County pays Eastridge Little League to leave fields

he last inning of a year-long scuffle over a popular East San Jose Little League whose baseball players were compelled to leave the home fields they've used since 1972 has resulted in the league receiving \$225,000 from Santa Clara County.

The payment agreement, signed by Eastridge Little League President Johnny Cisneros last week, will inject money into the league's coffers for giving up the use of fields at Reid-Hillview Airport they've used for over half a century that the county claims are a public health risk because of the leaded fuel expelled by nearby airplanes.

 $The \, money \, provided \, by \, the \, county \, will \, be \, used \,$ to find future fields for 135 players including their equipment costs. However, the infusion of cash will last until 2025 when the county will reclaim any funds that the league hasn't spent.

Cisneros is trying to work a deal in resettling the league's three diamonds at August Boeger Middle School. Another alternative is a possi-

ble merging with the neighboring East Hills Little League.

The battle between Cisneros and the county started in February 2022 when the county informed him that he'd have to leave Reid-Hillview the following March.

Cisneros has ignored the order to leave and has continued to use the fields because he says, "I

question the lead hazard claimed by the county."

The most recent study that tested soil samples in the area found no elevated levels of toxins, leading some in the Little League to doubt the danger.

A specific date by which the players must officially leave Reid-Hillview has not been deter-

San Jose says yes to controversial Buddhist temple in Evergreen

ontroversial plans for a Buddhist temple years in the mak-■ ing are moving forward in San Jose's Evergreen neighborhood.

Following a three-hour discussion Tuesday, the San Jose City Council unanimously approved the development of the nearly 14,000 square-foot Wat Khmer Kampuchea Krom Temple on a 1.86-acre corner lot at the intersection of Ruby and Norwood avenues.

"The Buddhist practice, like other religions, is about bringing peace, harmony, love, kindness and a healthy environment to their families and community," Councilmember Peter Ortiz said. "I'm confident that this new temple will

add value to the surrounding neighborhood, and create a sense of safety and harmony to the area."

In approving the temple, the council sided with supporters of the project, largely Cambodian immigrants and people of Cambodian descent, many of whom fled wars or genocide in Vietnam and Cambodia. Backers said the project will fill a need for a proper gathering and worship space, and serve as a point of pride for the local Khmer community.

The project is backed by the nonprofit A Khmer Buddhist Foundation, led by Lyna Lam and funded by her and her husband, local tech billionaire Chris Larsen.

The council's decision disappointed some neighbors in the area,

who have opposed the temple since its inception and through multiple changes to the plans as the project worked through the city planning process over roughly four years.

Their opposition was built around concerns that the temple is inconsistent with the neighborhood character, that it's too big for its lot and that it will bring too many cars and people to the area. Some also worry about noise from large events that could span from early mornings through late evenings.

Damien Maker said he lives across the street from the proposed temple, and noted his opposition to the project isn't about acceptance of Buddhism.

"Our neighborhood is actually very diverse and very accepting, there is no racism, there's no hate towards a temple or church or anything like that. We actually welcome it," he said. "We are a very quiet neighborhood and we just want to maintain that, that's all See TEMPLE, page 13







an José Mayor Matt Mahan took part in San Jose's Clean California Community Days, part of a state-led 11-day beautification program designed to engage communities and improve public spaces in underserved areas across the state on March 29.

"A clean city builds community. It builds civic pride. It transforms neighborhoods, increases safety, and fuels economic investment," said San José Mayor Matt Mahan. "And our partnership with Clean California helps us get there. I want to thank the Governor for investing in this cleanup

effort to create stronger cities throughout our state"

He was joined by Chief Service Officer for California Volunteers, Office of the Governor, Josh Fryday, Councilmember Omar Torres(D3), and Sean Nozzari, District Deputy Director of Operations for Caltrans Bay Area working with a team of over 70 volunteers to clean up and beautify Ryland Park in Downtown San Jose. Among the volunteers were members of the #CaliforniansForAll College Corps and Youth Jobs Corps, and San Jose's California Climate Action Corps.

"Clean CA has created an incredible partnership between the State and local communities

to empower everyone to keep California clean," said California Chief Service Officer Josh Fryday.

The City of San Jose hosted 8 Clean California Community Day events with partners:

- Coyote Creek Trail and Creek: The City of San José Parks, Recreation and Neighborhood Services Department (PRNS) BeautifySJ program, Caltrans, and Keep Coyote Creek Beautiful collaborated to host a Clean CA Community Day cleanup event on Sunday, March 19. More than 160 volunteers registered to spend a few hours beautifying the trail and creek. They collected 6,420 pounds of trash, helping improve the environment and a healthy local creek.
- Cataldi Park: PRNS Volunteer Management Unit hosted a Clean CA event on Saturday, March 18 where 50 participants tended to the vegetation and raked tree debris to help keep the park healthy.
- Ryland Park and Parque de los Pobladores: Located in Council District 3, the events were initiated by the PRNS Park Maintenance team based on the park's Healthy Places Index (HPI) score. HPI comprises categories addressing education status, job opportunities, clean air and water, and other social health factors.
- Dumpster Event: The City hosted two dumpster events with BeautifySJ in Districts 7 and 8
- Litter Clean-Up: The City hosted two litter pick-ups with BeautifySJ in District 3.

At Ryland Park, Mayor Mahan, Josh Fryday, and volunteers re-seeded areas of the lawn in need of upkeep, maintained the park's garden, and disposed of trash throughout the park.

"It's important to keep our parks, creeks, and trails clean and beautiful for our wildlife and residents to enjoy the outdoors," said Councilmember Omar Torres. "I am grateful for the \$296 million to remove litter in underserved communities and transform public spaces. We hope to encourage others to help keep our City clean!"

"Our department is proud of our dedicated volunteers who go above and beyond to beautify our parks and trails," said Jon Cicirelli, PRNS Director. "As part of our 20-year strategic plan, ActivateSJ, PRNS staff, volunteers, and partners work hand-in-hand to take care of what we have and invest in the future for an active San José."

Clean California, a \$1.2B state beautification initiative led by Caltrans, aims to transform blighted California roadways and restore local streets and public spaces. The program recently kicked off the Clean California Community Days effort, an 11-day series of volunteer service events that saw California residents plant trees, dispose of trash, and learn about the impact of litter through educational entertainment events.

Since launching in July 2021, Clean California has disposed of 1.4M cubic yards of litter from state highways—enough to fill 367 Olympic-sized swimming pools.



Opera San José presents Puccini's Tosca April 15-30

pera San José's 2022-23 season concludes with a vivid production of Puccini's thriller Tosca presented April 15-30 at the California Theatre. With breathtaking music and some of opera's most celebrated arias, the work follows the tragic story of a tempestuous opera singer and her artist lover, whose illicit involvement with a political prisoner has made them targets of the chief of the secret police.

Opera San José Music Director Joseph Marcheso conducts, while OSJ's Resident Director Tara Branham makes her exciting California Theatre mainstage debut. Casting includes Maria Natale as Tosca, Adrian Kramer as Cavaradossi, Kidon Choi as Scarpia, Alexander Scheuermann as Spoletta, Robert Balonek as Angelotti, Igor Vieira as Sacristan, Joshua Hughes as Sciarrone, and Andrew Fellows as Jailer. Tosca, sung in Italian with English and Spanish supertitles, will be presented April 15–30, 2023 (dates/times below) at the California Theatre, 345 South First Street, San Jose.

Puccini's Tosca premiered at the Teatro Costanzi in Rome on January 14, 1900 and has been a hit ever since, remaining one of the most frequently performed operas around the world.

Featuring a libretto by Luigi Illica and Giuseppe Giacosa, the work is based on Victorien Sardou's 1887 French drama La Tosca, which was set in Rome during the height of the Napoleon wars, and premiered at time of political unrest in Italy, with its first performance postponed a day in concern for potential disturbances. Although critics did not rush to praise the work, audiences were rapt, and its powerful score contains some of opera's most iconic music, including the breathtaking soprano aria "Vissi d'arte" ('I lived for art') sung in the second act by Tosca. The tender "Recondita armonia" ('Concealed harmony') performed early in the first act by Cavaradossi (like Verdi, Puccini occasionally enjoyed rewarding prompt opera-goers - or punishing latecomers) has been recorded by famed tenors from Caruso to Luciano Pavarotti and Plácido Domingo. One of the most famous arias in opera, "E lucevan le stelle" ("And the stars were shining"), is performed by Cavaradossi in the third act as he awaits his execution, with vocal pyrotechnics that include a range from F#3 to A4..

Cortese sponsored bill guaranteeing income to homeless high school seniors passes committee

Qualifying students would gain \$1,000 for each of five months

bill by Senator Dave Cortese (inset) establishing a state-wide guaranteed income program for homeless students cleared its first policy committee on March 29.

In a unanimous vote, the Senate Education Committee advanced SB 333, which would give homeless high school seniors \$1,000 a month for five months to help them enroll in college or enter the workforce.

"When homeless students graduate from high school, a crucial piece of their support system is suddenly removed. Let's help these young people pursue their dreams - not end up back on the streets," said Cortese. "The no-strings-attached guaranteed income model will empower these students to use the funds as they see fit. The data shows that guaranteed income programs work - people lift themselves out of poverty when given the tools to do so. Instead of graduating kids into homelessness, let's graduate them into success.

SB 333 unanimously passed the Senate Education Committee with bipartisan support on Wednesday in a 7-0 vote. The bill now heads to the Senate Human Services Committee.

Approximately 270,000 students within California's K-12 school system are experiencing homelessness, according to a 2020 report by UCLA's Center for the Transformation of Schools. That number has grown by nearly half over the past decade. About 15,000 of these unhoused students are in the 12th grade.

"If it wasn't for funding, I would be part of the youth struggling to find a roof over their head. Instead.



I am in college pursuing my dream of becoming a detective," said Najarrea Bell, a student at Chaffey Community College in Rancho Cucamonga. "SB 333 gives funding for other young people going through the same difficulties I went through," she said. "Giving them financial support will allow them to accomplish the dreams they had as little kids."

While federal and state law provide extensive financial aid to homeless youth attending higher education, the aid does not become available until the student enters college in the fall. As a result, many young people become subject to a phenomenon known as summer melt, where high school graduates are accepted into college and intend to enroll, but ultimately do not. In fact, a recent survey found that more than 90 percent of unhoused youth respondents described a career goal that required education beyond high school, but only 16 percent believed they would be able to attend or graduate college within the next five

SB 333 would establish the Success, Opportunity, & Academic Resilience (SOAR), a guaranteed income pilot program. The funding would be eligible to all 12th grade unhoused students who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence. Direct cash payments from SB 333 would be awarded from April to August 2025.

In 2021, that Santa Clara County pilot program was scaled statewide under Senator Cortese's SB 739. That legislation, known as the Universal Basic Income for Transition Age Foster Youth Act, was incorporated into the 2021-22 State Budget as a \$35 million first-of-its-kind investment called the "California Guaranteed Income Pilot Program."

SJECCD Bond Program continues to revitalize campuses

🖚 an José – Evergreen Community College District (SJECCD) has completed the sale of approximately \$238 million of general obligation bonds, which will fund the continued development and modernization of facilities, $equipment, technology, and infrastructure\, at\, the$ District and its colleges, San José City College (SJCC) and Evergreen Valley College (EVC).

The \$200 million in Series C federally taxexempt and \$38 million in Series C-1 federally taxable bonds represent the fifth and sixth issuance of bonds since voters approved SJEC-CD's Measure X in 2016. While it will be several years before the proceeds are fully spent, this is the final funding available to SJECCD from the \$748 million Measure X authorization.

"The future of our regional and state economies and the continued success and growth of Silicon Valley and California depend on a highly skilled and highly trained workforce. It is imperative that those workers are learning and training in safe and secure facilities and with up-todate equipment and technology," said Dr. Raul Rodriguez, SJECCD's interim chancellor.

We are extremely grateful that our community understands the importance of investing in its local colleges and has provided us with the resources to develop our campuses into stateof-the-art colleges."

The SJECCD bond program has been the driving force behind the modernization of the SJCC and EVC campuses, which have seen numerous new buildings and facilities constructed and renovated in recent years, including classrooms and labs, physical education and athletics facilities, infrastructure and safety improvements, and technology upgrades, among other projects.

"We are deeply committed to responsible stewardship of the tax dollars with which we are $entrusted, "said\,Bob\,Livengood, president\,of\,the$ SJECCD board of trustees. "The District has secured strong credit ratings of Aa1 from Moody's and AA+ from Standard & Poor's'; both ratings are just one level from the highest possible credit ratings that these agencies issue, so investors know SJECCD general obligation bonds are a strong investment."

These ratings reflect advanced financial planning combined with the support of local property taxes. Moody's Credit Opinion refers to SJEC-CD's financial operations and reserves as "sound, improved reserve position supported by deep entrenchment in community funded status. The district has a healthy financial position that has further improved in recent years, which we expect will remain stable given its deep entrenchment into community funded status and management's conservative fiscal practices.'

Both campuses have construction projects currently underway that will be flagship buildings once completed, including a new Career Education Complex at SJCC and Student Services, Language Arts, and General Education Build-

"Our strong credit rating and overall fiscal health starts with leadership from the board of trustees and includes great work from numerous individuals throughout the District," said Jorge Escobar, SJECCD's vice chancellor of administrative services. "But I'd be remiss if I didn't mention our bond team, led by Associate Vice Chancellor of Physical Plant Development and Operations Terrance DeGray, who has four major capital construction projects worth over \$400M under construction and continued the development of our colleges during the Covid-19 crisis."

Continued from page 1 we're looking to do."

While regular worship services during the week and on weekends would likely only see between 20 to 50 visitors, the temple is allowed to have up to 300 visitors on site for special events, along with eight monks who will live on the property, plus event staff, city reports

Several neighbors said the size and use of the temple does not fit with the neighborhood, and tried to paint the temple as a commercial facility, because they fear it will be rented out for many special events, which the developer said will not be the case.

"Mr. Mayor, you ran on a platform of common sense, and it's just not common sense to have a large commercial facility in a neighborhood like this," neighbor Dan Rogy said.

Michael Gabler, president of the Norwood Neighborhood Association, opposed to the project being placed on that lot.

"It's a big project that has been shoehorned into this little plot of land to give them what they want," Gabler said.

Councilmember Domingo Candelas, who was recently appointed to represent District 8 where the temple is planned, said the city has placed roughly 40 conditions on the project to ensure it will be respectful of the neighborhood, including some extra rules Mayor Matt Mahan and other councilmembers put in a memo adopted by the council.

They include requiring the temple to have traffic control and security staff on-site for any event with more than 100 people, as well as valet parking programs in place to help people park off-site easily, after the temple's 67 parking spaces are filled up.

The council also required the regular hours of operation to be set from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m., a reduction from the previously proposed 7 a.m. to $10\,p.m$. The temple, during events and holidays, would have hours from 6 a.m. to midnight, with events typically ending by 10 p.m. and cleanup occurring up to midnight, city reports said.

"It is time we do the right thing after four years of work, input, project changes, community discussions and give space for the community to worship and heal from the horrific trauma they've endured," Candelas said.

Mahan agreed, saying the conditions the city placed on the temple "sets a very high bar" while still allowing it to go forward.

"I would like to think that the desire to gather and have community and worship and pass on traditions can be compatible with a high quality of life in a residential area," Mahan said.

A spokesperson for the project said construction on the temple is expected to start in the fall and should take approximately two vears to complete.

Tech Jargon of the week Digital Dystopia

ave you ever stumbled into a conversation where everyone lack is speaking around this "techie" word - and even after you've broken



in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used

Digital Dystopia

Tim Berners-Lee is the inventor of the World Wide Web, which is the service that runs the infrastructure of Internet. In a recent interview, he warned that the internet faces 'Digital Dystopia' if the world fails to tackle

Times Feature threats such as disinformation and invasion of privacy.

Let's first understand what dystopia means. The Merriam Webster definition of dystopia is an imagined world or society in which people lead dehumanized, fearful lives. So why does Tim Berners-Lee believe that the free and open web faces a grave risk?

Digital dystopia stems from the rise of online threats and abuse of rights digitally. Some people believe a few powerful entities are wielding control over all the digital serfs. Their belief also extends to data privacy of people, which could be compromised by the tech giants whose business models depends on harvesting and monetizing our data.

 $Even the governments \, are \, enacting \, laws \, that \, man$ dates forms of mass surveillance and information control, while big internet companies and data brokers vacuum up as much data as they can for ever-more intrusive ad targeting.

The political parties are not behind. They are invest-

ing in manipulative advertising, on top of conspiracy theories to mislead people and replace fact with fiction on data of candidates.

The problem is - nobody seems to care about it. The web started as a promising, anarchic force but nobody said people with bad intentions couldn't and wouldn't turn it into a disturbing free-for-all.

To overcome digital dystopia, Tim Berners-Lee came up with a set of nine principles to turn the tide, three each for governments, companies, and web citizens themselves.

Principle 1 – Governments will... Ensure everyone can connect to the internet

Principle 2 - Governments will... Keep all of the internet available, all of the time

Principle 3 – Governments will... Respect and pro $tect\,people's\,fundamental\,online\,privacy\,and\,data\,rights$

Principle 4 – Companies will... Make the internet affordable and accessible to everyone

 $people's\,privacy\,and\,personal\,data\,to\,build\,online\,trust$ Principle 6 - Companies will... Develop technologies that support the best in humanity and challenge the worst

Principle 7 - Citizens will... Be creators and col-

Principle 8 - Citizens will... Build strong communities that respect civil discourse and human dignity Principle 9 – Citizens will... Fight for the web


He has managed to get 150 organizations to sign up for these principles including Microsoft, Google, Facebook and Twitter. Let's hope that the efforts of the creator of the internet does not go futile.



On-Site Dental Care Foundation unveils new mobile dental van

anta Clara County Supervisor Cindy Chavez joined Marti Remmell, Board Chair of the On-Site Dental Care Foundation (OSDCF) to unveil their new mobile dental clinic at a ribbon cutting ceremony in San Jose, Saturday, April 1.

"It's such an honor to be with the On-Site Dental Care Foundation today at the unveiling of this amazing mobile dental clinic that will continue to heal people in our community ... even if they come in pain, they leave with a smile," Chavez told the audience.

On-Site Dental Care Foundation fills a void for those with health disparities by bringing oral health services and education to Bay Area locations. The clinic, led by Dental Director Dr. Osleydis Diaz, serves the homeless, LBGQT, migrant





workers and low-income families and seniors. Eighty-five percent of the 1,400 patients served each year are Latinx.

"We're are excite to celebrate 20 years of community health care and education," Remmell told the audience. "This stunning new clinic will enable On-Site Dental Care Foundation to improve and expand its practices and programs. To do this, we need funding, and are preparing to launch a capital campaign we are calling 'Drive for Smiles."

Besides free and low-cost oral health treatments, the clinic also educates their patients about the importance of daily oral hygiene.

"I now get so many compliments about my teeth," Lavella Benton, an over 10-year patient of OSDCF smiled as she told the audience. "My gums used to be dark, and I learned that means you're not flossing enough or keeping your teeth clean. These folks taught me how to keep my teeth clean, and now my gums are pink!"

Dental Director Dr. Osleydis Diaz led a tour inside the mobile clinic. The equipment includes a panoramic X-ray system, three examination chairs with digital monitors for patient education, intra-oral cameras, and slide-out components that provide patients and dentists more space.

"It will thrill our dentists to work in this stateof-the-art facility, and our patients will be too", Diaz said. "I am especially thrilled that this new

> van offers more area do more specialized dentistry such as implants and root canals."

The need for services such as those offered by On-Site Dental Care Foundation goes beyond serving individuals to affecting the community at large. Many individuals who lack insurance or have limited means find it difficult to pay for medical and dental treatments, leading them to go to the emergency room for dental problems, even though the emergency room doesn't offer dental treatments beyond painkillers and referral to a dentist.

The new clinic will go into practice in a few weeks. You might spot the bright blue buslike clinic on the freeway heading to areas such as Sunnyvale, Mountain View, Gilroy, Hayward or South San Jose.

"With the success of our capital campaign, you'll find us in even more locations," said Remmell. For more information, see www.osdcf.org.






