Set on a quiet landscape in Lower Frederick Township, Montgomery County, near historic Schwenksville, you will find the picturesque St. Mary Catholic School.

St. Mary has served the surrounding Perkiomen Valley and beyond for over 60 years. What began as a simple K-8 elementary school has grown into an Educational Center, providing preschool for 3- and 4-year-olds through Agnus Dei Academy, as well as evening Catholic education through P.R.E.P (Parish Religious Education Program).

The parish school has gone through many changes, with the 2021-2022 school year being no exception. St. Mary opened its doors to in-person learning for the 2021-2022 school year, continuing to navigate the ever-changing recommendations during the pandemic while keeping exceptional education at its helm.

In September 2021, the United States Department of Education announced that St. Mary earned the honor of being a national Blue Ribbon school.

This recognition "affirms the hard work of educators, families and communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging and engaging content," a media release from the department said.

St. Mary also was named a school of Distinguished Instruction by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. The year's accolades were completed with the reaccreditation from Middle States Commission on Higher Ed-

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



In fact, research by Stanford scholars, whose data was published in Psychological Science, found that applying a strategic approach to studying helped college students improve their exam scores by an average

The testing preparation resource PrepScholar says it is important to build and maintain strong study habits to help students avoid undue stress and lastminute cramming.

The following are seven techniques that may help foster good study skills.

1. Find value in the lessons

2. Avoid distractions

5. Use grades as benchmarks and motivators

Blaming a teacher for a poor grade won't get a student anywhere.

Rather, grades should indicate how well one is learning the material, and in turn, the effectiveness of students' studying habits.

Students can tweak their habits if they find their grades are not where they want them to be.

6. Rephrase material

Textbook language can be dry and unappealing.

Students can try putting the material into their own words or rephrase passages to make them easier to remember and recall.

Similarly, teaching or sharing the material with another person also may improve retention.

7. Make a formula sheet

Depending on the subject, having a sheet with shortcuts, formulas or diagrams can put the material into smaller bursts of information that are easier to digest.

Along this same vein, writing information down can help improve recall.

How music and arts programs benefit academic performance of students

The cost of products and services continues to rise, and organizations everywhere have increasingly been feeling the pressure to reevaluate budgets.

It's no different in school

districts nationwide, with school boards making difficult decisions about which programs to keep and which will have to go in order to save money. Music and arts programs often are the first to be cut when school budgets are tightened.

Music says that during the 2009, per-pupil spending in public schools decreased by approximately 7% across the country. This led to a trickle- included down effect that resulted in the cancellation of art and music programs.

Since then, many districts have continued to cut arts programs due to budget limitations. COVID-19 also did little to help the situation. Art program cutbacks are rarely met with open arms, and that resistance has a lot to do with the positive effects such offerings have on students' academic performance.

Better test performance

Numerous studies have found a correlation between early introduction to music education and a number of benefits for children.

Music education can help develop communication skills, brain plasticity, language and motor skills. A study conducted by the University of California, Los Angeles used a database of more than 25,000 middle and high school students. The researchers found that students involved in arts performed better on standardized achievement tests than students with lower arts involvement.

Furthermore, data from 2015 from The College Board, which produces the SAT, found students who took four years of arts and music classes while in high school scored an average of 92 points higher on their SATs than students who only took onehalf year or less.

Improved emotional states

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

Community involvement

Participation and even appreciation of the arts can have an impact as well.

Researchers from the Department of Public Administration at the University of Illinois Chicago found that being an art curator or audience member leads to high levels of civic engagement and social tolerance.

The support and therapy company Evolve Treatment Centers reports that involvement in music and arts leads to overall higher GPAs, higher scores in math and reading and a reduced greater risk of behavioral problems
