Gorham HS Awarded Funding to Support Education Innovation

AUGUSTA, ME (October 4, 2022)—The Maine Department of Education (DOE) today awarded \$1.6 million in Rethinking Responsive Education Ventures (RREV) funding to support education innovation in twelve school administrative units (SAUs) across Maine. These federal funds will be used to invest in strategies to engage students through outdoor learning, alternative education, online learning pathways, and more.

Awardees for this fourth round of RREV funding include RSU 35 Marshwood Great Works School, RSU 34 Old Town Middle/High School, RSU 73 Spruce Mountain Elementary School, Gorham High School, MSAD 61 Lake Region Middle School, MSAD 11 Gardiner High School, Limestone Community School, Maine Academy of Natural Sciences, Wayfinder Schools, RSU 13 Oceanside High School, MSAD 49 Lawrence High School, and MSAD 59 Madison Elementary School. The first round of RREV investments were made last fall, a second round in March, a third round in June, and total RREV investments now near \$8 million with 39 awardees.

"RREV investments help fuel the innovation and creativity of Maine educators so that all Maine students are engaged, prepared, and can thrive," said Education Commissioner Pender Makin. "We're excited to invest in these educator-led efforts to deepen student engagement through outdoor education initiatives that provide students with hands-on, project-based learning opportunities as well as initiatives that create multiple education pathways that fit the needs of all of Maine's students."

Schools will use this funding in a variety of innovative ways, including:

Spruce Mountain Elementary will create a greenhouse classroom for all students to use.

Gorham High School will create outdoor learning spaces, fund field trips for students, and offer students and teachers learning experiences to extend their capacity toward outdoor learning.

Lake Region Middle School will build both a large greenhouse and an outdoor learning pavilion to increase their capacity for outdoor education and ensure

Head Outdoors for National Wildlife Refuge Week

WIDE (October 6, 2022) -- Walk, run or stroll in nature during National Wildlife Refuge Week, October 9-15, 2022. Enjoy great outdoor recreation in the nation's largest network of public lands dedicated to wildlife conservation, the National Wildlife Refuge System, managed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Founded in 1903, national wildlife refuges offer access to a host of popular activities while providing vital habitat for thousands of wildlife spe-

"Conserving wildlife habitat and improving recreation access to public lands are key goals of the Biden-Harris administration's America the Beautiful initiative," said Service Director Martha Williams. "National Wildlife Refuge

Week is a great time for Americans to take pride in our rich wildlife heritage and discover the recreation and scenic wonders awaiting them at national wildlife refuges."

America the Beautiful is a decade-long challenge to pursue a locally led and voluntary, nationwide effort to conserve, connect, and restore the lands, waters and wildlife upon which we all depend. National

Wildlife Refuge Week occurs yearly during the second full week of October. The week of celebrations kicked off on Saturday, October 8, with Urban Wildlife Conservation Day. Admission was free on Sunday, October 9 at wildlife refuges that normally charge an entrance fee. Nearly 500 national wildlife refuges and wetland management districts offer free admission year-round.

This year, the Refuge System is partnering with the Public Lands Alliance to celebrate our commitments to deepening human connections with nature. As part of Refuge Week, the Service is encouraging people to get out in nature for good health and to help wildlife thrive. Over 30, free, self-guided 5K "Walk for the Wild" events around the country will highlight national wildlife refuges.

The Refuge System offers many healthful outdoor activities including fishing, wildlife viewing and wildlife photography while providing vital habitat for thousands of wildlife species, including sandhill cranes, American alligators, bison, and sea turtles. This year's Refuge Week

theme is: "Find refuge in nature. Join us on our mission to make sure wildlife and humans thrive."

The Refuge System helps many species recover and thrive:

About 340 California condors fly free today, thanks to efforts by Hopper Mountain National Wildlife Refuge, Bitter Creek National Wildlife Refuge and many committed partners. In 1982, there were just 22 known condors in the wild.

Refuge-led tidal marsh restorations in San Francisco Bay and Willapa Bay in Washington are providing new feeding and rearing areas for salmon and migratory birds, while also protecting nearby communities.

The Refuge System is an unparalleled wildlife conservation network of 568 national wildlife refuges and 38 wetland management districts. There is a national wildlife refuge within an hour's drive of most major metropolitan areas, almost all offering free admittance yearround. National wildlife refuges provide vital habitat for thousands of species and access to world-class recreation, from fishing, hunting and boating to nature watching, photography and environmental

National wildlife refuges contribute \$3.2 billion per year into local economies and support more than 41,000 jobs, according to the Service's report Banking on Nature. Visits to refuges have doubled in the last 10 years, reaching nearly 65 million visits in 2021. National wildlife refuges also make life bet-

More than 101 million Americans - 40 percent of the U.S. population age 16 and older - pursue wildlife-related recreation, including hunting, fishing and wildlife watching.



Whitewater Exploits on the Magalloway River

Twenty-six years ago, my late friend Bill Kaiser recruited me to represent the Appalachian Mountain Club in dam relicensing tests on the Rapid and Magalloway Rivers in western Maine. I was one of perhaps a dozen participants from several regional paddling organizations.

The purpose was to navigate the two rivers in canoes or kayaks for three consecutive days at different release levels and provide feedback on the best volumes for whitewater boating. The dam owner provided food, lodging, and transportation. The participants' responsibilities were to paddle the rivers and evaluate the releases.

If this sounds like a sweetheart deal for an avid whitewater paddler, it was. There was a minor catch; although a veteran of many Rapid River excursions, I had never heard of the Magalloway River and had no idea what to expect. When I met with the other river testers, the scuttlebutt was the Magalloway was a very stimulating sector of whitewater that began with a difficult Class V.

After an entertaining low volume outing on the Rapid on the first morning, we were transported to the Magalloway for the highest of three levels to be tested, 1500 cubic feet per second (CFS). When our group arrived at the

parking area next to the river, only one participant elected to paddle the Class V section. Everyone else walked to the bottom where a Class III rapid began and watched intently as the solo kavaker completed his run. He had some difficulties tumbling through a couple of nasty holes, but remained in his boat. Several of us believed we saw a better route staying tight right and plummeting over a vertical ledge drop near the bottom. The remainder of the 2.1 mile trip was a succession of easier but exhilarating rapids.

On the following day, the Magalloway test level was 900 CFS. Again, only the one kayaker challenged the Class V. That release received a high rating from everyone.

On the final day, the release was 1200 CFS. After a careful scout, several of us ran the difficult rapid. Negotiating down the right worked. We all had successful descents. The downriver rapids offered several exceptional surfing waves. The 1200 CFS level received glowing reviews from all of the testers. As a result of our group assessment, the 1200 and 900 CFS levels were selected as the primary re-

Fast forward to Labor Day weekend 2022, my wife Nancy and I learned several young friends were camping near the Magalloway and paddling the river during a weekend of 1200 CFS releases. My email trolling for a Sunday invite for two senior citizens received a positive response.

We met a large enthusiastic group at the take out in Wilson Mills. The three paddling families were equipped with rafts, canoes, and kayaks. Nancy decided to paddle on a raft and I brought a kayak.

At the put-in, young Mason Galway chose to attempt the Class V section while the remainder of the crew carried down the trail to the Class III launch. Age 16, seemingly overnight Mason has matured into a solid Class IV boater. He scored a perfect 10 nailing the line on the right.

While Mason played in the waves, the rest of us began embarking one boat at a time from the confined launch area. The first Class III is the most complex of the remaining rapids. The gradient is steep and congested with boulders, ledge drops, and sticky holes requiring precise maneuvering. Rolling is difficult in the shallow descent. One kayaker had flipped and swam the previous day and everyone was on high alert. We aced the tricky extended assortment of river impediments.

The excitement continued as we progressed downriver. The next couple of rapids were similar to the first but easier. Waves at the bottom provided excellent surfing opportunities.

Rounding a bend, we encountered a Class III rapid called Double Wide. Viewed from above,

there is no obvious route through a maze of pour overs and breaking waves. We plunged down a narrow slot on the right, rode the left side of a wave train past a boat flipping hole, and negotiated easier rapids and quick water to the takeout.

After lunch, we did it all over again. Our energetic friends completed yet a third run. We were right twenty-six year ago; 1200 CFS is the best.

Several more Maine whitewater adventures are narrated in my book, Maine Al Fresco: The Fifty Finest Outdoor Adventures in Maine.

After sharing videos with students in the spring of this year, one school staff person indicated, "What I enjoyed the most was the accessibility of the videos; they helped to


motivate the kids, and the videos were easy to follow and understand."



The Nation's Most Frequent Disaster: Home Fires

PORTLAND, ME (October 6, 2022) — This Fire Prevention Week (October 9-15), the Red Cross Northern New England Region urges everyone to practice their two-minute home fire escape plan and test their smoke alarms to stay safe from the nation's most frequent disaster.

Two minutes is the amount of time that fire experts say you may have to safely escape a home fire before it's too late. These crises account for most of the 60,000-plus disasters that the Red Cross responds to each year across the U.S. — where home fire responses are 30% higher during cold months than warmer times of year. In the Red Cross Northern New England Region - encompassing New Hampshire, Vermont and Maine – home fire responses are 37% higher during cold months.

"As the threat of home fires increases with colder temperatures, Fire Prevention Week serves as an important reminder to prepare now," said John Montes, Regional Disaster Program Officer for the Red Cross Northern New England Region. "Practice your two-minute home fire escape drill and test your smoke alarms monthly to help keep your family safe.'

HOW TO PRAC-TICE YOUR TWO-MIN-**UTE DRILL**

Practice your plan with everyone in your household; also teach children what a smoke alarm sounds like and what to do in an emergency. Include at least two ways to exit every room in your home in your escape

Select a meeting spot at a safe distance away from your home, such as your neighbor's home or landmark like a specific tree in your front yard, where everyone knows to

Place smoke alarms on each level of your home, including inside and outside bedrooms and sleeping areas. Test alarms monthly and change the batteries at least once a year, if your model requires it.

Check the manufacturer's date of your smoke alarms. If they're 10 years or older, they likely need to be replaced because components such batteries can become less reliable. Follow your alarm's manufacturer instructions.

Tailor your escape plan to everyone's needs in your household. If you or a loved one is deaf or hard of hearing, install strobe light and bed-shaker alarms to help alert you to a fire.

IF YOU NEED HELP If you cannot afford to purchase smoke alarms or are physically unable to install one, the Red Cross may be able to help. Contact your local Red Cross for help.



Sen. Collins Visits Standish, Addresses Nursing Shortage



STANDISH, \mathbf{ME} (October 4, 2022)—U.S. Senator Susan Collins visited Saint Joseph's College to speak with administrators, faculty, and students about the college's efforts to alleviate the shortfall of medical professionals in Maine. She also saw firsthand the plans that are underway to continue Saint Joseph's exceptional instruction of current and future generations of nurses.

President Jim Dlugos and Undergraduate Nursing Program Director Terry Girouard-Jordan led Senator Collins on a tour of the third floor of Mercy Hall, which is currently undergoing construction to become a nursing simulation floor. The new facility will consist of a nursing station, four hospital rooms—two ICU, one pediatric, and one maternity—that will have the ability to prepare nursing students for a variety of health care scenarios, including heart attacks, strokes, and births. The labs will use high-tech, life-like manikins, the latest medical equipment, simulated medications. The SIM floor also includes a simulated home care "apartment" to train students and caregivers in community health. Afterwards, Senator Collins received a tour of the second floor of Mercy Hall, which Saint Joseph's plans to upgrade to facilitate collaborative education and community partnerships with three smart classrooms as well as space where students can study, obtain test help, take tests, and interact with faculty. Senator Collins has championed funding for both of these projects.

"Maine has the highest median age of any state in the nation, which presents unique challenges to the state's health workforce for meeting the needs of its aging population. In addition, many of Maine's residents reside in rural areas where there is often a lack of access to home health care," said Senator Collins. "Saint Joseph's College has been a leader in the effort to train a sufficient number of medical professionals to keep Mainers healthy. By constructing state-of-



the-art simulation labs, and increased academic space, and flexible spaces to allow other community groups such as local EMT's to provide training, this investment will help Saint Joseph's build on its superb health care workforce training programs and grow the number of nurses and other health care workers in Maine. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I will continue to champion this funding as the appropriations process moves forward."

Commenting on the Senator's visit, President Jim Dlugos said, "Saint Joseph's College is deeply grateful to Senator Collins for her wonderful advocacy and support for our project to complete the Center for Nursing Innovation. These facilities will not only excellently serve our students, but assist us in our mission to engage the community around us so that together we can provide a larger, stronger health care workforce for

arts college with an average annual enrollment of about 2,000 students on campus and online. Among other programs of study, it offers an on-campus Bachelors of Science in Nursing, an online Registered Nurse to BSN program, RN to Masters of Science in Nursing Fast Track program, as well as online graduate programs and advanced certifications for Family Nurse Practitioners, nursing administration, nursing education, a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Study, and MSN/MBA and MSN/ MHA dual degrees. Nursing is the college's largest program.

Senator Collins secured \$810,000 for Saint Joseph's to build the simulation lab in the Fiscal Year 2022 Appropriations package that was signed into law in March. Senator Collins is also working to secure an additional \$1.2 million in the Fiscal Year 2023 Appropriations package to expand space for academic programs for BSN students and for training the home care workforce for the State of Maine.

APL Receives PLA Digital Literacy Grant

AUBURN, ME (September 15, 2022) — The Auburn Public Library is among over 160 public libraries nationwide awarded funding by the Public Library Association (PLA) to conduct digital literacy workshops using Digitallearn.org resources. The PLA Digital Literacy Workshop Incentive, supported by AT&T, provides support to libraries of all sizes to conduct digital literacy training in their communities and help close the digital divide.

The Auburn Public Library's mission is simple and direct – to bring "people, resources and ideas together to engage, enlighten and enrich the community." Within that mission, two goals speak directly to the need for knowledge of technology – the goal of helping customers of all generations to grow and to learn, and the goal of promoting workforce development.

Knowledge of technology continues to be a very important – and necessary – skill for members of any community. Whether applying for resources, seeking a new job, or simply communicating, more and more businesses and organizations are requiring that people complete courses or training, job applications, and/or formal documents online. On a given day at the APL Reference Desk, staff spend a significant amount of time providing some form of technology help, whether on library computers or with a customer's personal laptop or other device. Customers often ask about whether the library offers formal classes in digital literacy. The receipt of this grant will allow the library to teach the necessary skills for our community members to succeed in a digital environment.

Through the grant funding, to better facili-

tate these workshops, APL will be purchasing a large television monitor in the Computer Lab. This will allow the instructor to better facilitate the workshops and those participating to more clearly see the screen. In addition, the library also plans to purchase tablets for program participants for use with the training.

On receiving this grant, Auburn Public Library Director Mamie Ney said, "We are grateful to have this grant, which allows us to continue our digital and media literacy efforts. We began with an American Library Association grant a few years ago, and we realize now more than ever our work is not done here."

"The mission of libraries has always been about equitable access to information, literacy, learning, and culture. In the age of COVID-19, this mission has only become vital as libraries have played a crit-

ical role in keeping communities connected and online," said PLA President Maria McCauley. "A 2020 PLA survey found that about 88% of public libraries provide some form of digital literacy support, but only 42% offer formal classes. Staffing and funding were the top barriers to providing technology training. AT&T's investment with PLA and public libraries nationwide will boost access to digital literacy skills for the most vulnerable in our communities."

PLA's free training site, Digitallearn.org, helps community members build skills and confidence using technology. The Auburn Public Library will help patrons utilize these resources in upcoming workshops that will be conducted in person at the Library – 49 Spring Street, Auburn, Maine – in the 2nd floor Computer Lab. The first workshop is scheduled for Wednesday, September 21,

from 4-5 p.m. and will cover Computer Basics; skills will include navigating the desktop, organizing files and folders, managing the windows of an application, and working within files.

Gardiner Area High School will ensure that every freshman spends 75 percent of their Earth Science class outdoors to provide a real-world context for their learning.

Oceanside High School will bring together cohorts of eight to ten high school students, with a specific focus on students who are at risk of dropping out, to meet weekly to work on both social emotional learning and supplementing their academic requirements and standards with hands-on

outdoor training and projects

Lawrence High School is developing an intensive alternative education program for some of their most struggling students called the Lawrence Education Alternative Program (L.E.A.P).

Madison Elementary School will make their current trail ADA accessible and install a dock system onto their wetlands to be used as an outdoor classroom space.

Old Town Middle/ High School will create a remote/hybrid program called Coyote Online Opportunity (Co-Op) as a pathway for students to receive a quality education in a setting that best works for them.

Limestone Community School will pilot an outdoor education program that is accessible to all middle level students as part of their regular school day.

Wayfinder Schools is focused on their Passages Responsive Education Project (PREP) pilot to meet the needs Maine youth who have struggled in traditional school settings and are off-track to graduate.

The Maine Academy of Natural Sciences will construct a Makerspace Barn to engage students in experiential outdoor projects while providing the resources and space to offer a blacksmithing course on campus to all interested students.

Marshwood Great Works School's Great Works Ventures Outdoors will expand outdoor learning opportunities as a way to provide essential growth opportunities for every student.

The Maine DOE was awarded \$16.9 million from the U.S. Department of Education's Rethink K-12 Education Models Funding. As one of 11 States to receive funding, Maine created RREV to support the work of visionary educators to develop innovative pilot programs around remote and outside

of the classroom learning, including professional development and pilot design classes. Courses in innovative design process are available through several of Maine's public and private universities at no cost to Maine educators who wish to participate. In addition to the innovative pilot development classes, the Department is also offering asynchronous, innovative principles webinars which are available to all educators in self-paced, independent modules.



Passing Legislation that Works for Maine People

-- As I reflect on my final session as your state senator and the work the Legislature was able to accomplish this year, I'm confident that we focused on passing laws that help address the challenges faced by everyday Mainers. From longstanding challenges like access to affordable health care to new

issues like the high cost of heating and electricity, my colleagues and I passed laws that will make a positive impact on the lives of people here in Lewiston and across the state. In Maine, the majority of laws take effect 90 days after the Legislature adjourns, making Aug. 8 the day that many new laws went into effect this year. I'd like to share some information with you about the laws

we passed to make life easier for Mainers this year.

When the price of energy and heating oil spiked in January, many Mainers were left wondering how they would be able to keep the lights on and their homes warm. While these cost increases are mostly due to global factors, the Legislature did as much as we could to ease the burden on Maine people. For shorter-term

to streamline access to existing heating assistance programs and created a tiered credit worth up to \$3,000 to help small businesses like grocery stores and convenience stores that have high energy burdens. We also looked at longer-term solutions by making structural changes, ensuring greater accountability and consumer input during the electric rate-setting process and holding utility companies accountable for failing to prioritize customers. As we near the end of summer and head into autumn, I encourage you to apply as soon as possible for any heating and electricity assistance that you may be eligible for. You can learn more by vis-

During my eight years as your state senator, one concern I've heard from you time and again is the high cost of health care and prescription drugs. This year, the Legislature continued building on the progress we made these past few years to help Mainers access quality, affordable care. We passed a law to prohibit a shady dou-

grams-services/energy.

insurance companies apply to policyholders who receive assistance paying for their prescriptions. We also passed a law to ensure that patients can access an emergency supply of their prescription medications by allowing pharmacists to dispense small amounts of chronic maintenance drugs as long as the patient has a history of receiving that medication. This can be a literal lifesaver for people like the bill's sponsor, Rep. Amy Roeder, who relies on an inhaler to treat her asthma. We also expanded insurance coverage for state-regulated insurance plans by requiring them to cover fertility treatments, contraceptives and postpartum care. It's critical that Mainers are able to decide if and when to start a family, and that parents and babies are given the care and attention they need to get off to a healthy start.

Also going into effect this month is my law to extend the Historic Property Rehabilitation Tax Credit, an important program that encourages downtown revitalization efforts while creating affordable housing. With the housing shortage impacting so many communities all across Maine, it's important we use all tools at our disposal to meet this need while preserving the character of our downtowns. Among the other laws going into effect this month are laws that expand property tax relief for totally and permanently disabled veterans; ensure continued funding for Meals on Wheels; improve access to justice for sexual assault and domestic violence survivors; and so much more. I'm incredibly proud of the good work we were able to accomplish this year, and very grateful that you put your trust in me to do it.



"An accreditation like this is part of building the infrastructure needed to grow the life sciences in this state," said Ross Hickey, Assistant Provost for Research Integrity at USM. The only other such accreditation in Maine is held by MaineHealth, a frequent USM partner.

in this state," said Ross The accreditation Hickey, Assistant Provost for USM and four oth-

er institutions worldwide was announced Sept. 23rd AAHRPP President and CEO Elyse I. Summers.
