Kirtland motivated by rare season-ending loss

Hornets had longest winning streak in country before losing in D-V state final

The lights were already on in the Kirtland football team's weight room as George Prusock and Philip LaVerde wandered in for a morning lift.

Muscles were still sore and wounds were still fresh from the previous day, when the Hornets dropped a 20-16 decision to Versailles in the Division V state championship game at Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in Canton.

The feeling that morning was somewhat unfamiliar - almost weird since it was the first time in their high school careers that Prusock, LaVerde and their teammates had lost a game. The state championship game loss ended Kirtland's 55-game winning LaVerde said. "That (loss) streak, which was the longest winning streak in the nation at that time.

The Tony Fisher Award goes to The News-Herald's football player of the year, and is named after the former star of the Euclid Panthers and Notre Dame Fighting Irish running back who went on to play for the Rams in the NFL.

The Tony Fisher Award will be presented the Monday of Thanksgiving week as part of a special edition of The Varsity Chalk Talk Show at Hooley House in Mentor. That same night, The News-Herald's Bob Ritley Award, given to the season's football coach of the year, will also be presented.

The Fisher Watch List can and will change on a weekly basis. This preseason list, in alphabetical order, is a starting point of what to look for at season's start. The preseason list includes:

Nick Biega, Mayfield, Sr.: He had 37 catches for 673 yards last year. He ran a 10.49100 and a 21.27200 this past spring in track. If he gets the ball in space, it's going to be six points.

Jake Elly, Riverside, Sr.: He can do it all. A year ago, he had 38 catches for 697 vards and seven touchdowns, and also had 59 tackles and six picks on defense.

Aidan Fitzgerald, Lake Catholic. Sr.: A three-year starter, Fitzgerald will be one of the area's top receivers this year. Good things happen when this young man has the ball in his hands.



Scotty Fox, Mentor, So.: If scrimmages are any indication, Fox is going to

get the starting nod and the most reps as the Cardinals' quarterback this year. He threw for 595 yards and six touchdowns as a freshman pressed into duty when Jacob Snow broke his thumb.

Nikko Georgiou, Kenston, **Sr.:** He missed a big chunk of last season with a hand injury. But he's back for his third year under center and is among the area's best dual-threat quarterbacks.

Bo Jackson, VASJ, So.: He was the No. 3 running back last year, but picked up offers from Ohio State and Penn State in the offseason. He's a big-time talent primed for a big-time year.

Benedictine, Jr.: A 6-4, 230-pounder, Jennings was a wrecking ball on defense last year. Now he's going to be a double threat as a tight end for the Bengals' offense.

Lucas Kaltenbach, Benedictine, So.: Don't know this young man's name yet? Well, you will soon. The 6-foot-4, 200-pound sophomore got some varsity time last year as a freshman and is primed for a big year as the Bengals' starter behind the big line anchored by Anthony Iliano.

DIVISION I. REGION 1

(in alphabetical order, with 2021 regular-season record; News-Herald coverage area teams are in CAPS)

Contenders: Berea-Midpark (6-4), Brunswick (6-4), Canton McKinley (6-4), Cleveland Heights (8-2), Elyria (6-4), Massillon Jackson (8-2), Medina (10-0), MENTOR (5-5), St. Edward (8-1), St. Ignatius (6-4), Stow-Munroe Falls (8-2), Strongsville (5-5)

What to look for: Starting with The News-Herald coverage area ranks first like usual, the hope would be for rebound campaigns from Mentor and Euclid. ... The Cardinals' problem was two-fold in 2021 — they needed one more nonconference win, and the struggles in Greater Cleveland Conference play early were a backbreaker as well. Looking at the 2022 slate, it feels like that Week 2 trip to First Energy Stadium to face St. Ignatius is a must-have to build confidence out of the gate. Mentor has to solidify its skill-position turnover and transition on a senior-heavy

defense. The Cardinals could climb a bit out of that .500 middle-of-the-pack range in the region, but how high will be interesting to watch transpire. ... Obviously, the Panthers have nowhere to go but up following an uncharacteristic 0-10 season. With a new coach in Robert Andrews and building blocks on defense in Chase Smith and Ryan Merrill, getting Euclid back in the win column more consistently is doable and would be a welcome sight. ... As far as the class of the

region, we'll lean toward the safe route and side with St. Edward. The Eagles will be stout in the defensive trenches paced by returning All-Ohio performers Michael Kilbane and Wyatt Gedeon. ... Medina will undoubtedly miss 2021 Ohio Mr. Football Drew Allar at quarterback, but having prolific WR Brennen Schramm (82 catches, 1,333 yards, 14 TDs) back in the fold is a start. ... Don't be surprised if Elyria improves on a 6-4 season, led by RB Lance Glover (665 rushing yards, nine TDs in 2021). ... Last fall, 12 of the teams in this region had six wins or fewer. If it winds up like that again, and especially with only 17 teams in the region of course, Week 11 home field contention won't be quite as daunting as it typically can be.

DIVISION II, REGION 5

What to look for: While not wanting to be a jinx in the process in this space and granted, this is a brutal region to contend for anything top to bottom — but it seems like this could be a special year for Riverside. The Beavers won seven games a year ago, including a playoff win over Brush, return All-Ohioans Jason Ryan and Jake Elly on defense

amid a largely experienced group and weren't far off from accomplishing more in 2021. Watch for how Riverside navigates Weeks 2 and 3 trips to Aurora and Mentor, some help under first-year especially the latter. If the Beavers could emerge 2-1 or even 3-0 into Western Reserve Conference play, look out because contending for the top four in turn is there for the taking. ... South should be solid once again, paced by QB Colin Quinlan. The Rebels are done no favors in 2022, either, with the breakdown of their WRC slate, drawing Kenston, Chardon and Riverside to close once more, so maximizing nonconference play

hosting NDCL. ... Elsewhere area-wise, Brush could be in the top-12 hunt but needs to give workhorse RB Tanelle Rose (1,475 yards, 18 TDs) coach Ricky Powers. ... In addition to how competitive this region will be, it will have a new complexion, too. Shaker Heights and Solon come in from Region 1, as do tough programs such as Akron SVSM (Region 9) and Barberton (Region 6). ... The Fighting Irish should be improved after a 4-6 season with a young core. ... You know what you're getting from Akron Hoban by now, so not much more needs to be said there. ... Hudson will be key — notably Week 1 brings back QB Jagger Pal-

lay (2,190 yards, 20 TDs) but must replace its skill position corps almost in entirety. ... Another non-area squad that should be better in this region vs. 2021 is Warren Harding, with dual-threat QB Dalys Jett (2,201 yards passing and rushing, 34 total TDs) and a seasoned defense.

The Hilltoppers return QB Alex Henry and RB AJ Bruce to fuel the vaunted Wing-T, and that defense is going to be fierce with its high level of talent. As Coach Mitch Hewitt has noted, some work needs to be done on the line. But Chardon will be a load as usual. That nonconference slate is unusual. with out-of-state foes from New Jersey and Florida.

However, it should provide enough point potential. ... It's not unreasonable to see Kenston, even with the seniors it graduated, factoring toward the top six led by RB Sean Patrick (1,127 rushing yards, nine TDs in 2021). ... Benedictine graduated a ton but always find a way to be in the mix. A particularly key two-week stretch for the Bengals will be in Weeks 3 and 4, with D-I points on the table hosting Cleveland Heights, then taking on Maryland power DeMatha Catholic. ... Gilmour and Villa Angela-St. Joseph have a lot returning, but the reality is the road naturally becomes tougher moving up from D-IV, Region 13. That's not to say Region 13 was a cakewalk, of course — it's not. Region 9 is more treacherous, though. Each has four regular-season opponents in smaller divisions, so while making it at all won't be a problem with a top 16, lunging toward home field contention could be more tricky. ... Tallmadge has QB Ty Hurst (3,241 passing yards, 31TDs) back at the controls and top target Collin Dixon (69 catches. 1,461 yards, 18 TDs) at WR, so that offense will be something. ... If you want a deep sleeper, how about Alliance? Although the Aviators were 3-7 last fall, three losses were by three points or fewer and QB Brendan Zurbrugg (1,815 yards, 14 TDs), RB Kayden Davis (843

rushing yards, 16 TDs and 41 catches) and WRs K'vaughn Davis and Ramhir Hawkins (40 catches each) were all underclassmen in 2021.

DIVISION IV, REGION 13

What to look for: The lone News-Herald coverage area team in this region is Lake Catholic. Last season, from a won-lost standpoint, was not remotely what anyone on that proud corner of Bellflower and 306 has in mind, as the Cougars went 1-9. Not including Lake as a contender here comes with two justifications and a caveat. Region 13 has eight teams coming down from D-III. Region 9, including perennially playoff-vying programs such as Hubbard and Streetsboro. So what was already a rocky road for anyone in Region 13 becomes ever more so. Also, after a 1-9 year, the Cougars have to show they're ready to take that next step. Lake has shown to be at its best at times when it's undervalued from the outside — the naysayers certainly didn't see that magical state final run two years ago coming. In turn, the caveat is this is not to say the Cougars can't be a contender. They just

Girard was junior-heavy at the skill positions a year ago, including RB Michael Palmer (1,174 rushing yards, 14 TDs), so an uptick from 6-4 is possible. ... One of the premier workhorses in this region should be Niles McKinley RB Antuan Gardner (1,514 yards, 18 TDs), so keep an eye on the Red Dragons faring better than 4-5 in 2022 as they move from Region 9.

DIVISION V, REGION 17

(in alphabetical order, with 2021 regular-season record; News-Herald coverage area teams are in CAPS) Contenders: BERKSHIRE (6-4), CHAGRIN FALLS (5-5), Fairless (9-1), Garaway (10-0), Garrettsville (10-0), Norwayne (7-3), PERRY (8-2), Richmond Edison (7-3), South Range (10-0), Triway (7-1), Waynedale (5-5), West Lafayette Ridgewood (9-1)

What to look for: Prefacing this is more of an observation than a projection, but it feels odd to have Chagrin Falls and Perry in Division V now. One benefit of moving down, though, will be virtually every game will be larger-division points at stake. Every little bit helps in that regard. ... With the Pirates, such a capable senior class exiting the program is concerning. But Perry has earned the trust to figure it out, especially with talented underclassmen who earned playing time a year ago. It's only on paper in mid-August, but that Week 2 clash hosting Kenston feels

really important for Perry. ... Chagrin Falls will be in flux on the line with Nick Dalessandro graduated. But versatile RB Donny Hardy showed promise last fall, and there is opportunity to slot into the upper echelon of the CVC Chagrin. Kirtland is the favorite of course, but it could be wide open after that. Not to be repetitive, but Kenston, in the Tigers' case a Week 1 game, looms large as well. ... With Josh Brown and Miles Miller back. Berkshire seems like a squad with which bullish prospects are reasonable — how bullish depends on rebuilding the lines, which were seniorheavy in 2021. ... With Kirtland dropping back to D-VI, Region 21, the best team in this region now is probably Garaway. The Pirates, who won 12 games last fall, return a plethora of All-Ohioans including first-teamers Jarett Wallick and Brady Roden on defense. That group was one of the best in the Buckeye State in 2021, yielding 88 points in 13 games and posting five shutouts. QB Logan Yoder and RB Ethan Miller also earned All-Ohio distinction and should be a handful again. ... Richmond Edison, with 6-foot-6QB Gage Cline, could also intrique.

Cardinal's seven-win campaign a year ago was one of the feel-good stories of the year in News-Herald coverage area football. Graduating four All-Ohioans and filling those shoes will be a tall order, though, notably in the trenches with Mike Soltis and John Avalon. But here's to hoping the Huskies can keep that feel-good run going with another charge toward the top 12. ... Hopes are high at Brookfield with QB Donovan Pawlowski (2,509 total yards, 25 TDs) and LB AJ Bartolin (108 tackles) pacing an experienced defense. ... Canton Central Catholic, which went 4-6 last fall, could be improved with prolific dual-threat QB Jack Talkington (2,730 total yards, 20 TDs) and versatile RB Alexander Anderson. ... Valley Christian is in Year 2 under former longtime Berlin Center Western Reserve coach Andy Hake and could be a threat coming up from Region 25. ...

Newton Falls admittedly might be a reach as a sleeper coming off a 3-7 season. But the Tigers boast two high-caliber RBs in Carter Rapczak and Camryn Brainard, who combined for nearly 1.800 vards and 17 TDs a year ago, along with three of their top five tacklers. So it's worth a shot. ... Three other staples also came up from Region 25 in Cuyahoga Heights, Dalton and Independence. You can trust the two CVC representatives and the Bulldogs to figure it out regardless of personnel.

DIVISION VII, REGION 25

(in alphabetical order, with 2021 regular-season record: News-Herald coverage area teams are in CAPS)

Contenders: Conotton Valley (5-4), Danville (4-6), Hillsdale (6-4), Lowellville (7-2), Lucas (8-1), New Middletown Springfield (9-1), Norwalk St. Paul (8-1), Plymouth (5-4), Salineville Southern (7-3), Steubenville Catholic Central (3-7), Toronto (5-5), Warren JFK (6-2)

What to look for: The lone News-Herald coverage area squad in this region is Fairport. Fortunately, things appear quieter on the home front than they were this time last year amid a late coaching change and concerns over low roster

numbers. The Skippers do return experience in spots and did win three straight to close 2021. But low numbers again, any bout with the injury bug and an inability to score consistently (they scored 44 points in two wins over St. John to end the year and 26 in their other six games) will make it tough to get to .500. ... Even with the exodus to Region 21, this is still a formidable region. Every year, you know it will be top-heavy, and this season is no exception with Lucas, Norwalk St. Paul, Warren JFK and more. What takes it up a notch in 2022 are squads ready for an upswing. Danville, for example, is a newcomer from Region 27 that went 4-6 in the regular season in 2021. The Blue Devils return multi-faceted senior Max Payne, who played QB and was also their leading rusher with 714 yards and 11 TDs, along with WR Kaiden Colopy (57 receptions) and four of their top five tacklers, including Levi Lyons (89 tackles). Sounds like a bounceback candidate. ... Also keep an eye on Lowellville, with 6-foot-4 All-Ohio QB Vinny Ballone, who accounted for nearly 3,000 yards through the air and on the ground and 39 total TDs. ... This is not typically the case in this region, where three wins was enough last year, but it might take 6-4 to vie for the playoffs, even in the expanded format, between the newcomers and the improved.


Outlook

What Beachwood lacks in numbers it more than makes up for with experience going into the 2022 season. The Bison have 17 returning starters on a 24-player roster.
