Bridge built in 1946 suffers earthquake and storm damage

By Kevin Larsen *Times staff writer* fter 77 years, a walking bridge located in Evergreen Valley has been closed by the City of San Jose on January 6, 2023.

This bridge, named by the City of San Jose as the Yerba Buena Upper Pedestrian Bridge, is located across from the parking lot of Evergreen Valley College and is used primarily by the residents of the Estates housing tract.

In response to several emails, District 8 City Councilmember Domingo Candelas stated, "I have heard from numerous residents See BRIDGE, page 19

Evergreen high schoolers' endeavor to bridge the digital divide goes global

Facilitates the donation of 40 Chromebooks to Ukraine By William Bellou

Publisher vergreen Valley students (pictured: Gaurish Agrawal, Abhinav Bellapu, Zakaria Kortam, and Nishanth Tharakan) have been working towards bridging the 'digital divide' - the unequal distribution of access to technology and the internet between members of society.

Since the invention of the household computer, there has been an inequality in technological access. Even in Silicon Valley, the epicenter of technological innovation, thousands of families have no devices or internet access. The lack of technology results in the reduction of opportunities and resources for future success.

ClosingTheDivide was established to tackle this very problem: combating the digital divide through providing low-income families with computing devices. Run by students, ClosingTheDivide, abbreviated to CTD, collects discarded devices, refurbishes them, and distributes them to the underprivileged.

Having started locally in San Jose, ClosingTheDivide has raised more than \$210,000, donated over 1200 working devices across 29 countries, worked with 50+ partners, and expanded to over 16 branches with 160 active volunteers.

Area's most congested corridors to the major regional job centers," said the state announcement. "California is making a multiyear,

multibillion-dollar investment to transform and modernize our transportation infrastructure, creating jobs, alternatives to driving, and reducing pollution," said Newsom in a statement. "Our state is placing a high priority on investing in public transportation projects that aim to shift away from fossil fuels while making public travel more rider friendly. Today's announcement not only provides better travel alternatives but also helps to speed up our transition to a cleaner, healthier transportation future for all Californians.'

The larger, multiyear, multibilliondollar investment to upgrade the state's transit system aims "to support equity, enhance mobility options, improve service and reduce overdependence on driving," the governor's office also said in the statement.

The grants are administered by the California State Transportation Agency.

CA Announces \$46.6M Light Rail grant to connect Eastridge Center to Milpitas BART

Publisher \$46.6 million grant to extend VTA light rail service into East San Jose, creating a direct rail link between VTA's second-busiest bus transit center at Eastridge Center in Evergreen Valley was announced last week.

The extension, connecting the Milpitas BART Station and the rest of the VTA light rail system, is expected to be completed in 2029. The extension also includes an elevated light rail station at Story Road with a pedestrian overcrossing and a ground level station at the Eastridge Transit Center.

When the project is complete, VTA riders will be able to get on light rail at the Eastridge Transit Center and connect directly with BART at Milpitas Station.

The announcement came with the presentation of a giant check by California Transportation Secretary


Toks Omishakin in East San Jose, flanked by San Jose Mayor Matt Mahan, Santa Clara County Supervisors Sylvia Arenas and Cindy Chavez, Sen. Dave Cortese and others.

After the event, Mahan tweeted: "I'm so excited for this project to break ground and to one day be able to get on board that light rail and go connect to BART and the larger regions!" The award represents the final piece to bring rail into the Eastridge Transit center and is matched by "significant local funding", according to the announcement from Gov. Gavin Newsom's office.

"The congested, transit-dependent neighborhoods of East San Jose are all classified as low-income communities and these residents will be able to travel on protected rail rightof-way through some of the Bay



Silicon Valley's Central Bikeway could be a game changer

By Sonya Herrera San José Spotlight anta Clara County residents could soon ride on the region's first biggels cuparhighway

First bicycle superhighway. The Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority could approve the basic design of the Central Bikeway a 10-mile stretch of protected bike lanes between San Jose and Santa Clara—as soon as next month. VTA's bicycle advisory committee voted unanimously Wednesday to recommend the transit agency's board approve the concept for the project. The VTA board will consider the Central Bikeway on May 4.

"This is a really precedent-setting project," VTA land-use planner Brent Pearse said during the meeting. "We're going to use this when we work with cities (and) we're going to use this when we work on future bike superhighways."

VTA initially had about a dozen routes to choose from, and eventually narrowed the choice down to three. More than 1,400 residents gave *See BIKEWAY, page 7*

Longtime local radio station set to be demolished

San José Spotlight building that once housed legendary San Jose radio stations KLIV and KRTY is set to be demolished and replaced with a warehouse.

City planning officials greenlighted a proposal during a hearing on Wednesday from Scottsdale-based developer GO Industrial to demolish the 10,552 square-foot building at 750 Story Road in the city's Little Saigon district.

Plans call for construction of an industrial building, with 65,126 square feet of warehouse space and 5,867 square feet of office space on the roughly 3.6-acre site.

Robert Guerena, managing partner of GO Industrial, told San José Spotlight that real estate investment giant Clarion Partners, which is behind the current development plan, bought the property last year. New York-based Clarion is a private equity firm with more than \$80 billion in assets, according to its website, and one of the largest real estate management groups in North America.

Several residents spoke against the project at the hearing, and shared concerns the warehouse would become an Amazon operation and bring more traffic and safety risks to an already congested, dangerous road.

However, Preston Pruett, representing the developer, said the project doesn't have a tenant yet and it has no connection to Amazon.

Guerena told San José Spotlight the project is being designed to attract high-quality tech manufacturing and distribution tenants.

The area's land use designation and zoning allows for industrial and commercial properties, city staff said, and the project proposal complies with city building guidelines. The existing building's current tenants include a private COVID-19 testing facility.

City reports said there will not be a significant impact on traffic as a result of the new project, but noted that stretch of Story Road-Keyes Street is an area with a long history of congestion and crashes. The San Jose City Council unanimously voted on Tuesday to secure the final funding needed to make a range of safety improvements for bicyclists, pedestrians and drivers along a 2.3-mile stretch of the Story-Keyes corridor from Third Street to King Road. The area is one of 17 most dangerous corridors in San Jose, officials said.

In addition to traffic and safety concerns, one man named Orlando called in to say the building is a landmark because of its affiliation with local radio. He did not provide a last name. The building does not have landmark or historical status in the city. The building was put up in the late 1980s to replace a 1940s-era building on the same spot. It served as a home for 1590 KLIV, an AM station that ran for more than seven decades in Silicon Valley beginning in the mid-1940s, and becoming a Top 40 music station in the early 1960s.

Empire Broadcasting, headed up by San Jose community stalwart Bob Kieve, purchased the property in 1967. After cycling through other music formats, the station eventually became a local news outlet from 1991 to 2016. It later transitioned to classic country music, before being shut down entirely in 2019 when Kieve sold the building.

Kieve, a huge supporter of San Jose and a proponent of civic engagement and the arts who previously served on the speech writing team for President Dwight Eisenhower, died in 2020 at the age of 98.

The building also housed KRTY, an iconic country music station that operated out of a different building, after relocating in 2019. KRTY now streams online only, and its spectrum, 95.3 FM, was sold to Educational Media Foundation, a nonprofit Christian media organization, according to Nate Deaton, general manager of KRTY.

Deaton told San José Spotlight the building at 750 Story Road has seen a lot of Silicon Valley history, as KLIV News Radio reported on its growth. The building has also seen a lot of music history.

"There are a lot of great memories in that building, that's for sure. From a KRTY and country music standpoint, so many of the big artists of the day played in that conference room," Deaton said.

Deaton worked in the building for 25 years and said country artists often put on small shows for station staff when they were in the area touring.

"You go back to Brad Paisley, Dixie Chicks, to Lady Antebellum, you name it. Anybody who's anybody in the last 25 years, played that conference room," he said.

Guerena said demolition of the building could begin this fall, though an exact timeline isn't clear yet. Construction of the warehouse could take about a year once started, he said.

their input on the best route for the superhighway, 30% of whom don't currently ride a bicycle or only ride for recreation. Resident feedback was gathered through social media, surveys and VTA pop-ups at events like Viva Calle for almost two years.

VTA planners ultimately landed on the route dubbed The Shortliner, which goes from Penitencia Creek County Park past the Berryessa BART Station on Mabury Road, continuing on Taylor Street. The route turns north on Fourth Street and west on Hedding Street, finally turning on The Alameda and continuing north on El Camino Real. The Shortliner ends at Lawrence Expressway, about a mile and a half south of the Lawrence Caltrain station in Santa Clara.

Construction of this unprecedented bicycle highway system-including the landscaping and materials to raise the path above street-level—is estimated to cost \$213 million. The project design is about 10% complete. Funding is expected to come from multiple sources but has yet to be determined.

Santa Clara aims to double biking infrastructure in new plan

Pearse acknowledged the cost is intimidating for a bike path. But it's a much longer and more welcoming bike path than has ever been built in Santa Clara County before, he added.

"It is a lot of money, but it's a very highquality, long distance bike facility," Pearse said. "It's transformational, it's regional ...

It's also on par, cost-wise, with some of our other large projects. So we don't feel like that cost is super extreme."

He said the cost is comparable to a roadway interchange project or a new light rail corridor.

Aside from cost, at least one member of the bicycle committee was concerned that commuter cyclists would be sharing the path with recreational cyclists, which could deter commuters from using the bikeway at all.

"I think that's going to encourage a lot more of the (experienced) bicyclists to ride on the street, and not in the bikeway," said committee member Herman Wadler.

The idea of a superhighway stems from VTA's Santa Clara Countywide Bike Plan released in 2018. Santa Clara County already has 800 miles of bikeways, including dedicated bike lanes on roads such as San Fernando Street in downtown San Jose. In addition to bike lanes, there are 200 miles of dedicated bike trails, but many are not connected through a continuous, uninterrupted path.

Sandhya Laddha, policy director for the Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition, said the group supports construction of The Shortliner route for the region's first bike superhighway.

"We look forward to the Central Bikeway project to lay a great example of what a bicycle superhighway could look like, changing the experience of bicycling on our arterials," Laddha told San José Spotlight. "Hence inviting more people to expe-



Cortese proposed bill would create civil penalties for social media platforms that circulate child sex

A bill by State Senator Dave Cortese that creates civil penalties for social media platforms that circulate child sex abuse material passed the Senate Judiciary Committee last week.

Under SB 646, social media companies would have two days to remove child sex abuse material — commonly known as child pornography — after it is reported by the victim or their legal guardian. Failure to remove the material after two days would make the social media platform liable for up to \$200,000 in civil damages.

"It's time to stop waiting around for social media companies to put an end to digitized child sex abuse. Victims are further traumatized every minute that exploitative photos and videos are viewed online," said Cortese. "Under SB 646, social media companies would finally be forced to remove child sex abuse material from their platforms. This bill is critical to protecting young people and holding social media platforms accountable."

Despite advances in technology, online child sexual exploitation is on the rise. In 2021, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children's CyberTipline received over 29 million reports of child sexual

Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority honored for innovation in BART to Silicon Valley Phase II Project

VTA Selected as "Owner of the Year" by Engineering News-Record

he Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) has been named the California 2023 "Owner of the Year" by Engineering News Record (ENR) for its innovative work on the BART to Silicon Valley Phase II project and its Transit Capital Program.

"Recognizing numerous agency accomplishments, most notable to VTA's selection exploitation — a jump of 35 percent from the previous year. Nearly all those reports related to suspected child sexual abuse materials. A recent survey showed that 85 percent of respondents wanted policymakers to do more to stop this trend.

Victims of child sex abuse have a greater likelihood of suffering from self-harm, depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress, eating disorders and substance abuse. Victims have also reported insomnia and panic attacks, which can create challenges with concentrating in school or sustaining employment.

In 2006, Congress passed Masha's Law, which allowed child victims to recover civil damages against anyone who produces, possesses, or distributes any visual depictions of child sex abuse. Then in 2017, Congress passed the Fight Online Sex Trafficking Act (FOSTA), which closed a legal loophole that shielded social media platforms from liability for distribution of child sex abuse materials on their platforms. San Jose celebrates opening of quick-build community which will house homeless residents working to beautify the city

Publisher an José Mayor Matt Mahan, was joined by former Mayor Sam Liccardo, and community partners at LifeMoves, Goodwill of Silicon Valley, Sand Hill Foundation Co-founders Peter and Susanna Pau, and members of the Lived Experience Advisory Board (LEAB) to celebrate the opening of the City's newest emergency interim housing (EIH) site, or quick-build community April 19.

The Guadalupe Interim Housing Community, located near San José Police Department Headquarters on Guadalupe Parkway, will provide 96 private rooms for those experiencing unsheltered homelessness and bring the city closer towards Mayor Mahan's goal of ending the era of encampments. Half of the units will be dedicated for members of San José Bridge, a program for homeless San José residents that provides them with employment; job training, the development of long-term career goals and job placement; and assists in finding housing and placement in San José.

"No one should live in encampments," said San José Mayor Matt Mahan. "Sites like Guadalupe, which cost a fraction of traditional housing, offer a safe and dignified alternative to the streets. I'm especially excited that we are reserving half of these units for residents enrolled in our work program that employs homeless neighbors in jobs cleaning up our city. Offering people work and stable shelter is the path we need to take to end unsheltered homelessness."

San Jose Bridge has employed 137 unhoused residents since March 2022 and 46 participants have secured permanent jobs at various companies and organizations, including Tesla, Goodwill, the Santa Clara County Reentry Resource Center, and the San José Airport. San Jose Bridge participants have removed 351,450 pounds of trash from city streets and trails.

Including Guadalupe and the new Monterey/Branham quick build community, which broke ground in April, San José now has 697 units operating or under construction, with another 300 in the pipeline. San José is also set to receive 200 small homes from Governor Gavin Newsom, which will get San Jose 20% of the way to Mayor Mahan's goal to create new capacity to move 1,000 unhoused residents out of unmanaged encampments by the end of this calendar year. San Jose's quick-build community model

has led to a halt in the increase of unsheltered homeless residents for the first time since 2015. Based on the 2022 countywide point-in-time census (PIT), 75% of homeless residents are unsheltered in San José compared to 84% in 2019.

The Guadalupe site is a \$16.95 million undertaking, with funding for construction through federal American Rescue Plan funds, City of San José Housing Department funds, and Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) funds from the state. The City also received generous donations from community partners, including \$1 million from Destination: Home, \$500k from All Home, and \$25k from Housing Trust of Silicon Valley. Peter and Susanna Pau donated the living units through their Sand Hill Foundation saving the city millions in development costs. SHP Foundation previously contributed to the construction of the city's first quick build apartment community at Evans Lane and the Pau's continued support for this housing model is generating ongoing interest in philanthropic support.

"Homelessness is a crisis. The City of San Jose, Mayor Matt Mahan, and former Mayor Sam Liccardo act and not just talk," said Peter and Susanna Pau, Co-founders of Sand Hill Property Foundation. "This project is not the whole answer, but it is an effective solution. We hope more will follow. Our Christian Foundation is helping because this is God's work"

The Guadalupe quick-build community is being developed by Bay Area-based firm DevCon Construction, Inc. and will include onsite laundry, community kitchen, dog runs, computer rooms, community programming space, and case management offices. The site operator, LifeMoves, will provide wraparound services to connect residents with a case manager and transition them to permanent housing. Each prefab unit also comes with a bed, heating and air conditioning, as well as a personal bathroom complete with a shower.

"The need, in our community, to bring our unhoused neighbors indoors has never been higher," said LifeMoves CEO Aubrey Merriman. "LifeMoves believes it takes us all coming together to build a thriving community. Close teamwork, partnership, collaboration, a sense of urgency, and a unified vision have brought us together to celebrate this ribboncutting milestone. Opening San Jose's Guadalupe Interim Housing site will provide a supportive transitional step toward stable housing for people, along with the resources and customized, intensive services to help chart their course to permanent housing."

The Guadalupe quick-build site will be the home of numerous residents who were originally living in the Guadalupe Gardens encampment - the city's largest before being decommissioned in 2022. Several residents that moved from the encampment into hotels and motels will be able to move into the Guadalupe quick-build community. Going forward, outreach teams will prioritize SJ Bridge participants and unhoused residents living in the nearby neighborhood to live at the site.

"When we began discussing this site back in 2020, we knew there was a real opportunity to both expand our community's shelter capacity and create a new model for how lived experience can influence the design and operations," said Jennifer Loving, CEO of Destination: Home. "We are so glad to see this vision come to fruition and are proud to be a partner of a project that has been meaningfully shaped by leaders who've experienced homelessness.'

Mayor Mahan continues to push the City to narrow its focus and make meaningful progress in these areas using practical, cost-

"From the conception of the project and throughout the development process, we were given decision-making power and were able to offer our lived experience of homelessness to help set this site up for success."



Fake job postings frustrating propositions

lthough April Fools' Dav is over, this is no joke. If we didn't have enough to wade through, now we have to consider fake job postings.



According to The Wall Street Journal, a survey of more than 1,000 hiring managers conducted by Clarify Capital found that 27 percent reported having job postings up for more than four months. Of those, almost half were left up

to give the impression that the company was doing well.

Other employers left job postings up for different reasons. They may want to give the impression to overworked employees that help is on the way. Or, they may be hedging their bets that they will need employees in the future.

If this sounds frustrating for a job seeker, it is. Job seeking is a grueling process that takes a considerable amount of time and energy. It requires job seekers to sneak out of work for a series of interviews. If the job seeker were to be caught in this process, it could put their current job at risk.

Some companies will delay hiring as they search for the perfect candidate. After some time, they decide not to fill the role at all. Other companies delay hiring to save money. In some situations, the hiring process can take so long that the hiring manager may change. And, the new hiring manager may want to reevaluate the role

Companies often look at job candidates like a product. Imagine going shopping at a store like Target, You can look at every item, and in the end, if you don't want to buy anything, no one will care. But, with a job seeker, this isn't a fair experience. Job seekers are people, not products. These decisions have a real impact on their lives

I once interviewed for a role at a large financial services company. The company put me through roughly 12 rounds of interviews over a five month period, including in person interviews in another state. Near the end of the process, they assured me that I would get an offer. I stopped looking for other jobs, and started packing my things to move. A few weeks went by and the hiring manger called. The role had been on hold since the beginning. He continued to interview me in hopes that he would eventually gain approval. He did not.

If you're a job seeker, remember that your job search is a numbers game. If you aren't hearing back from a company or if they're going slowly, hedge your bets. Apply for more roles. Keep things moving, so that you will find an employer who is truly hiring. Look for job postings that haven't been up for months, and that contain specific details about the role. Eventually, you'll find a real opportunity that's a great fit.

Rains, winds of April yielded proper hydration

he rains and winds of April have yielded prop-

er hydration for the environs which grace the valleys of Santa Clara County. Not the least of which are Evergreen Valley and Santa Clara Valley.

These torrential rains and winds were almost immediately followed by sunshine and substantial heat.

With the proliferation of wildflowers and grasses, there is much to admire in these valleys of our county. One new practice I and my family have

adopted is letting our turf lawn in our front yard grow wild, Essentially transforming a manicured turf lawn into a meadow adorned by wildflowers and wild grasses.

The turf grass blends we use as well as the sod rolls yield a variety of grasses of various lengths and thicknesses. Among the grasses are volunteers or weeds which flower profusely and bring us an array of colors which rival those seen along the boulevards and streets. Many of these wildflowers and wild grasses attract both migratory and native birds and insects.

Just yesterday, I watched a troupe of warblers forage for seeds among the tufts of the dandelions growing wild in our front yard. Along with these small birds come others with a similar intent, foraging for food and nesting materials. Sparrows and a plethora of other birds of various sizes appeared and took full advantage of the flowering weeds which had emerged in the front yard.

While driving to and from work, I see

through the chain linked fences, wildflowers and grasses of various types with an abundance of wild birds and insects congregating and flurrying about. In earlier column entries, I have made mention of beneficial weeds which draw beneficial insects with their blooms. There have been many occasions while working in the garden centers and nurseries in my past to have witnessed the waves of birds and insects arriving and searching.

With the drought now seemingly under

control, we can return to irrigating our turf lawns at night within the parameters set by our water agencies and water districts. Checking the forecast and irrigating accordingly is still highly recommended. With late spring upon us now, running our sprinklers at 9:00 p.m. for 15 minutes two nights per week is plenty of irrigation for our turf lawns.

We can now relax and let our turf lawns grow long and let the flowering weeds emerge and thrive as well. We

will see birds and insects which we would normally not. Abstaining from the use of herbicides and insecticides in conjunction with this is also highly recommended. In a future entry, I will mention some native insectary flowers.

Along with letting our turf lawn grow long and letting wild flowering weeds emerge and thrive, there will be a substantial reduction in our water bills. Watering at night and letting the lawns grow wild will be well worth the effort as we see wave after wave of birds and insects. The culmination of our lawns as meadows will bring us into a new frontier ... The Meadowverse®. Carpe Verde ... Seize The Green!

about the bridge since I assumed my role a little over three months ago. I am committed to ensuring a safe crossing for the residents of this neighborhood and working to explore all the options. Unfortunately, for safety reasons the bridge is closed for public use. One of the first things I did was reach out to City Staff and I am working to identify funding and feasibility options for an updated bridge that meets today's seismic safety standards as soon as possible, while also looking at temporary options to safely access and cross Yerba Buena Avenue."

Many site studies have been done regarding installing a possible future replacement bridge in years past however, it is unclear if such a new bridge would be approved by the City of San Jose.

The following statement was emailed by San Jose Parks and Recreation and Neighborhood Services Trail Manager-Capital improvement

Evergreen

representative, Liz Sewell, "Unfortunately, this bridge will not be reopened. We have had a tough year full of natural disasters. The bridge is an older feature that was inherited by the City, and the structural damage incurred by the recent earthquakes was exacerbated by recent storms. There is a major canyon that formed in the creek channel which is eroding the bridge abutments that support the foundation of the structure. The Department of Public Works has conducted a few studies to explore the bridge and assess its structural condition and has found that the bridge's structural integrity has been compromised to the point of no repair. For the time being we recommend routing them to Evergreen Park where the pedestrian bridge can provide safe access across the creek."

There are other statements in studies that discuss the need for a pedestrian bridge replacement over the creek which would connect the residential neighborhood to the Evergreen Valley Community College as part of the Yerba Buena Trail System. Such future decisions will be in the hands of the city.

Continued from page 1 The organization has also constructed six computer labs in Tanzania, three in California. one in Cambodia, one in India, and one in Kenya.

One of CTD's recent ventures Nova Ukraine. During the school year, most classes in Ukraine were remote as children found

themselves in red and orange zones, prone to strikes.

With millions of people forced to leave their homes, and thousands of schools affected by bombings and shelling, the Ukrainian Ministry of Education and Science predicted that more than 3.7 million students will be forced to learn remotely.

To help ameliorate this situation, ClosingTheDivide CIO/CTO Gaurish Agrawal coacted with Oleg Kritsun and Alexei Kononenko, representatives from Nova Ukraine, to facilitate the donation of 40 Chromebooks. Working in conjunction with the World Computer Exchange, Ukrainian First-Responders, and the Deputy of the Department of Education in the Chernihiv region, these computers were brought to Ukraine and successfully distributed to lyceums in the Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, and Khmelnytsky regions of the country. The donation was a significant step towards providing educational opportunities to children, especially those orphaned or displaced, and those learning remotely due to the ongoing conflict. Agrawal's efforts demonstrate the dedication and commitment ClosingTheDivide holds in improving access to technology and education in underprivileged communities. In addition to their work in Ukraine, Clos-




included a partnership with In Ukraine, students and their families line up at a shelter to receive the first round of care packages; each equipped with a Chromebook from ClosingTheDivide.

> ingTheDivide has also launched a digital course pathway to promote basic computer literacy, amongst other initiatives. One of their most exciting endeavors is taking place in Morocco, where they are developing multilingual digital literacv courses to educate local households on the basics of computing.

> The impact of ClosingTheDivide isn't limited to Morocco. Branches across the world, such as those in Georgia, California, Egypt and beyond, are also deeply invested in a wide range of projects. From hosting virtual hardware repair lessons at orphanages in India to working with local businesses to collect spare parts, creating school clubs to recruit members, and even holding local fundraisers, the team is dedicated to making a real difference.

> "CTD was created to change lives in our community, but I never imagined that my work would extend to giving children in war-torn areas, and across the world, a brighter future. Knowing that our efforts have touched the lives of those facing unimaginable challenges is gratifying and propels us to continue to work even harder," says Gaurish.

Messages made on a keyboard electronically move through the internet from one tower to another to land quietly in the hands of those who clicked on their mouse. One may not know their neighbors who live just next-door, but the NEXTDOOR electronic neighbor within this application allows all to freely speak to anyone in the community on topics that fly all over the place due to ease of keying into dialogue and messaging platforms.

The call out to ask for help to urgently get a room and come out of the cold was met by a kind person on NEXTDOOR. Then something else happened. Others began to communicate by messaging each other and the giving was magnified!

Someone decided to deliver two bags of freshly purchased groceries, not only for the person, but also her pet. She believes pets are an important part of the family and a source of unconditional love and support, so addressing the needs of a pet companion is equally important when helping a person in need.

When asked for a message to be delivered, while this Good Samaritan lady was giving two big bags, she said, "I am not wealthy but I have a heart that feels for others! Although everyone can't always help with everything, someone can always help with something! It's the little act of kindness that makes the difference and brings brightness in the life of others. All living beings have the same light in them and there is inner oneness behind all the outward diversity. This Good Samaritan further said, "Please tell her she is loved! She is very important."


