# Community Elementary installs a tool to increase literacy.

A vending machine dispenses more than books.

**P** ROGRAMS LIKE Dolly Parton's Imagination Library are a blessing, putting books into the hands of children from birth to 5 years. But once a child enters school, their library may not continue to grow. While they can access books at school, most of the reading material is the school's property. Children longing for books of their own are often left without resources and access to stories that enrich their lives and entertain them outside of school. And the local literacy rate, especially following the pandemic, could use a boost.

Susan Redden, librarian and media specialist at Community Elementary, first saw a book vending machine on social media. Seeing it as an opportunity to encourage students to read, she shared the idea with the school's principal, Whitney Yoes, and the two immediately began brainstorming for its funding. Soon, letters were mailed to area businesses, churches, government leaders, and others in our community. The letters were sent in April, and by report card day in May, a local Kiwanis club donation enabled the school to fund the purchase of the machine.

Redden said, "I was amazed because I thought I'd need to save money from the book fair in the fall just to get the money for it. I was blown away."

Installed in November 2021, students earn "Inchy" tokens through their Accelerated Reader program, and the youngest students obtain them as they progress with their sight words. The 2022-23 school year included a 40-book challenge for extra opportunities to earn tokens. Third through fifth grade students who read 40 books from different genres received a coin. All students also received a coin last Christmas and were excited to select the book of their choice.


"Part of the reason we [installed the machine] is that many of our kids don't have books at home. Studies have found that students having books in their homes improves literacy rates. Our goal with the machine is to improve literacy and the students' love of reading. I feel like if students get to pick a book they want, it's going to make them want to read, and I think the kids feel that way, too," said Redden.

Redden fills the machine with books inspired by the students' feedback.

She said, "A lot of times, it's based on what's popular for library checkout because they get stuck on a series, and they absolutely love it. I try to find books I know they like or will catch their attention. I even asked them when we first started this for ideas for books they wanted to see in the machine."

With an ever-changing selection, the book vending machine dispenses more than books. Building a love of reading and libraries, no matter how small, sparks joy in students' hearts. And the literacy rate? It improved from 28.3 (2020-21) to 31.3 (2021-22).

Who knew an "Inchy" token could buy so much? GN


Live entertainment at the Humble Baron will not disappoint. The grand opening weekend performances included American Idol's country music artist Hunter Girl and international DJ Bova.

# Local program sends seniors back to school.

Foster grandparents find purpose and help shape lives.

A H, RETIREMENT! We dream about it, save for it, and imagine how we'll fill our days. While many seniors and retirees find countless ways to spend their time, others discover extra time on their hands. Living costs continue to rise faster than retirement benefits, and low-income seniors are hit particularly hard.

Teachers never seem to have enough time or resources to meet all the demands placed on them and their students, and the pandemic left many students behind in reading. Not every student has a strong family support system to encourage and help to catch up in any areas where they struggle.

But there is one excellent resource that serves to fill the gap for seniors, teachers, and students. The South Central Human Resource Agency's (SCHRA) Foster Grandparent Program, funded through AmeriCorps Seniors, is that bridge.

Jeana Mills, Foster Grandparent Program director, said Bedford, Franklin, Coffee, and Lincoln County headstarts, schools, and after-school programs are among the 13 counties covered in our area. Foster grandparents presently serve over 27 students in Lincoln and Franklin Counties. SCHRA is ready and able to connect students, seniors, headstarts, schools, and after-school programs in Bedford and Coffee Counties."

Mills said, "We currently serve 23 partnerships in our area, and my goal is to establish a partnership with Bedford and Coffee [Counties]. While headstart programs usually receive only one [grandparent], we can cover a larger area in our school systems."

The volunteer program is open to all seniors. Travel is reimbursed, and participat-

The one-on-one sessions with students focus on reading, math, and building life skills. Teamwork and self-confidence grow as students benefit academically and form lasting connections with the foster grandparents long after the school year ends. The areas where volunteers are presently assigned find the presence of the foster grandparents to be an essential part of student learning and something positive within the school or program's culture.

Mills explained the foster grandparents' requirements. "To qualify, they must be low income, over 55, and able to pass a background check. They receive 40 hours of training — 20 hours with us and 20 hours shadowing someone at the school," she said.

Volunteers choose the number of hours they want to work, and many choose additional hours once they've experienced the program.

" I always warn the volunteers, once you start working with these children, they will love you endlessly, and you will love them the same. They will become like family, and when you're out for doctors' appointments, illness, or simply a personal day, you will be missed. So be ready to explain why you were out because they will ask," she said.

Mills continued, "It's just a win-win. The kids get extra help, the teachers get extra help, and senior citizens stay active and engaged in the community. Every morning, they have a purpose to get out of bed and push themselves to keep going. It's a really good program that works hand in hand between both generations." GN






When life is a song

BILLIE CROWELL CONNECTS TO THE WORLD AND US THROUGH MUSIC.

T'S A life of song. Spend 15 minutes with Billie Crowell, and tell me you don't walk away with a song in your heart, a smile on your face, and a pep in your step. She says music is God's gift to her; Crowell is God's gift to us.

The piano has its place in many childhood memories. Some find practice and recitals a chore, while others, like Crowell, discovered a life-changing melody. It was a connection that grew stronger when Billie Crowell's father, W.D. (Bill) Hayes, who operated Bill's Grocery, received a piano as payment on an account. The ivory keys on that old Wurlitzer played more than scales; they played into Crowell's future and set the trajectory of her life.

According to hellomusictheory.com, one of the many benefits of learning to play the piano is it improves your memory. Crowell is living proof and effortlessly recounts events in her life in song. She burst into song with lines from the first song she sang with her sister, Mary Jane. "There's a gold mine in the sky far away. We will find it, you and I, some sweet day."

Music and the piano are Crowell's heartbeat, and Crowell and music are a dance. While the metronome of life ticks perfect rhythm as crescendos approach and gentle melodies evolve, Crowell can't (and would never want to) separate herself from music.

That first Wurlitzer watched Crowell grow up. It patiently worked through scales, recital practices, and performance preparation. Like a doting parent, it watched as she left behind childhood toys and waked into young adulthood.

Also testifying to this season is a framed, yellowed newspaper. The Bedford County Times reminded its readers to tune in for Shelbyville's AM 1400 WHAL first broadcast on Friday, December 20, 1946, featuring Ralph (Rat) Brantley and Miss Billie Hayes.

She said of that first broadcast, "The first sound ever [on WHAL] was Rat playing piano, and I sang, 'If I Had My Way."

Other opportunities to perform during this time stirred memories of specific songs.

Crowell recalled, "In my high school days, we had one morning where everyone with a talent performed. 'Dream (When You're Feeling Blue).' Remember that one?"

Indeed, piano playing sharpens and extends memory while simultaneously creating lifetime memories.

Crowell took her beloved music with her as she married Elmer "Coke" Crowell, and they began their family. You'll find that handsome football captain pictured on the same yellowed front page newspaper, foreshadowing two lives that would become one. While chauffeuring her children, Jackie, David, and Nancy, Crowell found ways to continue to make music a part of everyday life. She shared music with Bedford County's school children as a music teacher in the '70s and '80s and taught private lessons. She briefly operated a dance studio in her home's basement before moving on to playing piano and teaching dance at Nancy June Brandon's School of Dance.

"God grant me the serenity to start each day on a joyful note, courage to sing the song of my soul, and wisdom to trust you always accompany me, that's my prayer." - MUSICIAN'S SERENITY PRAYER

Jack

Brenda Ayers was one of Crowell's dance students and remembered how important it was in her life.

"We were poor growing up, but dance was the one place I could go to and escape that reality," Ayers said.

Crowell said, "My real joy was helping others learn to love music and have a part in it, even if they never played anywhere."

But some still play and live with the joy their time with Crowell sparked.

Her first piano student, Bob Smith, plays piano and organ. Music has taken him from the center ring of the Tennessee Walking Horse National Celebration to church platforms, and he continues a life of music sparked at Crowell's side on the piano bench.

He said, "I credit everything I've ever accomplished through my music to this super dear lady! She was so patient and worked with me to learn to play the piano; then, the organ came naturally. I owe my love of music to her, and, to this day, when I see her, it's like seeing my idol. I'm so humbly thankful God allowed me to learn and study piano under her."

Crowell has always shared her love of music by serving as a pianist at area churches. She said, "I am still blessed to be able to play the piano and organ at my church, First Presbyterian, every Sunday morning in praise to our Lord God."

The list of piano positivity states that learning the piano removes negative emotions. Another benefit of playing the piano is that it helps alleviate stress and reduce anxiety. Crowell agrees, saying she depends on it and God for strength and happiness.

Crowell adds her reason for learning to play the piano to this long list.

"It becomes a joy in your life like nothing else," she said. **GN**

Discovering

N OLD ledger-turned-scrapbook testifies to the tenacious and adventurous spirit of a woman ahead of her time. Glued to the aged pages is a series of encouraging quotes, more roadmap than sentiment for the one that cut and pasted keepsakes from her travels. While many of us dream of all we'll do "one day," Laura Trescott Ledbetter charged head-on into life.

"Remember, nothing can put you down but yourself, and nothing can keep you there but yourself."

Ledbetter was not one to be put down or slowed down. Her grandparents raised her after her mother, who was married to a Native American man, died 11 days after giving birth to her. Her grandfather died when she was 12, and her grandmother died two years later. Only two and a half months after her grandmother's death, her father was killed by Indians in Arizona. By her 15th birthday, Ledbetter was without immediate family.

She obtained her early education in Bedford County's schools, then attended a preparatory college in Cincinnati, Ohio. Education became one of Ledbetter's champion causes. In Laura Ledbetter Ingram's book, "My Grandmother," Ingram recalls her grandmother's desire for her children and grandchildren to be cultured, seeing they received music and elocution lessons.

"Grandmother had a business college in her home. Because of her interest in education, my mother and father met and married," wrote Ingram. Her mother taught shorthand and typing at the school and met Ledbetter's son, John Trescott Ledbetter, who lived in Texas at the time when he visited his mother in Shelbyville.

Ingram recalled her grandmother getting her started in stamp collecting and gifting her a ten-volume set of Journeys Through Bookland, which is still among Ingram's most treasured possessions. Ledbetter was always actively investing in her grandchildren's lives,

A path to success for a woman twice widowed by the time she was 47 would seem like a winding,





mountainous road. With two sons born from each marriage, Ledbetter wasn't one to wring her hands and woe-is-me wallow. In addition to her school of business, Ledbetter owned numerous rental properties, an investment for her financial security and an investment in the lives of her tenants.

Ingram's book shared a May 26, 1940, birthday tribute from the Shelbyville paper. "Miss Laura,' as Mrs. Ledbetter is affectionately known by hundreds of admirers, is a large property owner and personally attends to all the details of repairing, remodeling, and building houses. It is said that no one in Shelbyville is better informed on the cost and selection of building materials or more active, regardless of years."

Ledbetter took to heart the needs of her tenants, especially at Christmas. Recalling holiday celebrations, Ingram wrote, "It was an annual custom to have a tree for the benefit of a large number of people who would otherwise not be remembered — mostly her tenants, as she had many houses for rent. One year 149 attended and were served turkey sandwiches, cranberries, and hot coffee. Heads of families received gifts of practical value, and candy, fruit, and nuts were given to all."

Ledbetter was not all work and no play. The tribute in the paper noted, "When she desires to relax and forget business worries, she takes a trip, sometimes to distant points, always driving the car herself and alone. 'May she never grow old' is the sincere wish of the hundreds of friends at home and acquired in her travels over the country. Mrs. Ledbetter, whose appearance and indomitable energy do not indicate it, was 73 years of age Sunday."

The old scrapbook begins with a newspaper clipping that reads: "Mrs. Laura Ledbetter left last Sunday for Nashville, where she joined a party for an extensive Western trip and expects to be away for a month or so. She will visit California and many other points of interest." During the 1926 trip, she collected memorabilia from Kansas City. She clipped the header of the free coach schedule at Unity Inn and collected information on an Indian detour, Grand Canyon outings, Santa Fe highlights, and California not-tobe-missed lakes, mountains, and cottages. Even a Hollywood brochure is fully intact.

"Have you a vision? Put it to work."

Ledbetter put her vision to work in more ways than one. "Postcard Memories of Bedford County, Tennessee" features Ledbetter as Shelbyville's Pioneer Postcard Photographer. Despite being widely traveled, all of Ledbetter's postcard photography captured scenes exclusive to Bedford County. Sylvan Mills (The Cotton Factory), the old First Baptist Church on Depot Street, Shelbyville's public square, and other local landmarks and images of everyday life are frozen in time.

### The future is now.

Ledbetter's great-granddaughters, Becky Nichols and Camille Bell, reflected on Ledbetter's colorful life and her influence still today. Education is threaded through Nichols' life as a home economics teacher, and Bell is a local real estate agent. Their father, John T. Ledbetter Jr., regularly invested in real estate and rental properties.

Nichols said, "I think that was passed down. Our dad said, 'Education is the most important thing. People can take your inheritance away from you, but they can't take education away.' And that seems to be something that was passed down from her."

Today, Ledbetter might have documented her travels on Facebook, tweeted her thoughts on kindness, and shared her local photography in an Instagram feed. She would have much to add to conversations about homelessness, zoning, and land development. But most of all, she would be proud to see that her influence is alive and well in the family that follows in her footsteps.

Ledbetter is a Bedford County legend. GN

### **DISC GOLF**

While the two words seem contradictory, the sport's growing popularity is anything but.

According to the Merriam-Webster dictionary, Disc Golf is also known as Frisbee golf. In playing the game, players attempt to toss a plastic disc into each of a succession of basketlike receptacles stationed along a course, with the object being to reach each target in as few attempts as possible. It is similar to regular golf in that it has 18 holes and is played primarily by the same rules. But instead of hitting a ball into a hole in the ground, in Disc Golf, Frisbees are thrown into metal disc-trapping baskets on stationary poles. Locally, Disc Golf courses have popped up steadily, with plenty of spots to play a round in whatever county you might find yourself in. It's also a sport that welcomes all skill levels and almost all ages.

Heather Brown is an avid lover of the game who not only plays but also competes in area tournaments and competitions. One of her favorite courses is the Red Apple Disc Golf Course at Stone Mountain Distillery in Woodbury.

"It's one of my favorites. The course is super challenging but fun," she said. "I have sort of a noodle arm, so it's harder for me to throw farther," she said. "A wooded course is a little more challenging but allows you to use the trees to your advantage. My family and I enjoy playing the more heavily wooded courses."

As a female who plays the game, Brown added that she welcomes other females to try the sport.

"I think it can be a little intimidating to come out and see a bunch of guys throwing discs," she said. "But the more you're out there, the better you get. We invite women of all [skill] levels to come out and enjoy with us."

### PICKLEBALL

Another summer activity that seems to have picked up its own cult following is Pickleball.

A paddle sport with combined elements of tennis, badminton, and Ping-Pong, Pickleball is played on a doubles badminton court. The net is similar to a tennis net but is 2 inches lower and played with a hard paddle, identical to Ping-Pong. It can be played in either singles or doubles matches.

out and experience the addictive sport. According to the USA Pickleball Association (USAPA), playing Pickleball can boost mood and overall mental health while burning calories. It also works on balance and agility while offering the same benefits as other exercises, including reducing the risk of heart attack and chronic disease, toning muscles, and increasing energy.

Local Pickleball player Felicia Daniels knows the benefits of playing the sport. She and her family have a long-standing love of Pickleball, which is four generations strong.

"My family is a four-generation family that plays," she explained. "My mother started playing in Tullahoma at the D.W. Wilson Community Center. I hardly ever got to see her because she was so addicted to it. She told me I should start playing so I could see her more, so that's how I got into it. That was probably



three years ago, and that's how long my husband and I have played. My children started giving me a hard time about never seeing me, and I told them the same story. So now my children have started playing, and even my grandbaby is trying to play too. It has become one big family affair."

The Shelbyville Recreation Center has a \$3 fee, with courts open from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. for those wanting to play indoors. Outdoor players can enjoy Pickleball free of charge from 6 a.m. to midnight every day on specially marked outdoor courses at the center.
