

Eicher said, "We had been looking for someone to fill a design position, and he took some interest in it. And through some training, he's done a phenomenal job."

T HE FRANKLIN County Chamber of Commerce is gearing up for this year's annual junior leadership program. The adult program is in its 26th year, and the youth program is in its 21st year. The program expanded from what was once an adult program into a program where adult business professionals are assigned a youth program member to mentor.

Kayla Doney, the Franklin County Chamber of Commerce executive director and Leadership Franklin County program administrator, reported that the Franklin County Junior Leadership Program recruits and prepares existing and emerging leaders for responsible public decision-making and volunteer service. It motivates and directs them toward achieving their desired community goals. Through this program, the youth within the Franklin County community are exposed to different parts of the county that they may only see if they were somehow involved in county leadership.

Doney said the program accepts rising high school juniors. Students who want to participate in the program must pick up an application from the chamber office or their school, fill it out, and turn it in by August 11. The program's leadership team will select students based on their applications.

Doney said she is optimistic that students are learning and enjoying their experiences during the program and are learning tangible skills that will help them in the future.

"We hope the students are inspired by all that Franklin County offers from education, agriculture, history, economic development,



and health care. We want the students to be inspired to stay local and continue living, working, and playing in Franklin County."

During the program, the youth experience five months of hands-on discovery, exploration, and experience.

From September until February, they learn everything from county history to leadership skills, education, healthcare, agriculture, county government, and much more. They take trips to hospitals, farms, utility facilities, courthouses, and the state capitol.

The Franklin County Junior Leadership Program challenges the students and helps them explore their untapped potential through creative and hands-on activities.

Doney said, "We strive to teach them leadership traits and skills and how to make smart decisions and to always have integrity and a strong work ethic."

Program leaders can watch the teens blossom into firm and confident leaders.

Doney explained that many students use what they've learned during their time with the program to transform into leaders that positively impact their generation through well-informed decisions.

She said, "We can tell a big difference in their confidence and how they kind of step out of their box. By the end of the program, they're ready to speak up and ask questions. And they're more knowledgeable about how the county operates."

Doney also said it's common for the youth to return and participate in the adult program 6-8 years after graduation. The program isn't just for enrichment but a place where camaraderie is present.

"A lot of the students we do keep in contact with send us graduation invitations the next year when they're seniors in high school. And we also give them reference letters to enter college and gain scholarships."

The Franklin County Junior Leadership Program is currently accepting applications for rising high school juniors and adult business professionals. Applications are due by August 11, 2023, and the program proceeds in September. **GN**





From CLASSROOM to DIRECTOR'S CHAIR

Examining Dr. Cary Holman's unwavering commitment to improving the education system.

D R. CARY Holman, director of Franklin County Schools, embodies excellence from his visionary outlook to his relentless pursuit of education and deep love for his community. Born and raised in Franklin County, he was raised entirely within the county's school system. After graduating from Franklin County High School in 1989, he ventured out for his higher education, later returning to his hometown as a teacher at his old elementary school in Decherd.

The central office soon hired Holman to work with at-risk North Middle School and South Middle School students. After serving there for a year, he realized his true calling was in the classroom.

He served as assistant principal at North Junior High School for two years, but it was only a short time before he earned the distinguished principal position at Clark Memorial Elementary School.

Throughout his academic journey, Holman had a strong support system in the form of his family, especially his loving mother. "My mom was tapped into our well-being. She wanted to make sure that we did well in school," he recalls.

"We didn't have a lot growing up, but she was very persistent in creating a loving family. So the backdrop of my experience continues to motivate me to strengthen my own educational pursuits."

A tenacious educational leader, Holman began his higher education journey at Motlow State Community College, where he earned his associate degree. He then obtained his bachelor's degree at the University of Tennessee Chattanooga and his master's degree at Tennessee State University.

He later attended Middle Tennessee State University, receiving his educational specialist degree. In 2020, he earned his doctorate from the prestigious American College of Education.

Holman's extensive experience in the field includes teaching first, fifth, and sixth grades and serving in various director and administrative roles.

"I have always been an educational diehard. I love everything about education and believe it is truly the foundation of everything that exists. It is the most noble profession there is," he remarked.

Holman is also a servant leader who works in ministry and believes wholeheartedly, "If you're going to do something, do it to the best of your ability and with compassion. Do it with the desire that you are impacting not just yourself but others as well."

When Holman was an administrator in Rutherford County, he had a powerful vision to connect the school and the community. He brought that vision to life with Project Feed, leading a canned food drive and providing a hot meal for everyone every Tuesday before Thanksgiving.

For 15 years, the team served at least 1,000 meals annually. Though the event received a lot of positive news coverage, their real reward was honoring the community. Many of the children continued the program in high school, sparking and expanding a beautiful tradition.

When the opportunity to serve as director of Franklin County Schools presented itself, Holman immediately decided to pursue it. "Franklin County Schools worked for me, so why not go and work and lead the Franklin County School District? So hence, me being named director of schools there," he said.

Holman did his doctoral dissertation on a school counselor's perspective on how student behavior affects school culture and climate, a premise he would later use to start organizations and shift school cultures, leaving a lasting legacy on students, educators, and staff all over Tennessee.

With a heart full of passion for the growth and development of students, Holman has graced state and national conferences, weaving tales of their experiences and breakthroughs surrounding student relationships, school culture, and educational leadership.

Armed with effective research-based strategies and insights, Holman is a beacon of light, guiding leaders toward creating impactful environments that inspire students to thrive.

"What I have found in my years of service is that there's a significant amount of power that a person is able to establish when he or she takes the time to build relationships and connect with children," he said.

Holman humbly credits his fourth grade teacher, Mrs. Charlene Simmons, as a beacon of hope in his life. He said his teachers contributed immensely to his growth and development, each bringing their unique flavor to the table. Holman also noted that his leadership style is a culmination of valuable lessons learned from working with excellent principals in the past.

As the leader of Franklin County Schools, Holman is determined to help the Franklin County community reach new heights in their educational journey. Although he recognizes that challenges are on the horizon, he views them as opportunities to grow and improve.

One of his primary leadership principles is to turn problems into opportunities while building transparent connections within the community. Holman aims to empower, encourage, and enhance all stakeholders, including teachers and students, to achieve statewide and nationwide recognition for Franklin County Schools.

"Having that desire, that vision, that role — then as a leader, I've got to make sure that we have the resources and the connections that it will take to continue to accelerate our school district." GN

and Math (STREAM). In 2018, Nissan donated monies providing the foundation with the means to purchase a van. Thanks to generous donations from other businesses and individuals in the community, the foundation was able to give the van an exciting exterior and make it an exceptional learning tool by stocking it with resources to support the students' learning endeavors. Some examples include Ozobots, Spheros, coding mice and Botley bots, electrical snap circuit boards, straw rockets and launchers, balloon car kits, and do-it-yourself microscopes. Also available are classroom sets of virtual goggles, which one fifth-grade teacher used to wrap up a space unit with a virtual trip to the sun. Students were able to see the asteroid belt, stars, planets, and constellations in 3D. The van services eight elementary schools in the school system, where teachers can access the collection of STREAM tools and training on how to use them.

The foundation recently awarded innovative teachers \$15,000 in grants to support their classroom students — from "Student White Boards" to "Building Uku-



HAT BEGAN as a small gathering of people, at the request of director of schools Amie Lonas,

in late 2016, soon expanded to a large group of business people, professionals, and community leaders to establish an educational foundation that would support the Franklin County School System with big and bold educational enrichment opportunities, not funded by state and local revenues, for *all* students in the Franklin County School System. In 2017, after much discussion and planning, the Franklin

County Foundation for Excellence was established. Retired Chancellor Jeff Stewart and Alex Barnett are two of those people.

The foundation provides educational funding opportunities and resources to Franklin County public schools through grants and donations. This nonprofit organization has been granted tax-exempt status under section 501(c)(3). The foundation's all-volunteer board of directors is committed to fundraising initiatives that promote the learning of all students from pre-K to 12th grade in the Franklin County School System.

To successfully expand upon basic learning principles, the organization integrated "art and reading" into the core principles of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM), calling it Science, Technology, Reading, Engineering,











The foundation further invested in music endeavors through a \$5000 grant and purchased wireless microphones for student performances. In April, the foundation gave \$15,000 to purchase band instruments for middle and high school students to help combat the nationwide epidemic of limited school system funding.

Through the Educational Foundation for Excellence, Stewart, Barnett, and the other foundation board of directors, are carving out a new path in educational funding for generations to come, aligning with their aspiring motto of "Today's learners... tomorrow's leaders."

Stewart, president of the foundation, has a passion for education. He was born and raised here in Franklin County with a strong family background in education. Stewart is passionate about providing the highest quality of education to the children in the community.

Stewart said, "I think, speaking for our entire board of directors, we all have a passion for education and a desire to see all students of Franklin County receive the best educational enrichments we can provide."

Alex Barnett, vice president of the foundation and an esteemed businessman and partner at Russell Barnett Automotive Family, joined Stewart, helping to create and fund a foundation that soon became an opportunity for all community members to become involved, positively impacting numerous children within the community.

Barnett shares a similar passion for the organization's cause.

"Our family is a big supporter of all things community. And we have a passion for education. And we want to equip our young people with all the information, all the tools they can have to be well-rounded,

and all the things they need to become good students and, in turn, good employees, citizens, and family members."





Kaleob used roadblocks as building blocks to live the life of his dreams.




K ALEOB ASHLEY learned about the power of faith and perseverance at an early age. The 23-year-old Airbnb owner, coach, real estate investor, minister, and Huntland alum earned his undergraduate degree at Tennessee Tech in Cookeville, where he graduated in three years with two bachelor's degrees: a business management degree with a minor in agriculture and another bachelor's degree in finance with a minor in social sciences.

Kaleob learned the importance of perseverance by observing how his father, Jerry Ashley, effectively coped with the adverse emotional, physical, and financial consequences of Kaleob's mother's debilitating drug addiction. He admired his father's ability to navigate life during such a difficult time in his and his children's lives.

"I remember as a kid seeing my dad work so many long workdays, so many long hours, a physically taxing job here at the sawmill and working on people's vehicles and cutting timber and things like that just to try and make ends meet," said Kaleob.

Kaleob did not have a strong relationship with his mother as a child, but when he was in high school, she joined a rehabilitation program, and during the last nine years of her life, they worked to rekindle their relationship.

After battling a few relapses in between recovery, his mother passed away in January 2023. The strength and perseverance he saw in both parents would later help him navigate hardships as a young adult.

Amidst an already challenging season, Kaleob and his wife Megan received the news that Megan was diagnosed with cancer, but out of the storm always comes a rainbow. The couple expects a new addition to the family, Canaan Dale, in August.

The name "Canaan" came from the manifestation of God's promise to His chosen people, which was "The Promised Land," or "The Land of Canaan." "Dale" is the middle name shared between Kaleob and his father.

With every happening in his life, Kaleob takes daily strides to remain encouraged and encourage others along the way.

"I apply those early examples of strength and perseverance now. Just take one day at a time. Then, take the next step, and then worry about the next step when it comes."

Kaleob's faith in God is a cornerstone of his identity, and he feels grateful for the deep-rooted Christian faith shared by his family. Kaleob said his father always pushed him to become his best academically and in sports activities, but one of the biggest lessons he instilled was the importance of keeping his faith in God.


When he isn't working or spending time with his family, he is preaching and spreading love to people no matter who they are or where they are from. His unwavering faith has driven him to devote much of his life to spreading the message of Jesus Christ.

"If there's anything that anybody takes from me and my life, it's that the kingdom of heaven is the most important thing. And there was a perfect creator, Jesus Christ, willing to lay down His life in our place," he said.

Kaleob works full-time at his father's sawmill company, Davie Ashley Sawmill LLC, and owns seven properties, 6 of which are investment properties, and 5 are vacation rentals.

At Davie Ashley Sawmill, Kaleob finds ways to solve problems by welding or fabricating for trucks, trailers, equipment, and production lines and fulfilling electrical maintenance needs.

Kaleob's grandfather started the business in 1972, and the family celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2022. The company has

Explore the musical roots and evolution of self-taught musician Zachary Brooks, from drumming pots to winning hearts.

G OD GAVE him the gift of music. Zachary Brooks spent his high school years performing music he created, using live instruments like the piano, drums, and sounds that captivated his audience.

Inspired by greats like Michael Jackson, Fred Hammond, and the Christian contemporary group Mercy, which his father was a part of, Zachary has built his career creating soul-stirring jazz, gospel, and neo-soul beats. He is a self-taught musician, and his passion for music was evident even before he was born, a sign that he was destined to be a musician.

When the Winchester native was 5 years old, his family could hear him vividly clanging pots and pans together, making sweet music.

The drums are Zachary's "thing." You might find his drum covers to songs by artists like Red Hot Chili Peppers, Busta Rhymes, and Tupac.

The self-taught musician recently took a liking to the piano, playing the organ in church during worship services.

Zachary said he and his sister and musician, Ashley Brooks, got their start in their youth vocal group known as Faith. They later branched out to become autonomous musicians.

Today, you can find Zachary producing eclectic sounds for

Ashley or working in his home studio, where he records his own beats. You can also find his music on streaming platforms like Soundcloud, Apple Music, YouTube, and Spotify.

Zachary credits a few people, aside from his parents, for molding him into the creative musician he is today: pianist Kenny Dedrick and drummer Charles Russell, both former members of Mercy.

Zachary recalled the first time he ever entered the big stage. A festival in Nashville left him encouraged and motivated to take on a life of music production at just 17 years old.

"My cousin, Tom, who I just recently met — I found out he was a rapper, and he showed me a few things. We ended up just

playing around, and then eventually, he told me about a show he was doing out there, and said it was like a festival or something, and he took a liking to my sound," the musician said.

"So that was probably my first big stage experience — being in that limelight in Nashville."

Zachary shared the stage alongside talented former American Idol performers like Skylar Dixon, the sister of Christian contemporary artist Colton Dixon, and Jeremy Rosado. He played alongside Sam Magill in Tennessee and venues around Huntsville, Alabama.

Creatives typically feel the most creative when lying in bed, and their brain has settled down for the day. Zachary is no different. The long-time musician said he feels the most creative when he's alone in his studio with his drums.

For Zachary, music is not just a hobby but a way of life. He said he feels the most at peace pouring his emotions into church worship sessions.

Despite facing challenges as a neo-soul musician, the producer and musician did not let that deter him from living out his childhood dreams and blessing others in the process.

"Sometimes, you can feel like at times it might not be received as well in some areas. And that's okay because, especially for the music that we do, this is different. So sometimes, people might not catch on to it right away, but eventually, [they] end up liking it. But, being black in Franklin County, as an artist, you don't really see a whole lot of us doing it on a major scale," said Zachary.

If you ask Zachary what advice he would give to young, blooming artists with more eccentric music tastes, he'll tell you to "keep going."

"Never stop practicing. Never stop learning. Always learn about your area, too. Just perfect your craft, even if people are not listening, or even if you [have] one person who is moved by it, keep going."

The Franklin County native said he loves his family and community, who helped shape him into the musician and man he is today.

Self-made musician Zachary Brooks is an undeniable force in the community, a hometown hero who has stayed true to his roots even as he has risen to new heights. His music speaks to the soul and tells a story that only he can tell — a true testament to the power of God-given talent. **GN**

THE NEXT GENERATION JOINS THE BUSINESS

The Thompson family legacy continues.

T HOMPSON APPALACHIAN Hardwoods began in 1993 with "a vision and a prayer" that would stretch beyond three decades. The reputable family business began with Nordeck Thompson's decision to branch out on his own, fortifying the foundation laid by his father's sawmill in South Georgia. Following his uncle's advice, Thompson researched and found a small green sawmill in Huntland, Tennessee, with the natural resources ready for harvesting. He, his wife, Mary Claire, and their six children uprooted themselves and settled in Huntland, running the mill with about 14 employees on one shift.

They expanded their business to become a fully integrated and self-sufficient supply chain as time progressed. Investing in improvements and taking strides to expand their business has become a cornerstone of their work ethic. Today, they employ over

100 individuals and support numerous contractors, being good stewards of the area and fulfilling their initial vision and prayer.

Now, the next generation has taken on the business and is moving toward expanding it even further. Nordeck and Mary Claire Thompson's children and spouses serve on the executive team. Claire T. Getty is the chief financial officer, Drew Getty is the vice president of procurement, Mary Lee McConnell is the chief administrative officer, Rob McConnell is the vice president of operations, and Nick Thompson is the president and chief operations officer.

"We wake up every day with the mindset that God has a plan," said Mary Lee.

Every day the family leads with the knowledge that God has a bigger plan than they could ever fathom. She referenced a plaque on her father's old desk, now her own, that reads the bible verse, "In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your path." (Proverbs 3:6)

Mary Lee described her siblings' journey to becoming the executive team as "organic growth." Each child had the space to explore their own talents and attend school before returning to contribute to the family legacy at Thompson Appalachian Hardwoods.

"We were able to come back in our own time," said Mary Lee.

"We all came back into our roles and found our own space where we have our own strengths that really fit well with each other," she said.

Nick Thompson, who grew up in the sawmill, graduated with a degree in landscape architecture from the University of Georgia in Athens and was the first to return after graduation in 2011.

Their sister, Claire Getty, and brother-in-law, Drew Getty, transitioned to Huntland in 2012. Prior to both meeting and completing their master's degrees at Georgia Institute of Technology, Claire also received a professional degree in landscape architecture from the University of Georgia. At the same time, Drew graduated from Clemson University with a degree in natural resources management.

Mary Lee graduated from the University of Tennessee with a degree in service management and returned to Franklin County, engaged to her now-husband, Rob. Rob was Drew's roommate and graduated from Clemson University with a degree in print production and design.

Mary Lee jokingly remarked, "Rob proposed to me, and then shortly after, my dad proposed to him, so we came back about eight years ago ready to get to work."

The three siblings and their additional three siblings were raised in a family that emphasized the importance of teamwork and family unity.

"As we grew up, [our mother] was adamant that we work together as a team and that we are a unit. We are a family that loves each other," she said. The children grew up attending leadership camps and programs that exposed them to new ideas about leadership and team unity, and their faith was at the center of it all.

If you ask Mary Lee to describe her family's dynamic in one word, she'll tell you "rooted," representing their firm foundation and unwavering faith in God. Another is the word "overcomer." Even when faced with challenges, such as losing their home to a house fire in 2005, and a mill fire in 2019, the family persevered with Nordeck and Mary Claire's guidance, instilling in their children the resilience to overcome any obstacle.

"The word 'rooted' comes up frequently in our group — that we are rooted firmly, we have a firm foundation, but we are growing. We are firmly planted, but we are also going to bloom. We will not be stagnant."

For Mary Lee, watching her children stand in the log yard watching the large loaders pass by serves as a reminder that staying grounded and maintaining faith can lead to extraordinary outcomes. The culture of the company is founded on teamwork and creating lasting memories.

"We have a fun culture here. We enjoy what we do, but the people we work with really make it what it is." GN

Turn steak over and continue to cook until desired level of doneness. Bring remaining soup mixture to a boil and serve with steak.

ROASTED CORN ON THE COB

8 ears fresh corn in husks 1/3 c. Italian dressing 2 1/2 T. water 1T. chili powder 1/8 t. ground red pepper

Carefully peel back husks, exposing corn. Leave husks attached. Remove and discard silks. Combine Italian dressing, water, chili powder, and red pepper in a small mixing bowl. Stir well and brush over corn. Return husk to original position and tie the tips with wire twist-ties. Grill corn over medium hot coals for 30 minutes or until the corn is tender. Turn corn every 5 minutes.


6 eggs 2 c. sugar 2 qts. whipping cream 2 T. vanilla approx 1 qt. milk

Weariness from the realities of the weight of parenting, caring for others, paying bills in today's economy, and responsibilities at work and home distract and overwhelm us. Grief, anxiety, and depression can also block the light of hope.

We can't always trust what we see.

We have an enemy who loves to see our busyness confuse our thinking like the clouds of dementia. We are not his prisoners, confined to the locked doors and walls of this world. The devil hopes we forget our direct access to the true authority and the truths of His Word. We are beloved children of the one who fulfills His purposes for us and provides rest and strength for our next steps.




