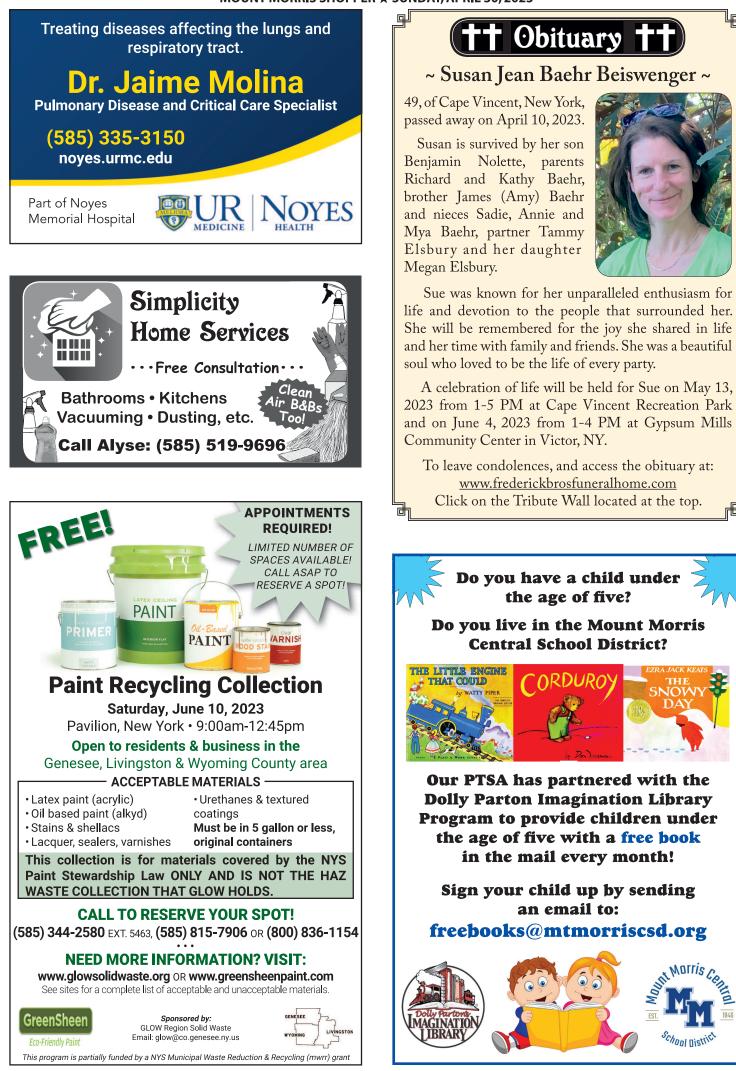

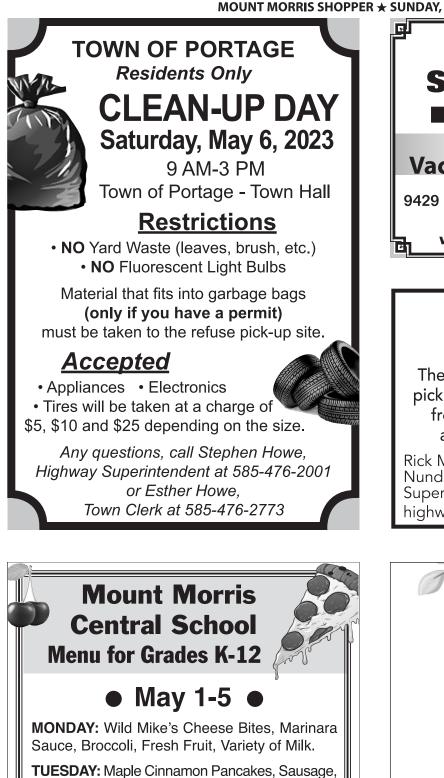

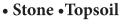

Notice is hereby given that the Annual Budget Hearing of the residents of the Keshequa Central School District, as taxpayers for the Bell Memorial Library, will be held at said library, 16 East Street, Nunda, NY, in said district, on Tuesday, May 2, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. EDT, for the transaction of such business as is authorized by the Education Law.

And notice is also given that a copy of the proposed budget which will be required for the ensuing year for public library purposes may be obtained at the library by any taxpayer in the district during the week preceding the hearing, except Sunday, Monday or a holiday, at Bell Memorial Library during regular hours of operation.

And notice is also given that petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the Board of Trustees must be filed in the Bell Memorial Library no later than 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 11, 2023. The following vacancy is to be filled on the Board of Trustees: one 5-year term beginning July 1, 2023.

And notice is also given that the application for absentee ballots is available upon request and that a list of all persons to whom absentee ballots have been issued will be available in the Library on each of the five days preceding the election, except Sunday, Monday or a holiday, and that such list will also be posted at the polling place on the day of the election. Voting on the election of one trustee and appropriation will be held on Tuesday, May 9, 2023, between the hours of 11:00 am and 6:30 pm in the Bell Memorial Library on East Street.

REMINDER

It is the law in the Town and Village of Mount Morris that all dogs must be licensed at the Town Clerk's Office once they are 4 months old. Below is the Local Code on Dog Licensing in the Town of Mount Morris.

§ 14-6. Licensing of Dogs; Fees.

A. License required. All dogs in the Town shall be licensed with the Town Clerk by the age of four months, and any person applying for a dog license shall present a current certificate of rabies vaccination at the time of making application for a license or for the renewal of an existing license.

B. Expiration of license. All dog licenses shall be valid for a period of one year and shall expire at the end of the month, one year from the date of issuance.

C. License Fees. The fee for a spayed or neutered dog will be determined by the Town by resolution from time to time. The fee for an un-spayed or unneutered dog will be determined by the Town by resolution from time to time; such fee shall be at least \$5 more than the fee for a spayed or neutered dog. The fee for a replacement dog identification tag will be determined by the Town by resolution from time to time.

D. Each individual dog license for a spayed or neutered dog shall be subject to an animal population control surcharge in the amount as mandated by New York State as must be paid at the time the dog license application is filed. Each individual dog license for an un-spayed or unneutered dog shall be subject to an animal population control surcharge in the amount as mandated by New York State as must be paid at the time the dog license application to the fees set forth in Subsection C hereof.

E. Enumeration Fee. When the Town Board determines the need for a dog enumeration, a fee as determined by the Town by resolution from time to time will be assessed to the owner of any dog found unlicensed or for which the license has not been renewed at the time the enumeration is conducted.

F. Service Dogs. The Town shall require a license for any guide dog, service dog, hearing dog or detection dog; however, the license fee will be waived for such dogs as those terms are defined by Article 7 of the Agriculture and Markets Law. Each copy of any license for such dogs shall be conspicuously marked "Guide Dog," or "Service Dog," as may be appropriate, by the Clerk.

G. Shelters. The Town does not allow the licensing of dogs by a shelter. The shelter shall send all dog owners to the clerk of the town or city in which

the dog will be harbored for licensing.

H. All dog licenses shall be purchased in person at the Town Clerk's office or by regular mail. If licensing or renewing a license by mail, the appropriate fee shall accompany the forms. There shall be no refund of fees.

I. All fees shall be used to fund the administration of the Dog Control Law of the Town.

This is our sixth consecutive year without a tax levy increase. Our enrollment has increased over the years which has led to additional funding,

allowing us to expand our programs. Last year, we had the highest general education graduation rate in Monroe and Livingston counties. Over the last few years, we have seen an increase in the number of students needing additional special education supports. Special education programming represents the largest area of expansion within our current budget.

This year, our Odyssey of the Mind program had nine teams participate in the regional competition, resulting in five of our teams advancing to the NYS Tournament in Syracuse. Our Masterminds team won the league tournament and advanced to the regional tournament in Rochester. Our extracurricular offerings continue to expand and next year, there will be over thirty-five of these opportunities for our students.

We have much to be proud of as our District has been recognized throughout the region and at the national level. As we move forward, we are committed to preserving the successes we have achieved and to maintaining our upward momentum.

2023-2024 Questions and Answers

Q: What will the residents be voting on?
 Proposition 1 – authorization of the budget
 Proposition 2 – the Public Library Proposition
 Election of two (2) school board Trustees

Q: What is the overall budget for 2023-2024 proposed in Proposition 1?

Proposition 1 proposes a budget of \$19,280,745.

Q: How does this budget compare to prior budgets? The proposed 2023-2024 budget once again continues the trend of the last six years of <u>not increasing taxes</u> from the prior year's proposed levy. However, the overall budget is increasing and being driven by several factors. The first major increase is within the special education area and its necessary costs for placements and transportation. Second, within the benefits area, health insurance premiums continue to rise over 10% annually on average and the district's average contribution rate to the NYSLRS is rising over 14%. The 2023-2024 proposed budget is an increase of \$2,144,498 or 12.51% compared to the 2022-2023 budget.

Q: What is this year's tax cap?

The tax cap legislation that passed several years ago limits the local levy increase by a local tax growth factor and the lower of CPI or 2%. The proposed levy of \$4,109,011 is under the cap by \$109,713; this is no increase for the 2023-2024 school year levy from the 2022-2023 proposed levy.

Q: How is the tax levy staying the same if the budget is increasing?

Foundation Aid is a formula driven aid that is calculated based on student enrollment, needs of specific student groups, regional costs, and wealth factors of individual districts. As one of the most underfunded districts in the State per the formula and due to cost increase factors within the formula, Mount Morris is well positioned to benefit from New York State's plan to fully fund Foundation Aid. Under the State Executive Budget's final year of a three-year phase-in initiative to fully fund Foundation Aid, the district is projected to get an increase of \$1,730,728 in 2023-2024.

Furthermore, there are two categories of expense driven aids that are increasing, special education and BOCES. The special education cost increases mentioned previously are for additional placements during the 2022-2023 school year and projected for the 2023-2024. This will drive additional aid of over \$400,000 during the 2023-2024 year and then more aid into the 2024-2025 year. Additionally, the district continues to use BOCES wherever possible to provide needed services which is driving an additional almost \$100,000 in 2023-2024. Altogether, the increases in aid amount to over \$2,200,000 which is more than enough to cover the budgetary increase.

Q. How does a flat tax levy affect my own property taxes?

As a general rule, if the tax levy remains flat it would be expected that tax bills would stay flat as long as all other factors remained the same. However, there are several factors that affect the distribution of the tax levy per municipality and per property. (continued) For example, changes in total assessments, exemptions, or equalization rates by municipality. The Board of Education will determine the tax rates using these factors once the assessment rolls are finalized by July 1st.

Q. Are we still doing a Capital Outlay Project?

Yes. The Capital Outlay Program is an expense driven aid program that allows the district to make necessary facility improvements one year and receive the full state aid on the work the following year. In other words, once you are into the cycle of completing an annual Capital Outlay Project, the aid from the prior year project significantly covers the cost of the project in the current year. The 2023-2024 general fund budget includes \$100,000 as a transfer to the capital fund for a project to continue to address some or all of the following: building security enhancements, communication system enhancements, replacement of control systems in various areas throughout the building, HVAC and mechanical improvements, and potential upgrades to athletic facilities' electronic systems. The project and work will be completed upon submission of the scope to the State Education Department (SED) and receipt of the commissioner's approval. However, the project is almost 98% funded by aid generated from the 2022-2023 year. The net result is a cost to the community of about \$2.00 for every \$100 worth of work.

Q. When is the annual budget hearing & vote?

The hearing is the presentation of the budget and will be held on Wednesday, May 3, 2023, at 6 p.m. in the school auditorium. The vote is Tuesday, May 16, 2023, from 12:00 pm (noon) to 9 pm in the high school gym lobby.

Q. What happens if the budget is defeated?

The Board of Education can choose to: Put the same budget up for a second vote; Propose a different budget; Adopt a contingent budget without holding another vote. If the Board of Education selects either of the first two options and the second budget vote fails, the Board of Education must adopt a contingent budget.

Q. What is a contingent (austerity) budget?

A contingent budget includes only expenses necessary to provide the minimum services legally required to operate and maintain school buildings and educational programs, preserve the property of the school district and ensure the health and safety of the students and staff. A contingent budget requires that there be no increase in the tax levy over the previous year.

Q. Why is there a separate proposition for the public library?

New York State Education Law requires a separate proposition for the public library. The school district is obligated by law to levy taxes for voter approved library funding on the school tax bill. The school district collects the money and turns it over to the library. Our library, located on Main Street, is seeking approval of a library tax levy of \$130,000.

The Role of Our Local Library and the Need for Your Continued Support

Modern public libraries, local or municipal, offering free library services to the public and supported by tax money date back at least to the mid-1800s. Since their inception, they were conceived as part of the nation's broader educational movement, and it was precisely their educational function that provided the main justification for public support. Initially, libraries contributed to improving the general well-being of their communities by aiding in literacy development, making reading materials available not only to school children, but also to adults in the community.

Today, libraries offer much more than books. The resources offered include newspapers, magazines, movies, games, electronic and audio materials, puzzles, parks and museums passes, etc. Spanish language materials are available as well. In addition, libraries also provide children and adult programming, lectures, a place to gather, assistance with tax preparation, technology tutoring, social assistance information, English as a Second Language resources, assistance, and interpretation, and many other services.

In short, we are a community center committed to building strong ties by sharing resources and efforts in a sustainable way to promote a collaborative, healthy, and informed citizenry. Please support us to to carry on this important work.

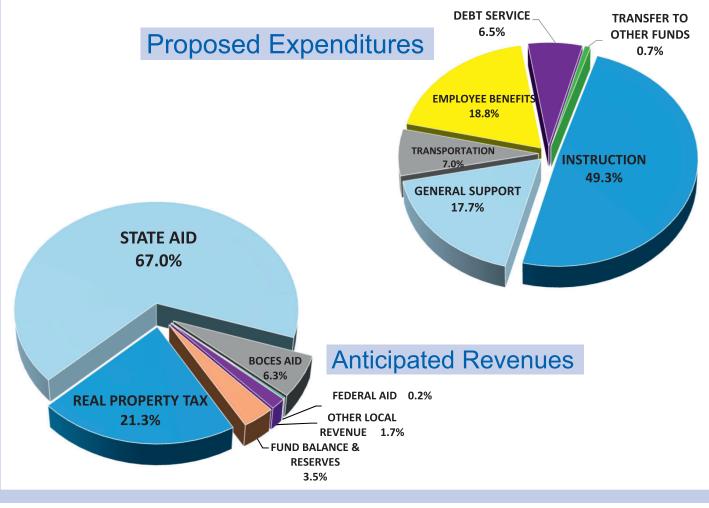

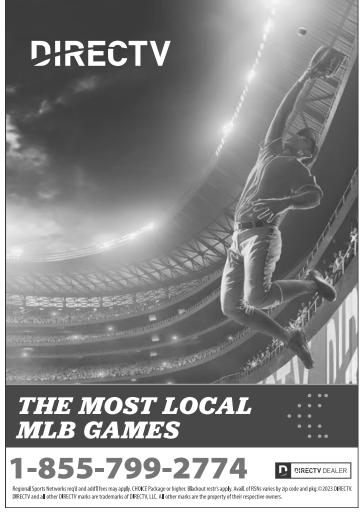

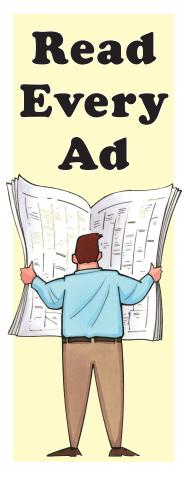
