submittal for our review. Once the project has been reviewed and all reviews are complete, including the CEQA review, the project will be scheduled for hearing. Since it has been six months since the last review letter, there is no estimated timeline for the hearing at this point."

Along with the knowledge test, there is also an interactive eLearning course option for those who need to renew their license and have trouble with exams or prefer an alternative learning method. The eLearning course is approximately 45 minutes and is currently only available in English.

# Q1: Can I take the online drivers test on my mobile device?

A1: No, the test cannot be taken on a tablet or a mobile device. You will need to take the online test on an internet-enabled computer or a laptop with a webcam. You can begin the online exam between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding state holidays. For identity verification and as a fraud prevention measure, online test participants are required to verify their identity and agree to be monitored throughout the exam.

# Q2: How many times can I attempt = the online driver's test?

A2: The test can be attempted

online twice. If you fail to pass the test after two tries, you will be prompted to go to a DMV office to take the test a third time.

# Q3: What happens after I take my online knowledge test or eLearning course?

A3: Customers with a testing requirement for their license must still go to an office after completing one of the online options to provide the required identity and residency documents, take a photo, provide a thumbprint, complete a vision screening, and be issued a licensing document.

sure that with time, gas prices will eventually return to normal (in maybe 8-16 months), our city needs to address this issue nonetheless because oil shocks are nothing new to our economy and will continue to happen in the future. I believe that San Jose should start taking steps now to improve infrastructure for pedestrians, bikers, etc., and should focus on trying to decrease urban sprawl.

San Jose has been a prime example of poor city planning, with spaced-out housing miles away from where people work. This means that it's almost impossible to travel distances without a car. For people traveling to work or school, owning an expensive vehicle is not an option; not to mention all of our roads are prioritized for cars and not other forms of transport. I think that our city should start with two main changes to combat the reliance on cars:

- 1. Change the zoning of our city to prevent further urban sprawl. This also includes building more compact housing closer to the city. This decreases the amount of time people spend on the road since their commute is shorter, and thus decreases traffic.
- 2. Prioritize bike, bus, and pedestrian infrastructure. This means repainting bike lanes to make them safer, installing more sidewalks, implementing more bus stops, making more rentable electric bikes/scooters, etc. It's not currently very safe to ride your bike to work, so clearer bike lanes would solve this problem.
- 3. These two changes are a great start to solving our problem.

# San Jose sees rising property values despite economic woes

he value of taxable properties in San Jose skyrocketed last year thanks to demand for luxury homes and new construction. However, experts and county officials say the growth won't last.

At the heart of wealthy Silicon Valley, the assessed value of all property grew by \$15 billion over the last 12 months—a jump from \$215.9 billion to \$231 billion. In Santa Clara County, the value has reached a record-breaking \$619.9 billion, according to county data. That's a \$43 billion increase over the prior year, demonstrating the COVID-19 pandemic's economic impact has limited reach.

Changes of home ownership and new commercial construction continue to be the greatest drivers of growth in the region, Santa Clara County Assessor

Larry Stone told San José Spotlight. New construction in the county contributed \$5.9 billion to the total increase last year. Changes in home ownership contributed \$24.5 billion—nearly half of the total increase—in the region. In San Jose, residential assessments accounted for \$9.9 billion of the total increase, while commercial properties contributed \$5.1 billion

The county's assessment roll, which contains nearly 500,000 properties ranging from boats and airplanes to commercial buildings, is revalued every year.

"In Silicon Valley, the luxury home market has been on fire particularly," Stone said. "On the commercial side, it was primarily new construction and major (tech) companies building and leasing spaces."





# **Crossing San Jose streets may become less dangerous**

ne of San Jose's most dangerous roads will receive multi-million-dollar funding from the state to reduce accidents and fatalities.

The city is receiving \$10 million in state funding to install more street lights, build out bike lanes and other protective measures around Senter Road. The 4.7-mile stretch from Monterey Road to Story Road ranks sixth in terms of traffic accidents, with more than 570 accidents since 2016. During this period dozens have been seriously injured and killed.

State Assemblymember Ash Kalra, who represents part of the city's East Side, advocated for the \$10 million for fiscal year 2022-23. The funding will add concrete medians and partitions for bike lanes, enhanced crosswalks with flashing beacons and better street lights. It also includes a new traffic light at Senter Road and Balfour Drive to simplify the complex intersection,

and new signage and additional radar speed signs on other streets.

District 7 Councilmember Maya Esparza said for years, residents have been asking for more street lights, better signals and additional protections for bike lanes and that's what this money provides.

"We've had some just really heartbreaking accidents on Senter," Esparza told San José Spotlight. "You have the elderly crossing the street with children. You can see moms out there with strollers, so that's why the urgency to do something immediately was there."

During the last decade, San Jose traffic deaths more than doubled from 29 in 2010 to 60 in 2021. Last year was a record high with 60 deaths and 2022 is on track to beat this number with 36 deaths to date.

Senter Road is the first major safety corridor redesign project in San Jose that has been prioritized through the city's 2020 Vision Zero Action Plan, Kalra said. San Jose adopted the Vision Zero initiative in 2015

to analyze traffic data and develop safety programs after 60 traffic fatalities occurred that year. In 2018, the city identified 17 of its most dangerous corridors — seven of the streets run through District 7.

"The proposed improvements will make this corridor safer and more amenable for all street users," Kalra wrote in his budget letter request. "Especially for the city's disadvantaged communities that live and work in this area of San Jose."

Data analyzed by San José Spotlight found those roads account for more than 70% of all traffic-related deaths last year. District 7 had the most fatalities with 16. The deaths occurred along Monterey and Story roads, McLaughlin Avenue, Capitol Expressway and Tully and Senter roads.

The city has funded temporary, quick-build infrastructure solutions to make streets safer. On Senter Road, the city spent under \$1 million to paint the intersections and put green balls and plastic barriers in place to force drivers to slow down. These efforts saw traffic death and serious injuries along Senter Road drop from 15 in 2020 to five in 2021, according to city data.

Esparza said while that was a notable improvement, she is ecstatic to see a much larger investment on the East Side.

"This \$10 million is to serve people that are already there in the heart of San Jose," Esparza said. "It's not to serve a new project. It's not to build new development. It's to do right by the people who live in the heart of our city. And that's what's different about this project. It's the equity part of it."

The redesign of Senter Road has a \$30 million price tag, but the \$10 million allows the city to move forward and qualify San Jose to apply for additional grants. Typically, money for transportation projects is doled out only when there is new redevelopment, which is why this investment is noteworthy, Esparza said.

"Nothing's real in transportation until you have money," Esparza said. "Now that we do, we are literally applying for more grants this month."

By August, the city will release the timeline for the Senter Road corridor safety improvement project. It's unclear how long the build out will take.

# You might see more beat cops in San Jose neighborhoods

an Jose is ready to bring back police foot patrols to address rising safety concerns and build truct with and build trust with residents, a service that has not gotten consistent funding for decades.

The City Council unanimously approved a proposal from Mayor Sam Liccardo last month to fund 16 police to patrol San Jose streets. The program, which costs nearly \$3.7 million, is part of the mayor's efforts to rebuild the police department.

The program will add four permanent foot patrol officers to each police division in the city—with the focus on the downtown core, dense residential neighborhoods and business corridors. SJPD has four divisions, including central/downtown, Foothill, South-

"Thanks to this year's budget, for the first time in decades, San Jose will have dedicated walking beats in every police district, and added foot patrols to high crime areas and downtown focused on street outreach, renewing our commitment to community policing in San Jose," Liccardo said.

The San Jose Police Department is the most thinly-staffed law enforcement department of any major U.S. metropolis, city officials said. The chronic staffing shortages in the department have intensified over the past decade from budget cuts. Increases in population and calls for service have also resulted in rising demand for police.

Police officials and residents hope the program will help law enforcement build relationships with the communities they serve, further advancing community-based policing.

"Foot patrols are significant because, by design, they are made to interact on a face-to-face basis with community members, local businesses and visitors to the area," SJPD spokesperson Steve Aponte told San José Spot-

San Jose expects the new officers to start patrolling in a year, as hiring and training will take at least 12 months, Aponte said. The city will rely on current officers to pilot the program this year. The City Council budgeted \$900,000 in overtime funding to accommodate this first year need.

The funding also includes \$632,000 to purchase eight patrol vehicles, \$186,192 in equipment for the new officers and \$67,536 for other supplies, budget documents show.

# A game-changer for downtown

Councilmember Dev Davis, who has long called for more police officers, said the captains of each division will decide where officers will patrol on foot. The city also has plans to use data to prioritize high crime areas.

"When we have done walks with SJPD in the past, in our business corridors, they are always very well received," Davis told San José Spotlight. "It's really a way to get the community and the police department working together and to understand each other."

Downtown leaders and residents are excited about the foot patrol program, calling it long overdue. The issue came to a boiling point in April after an unhoused person assaulted a San Jose Downtown Association worker while cleaning graffiti.

Downtown San Jose's recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic has also been grim and economically lagging, a new city report shows. Months-long shelter-in-place orders led longtime businesses to close. With tech workers still working remotely, restaurants and bars continuing to suffer, and people are not comfortable walking downtown, a neighborhood association leader said.

This is going to be a significant change for the downtown core," Elizabeth Chien-Hale, president of the San Jose Downtown Residents Association, told San José Spotlight. "I don't think downtown is going to be revived until we can promise people that it is clean and safe."

Businesses don't want to move into downtown because of safety issues, Chien-Hale added. She hopes the city will dedicate more officers in the downtown core.

Scott Knies, CEO of the San Jose Downtown Association, said the business group has been hiring SJPD officers to walk the downtown core prior to the program. He's disappointed the city will have to wait a year for foot patrols to be fully implemented.

'We're really optimistic that the level of interaction with the community will increase with the foot patrol concept," Knies told San José Spotlight, adding he hopes to see more collaboration between the Santa Clara County Sheriff's Office and San Jose State campus police as well. "I just wish we could (start) the services up quicker."

### Challenges ahead

Tom Saggau, spokesperson for the San Jose Police Officers' Association, is skeptical of the program, citing the city's issue with hiring and retaining police officers.


"We feel a little bit frustrated because it always sounds good on paper, but where are these bodies gonna come from?" Saggau told San José Spotlight, adding he worries the city will cut back on other services to prioritize foot patrols.

District 3 Councilmember Raul Peralez, representing downtown, said the city has improved its retention issue and is working to hire new officers for the program.

"We're not losing them at the same rate that we were five years ago, but hiring has gotten more challenging indeed," Peralez told San José Spotlight. "It's a reality that we may not be fully prepared to permanently staff these new 16 positions next year."







# San Jose State track proposal for fairgrounds

proposed track and field at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds may return a university to former glory.

Assemblymember Ash Kalra requested \$25 million from the state Legislature for a San Jose State University Speed City Legacy Center and Track and Field Training Facility. The Legislature approved \$4 million in the 2022-23 fiscal year budget. The 9-acre project will be a partnership with Santa Clara County and San Jose State University at the fairgrounds.

The facility gets its name from the university's track team, known as Speed City, after several of its athletes competed in the 1968 Olympics. Two of the medal winners, Tommie Smith and John Carlos, raised their fists during the awards ceremony in protest of racism and human rights violations. This iconic moment initiated the Olympic Project for Human Rights and is captured in a statue on the SJSU campus.

Kalra would like to see a center for social justice programming and services for the underserved as part of the track and field project.

"By funding the Speed City Legacy Center... we can use the framework of restorative justice to create a dynamic home to keep the legacy and values of Speed City and the Olympic Project for Human Rights alive," he said in a statement.

This isn't the only sports-related work planned at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds. The county wants to create a variety of recreational opportunities at the site, and has lease agreements with the San Jose Earthquakes for a soccer academy and Major League Cricket for a 15,000-person stadium on 14 acres of the fairgrounds.

Santa Clara County entered into a nocost exclusive negotiating agreement with SJSU in April to study the feasibility of leasing the parcel for the Speed City project. The contract runs until April 2023. During this time, SJSU will determine the potential costs and revenue for the project, provide design and planning details, develop a community engagement plan and development agreement and propose a lease for board review.

The facility, located in an unincorporated part of the fairgrounds just south of Franklin Elementary School, would also be open for public use.

Kenneth Mashinchi, spokesperson for SJSU, said the efforts by Kalra and Supervisor Cindy Chavez to secure funding for the Speed City project are appreciated.

"The funding from the state budget is held by Santa Clara County," he told San José Spotlight. "We look forward to our continued partnership with the county regarding the funding and how it could be

# **Contactless Payments**

ave you ever stumbled into a conversation where everyone is speaking around this "techie" word – and even after you've broken in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words:

### **Contactless Payments**

Have you simply tapped your credit card to a terminal to buy a coffee, doughnut, or slice of pizza?

Merchants like Visa, Mastercard have rolled out the technology to make contactless cards a reality. The successful rollout of EMV chip cards has proven that consumers are willing to adapt to new ways to use credit cards.

### How do they work?

They come embedded with chips and a near-field communication – or NFC – antenna. When consumers are ready to check out, they tap their contactless cards to a point-of-sale terminal. The card communicates with the chip terminal through radio waves. Contactless cards come with enhanced security, too. The cards generate a unique cryptogram with every transaction, making it more difficult for thieves to steal data.

Today's EMV cards, in which consumers must dip their cards into a reader, can take up to 30 seconds to close a transaction. Contactless cards can complete the same transaction in 13 to 15 seconds, thus making them a viable option.

Contactless payments are not just in the form of contactless credit cards! They can be in the form of key fobs, smart cards or mobile wallets using de-

vices like smartphones that use RFID (radio-frequency identification) or NFC (near-field communication). So how do mobile wallets work?

The NFC technology enables mobile wallet apps to link the secure credit card information which is stored in your mobile device to the connected payment terminal. Therefore, all you must do is open the app that contains your credit card information and move it in front of the terminal.


In addition, this app can be used for managing your finances by tracking your spending and signing up for digitized receipts and purchase notifications. Finally, it can help you store data on your phone, improve mobile shopping experience and make better spending decisions. Examples include Apple Pay, Samsung Pay, and Google Pay etc.

Apparently, there are numerous technology discoveries around contactless payments that can not only improve security, but also make the entire payment process more convenient and faster. Some of these methods are simple and straightforward, while others are ambiguous and more difficult to grasp.

As the technology gains acceptance, nontraditional banking institutions and third-party payment providers such as PayPal have begun to experiment with ways to improve frictionless check-out. For example, some payment providers are exploring ways that GPS technology can be added to help mobile customers locate financial services, such as ATMs, or opt into loyalty promotions conducted through targeted geofenced campaigns.

# The solace of citrus

### By Matthew Frazier

n the fifteen years I worked in retail and wholesale garden centers and nurseries,

▲ I enjoyed the spoils of my efforts to care for and promote plants which were both aesthetically pleasing and environmentally conscientious.

The very first nursery I worked in had eight consultants/salespersons of which I was one, where I was assigned to care for the owner's and manager's citrus, ornamental trees, and vines.

# The collector's corner

I enjoyed the experience of caring for each and all of the plants, even the ones in The

Collectors' Corner. There was something alluring about the citrus which set them apart from all other live goods on the property.

As the sun would set, the plethora of colors would glow in the waning light and accentuate the nuances of each and every item in the spaces. The citrus were both shrubs and trees. Their spectrum of oranges and yellows from the fruits and the greens from the foliage were something to witness.

### Fragrance

The citrus have different flowering and fruiting periods, depending on the variety. One thing they had in common ... The aroma of the blossoms eclipsed all other features. The fragrance drew native pollinators including our very own native bees. Standing immediately outside of the gravel beds where they resided, I took in the smell while reminiscing about the day's events.

There are many varieties of citrus, as one will come to learn with some reading and studying. There are dwarf, semi-dwarf, and standard versions of most varieties. The dwarf limes were among our favorites. The sharp contrast of tart flavor against the sweet smell of the blossoms was one very noted feature.

In the two years and one month I worked at this nursery, I introduced hundreds of customers to the gallery of citrus which were my personal pride for which to care. Staging the black plastic pots symmetrically on a grid which was equidistant from all angles and sides caught the attention of passersby.

# ${\bf Citrus\ can\ ward\ off\ nuisance\ insects}$

One little-known advantage of citrus rinds

is that they contain an enzyme which will ward off nuisance insects when grated with a culinary or a wood rasp. I have concocted home-made repellents using citrus rinds, dating back to when I worked at this nursery and beyond.


One challenge with caring for frost-tender varieties is that they must be covered with burlap as the sun goes down, to protect it from the cold air which settles by night. When the sun rises and the dew begins to

vaporize, the image is at once cinematic and mesmerizing.

Regardless of whether you visit a garden center/nursery, a hardware store, or a home improvement center to purchase your plants ... You will be well-advised to visit the citrus section. The scene and the scent invoke solace among other positive emotions.

Citrus like well-draining soils. I have seen them in a wide variety of soil mediums including nitrified redwood dust and sand. The composition and texture of the soil

medium has much to do with the drainage efficiency of the citrus. I have found that the best is an aggregate of small-particle sand and nitrified redwood dust.



If your landscape or yard has full sun most of the day ... Citrus is a strong candidate. They can even handle brutal mid-day summer sun if irrigated correctly and efficiently. Irrigating at night is best in late spring and summer, I have found. The irrigation contractor I have mentioned in past articles says 9pm, 12am, and 3am, two nights per week in summer.

With the raging mega drought in Santa Clara Valley and throughout California, there is no better time to introduce this gem to your property. For areas of the land-scape or yard which are battered by brutal mid-day sunlight ... Few better options exist.

### Seek out citrus

To conclude: I strongly encourage you each and all to visit your local retail garden center or nursery and seek out the citrus. I am confident you will find one or more varieties which speak to your desires. Thank you for your time in reading this article.

# California's water saving target missing in action

Tater usage numbers released last week show that Californians continue to miss conservation targets by a large margin.

The state is currently in a severe drought (97%) and (59%) in an extreme drought, the third and fourth most severe of five drought categories.

Last July, Governor Newsom declared a drought emergency and asked California residents to voluntarily cut urban water use by 15% compared with 2020 levels. The emergency request has fallen on deaf ears.

Northern Californians reduced consumption by 8.5% in May, Southern California regions fell far short at just 2.2% and dragged the statewide reduction in use to 3.1% compared with May 2020.

Will Governor Newsom's threatened crackdown in upcoming, mandatory conservation targets for each city take place? Some say it is similar to what former Gov. Jerry Brown imposed



during California's last drought.

Newsom spokeswoman Erin Mellon called the May numbers a positive trend but said more needs to be done. "Individuals and California businesses need to step up," Mellon said.

### Two day limit

In May, Newsom told the agencies to step up outreach and education efforts to communicate the urgency of the crisis to the public. A few weeks later, the state water board required most cities and water districts to limit outdoor watering to two days a week and ban the irrigation of "nonfunctional turf," or grass at office parks and industrial sites, but not at schools, parks or golf courses.

# San Jose Airport gets funding for disability upgrades

raversing San Jose's airport will get easier for people with disabilities thanks to future accessibility upgrades.

The Federal Aviation Administration is allocating \$10 million toward improving accessibility at Mineta San Jose International Airport, Congressmember Zoe Lofgren said in a statement last week. The funding is part of a bipartisan infrastructure package providing \$25 billion in total to airports over five years, of which \$1.5 billion will likely go to California airports.

"Americans with disabilities should be able to travel and access airport amenities fully and equally," Lofgren said. "I supported the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act to upgrade our infrastructure in California and nationwide. These funds will help improve Mineta San Jose International Airport and ensure it is accessible to everyone in our community."

A 2018 study conducted by Jensen Hughes, an outside firm hired by the San Jose airport, found 1,760 accessibility issues. Though the airport is involved in a larger accessibility overhaul that includes exterior improvements, the federal funds will support work inside the two terminals. Potential changes include lowering flight information display screens to be more visible to people with limited vision, adding

low railings for travelers who navigate spaces with a cane and adjusting ramp slopes. Work is scheduled to begin later this year.

Representatives with the San Jose Peace & Justice Center, Disability Rights California, Parents Helping Parents and the Silicon Valley Independent Living Center did not respond to requests for comment.

Airport spokesperson Scott Wintner told San José Spotlight the proposed changes are mostly small adjustments to bring facilities up to code, but will have a major impact.

"If the slope of a surface is a degree or two off, people who have full mobility might not notice. But for someone in a wheelchair, it might make a big difference." he said.

Director of Aviation John Aitken thanked Lofgren in a statement for her advocacy and support of the airport.

"This grant will support improvements that are core to our mission of making travel through Mineta San Jose International Airport easy and efficient for all travelers," Aitken said.

This is the most recent effort to address accessibility at the airport. In December 2020, SJC began its Sunflower Lanyard initiative, which allows travelers to subtly indicate to airport workers that they have a disability. In March of this year, it briefly piloted the use of autonomous wheelchairs, though officials have not yet decided whether to pursue this as a long-term option.

"As an airport, one of our unique features is that we're easy to get in and out of," Wintner said. "We want that to be true not just for people who enjoy being able to park close to the terminal, or have a short walk to the gate, but also for all people—regardless of accessibility challenges they may face."
