

DHHS Accepts Applications for Construction of Child Care Centers

AUGUSTA, (August 18, 2022) - The Maine Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Office of Child and Family Services (OCFS) announced today that the Child Care Infrastructure Grant Program, part of Governor Janet Mills' Maine Jobs and Recovery Plan, has launched the second phase of grantmaking for costs associated with new construction of child care centers and expansion of existing child care providers. The grant program, announced by Governor Janet Mills in July, will provide a total \$15 million investment to help child care businesses launch or expand, and could support more than 4,700 new child care slots across Maine, enabling over 2,700 parents to work or take classes while their children receive quality

The Child Care Infrastructure Grant Program, which utilizes Federal funding through the American Rescue Plan, is part of a \$25 million child care initiative in the Governor's Jobs Plan that includes \$15 million for early childhood education. The grant program will help Maine people open child care businesses in their homes, transform existing buildings into quality child care spaces, and construct new child care facilities. Existing child care providers can also use the funding to expand the number of children they serve. Priority is given to sites in rural areas, that care for infants and toddlers, and participate in the child care subsidy pro-

"We are excited to open this grant opportunity to child care facilities, which play a vital role in Maine's child care infrastructure" said Health and Human Services Commissioner Jeanne Lambrew and OCFS Director Todd Landry. "Expanding these programs will not only support Maine families by providing high-quality,

affordable child care options, but will also increase employment opportunities in early childhood education."

OCFS is administering the Child Care Infrastructure Grant Program through a partnership with Brunswick-based Coastal Enterprises, Inc. The funding may be used for new construction, renovations, outdoor spaces, indoor furniture and fixtures, educational materials and working capital.

Applications open to those building or expanding a child care facility (a child care business outside a home environment). Sole proprietors, partnerships, cooperatives, nonprofit organizations, and employers are eligible to apply for a grant covering up to 50 percent of their start-up costs. Existing child care providers seeking an additional license are also eligible to apply. Applicants renovating an existing building may request up to 50 percent of their start-up costs up to \$80,000. Those constructing a new building are eligible for up to 50 percent of their start-up costs, up to \$250,000. First round applications are being accepted through September 30, 2022.

The first phase of grantmaking to support new family or home-based care businesses opened July 6 to encourage new providers in Maine's rural areas. To date, 63 providers have applied for grants. Applications for this program are being accepted through May 2023. Home-based child care businesses may apply for 75 percent of their start-up costs, up to \$8,500. New family child care businesses licensed by September 30, 2023, are also eligible for a one-time \$2,000 sti-

Governor Mills is making these and other historic investments in accessible child care in Maine as part of the first-ever Child Care Plan for Maine (PDF) developed by OCFS that invests approximately \$120 million in American Rescue Plan funds to help Maine's child care system recover and to improve quality, accessibility, and affordability over the long-term. Maine was one of the first 12 states to release American Rescue Plan funds, with more than 1,500 providers receiving the payments to date. This investment also includes helping low-income parents who receive subsidies by waiving their contribution to child care fees.

Additionally, Governor Mills included in her supplemental budget, signed into law in April, State funding to continue \$200 monthly stipends to more than 7,000 child care workers, continuing stipends that the Department began providing last year as part of a larger effort to attract and retain people to work in this valuable profession.

As a result of these investments totaling more

than \$100 million to date, child care providers have been able to maintain and build capacity despite the pandemic – from 47,819 licensed slots in February 2020 to over 48,500 licensed slots in July 2022.

OCFS additionally maintains the Child Care Choices website, which allows families to locate and connect with providers in their area.

The Maine Jobs & Recovery Plan is the Governor's plan, approved by the Legislature, to invest nearly \$1 billion in Federal American Rescue Plan funds to improve the lives of Maine people and families, help businesses, create good-paying jobs, and build an economy poised for future prosperity. It draws heavily on recommendations the Governor's Economic Recovery Committee and the State's 10-Year Economic Development Strategy. Portland Conservatory of Music Announces Jazz Lineup

PORTLAND, ME (August 9, 2022) -- The Portland Conservatory of Music announces the 2022 Dimensions in Jazz Fall Lineup featuring renowned jazz musicians from Mali Obomsawin of Maine to Satoko Fujii and Natsuki Tamura of Japan. Dimensions in Jazz brings the latest in contemporary jazz to Portland, Maine.

The DIJ Season kicks off on August 20th, 2022 with vocalist Sarah Elizabeth Charles and pianist Jarrett Cherner as they go on a summer tour to promote the all-original duo release "Tone" which is steeped in jazz harmony, timeless melody, and poetic verse that addresses the need for care in the world.

On September 9th. 2022 renowned Sax player Anna Webber leads her working band of almost a decade, Simple Trio, in a performance featuring works from her most recent release titled "Idiom" alongside drummer John Hollenbeck and pianist Matt Mitchell. Simple Trio will also host a free jazz workshop at 4pm prior to the concert.

Satoko Fuji (Piano) and Natsuki Tamura (Trumpet) take the stage on September 16th, 2022 for a performance featuring the pinnacle of contemporary Japanese jazz. Since 1997, Tamura and Fujii's powerful collaboration has enlightened and engaged listeners. Prior to that, studied piano and performed in various jazz groups in Athens while pursuing a degree in Economics. Pandelis earned BM and MM degrees in music from Boston's New England Conservatory while studying with Paul Bley, Jimmy Giuffre, George Russell, Dave Holland and Joe Maneri (composition). Maine OCP Launches Portal for Municipal Reimbursement Funds

AUGUSTA, ME (August 8, 2022) - Today, the Office of Cannabis Policy (OCP), a part of the Maine Department of Administrative and Financial Services (DAFS), announced the launch of its online portal for submissions by Maine municipalities to be reimbursed up to \$20,000 for costs associated with opting in to Maine's Adult Use Cannabis Program.

As a result of the 130th Legislature's second session, Maine cities and towns that have opted in to the state's adult use cannabis market will be eligible for reimbursement of qualifying expenses, provided by the OCP from the Adult Use Cannabis Public Health and Safety and Municipal Opt-in Fund, which is funded by excise and sales tax revenues generated by the transfer and sale of adult use cannabis.

"Maine's launch of the Adult Use Cannabis Program has been strong," said OCP Director Erik Gundersen. "But the benefits are still only being realized by about 7% of Maine's cities and towns. From a recent report commissioned by the OCP, we know that the presence of adult use retail stores and other facilities is the most responsible way to continue to eradicate the illicit market, while driving down negative public health and safety impacts."

Qualifying expenses must have occurred in the previous three years, and must be associated directly with a municipality's process of opting in to the adult use cannabis market. Such expenses may include (but may not be limited to), attorneys' fees and/or staff time to research, draft and revise cannabis ordinances. fees associated with providing notice of election and public meetings, staff time and other associated expenses, for the conduct of town meetings and elections and the tabulation and publication of results. Reimbursements will be

considered on a first come, first served basis.

"The reality is, no matter if a town has opted in or not," continued Gundersen, "there is cannabis being


bought, sold, and consumed there. The most important thing we can do is to try and ensure that Mainers who choose to use cannabis can do so in a well-regulated environment that safeguards public health and safety in the best way possible. Taking this next, big step to incentivize Maine cities and towns to engage in the regulated adult use market

is the most effective way to do just that."

About the OCP: The Mills Administration created OCP within DAFS in February 2019. The Office is responsible for the oversight of all aspects of legalized cannabis, including Maine's Medical Use of Cannabis Program and the Adult Use Cannabis Program.

Seniors Not Acting Their Age

Little Whaleboat by Land and Sea

Little Whaleboat Island in northern Casco Bay is a special place. Actually a trio of small islands and ledges named Little Whaleboat (West), Nate, and Tuck, they're connected at low tide. I've been visiting them since I began sea kayaking a couple of decades ago. The reason is simple; it's a beautiful location easily reached by launching from Mere Point in Brunswick or Lookout Point and Mitchell Field in Harpswell.

During my many visits, I never realized Little Whaleboat was privately owned and access was due to the generosity of the landowner. When the island was placed up for sale, Maine Coast Heritage Trust (MCHT) led an effort to raise 1.3 million dollars to buy and conserve the island for the public for perpetuity. In December 2021, MCHT announced they had successfully purchased the island.

Recently, my retired friend, Bob Rowe, and I decided it was time to resume our relationship with Little Whaleboat by thoroughly exploring the newly acquired island. We elected to depart from the closest boat launch, Mitchfrom Little Whaleboat.

This was my first experience departing from Mitchell Field. I found it to be an exceptional facility. The complex offers opportunities to walk, bike, swim, and picnic. Hand-carry boats can be launched from two beaches. The proximity to islands in northern Casco Bay is another benefit.

We carried our kayaks down to the shore at North Beach. Little Whaleboat could be seen in the distance about a mile west of much larger Whaleboat Island. We traveled southwest in gentle swells and a light headwind towards Whaleboat. Carefully avoiding lobster boats and pleasure crafts in the busy bay was a necessity throughout our voyage.

From Whaleboat. we navigated west to the eastern shore of Little Whaleboat. The tide was low when we arrived at a substantial gravel beach on the north side. This is an excellent location to land kayaks at any tidal level. Two pleasure crafts were moored offshore and several occupants were swimming from their boats. While walking onto the beach, a noisy osprey circled above quickly capturing our attention.

Adjacent to the beach is a large MCHT campsite. After completing an inspection, Bob and I continued our land exploration. Low tide and a rocky shoreline allowed for fairly easy foot travel proceeding clockwise. We stopped to reconnoiter a smaller MCHT campsite on the east side of the island. The narrow channel that separates Little Whaleboat and Nate Island was impassable at that tidal level.

Large boulders and extensive ledges were more prevalent on the south side of the island providing for a stimulating scramble. The densely forested interior discouraged any inclination to shorten the journey. Rounding the bend and turning north, we encountered a veritable muddy highway between the western shore of Little Whaleboat and Tuck Is-

Surmounting a substantial ledge, we returned to the northern beach completing a trek around the exterior of the island. In addition to the ubiquitous osprey, bird sightings were plentiful throughout our trek. While enjoying views of the islands of Merepoint

and Middle Bays in the north, we were impressed with the remarkable peacefulness of the location.

Embarking in our kayaks, we concluded a circumnavigation of the archipelago. The numerous inlets, coves, and ledges provided for a stimulating investigation of the rugged shoreline by water.


the north end of Whaleboat, we encountered stronger winds and bigger seas during our crossing to Mitchell Field. A continuum of outgoing sailboats delayed our traverse. While bobbing in swells, we exchanged greetings with the exuberant occupants as they passed.

North Beach at After running off Mitchell Field was a much busier place when we returned. Hot weather had attracted a multitude of beachgoers. Despite the crowd, there was adequate space to land and carry our kayaks to the loading zone.

For me, Little Whaleboat Island has been an exceptional destination since I began sea kayaking. MCHT's successful effort to protect it for the public is a substantial achievement. As a result of our visit, we left the island with a heightened sense of the magnitude of their accomplishment.


The event features both long and short route options every day, each fully supported and carefully curated to include points of interest, a well-stocked rest stop, and additional food options along the way.

The Coalition urges Lincoln locals to be on the lookout for riders on the roads throughout the weekend, and advises motorists to allow plenty of space when passing cyclists.

The 2022 BikeMaine Weekend also marks the return of the "BikeMaine Village," the event's home base that offers four catered meals, camping, a Maine Beer Company beer garden, a wine tent, evening entertainment, and indoor bathroom and shower facilities. The Village will encompass both Cobb Field-the waterfront greenspace belonging to Mattanawcook Junior High School—and nearby Prince Thomas Park.

An assortment of postride daily local activities featuring the culture, community and history of the region will also be offered. This includes BCM-led gravel rides and "Fix-A-Bike" mechanic workshops, as well as farmer & artisan markets, local







tours, and kayak and paddleboard rentals. While the daily rides and catered meals are for registered BikeMaine riders, the Coalition is hoping that local residents and visitors alike will enjoy the additional programming. Group rides and workshops are free but space is limited, so interested parties can visit bikemaine.org to register.

Three-day registration is now closed, but single-day registration for riding on Saturday or Sunday is \$85 and can be purchased the morning of the ride at the Information Tent at Cobb Field.

"We are fortunate to have some of the most



Funding to Expand Electric Vehicle Charging Infrastructure

(August 18, 2022) – A new initiative from Efficiency Maine will further expand the coverage of the state's vehicle electric (EV) charging infrastructure by supporting installation of public EV chargers in rural communities. This is the first of a series of planned EV charging infrastructure incentives from Efficiency Maine using \$8 million allocated by Governor Mills' Maine Jobs and Recovery

Level 2 EV chargers add 20 to 40 miles of range per hour, and are suitable for hotels, restaurants, retail stores, and public parking lots where the vehicle can recharge for an hour or longer. Eligible projects under the funding opportunity being announced today by Efficiency Maine can receive 80 percent of installation costs, up to a maximum of \$5,000 per Level 2 plug for networked chargers or a maximum of \$2,000 for non-networked chargers. Thanks to the generosity of The Nature Conservancy, projects at local government-owned properties and public libraries in rural areas will be eligible for a bonus incentive of \$2,000 per networked plug, with the total combined incentives covering up to 90 percent of the total project cost.

To be eligible for funding, proposed projects must be in a publicly accessible location in a rural community as defined by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Projects in York and Cumberland counties, and the cities of Lewiston, Auburn and Bangor, are ineligible for this round, but future funding opportunities from Efficiency Maine are intended for areas not covered by this opportunity. To learn more about this funding opportunity, please visit the Efficiency Maine website. The deadline to apply is November

"One of our goals is to extend public EV charging throughout the state, so we are pleased to focus this round of funding on parts of the map that currently have fewer chargers," said Michael Stoddard, executive director of the Efficiency Maine Trust. "We appreciate the financial support from the Maine Jobs and Recovery Plan and The Nature Conservancy to make EV charging more accessible and affordable for rural businesses, nonprofits, towns, and tribal governments."

"A true statewide transition to clean transportation that meets Maine's climate goals has to include rural communities," said Kate Dempsey, state director for The Nature Conservancy in Maine. "We're pleased to collaborate with Efficiency Maine to make it a little easier for Maine's municipalities, tribal governments and public libraries to install publicly accessible EV charging infrastructure."

"With increasing consumer demand putting more EVs on the road in Maine, expanding EV infrastructure charging for rural communities just makes sense," said Dan Burgess, Director of the Governor's Energy Office. "We look forward to working with Efficiency Maine to use this funding from the Maine Jobs and Recovery Plan to help make EVs a reality for more Maine people."

Projects must be pre-approved and if they meet the eligibility criteria will be offered an incentive payable upon completion of the project. This opportunity is offered on a firstcome, first-served basis until the budget for this round of \$695,000 is exhausted. Efficiency Maine expects this initial funding opportunity to help defray the cost of approximately 150 new plugs. Projects must be completed by May 31,

Ineligible locations include private homes. multi-unit dwellings, Airbnb properties, vacation properties (e.g. camps, cabins, and cottages), non-permanent structures, K-12 schools, new and used car dealerships, and sites that intend to use the chargers for fleet vehicles of the property owner or tenant. Some of these locations may qualify for other incentives offered through Efficiency Maine and interested individuals should visit efficiencymaine.com for more information.

To date, Efficiency Maine has helped fund 236 new plugs in Maine's public EV charging network. A total of 613 Level 2 "com-DC high-speed charging EV owners.

plugs are publicly available in Maine. Consumers can find these charger locations using the charging station locator on the quasi-state agency's website. Efficiency Maine's website provides a one-stop shop for information about EVs, rebates, and charging infrastructure to help Maine consumers become more comfortable with EVs. The website maintains an online EV educational video library. One video series specifically targets the considerations and decisions of business owners, municipal officials, and other property owners who are assessing whether, where, and how to locate an EV charger at their business, school, apartment complex, or other public location. These videos also cover practical issues, such as reasons to install a public EV charger, choosing an appropriate charging site, sizing the electrical panels, and how to find equipment and installers.

Maine drivers also can learn more about EVs and EV charging through a series of 2- to 4-minute EV educational videos featuring Maine humorist and car enthusiast Tim Sample. The instructional videos featuring Sample cover a variety of topics: where and how to find EV chargers, how to use a public charger, home charging installation tips, how to maximize a home charge, how to recognize the different types of public charger plugs, ways to pay for public EV charging, and "one-pedal driving," which enables drivers to come to a full stop without using the brake pedal. In addition to the Efficiency Maine website, the video library also can be found on the Efficiency Maine YouTube Channel. Mainers also can find extensive written materials on the agency's EV web pages, including a guidebook on "How to Select and Install a Home Electric Vehicle Charger," which provides useful information and tips munity" plugs and 151 for current and prospective

Reliability, Cost Savings Among **Top EV Benefits**

AUGUSTA, ME (August 17, 2022) - A new survey of electric vehicle owners in all 16 of Maine's counties shows that Maine people value electric vehicles (EVs) for their reliability, performance, and the cost savings they pro-

The survey ducted by the Natural Resources Council of Maine (NRCM) in April 2022 by mail and online found that 98% of EV owners would personally recommend them to their neighbors, in part because EVs are quiet, help them avoid the high price of gas, and are better for Maine's environment. Seventy-nine percent of those surveyed save \$25 or more a month on gas, and 56% save \$50 or more.

"It's hard for me to say one thing that I like most about our electric vehicle. It's ultra-quiet, there are very few moving parts, it has incredible pick up, it's so reliable, and it's fun to drive. Then, it costs me so little to operate. I just can't believe I haven't done this before," said Gale White, owner of the Lubec Brewing Company.

There are now more than five times as many electric vehicles on the road in Maine than in 2018, the last time NRCM conducted an EV survey. Nearly 100% (99%) of those surveyed say their EV is



reliable, and 97% said their EV is affordable and easy to maintain.

"We heard directly from Mainers across the state that electric cars are improving their lives by helping them get around more easily for less money," said Jack Shapiro, NRCM Climate & Clean Energy Director. "There's no question as more models come to market and we continue to expand our network of charging stations, more and more Mainers will find electric cars and trucks an attractive and affordable option."

The survey found that electric vehicle charging is becoming more convenient. Ninety percent of EV owners primarily charge their cars at home, and the use of public charging stations has increased substantially over the past four years two out of three of drivers in this year's survey have used public charging stations, up from one half in 2018 and one third in 2014. Concerns about the costs of charging prior to purchase dropped by 73% after EV owners began driving their

"I decided to go elec-

tric because it just made a lot of sense to me. The downside was I was a little timid, so at first I bought a plug-in hybrid. But my next car is going to be purely electric. It's just reached the point of reliability that it's a no brainer for me," said Old Town resident Jim Mitchell.

There is now a wide selection of electric vehicles on the road in Maine, with more coming on the market each model year. Of all EV owners in the state, 44% own a fully electric vehicle that does not use any gasoline (up from 30% in 2018), while 56% own a plug-in hybrid vehicle that relies on electric and gas power. The top 5 EV car manufacturers for Maine drivers are, in order of popularity: Toyota, Tesla, Chevrolet, Ford, and Nis-

Maine's Climate Action Plan identified EVs, combined with investments in active transportation and public transit along with smarter land use planning, as a key recommendation for helping the state transition away from fossil fuels and toward a clean energy economy.



"As the Ranking Member of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee, I have strongly advocated for funding to launch

BSOOB Transit's electric bus fleet and install charging infrastructure. This investment will build on that effort by allowing BSOOB Transit to take two more diesel buses off the road and replace them with battery-powered, carbon-neutral, and 100% sustainable buses."

"This is a very exciting announcement of transportation funding to the Biddeford, Saco, and Old Orchard Beach communities. This grant award will propel our agency closer to the state's emission reduction goals," said Chad Heid, Executive Director of BSOOB Transit. "We're very thankful for the advocacy of Senator Collins and our federal delegation to secure this grant award, as well as the funding support from Maine DOT. We

In 2019, Senator Collins announced that BSOOB Transit was awarded \$880,000 to replace two diesel buses with two electric buses replacing. In 2021, she secured an additional \$1.2 million to allow BSOOB Transit to purchase depot and on-route charging equipment, which allows the new electric buses to remain on the road for a full 16-hour service day.
