Back to School Event in Annapolis Gives Parents a Hand with Free Hair Styling

A well-groomed child may become more confident and eager to walk through the doors of a school on the first day, but adults who feel the economic sting of inflation may struggle to budget for a student's haircuts and hairstyles. Covering the expense may be even more challenging, especially for low-income families.

Diesha Contee is an Annapolitan who understands that hair styling may not appear on a class supply list, but it is a school-related cost that often sparks budgetary concerns for parents. Contee is an active community volunteer who is helping fellow Annapolitans worry a little less about issues like these during the pandemic.

"I was thinking of ways that I can help with what would be beneficial to the children, so I thought of a braidathon because a lot of people weren't able to send their kids back with their hair done, so that's what really made me go that route. Now I added the barbers in for the little boys," Contee said. "Last year we were able to service 85 children."

This year, braiders are volunteering to braid hair for youth at the event, or at another scheduled time in a home setting. Most braiders hail from Annapolis. A few barbers will be traveling from Baltimore to lend a hand.

"I have 27 braiders, two locticians, and I should have two or three barbers," Contee said, referring to the next braidathon event.

Contee even thought of approaching businesses she patronizes to thank volunteer braiders with gifts of gratitude last year, such as a free massage or facial. Boys and girls who were waiting for their hair braiding appointment could also engage in activities, or eat, in addition to adults who provided their generous gifts of talent, time, and desire to give back by helping children prepare for school.

The idea to bringing the hair grooming resource to Annapolis arose because Contee noticed that some individuals in Baltimore hosted braiding events at any time. She felt that hosting a back-to-school braidathon event would be beneficial, so she implemented her idea with a twist.

On August 28, 2022, from 10 a.m. -8 p.m., a second Braid-A-Thon will be held at the American Legion, located 1707 Forest Dr., in Annapolis, Md., for first to twelfth graders. Participating children must arrive with washed and blow-dried hair, upon arrival. Braiders will provide free cornrow and feed-in styles. Barbers will assist boys with grooming needs by providing their haircuts. All students who want their hair braided or cut must be signed up in advance. Attendees must wear masks at the event.

Contee has a passion to help other families and individuals during holidays and throughout the year. She cooks, provides holiday baskets, hosts Easter egg events, and has provided other school-related events in the past.

"I'm from Annapolis, so I really care about [people] here," Contee said. "It's so many people have children, but they don't have the capacity to really pour into the kids to nurture them, and just be there or do things with them on a physical level."

Contee, who is a mother herself, stays busy working multiple jobs for

several organizations as a community navigator and caring for son. It does not deter her from giving back and mobilizing others to get things done.

Curtis Jones, Post Commander of the American Legion Cook-Pinkney Post 141, has supported Contee by providing event space there. Contee credits him with "welcoming her with open arms" and "never asking for a dollar from her."

Jemia Jamison is a fellow parent who has been assisting Contee with on-site event set up and donations. The mother also began helping Contee. She mentioned that some braiders attempt to accommodate the kind of preferred style a child likes. As a result, youth often leave the event feeling satisfied.

"I thought it [the braidathon] was a very good idea because a lot of people in the Black community struggle as far as getting their kid's hair done on time because of financial issues," Jamison said.

Donated supplies such as hair mousse; rattail combs; large hair clips; beads; rubber bands; pre-stretched braiding hair; sandwiches; and other items are being accepted. Bill Russell: A black man

William Fenton Russell passed away peacefully Sunday, July 31, 2022, in Seattle. Mark off 88 years old for the brother. They called him Bill Russell. As a child, Uncle Walker took his son George and me to see Philadelphia's legend, Wilt Chamberlain of the Philadelphia Warriors, play the vaunted Boston Celtics, starring Bob Cousy and Bill Russell in that order, at Philly's Convention Hall.

Uncle Walker, a mailman by trade, a renaissance man by life (painterartist, sign painter, book reader, black historian, activist), who barely finished 8th grade, loved Bill Russell but hated the Celtics.

How odd to love Bill and hate the team for which he played, George and I whispered to ourselves as a youth.

Racism filled Boston off of the basketball floor but not on the court. The Celtics reigned supreme. Most of the time, Boston beat the stew out of the Warriors and Wilt. Philadelphia and Boston were in the same division. I learned why Malcolm X underlined up South and down South in his speeches. All of it is South of the Canadian border. He emphasized the U.S.—but Canada has its racism issues as well. They lynched us in the South, and we suffered in the North— under the racism and complex low wage, paying dirty work too. My aunt Elizabeth, a union person, was a great comforter, especially when the Warriors lost to Bill Russell and Boston.

Russell exuded blackness through his dignified, respectful manner and "I am a man mentality" that demanded that respect. He did not sign autographs for Boston fans mainly because, at the time, too many whites in the Boston area did not want Bill and his family living next to them. His father and family moved from West Monroe, Louisiana, to Oakland, California, as part of the Great Migration. In Louisiana, his family was subjected to savage racism, imprinting Russell's attitude towards racism. He was a black man, not negro, in the United States of America who played professional basketball. Russell's blackness meant something to him. You know the difference.

He won 11 straight and 12 out of 13 NBA championships and served as the first black NBA coach. Russell, known for his tenacious defense and shot blocking, changed the NBA forever. As an unlikely recruit to the University of San Francisco, Russell helped win two collegiate championships and a gold medal in the summer Olympics of 1956. He commentated for several years.

Former President Barak Obama presented Mr. Russell with the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2011 for his accomplishments in the Civil Rights Movement, both on and off the court. Among other things, he stood up with Mohammad Ali and worked with Dr. King. Most of all, Bill Russell was a black man in the USA when most of us were called negros.

Editor: Western Drought Causing Water Shortage

The drought in the Western U.S. has been accelerating for 20 years and the water supplied by the Colorado River to two major reservoirs has decreased to near record low levels. Lake Mead is at 28% capacity and Lake Powell is at 27% capacity.

About 40 million people in Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming, Arizona, California and Nevada rely on this water supply. Next year significant cuts will have to be made to the water supplied to these states.

Climate change has worsened drought conditions in the Western U.S. Average temperatures have increased 2 to 3 degrees Fahrenheit in recent years. In Phoenix, the hottest city in the U.S., the average Summer temperature has increased 3.8 degrees since 1970. Phoenix is trying to lessen the heat impact by planting tree canopies, expanding the light-rail system and painting roadways white.

A combination of actions is necessary to lessen the impact of the drought, including a reduction in greenhouse gas emissions, increased use of renewable energy sources and conservation and rationing of water. Studies should be conducted to evaluate the feasibility of transporting water from the oceans and major rivers by pipeline and constructing more desalination plants.

It appears that we continue to live in Charles Dickens' "A Tale of Two Cities." He wrote these words: "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of light, it was the season of darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair."

Where you fit in between "the best of times" and "the worst of times" really depends on who you are today in America. For African Americans, too many of us are still experiencing the worst of times, and things will not get better unless we decide to make them so. While America is excited about abortions and gun violence, we have been victims of the latter, with civil rights violations and voter suppression being more important than abortions to most of us. The speed with which the President moved with an Executive

Just as our votes made Joe Biden president and sent two U.S. senators to the Senate from the State of Georgia, it is now our turn to rally in every state that the Trump people are trying to "Steal" in the coming elections. We must vote out their supporters.

Landis Technologies, a Pennsylvaniabased company that has provides consulting, implementation, and ongoing support services for Microsoft technologies, announced they are raising \$165 million from a group of investors that includes superstars Jay-Z and Will Smith.

The funds will help renters build credit until they can purchase homes. Landis buys homes and rents it to clients until they qualify for a mortgage. At that point, the client can buy the property back at a predetermined price up to two years after the initial acquisition.

According to Ebuzztt.com, the model counts as a new spin on a rent-to-own strategy that's been employed by other companies including Home Partners of America, which Blackstone Group Inc. agreed to purchase for \$6 billion.

"As part of its service, Landis provides coaching for clients on how to manage their finances to improve their credit and

payment," the tech site reported.

The company's typical client is a first-time homebuyer with a budget between \$110,000 and \$400,000, Ebuzztt noted.

Jay-Z's philanthropic efforts helping renters isn't new.

The hip hop icon and business guru recently teamed with Twitter Founder Jack Dorsey to announce a new "Bitcoin Academy" for underserved residents – particularly those in Brooklyn, New York's Marcy Houses, where the rap pioneer grew up.

The duo announced that the academy would offer one year of in-person and online classes through September 7, only for Marcy residents.

They plan to add other locations for the program designed in collaboration with Crypto Blockchain Plug and Black Bitcoin Billionaire.

Jay-Z and Dorsey said their mission includes providing education and empowering the community with knowledge.

Program participants would receive MiFi devices, a one-year limited data plan, and smartphones if needed. Residents may keep the devices.

Medicare Gap Plans and Medicare Advantage Plans

When you purchase a car, gap insurance is one of the coverages that you want to make sure that you have as a part of your finance

package. This insurance provides coverage for the difference between vour auto loan and the depreciated value of the vehicle if your car is in an accident or stolen. I cannot stress enough the importance of having this in place just as you should with ensuring that your physical wellbeing would be taken care of through having complete

Medicare health insurance coverage. This would be needed to financially address any medical occurrence, including emergency travel and care.

A Medigap Plan, also known as a Medicare Supplemental Plan (MSP), gives you the difference or makes up the gap in coverage that you may need. It is not covered under Original Medicare Part A and Medicare Part B. It helps with out-of-pocket expenses including a Medicare Part B deductible, Medicare Part A coinsurance, doctor's office visit co-payments, and skilled nursing facility care.

What are the differences between the two plans? While Medicare is a federally funded program, Medigap and Medicare Advantage are insurances sold by private companies. A Medigap Plan and a Medicare Advantage Plan are both ways to obtain Medicare benefits. A Medigap Plan only supplements your original Medicare Part A and Medicare Part B benefits. On the other hand, a Medicare Advantage plan provides coverage within Part C of Medicare. Most of your Part's A and B will be covered by the Medicare Advantage plan, not by Original Medicare. The difference between Original Medicare and a Medicare Advantage plan can also be in how much you pay outof-pocket, can lower co-payments,

coinsurance, and have smaller deductibles.

The plan that you enroll in should be based on your budget and healthcare needs. To qualify for a Medigap plan, you must have enrolled in Original Medicare Part A and Medicare Part B. If you enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan, you would still have Original Medicare in place. This includes

hospice care and hospice benefits. There are several types of Medicare Advantage plans that offer different kinds of coverage. To start, below are three of 12 different plans that are most popular based on the type of coverage that is offered.

An excess charge occurs when you have Original Medicare, and the amount the health care provider is allowed to charge (based on Medicare-approved amounts) is greater. The difference is called an excess charge. Plan F takes care of the excess charge. However, with Plan C it becomes the beneficiary's responsibility when you receive health services.

As you can see, Medicare Supplement Plan F has the best coverage. To be eligible for Plan F, you must have enrolled into Original Medicare before 2020. Plan F completely covers your out-of-pocket costs for both Medicare Part A and Medicare Part B. I recommend speaking with a plan provider to see if you qualify. This plan is considered to have the highest monthly premiums. Medicare Supplement Plan G is an option if Plan F is not, but be aware, if you join the Medicare Supplement Plan G, you will be responsible for the Medicare Part B annual deductible. However, once the deductible has been met, like Plan F, it will completely take care of out-of-pocket costs.

When should you sign up for Medicare Part B? You'll want to sign up as soon as you are eligible during the initial enrollment period. This would be three months prior to the date that you turn 65, including your birthday month, and no later than three months following your birthday month. This gives you a seven-month period to enroll. For example, if your 65th birthday is October 7, then your period of enrollment begins July 1 (three months prior to your birthday month), your birthday month, and January 30 (three months after your birthday month).

Did You Know?

To control the rising costs of Medicare, and as part of The Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization of

2015, anyone who becomes eligible for Medicare on January 1, 2020 or later won't be eligible to purchase Plan F, high deductible Plan F, or Plan C. If you had these plans prior to 2020, you can still keep them. Congress believes that the more people who must pay for the Part B deductible before seeing a doctor, it will limit unnecessary visits and help lower costs.

In my next article, I will discuss more about the 12 different Medigap plans. Stay tuned.

Part 2 of a 2 Part Series 130 Years and Still Going Strong The 'Storied' History of the AFRO Continues

The AFRO-American Newspaper has been in existence since August 13, 1892, when John Henry Murphy Sr., a former slave started the paper. Murphy died on April 5, 1922. At the time of his death, the AFRO was the most widely circulated African American newspaper on the Atlantic Coast. The publication was so popular amongst Black America that poet Langston Hughes, and legendary sports editor Sam Lacy—whose column influenced the desegregation of professional sports— contributed over the years.

After Murphy, Sr.'s death, his son, Carl Murphy served as publisher of the paper from 1922 until his death 1967. Under Carl Murphy's leadership, the publication rose to national prominence, with as many as 13 editions being circulated across the country. The AFRO is still going strong 130 years later, with its publication offerings including digital and print editions, podcasts and more.

John "Jake" Oliver, Jr. and now Dr. Frances "Toni" Draper, who are fourth generation members of the Murphy family, have managed the paper in recent years along with a governing board of family and community

members. Both are the great grandchildren of John H. Murphy.

"Our ancestors who founded this paper showed yes, I can do it. We can do it. And we will show you that we can do it," said Oliver, a former publisher for the paper, who also authored editorials to bring about change in the community. "And that was one of the major steps that I believe, facilitated

the beginnings of the Civil Rights era where Jim Crow started to be effectively sidestepped, if not eliminated. Black folks were viewed as not being able to contribute, because they were still being viewed as former slaves and uneducated, since education was illegal for Blacks to have while they were under the roof of enslavement."

He added, "But individuals began to emerge who exhibited unusual talent, imagination, and ability in all forms including the communication and journalism fields. It started to attract people and white people realized we

have misjudged these people and segregation simply is not right."

A visionary, who foresaw the forthcoming world of digital publications several decades ago, Oliver earned his J.D. degree from Columbia University Law School 1972. He practiced corporate law as an associate with the firm of Davis, Polk, and Wardell in New York City from 1972-78. "There were so many outstanding photographers, editors, writers and others who came through the AFRO," said Oliver. "And it shows, based on the cohesive focus the AFRO placed on the issues that it considered important for the elevation of the Black community. It's a continued battle we face."

In February 2018, Dr. Draper was named Chairman of the Board and publisher of the AFRO American Newspapers. She served previously as president of the company from 1987 to 1999.

"Our mothers worked there, and our fathers worked there, so we had a hefty dose of the family business around the dinner table and other places," said Dr. Draper. "So many things covered by the AFRO over the years were being ignored by the mainstream press. The AFRO covered not just the headline things that all of us know about like the March on Washington, but they covered Jesse Owens when he won the Olympics. We were there."

During World War II, the AFRO-American stationed several of its reporters in Europe, the Aleutians, Africa, Japan, and other parts of the South Pacific, and provided its readers with firsthand coverage of the war. One of its reporters, Carl Murphy's daughter, Elizabeth Murphy Phillips Moss, was the first Black female correspondent.

"We had the largest contingency of Black war correspondents who were actually journalists," said Dr. Draper. "They enlisted into the armed service as war correspondents and wrote about what was going on. We covered so many things we now look back on."

In the 1930s, the AFRO launched a successful campaign known as The Clean Block. Still in existence today, the effort is aimed at improving the appearance of, and reducing crime in, inner-city neighborhoods. During

its long and "storied" history, the AFRO also campaigned against the Southern Railroad's use of Jim Crow cars and fought to obtain equal pay for Maryland's Black schoolteachers.

Radio personality and political campaign strategist Anthony McCarthy worked at the AFRO as a staff writer during the late 1990s.

"I came to the AFRO from Virginia," recalled McCarthy. "I called the AFRO because I had gotten to know the late Jimmy Williams and he told me he needed a reporter in Baltimore. I took the job, and boy, my life has never been the same. The AFRO opened so many doors for me. It was extraordinary for me professionally. Working there really helped me to figure out what I wanted to do with my life and that was to be involved in politics. I will always be thankful for the AFRO."

In celebration of its 130th Anniversary, the historic publication will be holding the AFRO Gala on Saturday, August 13, 2022 at Martin's Crosswinds located at 7400 Greenway Center Drive in Greenbelt, Maryland. The Black-Tie affair will feature Kid Capri, Tommy Davidson, and Absolute Music featuring Temika Moore.

Meet Morgan State University's New Director of Bands

Dr. Jorim E. Reid Sr. was named Morgan State University's (MSU) Director of Bands. He will also serve as assistant professor and the coordinator of instrumental music, according to a press release. Reid's role entails working as the principal conductor who will oversee MSU's Symphonic Winds, Jazz Ensemble, Jazz Combo and "Magnificent Marching Machine."

"Dr. Reid comes to the National Treasure after a nationwide search and an exacting selection process to name the successor to longtime MSU Director of Bands Melvin N. Miles Jr., who recently retired after 49 years of dedicated service to Morgan," according to the announcement. "An accomplished and highly regarded composer and musician, Dr. Reid has an extensive background, leadership expertise and a creative approach to instruction, education, recruitment and marching band ensemble conducting that left a profound impression on the five-person search committee and ultimately proved to be kev factors in his selection."

Reid told The Baltimore Times that his musical journey officially began at MSU on July 25, 2022. Before joining the MSU community, Reid led the Marching Bronco 'Xpress as director of bands at Fayetteville State University. While working as professor of music, he taught wind symphony, "symphonic band, elementary and advanced instrumental conducting, music literature and arranging," according to a press release.

Reid's path to teach music at the collegiate level dates to his college years. The piano major did not initially aspire to become a band director. While attending Florida A&M University to complete his undergraduate studies, then continue

his higher education pursuit at Florida State University during graduate school, Reid studied to become a film composer. Even before he began writing music for the band in undergraduate school, Reid composed music in high school and as a church musician. He initially believed that his work would entail playing at churches and writing music for commercials. While Reid was attending graduate school, a few professors observed performances from one of his compositions. The professors knew an individual who was seeking an arranger, composer, and assistant director at one of the Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Their observation of Reid changed his career path.

"I interviewed and was offered the job there at North Carolina Central University where I was for 15 years," Reid said. Reid has worked on small films. He also has written, recorded, and mixed music for local commercials. Additionally, writing music for other universities, professional organizations, and productions outside of classical music have been other facets of experience he gained.

Despite Reid's eclectic musical background, his musical specialty is conducting and arranging music. While continuing Melvin Miles' legacy at MSU, Reid strives to lobby for Miles to be recognized as Director of Bands Emeritus. This would enable Miles to receive the highest recognition.

Reid wants to keep relationships intact that Miles had and create some new ones, As MSU's new Director of Bands settles into his new position, Reid is diving into the musical work at hand. One thing on

Reid's to-do list is preparing band students for preseason drills. And while Reid works hands on with students, he mentioned that alumni and the community can support the band by donating for scholarships and operating costs, showing up at MSU games dressed in signature blue and orange university colors, and sharing any positive university news, including MSU president David Wilson's tweets on Twitter.

Reid pointed out that bands are important at HBCUs beyond their roles playing music at football games and parades.

"Most of the time, over 95% of the band, they're not music majors. The band program at any university, not just an HBCU, will represent pretty much every single major on campus," Reid said.

He added that if students have a great experience in band while traveling to away games, across the country, or overseas to perform, these students will remember the undertaking for the rest of their lives. Giving back to the institution when they become professionals may be the result. Today's band members are future lawyers, doctors, teachers, researchers or even the next producer, Reid reminded. While MSU's band plays a role in entertaining the crowd in social environments, membership entails becoming a more well-rounded person. Achieving milestones as a group can be memorable and impactful.

"Band is big, but the outcome is bigger if the student experience is right, and the payback is immeasurable," Reid also said.

Ravens Patrick Queen Wants to Put It All Together in Year Three

The Baltimore Ravens have had a number of premier inside linebackers over their history. Ray Lewis started the legacy as he patrolled the middle of the Ravens defense for 17 years. Baltimore selected CJ Mosley with the 17th overall pick in 2014. The Ravens got five good seasons out of him.

Mosley signed a free-agent deal with the New York Jets in 2019, opening the door for the next inside linebacker to take over. Current Ravens inside linebacker Patrick Queen became the next man up when the team selected him as the 28th pick in the 2020 draft.

Queen's impact was felt right away. He was named to the Pro Football Writers Association All-Rookie team after he posted 106 tackles, seven run stuffs, three sacks, two forced fumbles and an interception. That success came under the leadership of current defensive coordinator Mike McDonald as Queen's position coach. All of his numbers except for run stuffs (14) dropped in his second season, despite having played one additional game. Now McDonald is back as the defensive play caller.

"I love it," Queen said. "We've got Mike [Macdonald] at 'DC' [defensive coordinator] – he was my coach my rookie year – then you've got 'ZO' [inside linebackers coach Zach Orr] in the room with us now. So, we've got two football guys, two guys that love football, who bring energy every single day, who love to communicate with us and get feedback from us, so now we're able to talk to our coach and tell them what we think. And everything is working together. Like I said, 'ZO' is an All-Pro, so he knows what he's talking about, he knows what he's doing. So, it's everything I need." McDonald agrees.

"He's definitely more comfortable in the scheme, he's confident, he's poised, communicates well. He's doing all of the things that we're asking him to do, and this is kind of the vision that he has for himself. So, like we said, he's on a great trajectory right now, and we're counting on him. So, he should have a great year."

The confidence comes from understanding how everything goes together from the playbook to conditioning and everything in between. He will be asked to wear the green dot helmet, meaning that he is the player on the field who gets the call from the coaches, then relays it to the defense in the huddle.

Queen noted that he has made plenty of progress over the last two seasons. Now that he is in his third year, he plans to put it all together and be a consistent playmaker for the Ravens.

The way last season ended serves as motivation for Queen. Now it's time to let it all out on the field.

"It makes you hungry," Queen said. "I don't like having a bad taste in my mouth. And I know, the last game of the season, it didn't end how we wanted it to, and we didn't make the playoffs, so the only thing on our minds right now is just getting ready for these preseason games – to go in there and just get off on the right foot – and just be better than what we were last year."
