Gorham School Committee resolution to affirm its support of LGBTQ+ students and staff in Gorham Schools.

WHEREAS, our vision statement says that All Gorham students learn in safe, positive, and inclusive environments that support risk-taking. Our staff builds strong, caring relationships with all students. Classrooms are collaborative and interactive where students have real choices and responsibilities.

WHEREAS, it is the right of every child, regardless of gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation, to access a free public K-12 education and the Gorham School Department welcomes and supports all students;

WHEREAS, the Gorham School Department recognizes that all employees are valued members of the school community regardless of their gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation;

WHEREAS, the Gorham School Department recognizes that the families in our community are comprised of various configurations and the Gorham School Department values all families and caregivers of students. regardless of gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation;

WHEREAS, The Maine Human Rights Act prohibits discrimination because of sex and sexual orientation, including gender identity and expression

WHEREAS, in Bostock v. Clayton County decided on June 15, 2020, the United States Supreme Court recognized that discriminating on the basis of actual or perceived sexual orientation or gender identity is always a form of sex discrimination, and federal law prohibits sex discrimination in employment and education;


WHEREAS, creating a welcoming and safe school environment for our LGBTQ students, staff, families, and caregivers makes our school community more welcoming and safe for all;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Gorham School Department will not tolerate discrimination against all persons, whether student, family/caregiver of a student, or Gorham School Department employee, on the basis of actual or perceived sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression, or the actual or perceived sexual orientation, gender identity, or gender expression of their associates;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the School Committee directs the policy committee to review and revise its policies with gender neutral and culturally responsive terms that are necessary to align our policies to the core values of the Gorham School Department and to protect students and staff from discrimination in all protected classes, but specifically in the area of gender and gender identity.

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Candidates Who Support Parents Rights on Graphic Sexual Content in Schools Letter to the Editor

Dear Maine Parents: I warn of a threat to the health of Maine children. People who know me know that I gave up a lucrative law practice, and the support of living where I grew up, to have time to raise my children. 15 years later, librarians still tell me they remember me giving lessons to my 3 preschool kids daily at the Camden Library. My first law job

was for a NY legislator had breasts and a wispy named Eric Vitaliano. He told me his legislative priorities were kids and older people. "You can't repeat the second grade". I have tried to reflect my wise, kind mentor's priorities ever since.

At a yardsale, a kid, maybe 24, sold dorm room junk. Trendy posters of four years ago had the glitter of things outgrown. He

goatee. He said in a tenor speaking voice, "Twenty-five cents for anything. I need to get rid of it all."

Getting rid of the trappings of immaturity is a rite of passage. It helps us start anew. But what if those things you chose in immaturity stuck with you forever? We don't allow advertisement of many products to children. Interposing mature judgment between a child and irreversible harm is what it means to be a parent. And if your kid gets hurt, you are the one left to help. No politician, activist, social worker, or surgeon is going to stroke their head or feel their pain or help support them.

Many Maine parents and grandparents adamantly oppose school focus being shifted away from academic achievement and onto hyper-sexualization and racialization. And yet the press does not ask the candidates their position on this critical issue. Does the candidate support parents' rights legislation? There is clear evidence of graphic sexual content in many Maine school libraries, of non-academic curricula paid for by special interest

groups, of the indoctrination of young children into a racialized and hyper-sexualized world view. And all before a backdrop of falling test scores. Before they cast their ballots, voters have a right to know if a candidate would outlaw sex change surgery and irreversible drug therapy for minors.



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Seniors Not Acting Their Age Paddling Runaround Pond

My one-word description for Runaround Pond is serene. I found the narrow 2.7-mile-long pond located in Durham last fall when I was looking for an easy kayak paddle while recuperating from hip surgery. I located it in my Delorme Maine Atlas when plotting a course to another pond and decided to stop on the way. From the moment I arrived at Runaround Pond Park, I was enthusiastic about everything I found.

The park has a boat landing, picnic area, hiking trail, toilet, and parking space for a few vehicles. The landing is ideal for a hand-carry launch. I backed my vehicle down to the water and literally dropped my kayak in the pond.

The Runaround Pond Recreation Area is part of Royal River Conservation Trust (RRCT). As can be evidenced by the RRCT Landscape Map, there are lots of nooks and crannies to explore. One only has to paddle around the first bend to find the pond hosts an abundance of wildlife. Runaround Pond

has an interesting history. In prehistoric times, the locale was home to Wabanaki Native Americans for centuries. In the mid-18th Century, an early settler named Judah Chandler moved to the area. He built

a dam and sawmill at the head of a falls on a stream now named Chandler River. The dam created picturesque Runaround Pond.

My first visit to Runaround was a very pleasurable paddling experience. I went back for another early this summer. Each time, I returned home extolling the benefits of my newfound kayaking adventure. Intrigued, my wife Nancy joined me on a recent visit.

When we arrived at the park, Nancy immediately remarked, "This is nothing like what I expected." That was similar to my first reaction. The landing on the eastern end of the pond is nestled in a wooded area that looks

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
Our premium grade sealer inexpensively adds years of life! more like the entrance to a rest area than a pond. From the landing, only about an acre of pond is visible. From that viewpoint, an observer would not expect that a much more substantial paddling

outing is forthcoming. Shortly after launching, a Great Blue Heron wading in swamp grass

wading in swamp grass loudly squawked at us and begrudgingly flew farther west. Each time I've paddled Runaround, lone Great Blue Herons have been encountered at different locations. I'm unsure if they're the same bird or several.

With the exception of a home situated at the top of a clearing near the western terminus, the shoreline of winding Runaround Pond is undeveloped. Besides the ubiquitous herons, wildlife is plentiful in this wilderness setting. Beavers, otters, eagles, osprey, and kingfishers are frequently spotted. Multitudes of turtles can usually be found lined up on logs along the shore.

We passed a beaver hut on the left at the outlet of a tiny tributary but no sign of beavers. In that same area, we met a solo kayaker fishing. She reported several bites. Runaround Pond is a popular fishing destination. Bass

and pickerel are plentiful.

Shortly after passing the mouth of Libby Brook on the right, we entered a sector cluttered with colorful lily pads. Locating a route in the maze was similar to negotiating a slalom course. The dense vegetation continued and the pond narrowed as we progressed west. Beyond the distinctive home on the right, we arrived at a dock where a pontoon boat was moored. Since aquatic vegetation thickens at that location, it had been my turnaround in the past.

Nancy and I decided to continue with our exploration. Although shallow and congested, we slowly progressed to an area where swamp grass appeared to block further advancement. Careful inspection identified an attenuated passage we negotiated using our paddles as setting poles. Just beyond. we converged on a culvert under Pownal Road. This was truly the end of the line, as submerged rocks prevented further progress.

On our return, we followed Libby Brook tributary to the end of nav-

igation. An otter swam in front of us just before we rejoined the pond. Approaching the landing, we turned right and paddled through a tunnel under Runaround Pond Road and entered a unique ravine. The pond ends there at what appears to be Judah Chandler's original dam. The 250 year old barrier continues to provide for the serenity of Runaround Pond.

Simply download the American Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org. call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have

to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Collins, Rosen MOBILE Health Act Signed into Law

WASHINGTON D.C. (October 18. 2022) — U.S. Senators Susan Collins (R-ME) and Jacky Rosen (D-NV) applauded news that President Biden has signed their bipartisan, bicameral Maximizing Outcomes through Better Investments in Lifesaving Equipment (MOBILE) Health for Care Act into law. The legislation provides community health centers with the flexibility to use federal funds to establish new, mobile health care delivery sites to increase access to health care services in rural and underserved communities.

the go with mobile clinics, **Maine Aviation Unit Slated for Deployment Next Year**

BANGOR, MAINE (October 25, 2022) (readMedia) -- Thirty-six Maine soldiers from 3rd Battalion, 142nd Aviation Regiment (3-142) will deploy to the U.S. Central Command area of operations in February 2023, Maine National Guard officials publicly announced today.

The unit operates the UH-60M Black Hawk helicopter and is trained to conduct air assault and air movement missions in support of combat and sustainment forces. The 3-142 will provide air support to Operation Inherent Resolve and Operation Spartan Shield for approximately one year.

"The nation continues to rely on the National Guard to support our active-duty brothers and sisters around the globe, and we don't anticipate that slowing down anytime soon," said Brig. Gen. Dean Preston, commander of the Maine Army National Guard. "Our soldiers have been training hard just as you'd expect them to be doing - and we know they will do Maine and our country proud."

The last deployment for an Army aviation unit from Maine was in 2018, when Company G, 3rd Battalion, 126th Aviation

Regiment supported operations in Afghanistan.

3-142 are split between the Maine and Connecticut Army National Guard.


Historically, Maine air and maintenance crews have supported operations in Iraq, Kuwait, Guatemala and Bosnia, as well as domestically at the Southwest border and in Louisiana after Hurricane Katrina.

Bangor-based Army National Guard aircraft are also periodically tasked with supporting the Maine Warden Service, Maine Forest Service, Acadia or Baxter park rangers, and numerous local fire and rescue agencies in cases of lost or injured civilians.

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UMaine to Study Climate Change Resilience For Mobile Homes

ORONO, ME (October 24, 2022) -- The University of Maine will partner with regional institutions to study climate change resilience of mobile home parks in the Northeast, thanks to funding from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association (NOAA).

The NOAA Climate Adaptation Partnerships program, formerly the Regional Integrated Science and Assessments (RISA) program, awarded more than \$79,000 to Sean Birkel, Maine state climatologist and assistant professor with a joint appointment in University of Maine Cooperative Extension and the UMaine Climate Change Institute, for a study of climate change resilience in mobile home park communities along with collaborators in New Hampshire and Vermont.

Mobile home park communities are commonly found in rural and ex-urban areas in the northern New England states of Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont. Mobile homes in parks are an affordable housing option at a time when there is a regional housing crisis.

However, these communities are especially vulnerable to climate-related extreme events. Most parks were developed before land use regulations were in place and are sited in lowcost, but often unsuitable and hazardous locations vulnerable to risks presented by climate change. For example, in Vermont, 6% of mobile home parks had land in floodways with more than 20% of parks at least partially located in FEMA-mapped floodplains, according to prior research from the University of Vermont. During Tropical Storm Irene, mobile homes accounted for 15% of homes damaged



during the storm in Vermont, though mobile made up only 7% of the state's housing stock.

"Mobile, or manufactured, homes are susceptible to damage from severe weather such as high winds and excessive rainfall, especially for structures that are not anchored," says Birkel.

Birkel, along with colleagues at the Universities of New Hampshire and Vermont, will use the NOAA grant to develop a deeper understanding of how mobile home parks in Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont are being impacted by climate change. They will create a database of mobile home park communities in the three states -Vermont is the only of the three that currently maintains a mobile home park registry- and convene meetings with representatives of the mobile home park communities to determine climate change impacts in different ecoregions across the Northeast. The meetings will also build relationships that will support climate resilience efforts with mobile home park frontline communities

"Mobile home communities are an important part of Vermont's affordable housing landscape, yet, as Tropical Storm Irene demonstrated, they face greater risks from cli-

mate change," says Kelly Hamshaw, co-principal investigator and senior lecturer in the Department of Community Development and Applied Economics at the University of Vermont. "This collaboration across northern New England will allow us to better understand the disproportionate risks posed by climate change, build partnerships across sectors and take a broader look at challenges and opportunities for supporting the resilience of these unique communities across the region."

"Mobile home park management structures and practices vary from one community to the next and in many parks, residents may own their home but not the land," says Mary Stampone, co-principal investigator and associate professor of geography at the University of New Hampshire. "These factors present a different set

of challenges, unique to mobile home park communities, that must also be considered when assessing the risks posed by climate change."

The researchers will also identify key external agencies and connect local and non-local stakeholders like state agencies and nonprofits that can reduce the vulnerabilities of the communities to climate change. Then, they will hold a final cross-state virtual meeting of all key stakeholders to discuss commonalities across each state and to develop an action roadmap for future collaboration and information sharing.

"By reaching out to vulnerable communities we can learn their climate adaptation and resiliency needs, and help connect people to needed resources. Ultimately, this project contributes to the important work of Maine's Climate Action Plan," says Birkel.

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Collins, King Announce \$84,000 for Gorham Fire Deptartment

WASHINGTON (October 27, D.C. 2022) – U.S. Senators Susan Collins and Angus King announced that 23 fire departments and organizations in Maine have received a total of \$3,311,791 to upgrade equipment and support personnel. This funding was awarded through the Fiscal Year (FY) 2021

Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG) and the FY 2021 Staffing for Adequate Fire Emergency Response (SAFER) Grants. As a senior member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, Senator Collins champions annual funding for these grant programs within the budget of the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

"Firefighters put their lives on the line every day to protect Maine residents, homes, and businesses," said Senators Collins and King in a joint statement. "This funding will allow Maine firefighters to acquire updated equipment so they have the best tools available to protect themselves as they serve our



families and communities '

The funding for Gorham Fire Department was \$84,000 to purchase vehicle exhaust removal systems.

As a co-chair of the Congressional Fire Services Caucus, Senator Collins has been a longstanding advocate for Maine's first responders. She annually leads a bipartisan

letter, signed by Senator King, to the Senate Appropriations Committee urging robust funding for FEMA's firefighter grant programs, which she helped create.



KVCC Announces Fall 2022 Enrollment Numbers



YOUR BRIDGE TO A BRIGHTER FUTURE

FAIRFIELD, **ME (October 27, 2022)** -- Kennebec Valley Community College (KVCC) of Fairfield, one of the seven members of the Maine Community Col-

lege System, is announcing their Fall Enrollment Census Data for the Fall 2022 semester. These numbers serve as important benchmarks for the college for tracking year-

over-year enrollment, identifying trends, planning future budgets, etc.

When comparing the enrollment data to the Fall 2021 semester, KVCC saw positive growth in multiple areas. There was a 5.3% increase in total credits enrolled for Fall 2022 compared to Fall 2021, as well as a 30% increase in enrollment from students directly out of high school.

KVCC's total student body for Fall 2022 was 2,119, up from 2021, with 47% of the student body being from Kennebec County and 28% from Somerset County. 76% of students are enrolled parttime at KVCC, with an average age of 24.

Of the 2,119 Fall

2022 students, 1,311 (62%) are enrolled in degree-seeking programs. 530 students in degree programs became eligible for free college tuition via the Free College Scholarship, which allowed high school graduates or students with GED/HiSET equivalencies from the Classes of 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023 to receive 100% of their tuition and mandatory fees paid for. KVCC currently of-

fers over 30 programs of study, focused on teaching students valuable and
