I'm excited for another month of County Kids! Since Covid, we're not as frequent, so I'm always happy for another column request. I love writing for you all and appreciate being able to reflect and share. Thanks for the emails, texts, and calls when you enjoy something you've read or when you haven't seen Family Matters with Amber in a while. I appreciate you!

Most know in May my youngest has turned 18 and graduated high school, and my girls are on their own (as I write this, they turned 25 and 21). Initially, this month's column was to be about how nobody tells you what it's like to walk smack dab into a wall called "Empty Nest". I'll still write about that because it's important, especially for mamas, but sometimes a single conversation causes me to change topics mid-stream, so instead I'm writing about something else some parent/s out there might need to hear today.

I network often as part of operating my editing/writing business. Recently I had a conversation with someone on the east coast. On our first call, we connected well, mainly about business, my ADHD diagnosis, and women's health. During our second call, I learned about her upbringing, family, and home life. Her mom is a single



mother of three, like me. My new Zoom friend in Cali is kind, intelligent, caring, hardworking, and down to earth. I could tell she was raised in a way that reflected her mom and the example she must have set. I respect her mom for that, I know it's not an easy road alone, and I said I felt her mom did a wonderful job raising her. She admitted it was not easy for her mom, and her mom did struggle, but she didn't hide it from her and her siblings. She explained how much she appreciated her mother's transparency, honesty, and willingness to allow the kids to see her as 'not perfect'. She appreciated how it allowed their relationship to become deeper and more genuine and helped her and her brothers not feel pressured to be perfect. My new friend then said, "I think that's why I connect with and respect you so much, you're

a lot like my mom". Wow! I was honored she felt that way! That was a compliment.

I'm there for my kids and tried being the perfect mom. As parents, we'd like to paint a picture-perfect façade and think we should always be strong; the one to support, provide, and protect. But there's times I've lost my cool or haven't been on my game. I've had my troubles; I've broken down, checked out, messed up, let someone down, cried and had to apologize. Those times weren't pretty. *I* wasn't pretty. I messed up, yes, but my kids were told the truth, not blamed, or left wondering if they'd done something wrong. My three most major and unforgettable messups were met by each of my children in the following ways...

When my oldest was 12 she watched me struggle; I felt like a failure. She said, "Mommy, it's okayyyyy", as she patted my back and handed me a tissue, "you don't have to be perfect...or else we would think we have to be perfect too, and that's impossible". After that night she would leave encouraging rainbow sticky notes and sometimes include a candy bar. When my middle was 16, she knelt by me as I apologized for screwing up big time, and said, "It's okay Mama, it's a lesson learned right? We all make mistakes, but we learn from them, you will learn from this one, it will be okay, we love you". My son had this response at 17, "It's okay Mom, we all have our moments, you can't be perfect all the time, and I know you love me, everything worked out fine"...with a hand reaching for mine, "now go do the things you lovecook, put on the football game, music or a movie, and get ready for tomorrow.... and thank you". THANK YOU? Through tears, "FOR WHAT Buddy!? I just let you down!" His response, "You've always been there for me growing up, coming to all my games, driving me to practices and everywhere else, getting me through school, and finding me the right health care help, and supporting me when I need it". 

3 Tips to Boost Your Children's Self-Esteem This School Year

(Family Features) While packing bags and backpacks for school, there's one essential that may be overlooked: Children's self-esteem. Although many children may feel confident and self-assured at home, they can feel differently in the classroom. When children have high self-esteem, they're less likely to reflect negative feelings toward others.

"If children can treat themselves kindly, they'll treat others that way," said Carter Peters from KinderCare Learning Centers' education team. "When children feel encouraged, supported and loved, they are able to give those feelings to others."

Consider these three tips to boost your children's self-esteem.

Be Your Children's Cheerleader. When praising or complimenting children for their achievements, be specific and include affirmation for positive character traits, such as "You were so kind to help Ms. Delmar take her recycling out" or "I'm proud of you for seeing she needed help and offering it." Being specific with



your compliments reinforces the idea that your children are kind and helpful. Eventually, they'll offer others the same positive affirmations and be less likely to look to outside influences to define their sense of self.

"When children have high self-esteem and self-worth, they know when someone's opinion of them is untrue," Peters said. "Children with high self-esteem become adults capable of believing in themselves."

one-on-one, it's equally important to give them space to come to you for help. Let them know you notice when they don't seem like themselves but try not to push them to share before they're ready.


You can talk with your children about the ways they can communicate with you, aside from one-onone conversations. If they find it easier to communicate their feelings through writing, you can go to the store together to pick out a journal. Children who are not yet proficient writers may prefer to draw pictures about their feelings. No matter the method, be sure to make time to check in with your children.

Teach Emotional Literacy and Replacement Skill Behavior. You can help your children move beyond comprehension of basic emotions - happy, sad, mad - and toward an understanding of more nuanced emotions. When children can identify their feelings, they're closer to developing healthy responses.



Commonly labeled "bad behaviors" are often young children's way of communicating something is wrong, so they may need help identifying the emotion driving their actions. It's important for children to understand that while their feelings are acceptable, their behavior may not be. That's where replacement skills - acceptable ways to express emotions - come in. For example, try saying "It's OK to be mad. It's not OK to hit other people. When you're mad, you can hit a pillow."
