Sen. Rotundo of Lewiston Sworn into Maine Senate

AUGUSTA, ME (December 7, 2022) — Earlier today, Sen. Peggy Rotundo, D-Lewiston, was sworn into the Maine Senate. Sen. Rotundo was elected to her first term in the Senate in November.

Gov. Janet Mills administered the oath of office to Sen. Rotundo and 34 of her Senate colleagues, all of whom have been elected to serve two-year terms. She represents the people of Senate District 21, which consists of Lewiston.

"I am excited to be a member of the 131st Legislature in the Maine State Senate," said Sen. Rotundo. "We have many issues that Maine is facing, and now is the time to come up with meaningful solutions that get to the root of many of these problems and create lasting solutions for years to come. I am looking forward to working with my fellow Senators, as well as my constituents to continue to make Maine an incredible state to live, work and raise a family in."

Sen. Peggy Rotundo was first elected to the Legislature in 2000 as a senator and served the four terms allowed under term limits. During her first tenure in the Senate, she served as the chair of the Appropriations and Financial Affairs Committee for four years and the State and Local Government Committee. She served on the Education and Cultural Affairs Committee; the Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Committee; the Committee on Bills in the Second Reading; and the Senate Ethics Committee. She also served as the Senate Chair of the Citizens Trade Policy Commission. In 2008, she was elected to her first term in the House of Representatives, where she chaired the budget-writing committee and the Citizen Trade Policy Commission and served on the Government Oversight Committee.

The swearing-in ceremony was held inside the Senate Chamber, and was attended by family and friends of the Senators, as well as the general public. A livestream of the event was made available to the general public, and can be viewed See Rotundo, page 16





New Locally-Owned Urgent Care Clinic Opening in Gray

GRAY, ME (December 9, 2022) - Residents in and around Gray-New Gloucester will soon have a new option when it comes to non-emergency medical treatment.

Gray Urgent Care, an urgent care clinic owned and operated by two local medical professionals, will open to the public on Monday, December 12.

The practice is located at 6 Turnpike Acres Road in Gray, which is next to the post office just off of Gray Road.

Owners Patricia and Anna Kittredge say they're opening the clinic with the goal of bringing expert medical care to an underserved area, while also emphasizing a connection with the local community.

"The care that I want to provide is not a big box urgent care model. I never want my patients to feel like a number," Patricia says. "I want to give them personal, patient-centered, compassionate care."

Both Patricia and Anna are longtime Gray residents. Patricia is a family nurse practitioner who will serve as Gray Urgent Care's chief medical officer and treating provider. Anna, a veteran and physician assistant with extensive military medical experience, is the practice's chief operating officer.

Gray Urgent Care will offer walk-in service to patients Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. with no appointments necessary. Locals will be able to avoid trips to Portland or Lewiston for treatment, as well as the potential for long wait times.

Services will include on-site x-rays and pointof-care testing, as well as treatment for a variety of acute, non-emergent conditions ranging from fractures and sprains to viral

Influenza Rates Rise Sharply **Across**

(December 6, 2022) — Maine is experiencing a sharp increase in seasonal influenza (flu) activity statewide. The Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention (Maine CDC) reminds residents and vis-

itors to take steps to stay healthy, including getting the flu vaccine.

For millions of people every season, coming down with flu means a fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle aches, and fatigue. This can lead

to time missed from work or school. Contracting flu can also result in more severe symptoms that can lead to hospitalization and

The best protection is the flu vaccine, which is recommended for those aged 6 months and older.

"Maine's flu season is undeniably here but it's not too late to protect yourself and your loved ones in time for holiday gatherings," said Maine CDC Director Nirav D. Shah. "This year's flu vaccine is a good match for the strains of the virus circulating in Maine and across the country. Getting your flu vaccine is the most effective way to prevent the spread of flu, as well as its worst impacts."

All 16 counties are experiencing a sustained increase in flu activity. There were 63 influenza-associated hospitalizations reported to Maine CDC last week, a 152 percent increase from the previous week. Of those

hospitalizations, nearly 50 percent were in people age 65 and older. This year, Maine CDC has reported 3,446 positive influenza tests, 110 hospitalizations, and 31outbreaks, suggesting a higher and more rapid increase in flu activity than is typical for this time of the year.

Flu vaccination can reduce the risk of illness, visits to the doctor, and missed work or school. The flu vaccine can also reduce the severity of the illness. Studies show the flu vaccine saves children's lives and prevents serious events associated with chronic lung disease, diabetes, and heart disease. It also helps prevent

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flu-related hospitalization among working-age and older adults.

In addition to getting vaccinated, people can take the following steps to reduce the spread of illness:

Stay home when you

Wash your hands Cover your coughs and sneezes

Avoid close contact with people who are sick

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth

Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects

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AARP Urges PUC to Oppose Unfair CMP Rate Proposals

PORTLAND, ME (December 7, 2022) -- Fighting to save Mainers money on their utility bills, AARP Maine has formally intervened in the case filed by CMP that would increase residential customers' rates by as much as five dollars more a month.

The Maine Public Utilities Commission (PUC) is currently considering the request to raise rates as much as 50 percent for residential customers. In its testimony to the PUC last week, AARP Maine calls for closer scrutiny of the proposal and for the Commission to consider the significant burden such increases will have on older Mainers and their families.

Apart from the Office of the Public Advocate, AARP Maine is the only consumer voice weighing in on this critical issue.

"AARP has a long history of fighting to prevent unfair utility rate hikes so people 50 and older can keep more of the money they've earned," said Noël Bonam, AARP Maine State Director. "This is a pocketbook issue for older Maine residents, many of whom struggle to balance paying utility bills and other household expenses such as buying food and medicine."

The CMP proposal before the PUC would likely impact every one of their customers. As AARP Maine stated in last week's testimony:

The Commission should reject CMP's proposed three-year rate plan. Rates should not be approved for expenses and investments that have not yet been implemented or determined to be useful. Multi-year rate plans, such as those proposed by CMP, contain trackers and mandatory rate adjustments that shift the risks to ratepayers and eliminate the role of shareholders in the utility ratemaking process. Approval of any rate



increase should reflect the minimal level of investment to ensure reliability of service and customer service.

The Commission should reject CMP's expenditures for unnecessary projects and programs that are better funded from federal or state taxes and not utility rates. AARP opposes investments for privately owned businesses, such as Electric Vehicle charging equipment, and distribution costs that should be properly imposed on those who want to use the electric grid to invest in energy projects from which ratepayers do not receive the revenues.

☐ The PUC should reject CMP's proposed increase in the minimum monthly cus-

tomer charge from \$10 to \$15.

- CMP's proposed optional Time of Use rate options for residential customers, EV owners, and heat pump customers should be denied at this time due to the lack of any analysis of customer preferences, reliable evidence of customer participation, or impact on CMP's regulated rates. Alternatively, CMP should conduct customer research and test Time of Use rate options prior to proposing large scale programs and marketing costs.
- The Commission should require CMP to explore the poten-

tial for a peak time rebate program that would reward customers (rather than punishing customers with high peak hour rates under Time of Use rates) for reducing usage at the most expensive days and hours in the wholesale market. This peak load reduction has value that can be used to reduce rates to all customers.

- The Commission should require improvements in customer service in return for more investments in CMP's billing and customer service technologies. CMP's proposal to use a negative option to enroll customers in text messages should be rejected.
- The Commission should impose the lowest level of the rate of return or allowable profit to CMP's shareholders that is legally defensible in light of

the emergency associated with the high electric bills that have rapidly increased in the last 12 months.

AARP Maine is fighting to keep electricity costs fair and reasonable. The increases proposed by CMP will unduly burden every CMP customer, and AARP Maine is calling on the PUC to reject these unfair rate hikes.





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

I am incredibly proud of our Lewiston youth for taking the initiative to have this conversation. They are in touch with our community needs, and we should follow their example by bravely engaging in discussions like this with our families, friends, and neighbors. I am inspired by their advocacy work, as it demonstrates the impact that can occur when communication is at the forefront," said Mayor Carl L. Sheline.

Mayor Sheline also led a moment of silence in honor of the recent passing of former youth council member Omar Osman.

A panel of professionals fielded audience questions from elected officials, parents, youth, and teachers. On site were:

Colin O'Neill, Tri-County Mental Health Services Chief Clinical Officer; Amran Osman, Generational Noor Executive Director and Founder; Megan Parks, Licensed Social Worker/Substance Counselor/Clinical Supervisor; Lisa Escobar, Lewiston Public Schools Substance Use Coordinator/ Licensed Counselor; and Lewiston Police Detective Joe Philippon.

Questions thought provoking to include, "Is it OK for teen boys to cry; what do you do if your parents or guardians are struggling with mental health; and what if your feelings are dismissed by others?'

Other topics included the importance of validating people's feelings, understanding emotional triggers, knowing you aren't crazy if you are struggling, looking at root causes, de-stigmatizing mental health challenges through

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Proposal to Remove Tax Benefits in Support of Lobster Industry



STATE HOUSE, (December 7, 2022) – On Tuesday, Maine Legislative Republicans held a press conference at Hallowell Seafood & Produce to discuss the efforts by outside environmental groups to destroy the State's beleaguered lobster industry.

Senate Republican Leader-elect Sen. Trey Stewart, R-Aroostook, and House Republican Leader-elect Rep. Billy Bob Faulkingham, R-Winter Harbor, were joined by Maine lobstermen and fellow legislators as they told reporters the pair submitted legislation prohibiting any business from participating in the state's Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement and Business Equipment Tax Exemption Programs that, based on third-party certifications, bans, boycotts or otherwise prevents or restricts the sale or distribution of any Maine-based goods that are legally harvested, grown or produced.

One such retailer that has banned the sale of Maine Lobster based on third-party certifications is Whole Foods in Portland.

"This is a war. It is

not just about lobster fishing—it is a war on workers, family values, conservation, science and common sense," said Faulkingham. "It is going to take all of us standing together combined with many others throughout Maine to preserve the ability of lobster fishing families to earn a living, conserve the resource, and create jobs for thousands of Mainers."

In addition to the loss of the tax programs, the legislation will also ban the state from any contracts with such businesses. Stewart said they would also work with legislators from other New England states to encourage them to take action as well as investigate whether something else was behind the environmental groups' actions.

"We will also be asking the Attorney General to investigate the Marine Stewardship Council and Seafood Watch to see who they are funded by, what foreign governments are involved in their groups and what benefits result from their partners by singling-out Maine's lobster industry," said Stewart. "This group makes almost

90% of their funding by selling their logo and we'd like to know what, if any, impact their decision had on their funding streams."

"An attack on the Maine lobster industry is an attack on all of Maine," he added.

Rep. Billy Bob Faulkingham, R-Winter Harbor, who was recently elected Maine House Republican Leader, is a commercial lobster fisherman. In the past, he has been an outspoken representative of Maine's lobster fishing families. His efforts include bringing together 151 Republican, Democratic and Independent state legislators from across Maine in support of Maine's lobster fishing industry.

Senator Trey Stewart, R-Aroostook, is serving his second term in the Maine Senate representing the constituents of District 2. He was recently elected as the Senate Republican Leader for the Caucus and has served as the Senate Republican Lead for the Energy, Utilities, and Technology Committeeand the Health Coverage, Insurance and Financial Services Committee.

Tips for Creating a Dementia-Friendly Holiday Season

cember 9, 2022) — With the holiday season underway, the Alzheimer's Foundation of America (AFA) is providing four tips to help families affected by dementia enjoy the spirit of the season in a dementia-friendly way.

"The holiday season can be both joyful and stressful for all of us, especially individuals living with a dementia-related illness," said Jennifer Reeder, LCSW, AFA's Director of Educational and Social Services. "Being proactive, adaptable, and inclusive of the person's wishes and abilities are the best ways to help them have a happy and joyful holiday season."

Families, partners and friends caring for someone with dementia should consider the following steps:

Avoid overdecorating. Decorating is part of the holiday season fun, however, too much stimulation may be challenging for someone with dementia. Keep decorations festive, but simple—too many flickering lights or noisy items could be overwhelming. Instead of elaborate decorations, try choosing a few favorite items. Phase in decorations over a period of days instead of all at once, so that changes to the person's environment are less confusing.

Create a safe and calm space. Don't use fragile decorations (which

can shatter and create sharp fragments) or ones that could be mistaken for edible treats. Be mindful of potential tripping hazards on the floor, such as wires for decorations. Securely hook Christmas trees to the wall to avoid

falls and use menorahs or kinaras with electric candles to reduce fire hazards. As well as a physically safe environment, create a space where your loved one can sit in comfort and where guests can visit in small groups or one-to-one. As much as possible, maintain the person's normal routine when scheduling visits.

Adapt past favorite traditions or create new ones. Build on old traditions when appropriate, such as enjoying favorite music or movies, or looking at pictures of past holiday celebrations. Start new ones that center on activities and events the person enjoys and can do, such as touring neighborhood holiday lights,

and do it together. Take a strengths-based and person-centered

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and incorporate what the person can do and what they choose to do now, rather than dwelling on what they used to do. Focus on those things that bring joy and let go of activities that seem too stressful.

Involve the person in the planning and preparations. Whenever possible, involve the person by asking what traditions are important to them—it keeps them active and involved and helps you prioritize and plan appropriately. For example, if they always sent out holiday cards or baked holiday cookies and still want to do so, do it together with them. If they can no longer shop for gifts for their loved ones, invite them to help with wrapping the gifts so that they feel they are contributing.


