Curbside collection is restricted to ONLY wood/tree waste and brush.



to have two blood transfusions. Murphy is lucky to still be here. She said she was grateful that blood was available when she needed it.

units of blood have been collected with the potential to save up to 3,420 lives. In Maine, the Red Cross needs to collect 152 pints of whole blood every day to meet patient demand. That means 1,064 Mainers each week need to roll up a sleeve to keep the blood supply viable. Once you donate, you need to wait 8 weeks before you can donate again so it's critical that all eligible Mainers continue to give blood.

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State AG Frey Files Lawsuit Against 3M, DuPont

AUGUSTA, ME (March 30, 2023) -- Today, Attorney General Aaron M. Frev announced that the state of Maine is currently filing two lawsuits against the manufacturers 3M and DuPont. The lawsuits allege that both manufacturers, among others, have known for decades that PFAS poses a serious risk to human health and the environment, but advertised their PFAS products as safe and appropriate for widespread use in Maine.

Defend Our Health has been advocating for the elimination of PFAS chemicals since 2017 after contamination was discovered on the farmland of farmer Fred Stone in Arundel, Maine. Defend Our Health director of advocacy, Sarah Woodbury, responds:

"The defendant manufacturers knew of the science of PFAS toxicity decades ago but concealed that information from the public and continued to manufacture, sell and profit from their products containing these chemicals. Therefore, we commend the actions taken by Attorney General Frey and the state of Maine in holding manufacturers accountable for the destruction that they have inflicted on the livelihood of Mainers across the state due to PFAS contamination. Maine has been at the forefront in dealing with the PFAS crisis, spending millions of dollars for testing and cleanup. It is about time that those responsible are held accountable."

Seniors Not Acting Their Age Adventurous Skiing at Mount Blue State Park

By Ron Chase Mount Blue State Park offers one of the finest Nordic Skiing opportunities in western Maine. Located in the mountainous region of Weld, the park has about fifteen miles of trails groomed for classic skiing. Consisting of five loop trails of varying length and difficulty, there is something for virtually every cross country ski enthusiast. My book, Maine Al Fresco: The Fifty Finest Outdoor Adventures in Maine includes a chapter about skiing Mount Blue State Park and two additional Nordic ski trips.

I've been skiing at Mount Blue for over thirty years. During that time, I've learned ski conditions can vary from superb to downright scary. Having experienced scary several times, I carefully watch for the right combination of snow, its consistency, and weather. I always check with the park for a status report prior to making the almost two hour drive from Topsham.

After a recent snowstorm, I researched the conditions prior to announcing a Penobscot Paddle & Chowder Society club ski trip at Mount Blue. The park received

about a foot of powder and had groomed the trails the day after. However, temperatures had risen and fallen in the interim. My concern was an icy ski surface. Based on the forecast for Weld, the temperatures were predicted to rise above freezing in the middle of the following day. I posted a club trip meeting in the park at 11:00 assuming the snow would begin to soften by then.

Two of the usual suspects, Ken Gordon and Eggman DeCoster, agreed to join me for the proposed skiing adventure. On a clear day, skiers are guaranteed some of the finest views in Maine when approaching Mount Blue State Park Headquarters situated high on Center Hill Road in Weld. When entering the large parking area, visitors are greeted with a multi-faceted outdoor complex that includes an ice-skating rink and a warming hut. Snowshoe, snowmobile, and Nordic ski trails begin there.

The sky was clear and the temperature seasonably warm when we arrived. However, unanticipated gusty winds resulted in a sub-freezing chill factor. An inspection of the trail indicated

the surface was icy. I decided to use backcountry skis while my companions chose touring skis. The reason for my choice was twofold: backcountry skis provide more stability and control on an icy surface and the outing facilitated an excellent training opportunity for my upcoming Baxter State Park expedition. There are downsides to backcountry skis; they're heavier and slower than touring skis.

From the parking area, we followed Central Trail on a fast recently groomed surface. Our goal was to connect with Maple Trail, a ten mile loop according to park literature.

After crossing Center Hill Road, we climbed steadily to the rim of a bumpy, precipitous pitch that is the steepest descent in the trail system. Eggman ran a mostly successful probe attempting to hold a snowplow in the attenuated path. His exciting escapade ended with a dramatic crash. Ken and I opted to take advantage of the much more forgiving deep powder next to the trail.

Shortly beyond, we arrived at the junction for the Maple and Birch Trail Loops. Proceeding left on Maple, we ascended steadily before progressing through a long, winding downhill sector in a dense hardwood forest to another Center Hill Road crossing.

A brief climb preceded another challenging descent. This one contained a couple of humps with the potential for some airtime. The scene of numerous mishaps in the past, we carefully negotiated down the gnarly slope without any upsets.

Gradual downhill skiing followed through a circuitous route in a mixed hardwood and conifer forest. Inattentive when approaching a narrow bridge, I took a dive. Fortuitously, no cameras captured the blunder.

While climbing an elongated uphill grade, the snow began to soften. By the time we connected with a junction leading to Hedgehog Hill, two of us were collecting sticky snow on our skis. Adding Glide alleviated the problem and slower snow moderated our speed going forward.

Forgoing a side trip to Hedgehog Hill, the best downhill skiing of the day ensued. Long stretches of exhilarating double poling continued



DACF Increases Access to Maine-Grown Foods for Older Adults



AUGUSTA, ME (March 28, 2023) - The Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry (DACF) announced today that it will utilize an \$800,000 Federal grant to expand the Maine Senior FarmShare Program. The program provides low-income older adults the opportunity to receive up to a \$50 share of fresh, local produce at no cost directly from Maine farmers.

DACF estimates that the additional funding will expand the program by up to 3,000 more low-income older adults and authorize more Maine farmers to join over the next two years. The funding comes from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, with the goal of expanding and modernizing similar programs across the country.

"We are very pleased that this new funding al-

lows the expansion of the MSFP to include a broader range of our low-income neighbors and involve more Maine Farms," said DACF Commissioner Amanda Beal. "Our department staff are eager to play a role in steering this effort to increase access to fresh food from local farms as we pursue the vision and goals of Maine's Roadmap to End Hunger by 2030.'

"MSFP is beginning its third decade serving Maine's low-income older adults. I am excited at this infusion of financial support to ensure that this vital program continues, adapts, and improves," said G Cherichello, Maine Senior FarmShare Program Manager. "One-quarter of our funding will support partnerships and training to ensure that MSFP serves adults in communities that experience disproportionate rates of hunger, including people of color and members of the LGBTQ community."

To participate in the program, a person must be a Maine resident; be 60

years old or older, or 55 years old or older for Native Americans; and meet income guidelines. More than 100 farms in Maine, distributed across all 16 counties, are authorized to participate in MSFP.

Eligible adults can contact an authorized farm to sign up for MSFP now. Participants must re-enroll yearly and may only sign up with one farm annually. Eligible adults can also call their Area Agency on Aging at 1-877-353-3771



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Mitchell Center to Host Maine Food Waste Solutions Summit

MAINE, STATE-WIDE (March 31, 2023) -- The Maine Food Waste Solutions Summit, Maine's annual food waste education event, is scheduled for Friday, April 14, from 10 a.m. to noon via Zoom. The event is free and open to the public. Registration is required.

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Food waste has economic, social, environmental and climate impacts. Nearly 40% of food produced in the U.S. is never eaten, costing the country \$285 billion in 2019. Nationwide, \$5 million per day is spent on food that is wasted in schools. In Maine, 97% of food waste goes to landfills, contributing to harmful pollution and climate change. Meanwhile, 1 in 8 adults and 1 in 5 children in Maine go hungry every day.

"Food waste is a major financial, social and environmental problem that impacts all Maine people, but the great news is that there are simple solutions," says Susanne Lee, faculty fellow at the Senator George J. Mitchell Center for Sustainability Solutions at the University of Maine. "We host this free online event so that everyone can attend and learn to reduce wasted food."

The summit brings together key food system participants-residents, farms, food businesses, charitable food partners, community leaders, nonprofits and state representatives-to learn about Maine's food waste problem and solutions. This year's keynote speakers include Claudia Fabiano from the Environmental Protection Agency's "Food: Too Good To Waste" peer network and Congresswoman Chellie Pingree, Maine First District Representative, a leading sponsor of bi-partisan legislation to help end food waste. Linda Breggin and Margaret Badding from the Environmental Law Institute will also present about the connection between food waste and climate change, and how communities can work to solve both at the same time.

The "MaineSuccess Stories" segment will recognize inspiring food waste initiatives across the state. Leaders from Preble Street Food Security Hub, Scrap Dogs Community Compost and Hannaford's Zero Food Waste program will detail their food waste solutions. A highlight of the





AFS-USA host families represent a broad range of U.S. cultures, including individuals and families of multi-national/ethnic backgrounds, those with and without children, those who are members of the LGBTQ+ community, and more.

Participants live with a host family, attend an American high school, acquire leadership skills, and engage in activities to learn about U.S. society and values; they also help educate Americans about their home country and culture.

Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange (CBYX): Jointly funded and managed by the U.S. Department of State and German government, CBYX provides full scholarships for German students to live and study abroad in the U.S. for an academic year. Participants live with a host family, attend an American high school, acquire leadership skills, and engage in activities to learn about U.S. society and values; they also help educate Americans about Germany and German culture.

Future Leaders Exchange (FLEX): Through the U.S. Department of State's FLEX program, high school students from Europe and Eurasia live and study for an academic year in the United States.

Participants live with a host family, attend an American high school, acquire leadership skills, and engage in activities to learn about U.S. society and values; they also help educate Americans about their home country and culture. Once students and host families are matched, they receive ongoing support from trained staff and are welcomed into their local chapter of dedicated volunteers, alumni, and fellow host families. One thing that sets AFS-USA apart is the network of almost 3,000 volunteers throughout the U.S. Many volunteers have hosted international exchange students or studied abroad with AFS and will support families, students, and schools in gaining the most from their hosting experience

Hosts are expected to provide their student(s) with a bed, meals, and support and encouragement throughout their program. Students arrive with their own spending money and medical coverage.

"These students attend local high schools, participate in local community life, and are encouraged to share aspects

of their culture," Hofmann said. "They also discover first-hand what it's like to live in America and form lasting friendships that create enduring links between the U.S. and other countries. In many cases, the bonds that form between AFS students and their host families last a lifetime.'

AFS-USA is the largest organization within the international AFS network that includes 54 partners around the globe.

Eat Well-Adopt a low-fat diet high on fruits and veggies, like strawberries, blueberries, and broccoli. Take daily vitamins. Limit intake of red meats, fried and processed foods, salt, and sugar. In general, foods that are "heart healthy" are also "brain healthy."

Stay Active-Physical activity increases blood flow to the brain and can also help improve mood and overall wellbeing. Brisk walking benefits brain health, while aerobics can boost your heart rate, and weight training builds strength and flexibility.

Things-Challenge your brain by starting a new hobby like playing tennis, learning to speak a foreign language, trying a cooking class, or something you have not done before. Even something as simple as brushing your teeth with your non-dominant hand stimulates the brain by forcing it to think outside of its normal routine.

Get Enough Sleep-Getting a consistent sleep every night is key;



at least seven to nine hours is ideal. Having a good sleep environment is also helpful. Insomnia or sleep apnea can have serious physical effects and negatively affect memory and thinking.

Mind Your Meds-Medication can affect everyone differently, especially as you age. When getting a new medication or something you have not taken in a while (whether over the counter or prescription), talk to your doctor or local pharmacist.

Stop Smoking and Limit Alcohol-Smoking can increase the risk of other serious illnesses, while too much alcohol can impair judgment and cause accidents, including falls, broken bones, and car crashes.

Stay Connected-Social interaction and maintaining an active social life are very important for brain health, cognitive stimulation and mood. Invite friends and family over for a meal, board games, or just to hang out. Engaging in your community and participating in group activities is also beneficial.

Know Your Blood Pressure-Blood pressure can impact your cognitive functioning. Visit your physician regularly to check your blood pressure and make sure it is in normal range.



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
