market is a hub of activity on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays, with vendors selling everything from fruits and vegetables to homemade crafts. But long-time vendor Kristal Ray said that attendance would begin to pick up when produce is in season.

# Local author Brigid Murphy Stewart and illustrator Cheryl Lankhaar share children's book.

W INCHESTER AUTHOR Brigid Murphy Stewart and her friend and illustrator from Monteagle, Cheryl Lankhaar, have written and illustrated the children's book "The Monteagle Assembly, Kinsley's Story." Published in June 2021, the book is about a fictional 11-year-old girl named Kinsley who enjoys attending the Monteagle Sunday School Assembly (MSSA). Kinsley's family and many of her friends' families have come every summer for seven generations.

The MSSA is a religious and cultural community that has held its annual eightweek session of religious, cultural, and educational seminars for individuals and families since 1882. This historic community consists of 161 cottages nestled on Monteagle Mountain. Families from 23 states have come each summer for 140 years to hear speakers from all over the world.

Stewart and Lankhaar were so impressed with the history of the MSSA and the beautiful Queen Anne, Folk-Victorian, and Craftsman-style homes that they decided to create a children's book about it.

As the story begins, Kinsley's teacher asks the class where they will spend their summer vacation. Kinsley, without hesitation, responds, "My own special paradise — The Monteagle Sunday School Assembly." Cradled on a Monteagle, Tennessee mountaintop, the Assembly is where Kinsley can spend time with her friends and loved ones and truly feel a sense of childhood freedom. It's her own magical kingdom.

Author Brigid Murphy Stewart grew up in Nashville in a family of writers, journalists, and storytellers. She and her husband, Kevin, married and lived in Nashville for a few years, where she worked as a copy editor at The Tennessean before moving to Memphis. She became the editor and writer for the Cordova Beacon/Bartlett Express newspapers there. When her hus-

band, Kevin, a full-time member of the Army National Guard, was transferred to Winchester in 1999, she served as a state correspondent for The Tennessean. She eventually became the director of Religious Education for the children's programs at Good Shepherd Catholic Church until 2013, when she left to focus on writing.

Meanwhile, artist Cheryl Lankhaar settled in Monteagle in 2011 after living in California, Indiana, and Nashville, where she married Dr. Joe Wehrmeyer and raised their daughter. She had an unwavering passion for art throughout her 40-year professional career as a nurse practitioner.

In addition to children's portraiture over the years, she began painting the beautiful architecture and landscapes in Sewanee and Monteagle.

When she discovered the MSSA community, she asked Stewart to help her create the book. Lankhaar's ability to paint people, landscapes, and architecture perfectly matched Stewart's ability to write a heart-warming children's story that would give life to her illustrations.

She knew the long-time writer could perfectly depict with words what she expressed using illustrations.

The two began working in 2019. Lankhaar began illustrating after a trying recovery from breast cancer, just as the COVID-19 shutdown started in early 2020. Both Lankhaar and Stewart found it essential to take

this opportunity to pour their hearts into creating an enchanting story, not just about the MSSA, but much more than that.

"We wanted something that unified people instead of all the division we saw," Stewart said. "We wanted to write about childhood, the joy of faith and love handed down in families, and hope. Something that speaks to everyone."

Lankhaar said, "We felt like we were trying to put something good out into the world when, in many ways, the world was kind of a scary place at that time."

While Lankhaar's illustrations are vibrant and appeal to children, the book's content is for people of all ages. It includes maps of Franklin County and the surrounding area, from Cowan Station to the Mountain Goat Trail, and a game for children.

Stewart said, "It might be a children's book, but it's also for those children at heart."

## Through the Cowan Commercial Club, Jarod Pearson creates generations of civic-minded leaders.

RESIDENT OF the Railroad Museum and Cowan Commercial Club Jarod Pearson is a seventh-generation resident of Franklin County and a member of the Cowan Community. He joined the

Railroad Museum and Cowan Commercial Club at 14, but his passion for the organization only grew stronger over the years.

Long-standing members of both organizations welcomed him with open arms. Because of their willingness to pour into the young Pearson, he was able to step up years later as president and make a difference in each group and the broader community.

He said, "The work of these two organizations shaped my thinking and sharpened my commitment to the town I live in."

Pearson's dedication to the community stems from his childhood experiences watching his parents and other community members come together to make a difference.

He said he remembers the Homecoming '86 Celebration the city held in 1985 and how dozens of people came together to decorate and prepare the Railroad Park. Pearson said watching community leaders as a child made an impression on him.

"So many people who taught and inspired me and set that example have passed on. But I feel I'm part of their legacy because I continue what they started."

And now, as an adult, he's continued that legacy by leading the two organizations in various impactful projects.

The group participates in the town's commerce and supports causes and projects that benefit the beautiful town of Cowan.

Pearson described the Cowan Commercial Club as "an organization that's about making the town livable."

The club's mission to promote the well-being of Cowan residents has resulted in initiatives such as creating the VisitCowan.com website and the Cowan Clipboard e-mail newsletter, among other projects.

The Cowan Commercial Club is now 100 years old and is the oldest civic club in this area. Pearson said he feels proud to have served such a strong community for as long as he has.

The Cowan Commercial Club is known these days for its annual Flag Day ceremony, inspired by an excerpt Pearson's mother wrote about Betsy Ross and American Flag Day in the '70s. It is one of the newest, most unique traditions Cowan can call its own.

One of the club's challenges in recent decades was figuring out how to help bring the town back from challenging moments. In the early 2000s, numerous businesses and major industries faced difficult times. The Railroad Park, the town's centerpiece, was beginning to show its age, and it took a group of determined community members to roll up their sleeves and get to work. Their determination led to the original Fall in Love With Cowan Festival in 2002. That event was re-imagined as the Fall Heritage Festival in 2014, which has since become one of Franklin County's largest outdoor events.

Creating the festival helped motivate the community to invest in the park, recruit businesses, and encourage new property investment.

Another enormous challenge the club tackled was the loss of Cowan's only bank in 1997. Pearson said,

"Just when we thought we were in the worst situation, we got to work." In partnership with the City of Cowan, the Cowan Commercial Club organized a New Bank Task Force that coordinated a door-to-door survey and interviewed three prospective companies. In 2007, 10 years after the old Cowan Bank had closed, Franklin County United Bank opened a new branch in Cowan. The Cowan branch operates today as part of Citizens Tri-County Bank.

Pearson said there had been other times when the group was discouraged by challenging economic times. Many small businesses were forced to close, but others persevered, and the town always pulled through. Pearson said, "Having a civic organization that brings residents, businesses, elected officials, and other organizations to the same table to work through issues and find positive ways we can contribute just keeps us all together. Being part of a civic organization in a small town is no small feat. It takes a lot of commitment and resolve, but we do it and get it done."

Despite being 100 years old, the Cowan Commercial Club shows no signs of slowing down, thanks to leaders like Pearson, who continue to push for progress in their town. However, he gives all due credit to the civic-minded leaders from years ago who set the example that he intends to follow. **GN**

# Doug & Amy turn *pain* into

A Manchester couple honors their promise to their late daughter, Bethany.

OUG AND Amy Garrett's love for each other has spanned 27 years as of this past February, but the one thing that unites them more than anything else is their daughter, Bethany. After losing her to childhood cancer at just 8 years old, the couple knew they had to keep her memory alive and raise awareness for such a cruel illness.

Amy said, "Losing Bethany was the hardest thing I've ever experienced. It broke me into a million pieces, but I knew she didn't want me to stay in that dark and painful place. I decided that I wanted to live with passion and purpose and be the kind-hearted person that she was."

Amy was born and raised in Tullahoma, and Doug was born and raised in Lilburn, Georgia. After getting married, they helped open Applebee's restaurant in Tullahoma in 1993 and lived in the Estill Springs area until they moved to Georgia, where Bethany was diagnosed with leukemia. After her passing, they decided to return to Estill Springs to bury her, and they've lived there ever since.

Amy said, "She truly demonstrated what the love of the Father looks like. Her compassion and empathy to love people right where they were, was a blessing to witness. God did not just send me a daughter. He sent us an angel."

Doug expressed that at a young age, Bethany was an "old soul" and had a big heart for other children with illnesses. Before Bethany's heavenly transition, Doug promised his daughter he would continue fighting for other ill children after she passed.

When people think of cancer-related illnesses, they often think of the pink ribbon, representing breast cancer. The father and advocate said Childhood Cancer Awareness only receives 4% of all government funding. People often don't think of children battling cancer unless they come across St. Jude's commercials or have lived through it.

"Unless you live it or you're around it and see how violent it really is to a child, it's hard to imagine. And it's always resonated with me because I went through it."

But The National Childhood Cancer Association is working tirelessly to help recognize September as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month.

A few years ago, Doug came across a national high school football website that started its "Touchdowns Against Cancer" campaign and decided to start a campaign here in the community. Doug and Amy worked tirelessly with the Franklin County High School football coaches to make the campaign game happen every year in September.

Doug said, "It's gotten bigger every year. The coaching staff is wholeheartedly behind it. The new athletic director, Kelly Kennedy, has really been a big help."

On game day, they collect donations for St. Jude's Children's Hospital, hand out free balloon animals, offer face paintings to children, and paint the

50-yard line gold — the color representing Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. The coaches wear special shirts, and children and their families are honored on the field at the coin toss as captains for the night.

Childhood cancer hits close to home for numerous families in the county. Every year, 10 to 15 kids still fighting or in remission are honored. The next Touchdowns Against Cancer game will be September 22, 2023, against Shelbyville.

With Amy's help, Doug continues to fulfill his promise to his beloved daughter and ensures all community families dealing with childhood cancer have the proper resources. A local child passed away a couple of years ago from childhood cancer but never received a headstone because it was not feasible for the family. Doug and Amy used some of the proceeds from the football game and bought them a headstone.

The couple also holds a car show, organized by Amy, at Russell Barnett Chevrolet, where football players hand out trophies to children who battled cancer or families of children who have lost to cancer. Half of the proceeds from the car show go toward St. Jude's efforts and the other half toward the football team. This year's annual car show takes place September 23, 2023.

Amy said, "Because of her, we honor children fighting the fight against cancer. We remember children who lost their fight against cancer and provide support for their families. We raise money to help find a cure for childhood cancer so no other child or family has to go through what we went through."

With the help of Doug and Amy's efforts to raise awareness, we can all do our part to help make a difference.

Doug said, "I've made a life decision to raise awareness and help those going through it. Until they put me down, I promised my daughter I'd fight to make sure people knew about it. I'm doing all I can do to honor that promise." GN

IM AND Andrea McEwan, the proud new owners of High Score Arcade, moved to Winchester with their family just three years ago. And in that time, they've made quite a name for themselves in the local community.

Originally from New Jersey, Jim and Andrea moved to Winchester to start fresh and raise their families in a small, close-knit community.

Andrea said, "We just really love the small-town community. Once we started becoming part of the community, we could go to the store and always see somebody we know now. It's a nice, small community where people know and look out for each other."

She said the family didn't intend to open a business when they first moved here and don't have prior experience owning a business, but they were determined to fulfill a need in the community.

The McEwans moved to Winchester during the summer of 2020. With school being out and family birthdays in September, the couple searched for venues, but to Andrea's surprise, there were few fun places to



choose from. Some of the nearest gaming and party locations were in Murfreesboro and Huntsville.

With kids of their own, the McEwans saw a need for a fun, family-friendly place in Winchester where kids could hang out and make friends. So they decided to open up an arcade.

Opened in February 2022, the arcade boasts a diverse selection of games, including PS5 and Xbox One stations, two virtual reality rooms, over 30 classic arcades, and games suitable for all ages. She said the challenges of being firsttime business owners range from navigating



paperwork and taxes and learning the ropes to being well-stocked with maintenance supplies to keep all of the games running.

Despite their challenges, the family plans to keep expanding. When they first opened the arcade, they only had 17 games. Now they have over 30 and are seeking to continue to grow and add even more.

Andrea said, "If we can get to a Dave and Busters kind of setup, that would be awesome."

The High Score Arcade experience has been the first of many arcade experiences for many community members. Andrea said she wants the community to know that even first-time gamers can enjoy the arcade.

She said, "If you've never been to an arcade, or you might be nervous because you don't know how to play a game, it's great because you just go in, and you can spend five minutes on a game, you can spend an hour on a game, and explore and just try it out. And there's no judgment."

The McEwan family welcomes people of all ages and backgrounds to enjoy a day of fun at the High Score Arcade. Generations are unified during the arcade experience.

"The younger kids don't know about Pac-Man or Donkey Kong. So it's great that the parents show the kids the older games. And then, the kids show their parents how to play on the PlayStation. We have grandmas and grandpas that come in and play with their grandchildren. It's really awesome to see the different types of demographics that come in and play and have a great time." **GN**

3-4 lb. chuck roast
3 T. vegetable oil
6 med. potatoes, diced
2 lg. onions, diced
1 lb. carrots, sliced
6 c. water
3 cloves garlic, minced
¼ c. soy sauce
2 pkgs. beef stew seasoning mix
1 t. chicken bouillon granules
½ t. ground black pepper
1½ t. Accent®, optional
1 bay leaf

Preheat oven to 375°. In a large skillet over medium high heat, sear both sides of the roast in vegetable oil. Remove from heat; place in the center of a large roasting pan, along with the juices from the skillet. Place vegetables around meat and add water, garlic, and soy sauce. Sprinkle dry ingredients on top; stir lightly to dissolve seasonings. Add bay leaf. Cover, and bake at 375° for 30 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 275° and continue baking for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  - 2 hours or until meat and vegetables are tender.

1 c. shortening 1 c. sugar 1 t. salt 1 c. boiling water 2 eggs, beaten 1 c. lukewarm water 2 pkgs. yeast 6 c. AP flour

In a bowl, mix shortening, sugar, and salt. Add boiling water; blend and cool. Add the beaten eggs. Soften yeast in lukewarm water; pour into egg mixture. Add flour a little at a time and mix well. Refrigerate 6 hours or overnight. Remove from refrigerator and knead onto a floured board. Roll out into 1/4". Cut out with biscuit cutter. Let rise about 2 hours. Bake at 400° for 15 minutes.

### Dare to finish the race

Unleashing the power of endurance.

S TAR OLYMPIAN Usain Bolt is known as the fastest man in the world, and his reputation was cemented when he won the gold medal in the 100-meter race at the 2008 Beijing Olympics and 2012 London Olympics. He set a world record for both races, running 100 meters in 9.69 seconds in Beijing and 9.63 seconds in London, and set a new record at the World Championship in Berlin in 2009, running 100 meters in 9.58 seconds.

Bolt's championship-winning race from Beijing showcased his incredible speed and talent. He got off to a strong start, immediately taking the lead over his competitors, which he maintained for most of the race. With about 25 meters left, Bolt pulled away even more and looked poised to break a new world record (at the time) as he crossed the finish line first within 9.69 seconds. He held his arms out in celebration while slowing his stride after crossing the finish line, knowing he had just achieved greatness.

His record-high performance was remarkable not only because of his speed and prowess but also because of the endurance and mental fortitude it took him to achieve greatness in the face of adversity. His success story didn't come without a cost.

Many people don't know that Usain Bolt was born with scoliosis and has experienced some health issues affecting his performance on his road to beating world records. His right leg is half an inch shorter than his left, and his spine curves to the right, but he adjusted his movements to accommodate the effects of his diagnosis.

Bolt understood the power of endurance first-hand. He didn't allow his diagnosis and the issues it caused to interfere with his dreams. Endurance pushes us to keep going when we want to give up on our dreams and aspirations. Endurance is like a muscle that grows stronger with use. It's not something we're born with, but rather something developed over time through hard work and dedication.

It's the resilience to bounce back from setbacks and continue the race even when we fall down. Endurance is the fire that burns inside, the drive that propels us forward, even when the road ahead seems dark and uncertain.

Endurance is the courage to keep going, even when the odds are against us, and the faith to believe that victory is within reach, even when it seems impossible. It's the determination to push past our limits, reach new heights, and achieve our goals, no matter how challenging they may be. The Bible has much to say about endurance, a common theme throughout the Old and New Testaments.

One of the most well-known verses on endurance in the Bible is found in the book of James. "Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test, he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him" (James 1:12).

Endurance is an essential part of life. It is steadfastness and perseverance in the face of adversity and is often associated with faith and hope. So, the next time you find yourself standing face-to-face with adversity, remember Usain Bolt's testimony — keep the faith and run with endurance, the race set before you. **GN**

Moore is a spiritual business owner who sought to use her talents and passions to spread God's love. Marketplace Consignment is a twice-a-year pop-up shop that allows families to buy and sell clothing for spring, summer, fall, and winter.

Shoppers come from all over Tennessee and Northern Alabama to enjoy Marketplace Consignment and see what treasures they can find. They always leave feeling better than when they arrived.

Moore has been in the consignment business for 29 years, and she said her love for babies and families inspired her to start the business. Childhood memories with her thrifty late grandmother, Nelle Quandt, built the foundation.

Back then, there weren't many maternity clothing options, which led Moore to maternity and baby consignment sales in Nashville. She loved the concept, but when she asked her friend, Laura Rowland, about local options, she was disappointed to learn that there were none. The spring after her Thanksgiving baby was born, she and Rowland started a sale in Franklin County. Moore created marketing materials and clever slogans for bags and T-shirts. The first slogan read: "Outfitting families for less!"

Initially, her primary focus was helping families save money and providing them with a way to make money. After witnessing the relationships made, she soon realized her sale represented much more.

Their slogan eventually became: "Outfitting families for less... enabling them for more."

The Marketplace Consignment Sale is where one-time inquirers become regular customers and friends. Moore said the events are like "minireunions" for frequent attendees to reconnect.

"We all desire to be a part of something bigger than ourselves. When people started feeling that, it just all started coming together in such a beautiful way."

Moore said one of her favorite parts about the consignment business is the theme of "passing it on."

"That's good stewardship. That's the whole recycling, reducing, and reusing thing. But you're passing on so much more. You're supporting another local family. You're blessing another mama who's outfitting her family, and it's just a beautiful thing."

Moore and her team are proud to be a part of spreading love and blessings to everyone they encounter.

"It's just so neat how God gives us all talents, abilities, interests, and passions. In my younger years, I knew I wanted to do something helpful for other moms, but I had no idea what it would grow into and how to platform it. I feel like that's what God's calling me to use it for now — to uplift, encourage and spotlight his love of the family."
