivers have been requested and approved, with all 50 states now offering at least one flexibility to help WIC families get the formula they need.

Engaging directly with WIC stakeholders including holding multiple listening sessions to better understand current needs and concerns.

USDA's Food and Nutrition Service leverages its 15 nutrition assistance programs to ensure that children, low-income individuals, and families have opportunities for a better future through equitable access to safe, healthy, and nutritious food, while building a more resilient food system. Under the leadership of Secretary Tom Vilsack, FNS is fighting to end food and nutrition insecurity for all through programs such as SNAP, school meals, and WIC. 

Crossing the Canadian Border this Summer

Press Release by the **Canada Border Services** Agency

ON-OTTAWA, **TARIO** (May 26, 2022) The Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) reminds US residents visiting Canada as part of Memorial Day long weekend of what to expect at the border during the busy summer months.

This summer, travelers are returning to a border that is managed differently, with evolving COVID-19 requirements, which can mean delays during peak periods. The CBSA is working to mitigate long border wait times, but there are also things that travelers can do to make the process easier for themselves and other travelers.

Travelers can help reduce wait times at the border by coming prepared and by completing their mandatory Arrive-CAN submission within 72 hours before arriving at the border.

The CBSA invests significant effort annually to plan and prepare for peak periods, such as the summer months. The Agency works with bridge and tunnel operators, airport authorities and travel nated with Government industry groups to plan and review service requirements, enhancement opportunities, and required resources, so that we can deliver together the best service to all travelers.

The CBSA has also established modern processes to improve the traveler experience and manage volumes, like the International-to-Domestic and the International-to-International programs that significantly decrease connection times, as well as the Primary Inspection Kiosks, and the advanced CBSA declaration option.

Key tips for all trav-

· Ensure you are eligible to enter Canada Foreign nationals must meet the entry requirements under the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act and provide appropriate travel and immigration documentation. The final determination on entry is made by a border services officer at the port of entry.

Understand rules around COVID-19. There are still border measures in place for COVID-19. Foreign nationals must be vacci-

Canadaaccepted COVID-19 vaccines. Find out which requirements apply to you and if you can enter Canada.

· Use Arrive-CAN. All travelers, regardless of vaccination status, are required to submit their information in ArriveCAN (free as a mobile app or by website), up to 72 hours before entering the Canada. ArriveCAN collects contact, health and travel information to protect the health and safety of travelers and expedite processing at the border. It is the fastest, easiest and most secure way for travelers to show they meet public health requirements.

Travelers must ensure they have the most up-to-date version of the ArriveCAN app (consult the Google Play Store or the App Store for iPhone.)

Travelers should print or take a screenshot of their ArriveCAN receipt and bring it with them when they travel.

· Travelers without a smartphone or without mobile data can submit their information by signing in online through a computing device. If travelers are unable to enter to declare all goods in their their information themselves, they can have a friend or family member enter the information for

· Have all your documents ready. Travelers should have the following ready to present to the border services officer: their ArriveCAN receipt; passport or travel documents. proof of vaccination; and identification for all persons in the vehicle.

Plan ahead and border check times. Travelers crossing the border by land are encouraged to plan to cross during non-peak hours such as early morning.

· Entering Canada by water. Unless exempt, all travelers entering Canada by water, must report their arrival to the CBSA without delay. All travelers, including those with a right of entry (Canadian citizens, permanent residents and persons registered under the Indian Act), must submit their mandatory information in ArriveCAN before, or when, entering Canada at a marine port of

Be prepared to declare. Travelers entering Canada should be ready couver (YVR) may use

possession.

· Declare any foods, plants, or animals such as raw poultry products and by-products that are not fully cooked, to the border services officer. There are currently restrictions on imports of live birds, bird products and by-products from states affected by Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in the United States. Be sure to check the Automated Import Reference System to help determine all specific import requirements.

· Declare all money or currency of CAN\$10,000 or more. It is not illegal to bring such amounts into Canada, but it must be declared on arrival.

Cannabis. Don't bring it in. Don't take it out. Transporting cannabis across the border in any form, including any oils containing tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) or cannabidiol (CBD) remains a serious criminal offence subject to arrest and prosecution, despite the legalization of cannabis in Canada.

Advance Declaration. Air travelers landing in Toronto (YYZ) or VanArriveCAN (Web version) to complete their customs and immigrations declaration in advance of their arrival in Canada. This feature will be expanded to other airports in the future.

· Know the contents of your vehicle. Travelers can consult the CB-SA's website for information on firearms and other restricted and prohibited goods.

· Use the latest technology. Upon arrival at selected major airports in Canada, travelers can use a primary inspection kiosk to verify their travel documents, confirm their identity and complete an on-screen declaration.

· Children. When travelling with children, it is recommended that the accompanying adult have a consent letter authorizing them to travel with the child. Border services officers are always watching for missing children, and in the absence of the letter, officers may ask additional questions, to help them identify the relationship between the child and the accompanying adult.

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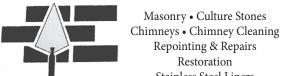


