SMAA Offers Course to Improve Balance, Reduce **Risk of Falls**



WINDHAM, ME (August 30, 2022) -- In the fall of 2022, Sothern Maine Agency on Aging will lead two in-person classes - A Matter of Balance and Tai Chi for Health and Balance - designed to improve the quality of life of adults 60 and over by improving their balance and increasing their physical strength.

As our bodies change with age, we may find that as our balance and strength change and we are less confident or even fearful during everyday activities we once took for granted like shopping, cooking, driving, doing household chores, and even playing weekly pickleball games. The fear of falling can put a damper not only on what we like to do but also on our social connections, leading to a sense of loneliness and social isolation.

No matter if we are reasonably healthy or have limiting chronic conditions, there are community-based programs and resources that can help to improve our overall health and as a result, decrease our chances of falling. Southern Maine Agency of Aging leads two evidence-based programs specifically designed to help reduce falls: Tai Chi for Health and Balance and A Matter of Bal-

A Matter of Balance workshop is designed to help participants increase physical activity, make important home safety improvements, and even learn how to respond if a fall does happen. The workshop empowers participants to take charge of managing their health. Each meeting invites attendees to share their own experiences and concerns about falls and together they create strategies for flourishing and living independently. Trained volunteers lead gentle exercises to build strength and improve balance and range of motion. "I got my entire group of friends at our housing facility to continue with our exercises after we took A Matter of Balance two years ago! I'm taking it again for See SMAA, page 16

What we need from all of you? Please keep off the loose loam areas all around the park until we have time to get it seeded and the grass to take hold. This will take up to 21 days minimum...so realistically think last week of September into October. We know that is a LONG time from now, but we really need you to help us help you....stay off the loose loam areas around the skatepark until we can get it up to standard.

And how about those new basketball backboards down on the pavement next to the skatepark? Right???

Please keep all bicycles, scooters, boards and blades off the pavement. The



surface needs to be protected until it gets painted and sealed. Thank You!

Please, Please...do not "shoot" or throw baketballs at those backboards until we can get the perimeter fence installed. Our sealcoating and striping cannot happen prior to end of September and then we need to have a stretch of warm nights, not get below 40 degrees, in order to consider putting the paint down. Stay tuned for the weather reports on that!

Ultimately, the "multisport" courts there will have basketball, pickleball and shuffle board lines when we get finished!

Newsmakers, Names & Faces **CRCofWM Annual Appeal in Full Swing**

(September 2, 2022) -- The Cancer Resource Center of Western Maine (CRCofWM) launched its Annual Appeal Campaign in early June. Funds raised from this appeal are critical to the Center's mission to embrace anyone affected by cancer in a community that offers hope and caring through support, education and concepts in healthy living - because no one should face cancer alone.

Finding support and resources for those impacted by cancer outside of Maine's populated areas is often difficult – especially for cancer patients living in rural western Maine where oncology services are limited. The CRCOF-WM serves cancer patients and their families in Oxford County and surrounding towns with a focus on

Center provides a patient -centered approach, offering one to one support from a cancer resource navigator and an oncology social worker. This support includes: travel and food assistance, help with basic needs, support groups for men and women, educational programs, in-person and virtual wellness programs, help with accessing complementary therapy services through the Live Well Program, new wigs and a variety of comfort items for those going through active treatment. These services are all free to anyone impacted by cancer in Oxford County and the surrounding towns. The Center also collaborates with the Oncology offices at Stephens Memorial, Rumford, and Bridgton Hospitals, all of whom often refer Oxford

county clients they think would benefit from one to one cancer resource navigation and support. In 2021, despite the restrictions imposed by COVID, the Center served 130 new cancer patients from 46 different towns in western Maine – a 50% increase from 2020.

According to Diane Madden, the Executive Director of the Center, the Center has benefited from generous grant funding from the Maine Cancer Foundation, which goes directly to help patients with travel needs. The high cost of gasoline is a barrier for many cancer patients who need to travel to Lewiston or Portland for daily radiation treatments, often over the course of 5 - 7 weeks.

In addition, many patients must travel multiple times to Boston for more specific cancer evaluation and treatment. Even as the price of gas comes down, many patients find they need to spend upwards of \$350 for treatment related travel. "We see patients struggling with making a decision between getting to treatment, paying their bills or putting food on the table" Madden reports. While the Center is grateful for the grant funding they receive, the money only goes so far, especially when the need is so high. The Center tries to keep their overhead costs low, allowing them to put more dollars back into the communities they serve. "This is why this annual appeal is so important" Madden said.

"We are very grateful for the amazing donations

we have received thus far for our annual appeal," said Judy Stone, CRCofWM Board President, we are a little more than halfway to meeting our 2022 campaign goal. Every dollar donated makes an impact: A \$50 donation will cover gas costs for a patient to make four trips (out of thirty) for radiation treatments in Lewiston or Portland or provide a gift card to a grocery store; and a \$100 donation will provide a gift card to purchase non-covered medical supplies or personal hygiene/ cleaning supplies not covered by food stamps."

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

However, the river gets a little crowded on weekends,

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
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Maine Author Reinvigorates The Hero's Journey with a Twist



MAINE (August 30, 2022) -- Debut author Brandon Ying Kit Boey decided to write Karma of the Sun, to be released from CamCat Books on January 17, 2023, because he had never seen a novel about the end of the world from an Asian perspective, despite a richness of Eastern cosmological and eschatological traditions.

"This book came about at a time when there was a sense of pessimism and darkness in the world," says Boey. "Many people I knew had an understandably fatalistic view of the future. As a parent of young children, I wanted to test that conclusion in an extreme setting, to try taking a belief held by much of the world, i.e., that the world is going to end, and ask: If the end was really around the corner and evervone knew it, could people still have hope?"

Karma of the Sun follows a young Tibetan Sherpa, in an imagined future of the earth's last days, who hunts for his missing father in the ruined nuclear winterland of the Himalayas, racing against a final calamity that threatens to destroy all humanity.

Readers will enjoy the rich world that Karma discovers on his journey and will be rooting for him as he finally reaches his destination.

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

Exciting Class III Whitewater on the Kennebec River

On the second day of the Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society weekend of paddling near West Forks, the schedule was exclusively whitewater. While a handful of Chowderheads planned to navigate the Dead River, most chose outings on the Kennebec.

The Kennebec Gorge below Harris Dam was the starting point for two trips. Releases from the dam were the source for both exciting whitewater excursions. One group planned to arrive early and negotiate a low volume voyage popularly called the "fish flow." The Class II/III fish flow begins at 350 cubic feet per second (CFS) and climbs incrementally until it reaches the rafting level at 10 A.M. A second team of whitewater boaters would test their skills on the Class IV 5000 CFS rafting release.

Nancy and I announced a Class II/III trip that starts about four miles downriver from Harris Dam at Carry Brook and continues for nine miles to West Forks. Our plan was to meet the fish flow crew and catch the rafting release bubble expected to arrive around 11:30.

We left a shuttle vehicle in West Forks and a kayaker joined Nancy and me for the drive to Carry

Brook. The Carry Brook excursion begins with a steep carry down a long twisting staircase to the river. On a typical summer weekend, the Kennebec River between Harris Dam and West Forks is a bustling place. Kayakers, canoeists, inflatable boaters, and rafters were climbing and descending the busy stairway when we toted our boats down. The rafting release had arrived by the time we reached the river and the fish flow contingent was anxiously waiting to paddle.

Gathered next to the shore was a mass of rafts loading supplies and exchanging passengers for the remainder of their journey. We would paddle amongst several rafting companies for our entire outing. The prospect of collisions with large rafts in difficult rapids was a concern. Smaller crafts are always the losers when such incidents occur. Our strategy was to ensure there was adequate space separating us prior to entering the more demanding rapids.

Our enthusiastic group paddled an assortment of boats. Ten Chowderheads navigated three solo kayaks, a solo canoe, a tandem canoe, a tandem inflatable kayak, and Nancy and I were in a shredder. Nancy's shredder is a

two-person inflatable boat propelled by single blade paddles. Several years had elapsed since we last shared a shredder; so we expected to be challenged especially by the large waves in Big Black Brook Rapid.

Launching amidst two rafting companies, we immediately attempted to separate ourselves in preparation for the longest most difficult sector of whitewater of the day, extensive Big Black Brook Rapid. We slowed to let one company move ahead while continuing a pace sufficient to stay in front of the other.

Proceeding around a sweeping right turn, we could see large swells marking the beginning of Big Black. Just below, the powerful current careened against sheer rock walls on river right resulting in a long stretch of substantial exploding waves. Most of us rode the left side of the wave train while a few of the more daring paddlers caught eddies next to the wall and attempted to surf the surging waves.

Chowderheads skirted a large boat-flipping hole with the unpleasant moniker, Dory Eater, as Big Black continued. More excitement followed as the protracted rapid ended with a feisty

passage through breaking waves and gnarly looking pour-overs. Everyone in our group successfully navigated the complex network of obstacles.

From that point, the difficulty level gradually diminished and the paddling agenda could be aptly described as "different strokes for different folks." Some surfed and played while others floated and socialized. Particularly noteworthy was the skilled father-daughter tandem canoe team of Ryan and Krea Galway who put on a wave surfing clinic.

The weather was superb, the water level excellent, and the company even better. It was a great way to end an exceptional weekend of paddling escapades.





USM Gorham Field Hockey, Men's Soccer Break in New Turf

GORHAM, ME (August 3, 2022) -- Home field advantage is going to be a lot more advantageous for the University of Southern Maine Huskies this year.

A renovation project at Hannaford Field in Gorham erased years of wear and tear by the five teams that use it the most. Those programs include Women's and Men's Soccer, Women's and Men's Lacrosse, and Field Hockey.

"You can see the new shade, new green, new color, the new life," said Tom Blanchard, Assistant Director of Capital Planning and Project Management. "And just the sheer excitement of seeing the branded logo, the Husky logo at center field. What more can you ask? That is so cool."

The old field had a generic layout without any additional decoration beyond the basic boundary lines. Fans accustomed to seeing only green turf will now be greeted by a giant blue and white symbol of school pride as they approach the field from the parking lot. The view doesn't get old for Blanchard who still smiles at the sight of the logo after weeks of overseeing the renovations.

Not only will players be able to see the difference, but they'll also able to feel it. The upgrades include a new 15-millimeter layer of padding that the previous field lacked.

"Better on knees, hips, ankles, everything. Get knocked down, it's softer on the landing. It's awesome," said Seth Benjamin, Head Coach of the Women's Soccer Team.

A field's ability to absorb impact is measured using the GMAX system. The numeric value increases as a field ages and hardens. When the rating reaches 200, the field is no longer deemed playable according to industry standards. A recent test of the old field returned a GMAX rating of 175, indicating its lifespan was nearing its end.

The padding is made to last for at least 20 years

without hitting the GMAX limit. The top layer of artificial turf, however, isn't as durable. The constant pounding of cleats takes a toll, and so does the environment. Faded colors are a sign of ultraviolet damage. Then comes the Maine winter. The only way to keep the field clear of snow is to run a plow across the surface. Between all of those factors, the turf needs to be replaced about every ten years.

Hannaford Field opened in 2011. USM went back to the same company that provided the original turf to handle its replacement. FieldTurf manufactures and installs its products for clients around the world.

Installation at Hannaford Field began soon after Commencement in May. The summer break in athletic competition was the ideal time to get the work done with minimal disruptions. FieldTurf crews began by cutting up and rolling the old turf, exposing the bare ground beneath. Over the next few weeks, they laid down the padding and new turf across an area spanning 93,000 square feet.

The turf is made in segments which fit together like a puzzle. As the wide-open swaths of green space are locked down, the field assumes its basic shape. The color-coded boundary lines go in separately along a network of seams. Workers insert them by hand, crawling inch-by-inch across the length of the field with the sun beating down on their backs. Making the heat even more oppressive is the hot glue they use to bind the fabric.

Even fully assembled, the field still isn't playable until it's been treated with a mixture of ground tires and sand called infill. One truck spreads infill over the entire surface while a second truck uses a rotating bristle to massage the grains down to the base of the turf. The infill reinforces the artificial grass to prevent it from flattening over

time.

The renovations also took the fans into account. The pathway around the field's perimeter was widened with a fresh layer of pavement to improve accessibility for people with mobility issues. Expanded safety netting stands 20-feet high and spans the full length of both endlines, making it safer to watch the action from behind the goals.

Major construction finished on June 23, well ahead of the projected end date in early July. The final cost of \$801,000 also improved on the \$900,000 estimate. Whether viewed from a budget line or the sideline, initial reactions to the new field have been positive.

"I'm probably biased, but I think it's the best-looking field in the state, especially in the fall," Benjamin said. "Leaves are changing color at night. For a night game, you can't get much better than Hannaford Field at USM."

Benjamin credits that wow factor with helping to win over prospective recruits who snuck a peek of the field during summer visits to campus. Good word of mouth is also spreading among a younger generation of soccer hopefuls.

Between July 18 and 21, Benjamin led a youth camp to teach soccer skills to girls in grades 5-9. Those campers were some of the first players to compete on the new field. Official team activities for USM's athletic programs don't resume until mid-August. Some of the women's soccer players still found their way onto the pitch as camp instructors.

"I'm glad to have the Husky (logo) in the middle, represent our school a little bit more. It's great. It's beautiful," said Bre Atwood during a break between drills. "I'm glad that we have one of the most pristine fields in our conference."

Atwood is an Exercise Science major heading into her junior year. On the soccer team, her position is goalkeeper. She hadn't

yet put the new field to the ultimate test by diving for a save. As a forward, Ci-Ci Berthiaume doesn't take quite as many dives. Still, she's logged a lot of field time on her way toward a master's degree in Leadership Studies and noticed a welcome improvement.

"It's a lot more cushiony than before," Berthiaume said. "I think the field before was pretty worn down. I remember playing on it when I was in eighth grade, so it's been here a while. It's nice to get back on the field again and feel how soft it is under our feet."

Both Berthiaume and Atwood put the campers through their paces, knowing the kind of commitment it takes to reach the next level. Daily sessions lasted seven hours with a full roster of drills to improve footwork, passing, and shots on goal.

Instead of clipboards, the coaching staff carried water guns to cool off

any campers who showed signs of wilting in the 80-degree heat. Words of encouragement flowed just as freely and had the same revitalizing effect. More than just lip service, the positivity emanating from the Women's Soccer program was already running high even before the new turf arrived.

"We had a fantastic fall this past year and we've just added to that team," Benjamin said. "We're coming in very confident and very optimistic that this season is going to be very special for USM Women's Soc-

cer."

The Women's Soccer team will play its inaugural game on the new field against the University of New England on September 10. Two other teams will get there first, however.

The Men's Soccer team hosted Curry College in a game on September 4. A few hours earlier on the same day, the Field Hockey team defended its home turf against Manhattanville College. Both the Men's and Women's Lacrosse teams won't hit the field until their seasons begin next spring.

Sen. Collins: Honoring Veterans Through Resources & Recognition

(July 19, 2022) -- Recently. I attended a White House signing ceremony for three bills I championed to help ensure that America's veterans receive the benefits, resources, and recognition they earned through their service to our country. It was a pleasure to witness the President sign into law two important bills that will strengthen breast cancer detection and prevention services, and one to pay tribute to the courageous Army Ranger veterans of World War II.

Women are the fastest-growing part of our veteran population. The bipartisan MAMMO for Veterans Act I co-authored will expand veterans' access to high-quality breast cancer screening and lifesaving cancer care. Specifically, the law will require the Department of Veterans Affairs to develop a strate-



gic plan to improve breast imaging services, create a telemammography pilot program for veterans in areas where VA does not offer in-house mammography, and expand veterans' access to clinical trials through partnerships with the National Cancer Insti-

As a companion to that bill, the President also signed the SERVICE Act of 2021. This legislation expands eligibility for VA mammography screenings to veterans who served in areas associated with burn pits and other toxic expo-

The U.S. Army Rangers Veterans of WWII Congressional Gold Medal Act provides for the award of a Congressional Gold Medal to World War II Army Rangers in recognition of their heroic service. Approximately 16 million Americans served in the U.S. military during that war. Among those soldiers, only 7,000 were Rangers. Of that elite group, there are now just a handful of living World War II Rangers left.

Those Rangers distinguished themselves in both the European and Pacific theaters. They are perhaps best known for their astonishing bravery and determination on D-Day, when they scaled the sheer 100-foot cliffs at Point du Hoc to eliminate the German threat to the amphibious landings at Omaha and Utah beaches below. Six months later in the Philippines, another Ranger battalion carried out a daring operation behind enemy lines to rescue more than 500 Allied POWs from a Japanese prison camp. That legendary special-operations unit established a legacy that continues to inspire us eight decades later.

In addition, both chambers of Congress have overwhelmingly passed historic legislation to address toxic exposure among service members. The Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act of 2022 will ensure all generations of toxic-exposed veterans receive the health care and benefits which they have earned.

The bill is named after Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson, who deployed to Kosovo and Iraq with

Tragically, he died in 2020 from toxic exposure as a result of his military service. Among its many priorities, the PACT Act will expand VA health care eligibility to Post-9/11 combat veterans, which includes more than 3.5 million toxic-exposed veterans. It will add 23 burn pit and toxic exposure-related conditions to VA's list of service presumptions, and it will expand presumptions related to Agent Orange exposure to include Thailand, Cambodia, Laos, Guam, American Samoa, and Johnston Atoll. Additionally, it will strengthen federal research on toxic exposure, improve VA's resources for toxic-exposed veterans, and expand training for VA health care and benefits professionals.

The brave men and women who have served in our military put themselves in harm's way, and it is our responsibility to provide them with the highest quality health care for any illnesses linked to their military service. For far too long, veterans exposed to toxic substances such as Agent Orange and burn pits during their deployments have not received the recognition or resources they needed. This comprehensive legislation puts us on the path to fulfilling the enormous debt we owe these veterans by expanding critical research on toxic exposure and providing relief to toxic-exposed veterans who may be experiencing serious illnesses and debilitating symptoms.

Our nation has a duty to honor the courage and sacrifices of those who serve, not just with words, but also with actions. As a Senator and the grateful daughter of a veteran, I am committed to ensuring that the government keeps that sacred obligation.



Another lovely aspect to this saga is that Jan's earliest helpers were her nieces and nephews who accompanied her on the camping trips. Now, they are adults and are carrying on the Serendipity trips from Houston with the Flowers' home in Wiscasset as one of their destinations.

When Jan thinks about the many camping trips she's planned and the many campers she's gotten to know, she says with pride that some of these young people "are

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
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

a refresher," A Matter of Balance participant said.

A Matter of Balance is an 8-session workshop with 2-hour meetings. Like every group-based program, participants benefit the most when they attend all eight meetings.

other The dence-based program that Southern Maine Agency on Aging offers to people who want to improve balance and wellbeing is Tai Chi for Health and Balance. It improves mobility, strength, breathing, and relaxation through a combination of movement, balance, jointsafe exercise, and mental focus. One of SMAA's Tai Chi practitioners and a volunteer instructor shared a story about trying to get from a trail at the Wells Reserve to the beach, which required walking across some rocks. "Because of my tai chi training, I could cross the rocks with no fear. Even when I lost my footing momentarily, I



was able to correct my balance."

Tai Chi for Health and Balance workshops meet for one hour twice a week for 10 weeks.
