The Russellville City Schools system has received statewide acclaim for its unprecedented success working with English Language Learners (ELL) and helping them become English proficient.

The system was the subject of a feature article in Education Week, a national publication that reports on K-12 education news and information. With more than 1.6 million readers, Education Week offers a footprint that spreads to all corners of the country.

The article profiled what RCS is doing as a district to help its ELL students and the nation took notice.

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

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



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# Thieves destroy ATM, steal 'significant amount' of cash

A group of unknown suspects got away with a 'significant amount' of cash early Saturday morning after using a vehicle and chain to steal money from an automated teller machine (ATM) at a local bank.

According to Russellville Police Department Investigator Jake Tompkins, the suspects broke into the ATM at the Highway 43 Bank Independent location, smashing the machine into a pile of metal rubble and getting away with a 'significant amount' of cash, Tompkins said.

Although Tompkins would not state the exact amount that was stolen from the ATM, a source familiar with the investigation said more than \$100,000 was taken.

A joint investigation with officers from RPD, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the State Bureau of Investigation, the Franklin County Sheriff's Office and the Red Bay Police Department is underway.

Surveillance video shows two vehicles at the ATM around 1 a.m., Saturday, March 4. Tompkins said there were multiple suspects wearing masks.

Earlier that night, the same vehicles were observed at the Red Bay Bank Independent, but the suspects left before attempting to access the machine. Red Bay Police Chief Janna Jackson said the suspects did not hook up to the ATM as it appeared they were not able to position the vehicle in order to pull the chain. One of the vehicles involved had been stolen from the Red Bay area, Jackson confirmed.

The investigation has resulted in the issuance of multiple search warrants for vehicles, records and some undisclosed locations.

Investigators are following up on some identifying information on the vehicles obtained by a FCSO deputy.

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The suspects chose an ATM across the street from one of Russellville's only 24-hour businesses, Legacy Chevron. Additionally,

the ATM is visible from the motel located north of the bank.

"That's what's so frustrating about this," Tompkins said. "They knew what they were doing. We are aggressively investigating this along with several agencies."

Thefts where suspects use vehicles to access ATMs are on the rise. In many cases, thieves will ram their vehicles into

store fronts or windows to gain entry into businesses where ATMs are located, or stores that carry expensive inventory like jewelry.

The crimes have led to the creation of a new name, ram-raiding, to describe these smash and grab offenses. And ATMs, at least certain models, are frequently the targets of ram-raiders.

The subjects involved in the Russellville theft are also suspects in ATM thefts in several other locations in Alabama as well as out of state.

banquet with a guest speaker.

With Florida Governor and Presidential hopeful Ron DeSantis coming to Birmingham March 9th to address the state GOP, there was no guest



speaker at the winter meeting. Response to DeSantis' visit to Alabama was so strong the state committee had to secure a larger venue to host the

event. Miller said one of the committee's most important agenda items at the winter meeting was approving a resolution to "abolish diversity, equity, inclusion bureaucracies and policies in public institutions and restore equality in public universities."

The resolution passed overwhelmingly, but there is no legal effect to a measure approved by

and how to do it without compromising the quality of education for all students.

This is a challenging dilemma for any system, and Russellville City Schools is seen as one of the guiding lights to help others navigate through that challenge.

"Something we stress is by being a good EL school it makes us better teachers for all our students because we have to be by using best practices," Grimes said. "We have such drive to succeed in spite of the demographics and challenges with the language barrier, and that prepares our teachers to be better.

"They give me a lot of credit, but for the mindset change to take place, your principals and teachers have to buy in and follow or this doesn't happen. Any time you change things and have different standards people get upset, and we had that for a short period of time. But we worked through it and our people were able to do some amazing things," Grimes added. Approximately 30 percent of kindergarten students enter RCS without

Approximately 30 percent of kindergarten students enter RCS without English proficiency and live in homes where the primary language is something other than English. The system's Hispanic enrollment numbers have increased every year over the past decade. As of last fall, 54 percent of all Russellville City Schools students are Hispanic.

The increasing Hispanic presence in Russellville City Schools is not a trend—it's a reality—although the changing demographics were initially met with resistance by some educators.

Kristie Ezzell, who retired last year after serving 15 years as principal of Russellville Elementary School, saw this first hand.

"When this (demographics) change started, there were some who said we just need to keep this quiet because they were afraid people would leave Russellville," Ezzell said. "And some did leave. There were concerns that other students would not get the same education because we were 'paying more attention' to EL students.

"After (Grimes) came to Russellville, we started realizing we have a very good thing and we can educate these kids. It was time to embrace this is the new us. Heath said we were going to educate every child and every child will get the best they can get. No excuses. Let's move forward and embrace what we have," she added.

Last year, the system received an overall "A" on the Alabama State Department of Education Report Card, one of only 24 school districts to score an "A."

Russellville City Schools were the only majority minority school system in the state to earn an "A." The closest EL percentage of the other 24 top districts was Fort Payne Schools, with 20 percent.

Only 10 Alabama school districts have more than 10 percent EL students, according to 2022 state report card data.

"It took a lot of work and leadership to bring people over to say 'hey, we can do this," Ezzell said. "In our first meeting with Dr. Grimes, he said 'I know where we are. I've looked at the data and we can be one of the best systems in the state. I'll never forget that statement. We can be, if not the top, in the top 10 in the state. And we just started working toward that."

The challenges continue each year, especially when the State Department of Education regularly changes the criteria to measure English proficiency.

"That standard changes each year, but our first goal remains getting those kids language proficient as quickly as possible," Grimes said. Another issue will come next year when the federal COVID-19 funds that

Another issue will come next year when the federal COVID-19 funds that were used to employ 10 aides to work with EL students expire. Grimes plans to make a case to his legislative delegation to provide funding sufficient to keep those aides in place by showing how the EL numbers have improved over the past two years.

Grimes and Ezzell will travel to Washington, D.C., to present a program at the Education Week leadership symposium in May. It's yet another opportunity to share the good things happening in Russellville City Schools.

"Kristie was here and supported everything we did. She saw the struggle, resistance and buy-in and the absolute turning of anxiety and concern into a lot of celebration and success," Grimes said.

"The State of Alabama is recognizing that Russellville City Schools is doing some great things and now we are able to share what we're doing at a national level and that's pretty cool," Grimes said.



Just more than four months from a mass round of layoffs, Tiffin Motorhomes has informed its employees that more will be coming soon as the company adjusts to changes in the marketplace and declines in sales of new recreational vehicles.

Employees were told last week that more layoffs will be coming by the end of the month as company leaders determine where staff reductions are necessary. While layoffs in late November 2022 were each approximately 25 percent across the board at all plants, this round will be more specifically related to helping stabilize business by reducing staffing where necessary but keeping it where it is needed to ensure business carries on in a sustainable manner. Still, a memo dated Friday, March 3, to Tiffin's management and service staff, stated the cuts could be felt deep within some departments.

"We will conduct a thorough review across every department to determine the appropriate number of personnel needed to produce the highquality motorhomes we're known for at Tiffin at a cost that allows the company to remain viable," Tiffin Motorhomes President Leigh Tiffin wrote in the memo. "Some areas may require cuts of about 30% while others may already be

close to the right size requiring little or no cuts. We will make necessary staffing adjustments on 3/31/23."

The memo stressed that the cuts are necessary as the company pivots to adjust output to better reflect market demand and reduce a buildup of inventory on dealer lots. Tiffin Motohomes and its parent company, Thor, are not alone in seeing these kinds of declines. Sales of recreational vehicles nationwide dropped by 18 percent in 2022 and saw a dramatic 50

percent decrease in December. According to the Recreational Vehicle Industry Association, RV sales peaked in 2021 with just more than 600,000 units sold. This includes both self-propelled units (motorhomes) and towables (travel trailers). In 2022, that number declined to 493,268

units, and for 2023, the RVIA has projected wholesale sales of 379,000-404,000 units.

The RV industry was hit in 2022 by several factors, including higher loan interest rates, high gasoline and diesel fuel prices, and a weakening economy. And, as inventory on dealer lots has grown, manufacturers have had to cut output – and employment rolls – as a result.

"We don't build open units," Tiffin wrote in the memo. "We work to ensure all scheduled units are sold.

We are watching dealer inventory very closely and will continue to focus on driving it lower."

Additionally, the memo, which was titled "Business Restructuring Talking Points," points to the company positioning itself for the future, which it has done several times in its 51-year history.

The most recent major decline for the company came after the economic meltdown in the United States in 2008. The fallout of that era saw Tiffin Motorhomes output and employment fall to frighteningly low numbers. Still, the company survived and grew to its present size.

"We will come out of this with stronger dealers, a stronger brand, and a more desirable product," Tiffin wrote in the memo. "We believe in the future of our company and our team."

Times like these present opportunities to improve our business for future growth and excellence."

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Austin's grandparents are Gene and Jeanie Balding. Gene is the former pastor of First Baptist Church Russellville.


Balding made his broadcast debut last Saturday when the Golden Tigers hosted Hazel Green High School.
