

Start of School

year has gotten off to an excellent start! We brought over 500 staff back two weeks ago and last week we opened our doors to our students. It is amazing to have our schools open and operational again.

We are beginning the vear with far fewer COVID restrictions but are still reporting active COVID cases on our website to assist parents in making informed choices. If a student or staff member tests positive, they need to isolate for 5 days but then can return to school with a mask for the next 5 days if symptoms are improving. We are not contact tracing and not quarantining anymore. If we do get into an outbreak status,

The 2022-23 school we will of course need to inform families at that time, and conditions could change depending on the recommendations the Maine CDC. Our district website has a COVID page that provides up to date information as well as a Q&A for people that have questions. People can also reach out to the school nurse with questions.



MDIFW will cancel a program when weather or conditions presents an unsafe environment for participants. In most cases, decisions will be made 4 hours prior to the event. For morning programs, we will try and make the decision by 6pm the evening prior. Due to the unpredictability of the weather, MDIFW reserves the right to cancel programs at any point when it is deemed unsafe. Participants will be notified of cancellations via contact info provided at registration.



## Maine Lobstermen's Association Responds to Court's Decision

Release by Maine Lobstermen's Association

Kennebunk,  $\mathbf{ME}$ (**September 7, 2022**) – The Maine Lobstermen's Association has issued the following statement following the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia's decision in Maine Lobstermen's Association v National Marine Fisheries Service. "The federal district court

and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) have failed Maine's lobster industry. It has become crystal clear that neither grasp the devastating impacts their decisions will

have on the Maine lobster industry, our coastal communities, and the State of Maine. The court's decision provides a blank check for NMFS to continue to use admitted "worst case scenarios" and disregard actual data in its regulation of a fishery that has zero documented right whale entanglements over the last 18 years. This disappointing decision puts the future of

Maine's lobstering heritage at great risk, and along with it, the livelihoods of thousands of hard-working men and women. But this is not the end. We won't go down without a fight."

#### to "Avoid" Maine Lobster **Poliquin Responds to C**

The following is a statement by Fmr. Congressman Bruce Poliquin:

Lewiston, ME (September 7, 2022) -- "Seafood Watch's designation of lobster caught in the

Gulf of Maine as being on their "red list" is grossly misleading. Maine's lobstermen have worked tirelessly to sustainably harvest lobster in the Gulf of Maine because their fam-

ilies' livelihoods depend on it. There has not been a single right whale death that can be traced to Maine lobstering equipment and there has not been a right whale entanglement in lob-

stering gear in almost two decades.

Telling consumers to "avoid" Maine lobster is wrong and adds to the hardships that our lobstermen currently face. This kind of extreme environmentalist action is a direct result of Jared Golden's support of environmental groups that want to sink Maine's lobster industry. When I'm in Congress, I will always

make sure that lobstermen have the ability to earn a living for their loved ones, free of misguided designations, burdensome regulations, and sky-high bait and fuel costs."

Whalen sat down with the brilliant youth Generational behind Noor to hear about their experiences and discuss their future plans for the

"One of our goals is to have the funds to hire someone from the community who can really help us take Generational Noor to the next level. There are a lot of passionate people who want to help and are currently looking for work," said Osman.

Whalen told Osman he supports the idea and will remain committed to helping this new organization grow. "That is certainly a win-win. Because not only will you be giving somebody a job, but a job in the movement. You are off to an incredible start and one of my goals is to help put Generational Noor on the map. Once known, Generational Noor will have all the support it needs," said Whalen.

Generational Noor seeks to educate and change the way certain immigrant communities look at substance abuse. This includes preventing vouth in the community from falling into drug addiction, helping others overcome it, and giving those who have been incarcerated for drug related crimes a chance to land on their feet. ## EPA Selects USM for \$350,000 Pollution Prevention Grant

FREEPORT, ME (September 8, 2022) -Today, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced the selection of the University of Southern Maine (USM) to receive a \$350,000 Pollution Prevention (P2) grant made possible by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's historic \$100 million investment in the program. This grant will help support sustainability in the Maine craft beverage industry.

"EPA is very pleased that this grant for University of Southern Maine will help reduce pollution from being created in the first place," said EPA New England Regional Administrator David W. Cash. "Funding authorized by Congress and the Biden Administration in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law will reduce pollution in many communities, including some of Maine's urban neighborhoods. This will in turn protect people's health where they live, work and play."

USM's project will provide onsite and offsite technical assistance to the Maine craft beverage industry to increase operational efficiencies, limit pollution, and create a healthier working environment and community. With University of Southern Maine student interns, the project team will assist 15-20 craft beverage businesses with technical assistance including a New England Sustainable Craft Beverage recognition program, best practices, benchmarking tools, alternative cleaners and sanitizers, and financing P2 upgrades, including refrigerants. The grantee will also develop education and outreach events and resources, and amplify their work through postings, a video and speaking engagements. To gain participation and distribute resources, the grantee will utilize previously established P2 connections with businesses, professional organizations, and connections established by

prior EPA P2 assistance.

"Maine's craft beverage industry is an important economic driver in Maine. With over 145 breweries and growing, this sector added more than \$600 million to the Maine economy in 2021 alone. Every weekend, especially during summer, we see tourists and locals alike visiting Maine's many fine breweries and contributing to our local economy. Yet these businesses use significant water, energy, and chemicals in their day-to-day operations. With the renewed support of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Pollution Prevention Program, we are proud to assist the Maine craft beverage industry - building upon our work with dozens of breweries to date take action to reduce their environmental footprint, continue to serve their communities, and bolster the state's economy," said Martha Sheils, Director of the New England Environmental Finance Center.

The USM grant is one of three P2 grants being awarded in New England, for a combined total of \$1.05 million in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding, and in turn are part of 39 grants announced nationally that will share nearly \$12 million. These EPA grants will allow states and tribes to provide businesses with technical assistance to help them develop and adopt P2 practices to prevent or reduce pollution before it is even created, while also reducing business and liability costs. At the same time EPA is awarding four additional P2 grants in New England worth \$800,000 in traditional P2 funding. All combined, these new grants represent an unprecedented investment of nearly \$1.9M in P2 programs throughout


New England.

The P2 Program advances President Biden's
Justice40 Initiative, which aims to deliver at least
40 percent of the benefits of certain government

programs to underserved communities. State and Tribal programs awarded grants will not be required to provide matching funds, as is required by traditional P2 grants. The ability to waive the match requirement under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, in addition to the new National Emphasis Area for businesses in Indian country, helped to broaden and diversify the applicant pool. Many grants selected will support implementing pollution prevention practices in Indian country.

The United States produces billions pounds of pollution each year and spends billions of dollars per year controlling this pollution. Preventing pollution at the source, also known as P2 or source reduction, rather than managing waste after it is produced is an important part of advancing a sustainable economic and environmental infrastructure. P2 can ral resources, and reduce financial costs for businesses, particularly costs associated with waste management, disposal and cleanup. These practices are essential for protecting health, improving environmental conditions in and around disadvantaged communities, and preserving natural resources like wetlands, groundwater sources, and other critical ecosystems.

These grants are the first of five P2 grant programs over the next five years that will be funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. EPA has announced two other new grant opportunities funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. 



On a primal level, we react to music through movement.

A head-nod, a foottap, or a handclap certainly shows appreciation, but dancing seals the eternal bond between audience and musician. Siphoning the spirits of rock, funk, R&B, jazz, and pop through a kaleidoscope of unpredictable and virtuosic improvisation, Boston-based Ripe consistently bring people to their feet. something unique happens," adds Jon. "You'll never see the same show twice. We want to bring that unexpected element into the pop sphere."

Ripe brings the swagger of funk filtered through a rock anthem, a musical journey that somehow gets as stuck in your head as your favorite pop banger.

Formed during their Berklee College of Music days, the boys have built a rabid fan base through tireless gigging and a steady stream of music. Following their debut collection of songs, Produce The Juice EP, the 2015 Hey Hello EP yielded fan favorites "Goon Squad," which clocked over 4 million Spotify streams. The band then raised the stakes with their debut album, Joy In The Wild Unknown, which represented a creative journey as Ripe became a national presence. The common thread would always be the translation of their individual interplay to their audience, one that Ripe views as not just fans, but old and new



## Communities Sending Kids Back to School with Healthier Outlook

PORTLAND, ME (September 9, 2022) – Families in Portland and Brunswick are sending their kids back to school this fall with a greater likelihood of not being exposed to flavored tobacco products.

Councils in Portland and Brunswick passed an ordinance earlier in the year ending the sale of flavored tobacco products in each community, effective June 1. Many families testified at the time that students in middle and high schools were being exposed to flavored tobacco products through targeted marketing to youth

by tobacco companies. Some students told stories of classmates losing interest in studying and sports because they were so addicted to flavored tobacco. Some students even complained that they didn't like using the bathroom because it was frequently full of other students vaping or smoking. As school eases back into session, students in those communities will be less likely to be exposed to flavored tobacco prod-

"I am genuinely glad that we are finally taking more and more action," said Caleb Gould, a 7th grader at Brunswick Junior High School. I remember when the bathrooms were closed due to vaping, and hundreds of signs were put up only to be vandalized and made fun of. The way the tobacco industry has been targeting teens for decades with their 'healthy flavored' options is disgusting, and I for one, am glad to see the end of it."

The Bangor City Council also passed an ordinance ending the sale of flavored tobacco products later in the summer. The Bangor ordinance takes effect January 1, 2023.

"My freshman year in high school was an incredible experience, but seeing so many classmates and teammates succumbing to flavored tobacco was discouraging, to say the least," said Sophie Ward, a sophomore at John Bapst Memorial High School. "The Bangor City Council taking action by passing this ordinance shows a great amount of support for the health and safety of students at every middle and high school in the city. I am very appreciative of their decision."

South Portland is also giving consideration to ending the sale of flavored tobacco products. The South Portland City Council expects to bring up the

issue next month with a vote expected shortly after.

The issue will also likely come before the state legislature when it convenes in January.

"The momentum we are seeing through overwhelmingly positive votes at the municipal level is encouraging," said BJ Mc-Collister, campaign manager for Flavors Hook Kids Maine. "We have polling from earlier this year showing strong support for this type of a law statewide, and the local votes reinforce that. It's time to protect all of our kids in Maine from the dangers of flavored tobacco products, and we are hopeful that the legislature will agree when they return to Augusta in the new year."

Dozens of partners have come together in support of the effort, including the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, the American Heart Association, the American Lung Association, the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network, Healthy Acadia, the Christian Civic League, the Maine Children's Alliance. ## September Is Falls Prevention Awareness Month

MAINE, STATE-WIDE (September 5, 2022) -- September is Falls Prevention Awareness Month, a time to recognize the impact that falls have on the lives of millions of Americans each year and take steps to prevent falls.

The U.S. CDC reports that each year one in four adults over the age of 65 experiences a fall. Additionally, the National Council on Aging reports that an older adult is seen in an emergency room every 11 seconds due to a fall-related injury.

"Healthy Living for ME is actively making a difference for Mainers who are at risk for falls. Through workshops and resource connections, network partners throughout the state are helping Mainers reduce their risk of falls and improve their quality of life," said Jennifer Fortin, Training & Fidelity Manager of Healthy Living for ME. 
