



## Bedford County Fair turns silver: Celebrating 25 years of fun, food, and farming!

The fair looks at the past, present, and future.

T WAS absent for more than 65 years. There were no blue ribbons, midways, cotton candy, or prized livestock competitions. Multiple generations missed the experience of a local county fair until two men shared a vision of its return.

Carter Woodruff and the late Maurice Armstrong shared a way of life deeply rooted in agriculture. Each envisioned a return of the county fair, recognizing the importance of connecting the community with the farming work and lives it sustains.

Woodruff said, "The primary [goal] was building upon that agricultural heritage — the rich agrarian history of the past and present. Bedford County is a strong agricultural county; it's a predominant industry. And we talked about how young people, even in a county like ours, are seeming to lose grasp of our agricultural roots."

Bedford County's first fair was a three-day event held in October 1857. The following year a five-day fair was held, and if the results noted in "Who, When, and What - Bedford County Fairs Vol. 1" by Roy Sonny Ferguson are any indication, it was a great success. The Bedford County Agricultural and Mechanical Association handed out awards for everything from apples to worsted sunbonnets.

The last fair location was in the area known today as Fairground Heights, and the fair continued there until a fire destroyed the facilities in 1933. Agricultural education lost its greatest platform until the spark that began with Woodruff and Armstrong's conversation grew into a flame that ignited the return of the fair to Bedford County in 1998.





FCB Chief Executive Officer Scott Cocanougher agrees.



## A promise kept honors an enduring friendship.

T WAS just a red Jeep, but it was a vehicle for healing and processing grief for two Shelbyville families. It was a symbol of celebration of a well-lived life, and for Carson Brandon, it was a reminder that his friend, Duran Shavers, would not get to honor his promise of a ride in it. But Carson, who is on the autism spectrum, had an idea when he got the sad news that his friend had passed away.

Carson said, "I love you, Mr. Shavers. We never got to go ride in the Jeep, but maybe the other Mr. Shavers can take me!"

While Carson didn't understand much about death and grief, he understood friendship perfectly, thanks to Mr. Shavers.

Good friends tend to share common interests, but what would a senior adult and a child on the autism spectrum have in common? When Mr. Shavers substituted in Carson's first grade child development center class at Southside Elementary School one day, they connected instantly. Students designed special boxes to hold their Valentine's Day treats, and Carson's television box sparked conversation. Over the years to come, the two compared the size of their TVs and discussed their favorite shows.

## Mr. Shavers understood the importance of mentoring young boys. His son, "the other Mr. Shavers," said,

"He loved kids. He was a Boy Scout as a teenager and a Boy Scout leader for close to 50 years. We would take in other Scouters during Boy Scout camp, and sometimes they would have special needs, and it didn't bother him a bit."

As best friends do, Mr. Shavers stayed in contact with Carson, attended his birthday parties and special events, and saw him at school. The last time the two were together was at a Shining Stars pageant. Carson kept asking his mom if Mr. Shavers was coming, and she said when he walked through the door, Carson's face lit up like it was the brightest shining face ever. She thinks Mr. Shavers' face was the same way.

The lifetime Scout's dedication and positive influence on the boyhood lives of so many was evident at his funeral.

The other Mr. Shavers said, "There were Boy Scouts at the funeral I never knew existed, and I was in Boy Scouts all my years growing up. And when the associate pastor spoke, he mentioned heroes, and it just struck me that my dad was a hero."

Carson seconds that wholeheartedly and can show you Mr. Shavers' picture on his hero board, a bulletin board in his room with photos of his heroes. It was the first place he went when his mom told him his friend had passed away.

There was no hesitation when the Shavers family heard about the promise to Carson. Carson would get his ride.

It was a ride they'll never forget, filled with remembering and honoring all that was important in Mr. Shavers' life and the friends' shared moments.

"We rode around places where Dad would fish and hunt and some of the places that he and Carson talked about. Carson wanted to see the churches he had been to, and then I took him by where I grew up, over on Shadow Drive. I asked if he was hungry, so we went to Burger King. We had a good little ride," the other Mr. Shavers said.

Carson agreed. "Mama," he said, "I bet my best friend is smiling big, and I bet he's proud of me and his son, Bubba!"

## The Jeep continues to represent the special friendship.

Carson's mom, Heather Brandon, said, "I knew the Jeep was going to be sold after Carson took his ride in it, so I told Carson when he came home that he wouldn't get to ride in it anymore. He got so upset. But [the other Mr. Shavers and his family] gave Carson a diecast red Jeep just like Mr. Shavers' Jeep, and that Jeep sits under the table in the

living room. That's his and Mr. Shavers' Jeep, and he pretends they go riding in it every day."

Carson said, "I want to tell everyone that Mr. Shavers was the best friend to me. He loved watching TV, and he loved me, and I love and miss him! The other Mr. Shavers, Mr. Bubba, I know makes Mr. Shavers so proud up in heaven for taking me in the Jeep. It was the best day of my whole life. The only thing that would have made it better is if Mr. Shavers would have been with me and Mr. Bubba. I just miss him!"

Indeed Mr. Shavers was with them on their ride. **GN**

Gene Williams just wants to help.

In THE '50s, Gene Williams and his parents watched helplessly as flood waters rose in and around their Shelbyville Big Springs home. Williams remembers clearly the relief and feelings of hope that arrived with the National Guardsmen who took them to safety with each flood.

"That always stuck in my mind. They came to help us, and I wanted to help, too. Seeing the personal experience of the tragedy stayed with me," Williams said.

It was a desire that never left him.


His mother, Catherine, was a living picture of dedication and sacrifice. Although she only lived until Williams was 17, she instilled in him a strong work ethic and a heart for others. She taught him to put the needs of others before his and to believe he could accomplish more than he could imagine, reaching far beyond the stars.

His mother would be so proud to know that many recognize Williams as the face of hope and help today. As a volunteer with the Red Cross for nearly 20 years, Williams drops everything and responds when disaster strikes. There are no holidays, weekends, or days off. Tornadoes, house fires, flooding, and other devastating losses strike without warning, and the impact of such tragedies is breathtaking. Knowing where to start is beyond overwhelming. Hope begins when Williams and volunteers like him show up, so recovery can begin.

He said, "Through the years, I've run into many people that I remember. They say, 'You came and helped me through my tragedy.' It may have been 10 years ago, but they're still thankful and grateful."

Williams always felt he needed to help others, but when Hurricane Katrina hit, he felt it stronger than ever. He knew God was



pushing him and telling him he couldn't stay here without action. He had to go to New Orleans and help those affected by the massive hurricane.

Williams said, "So [when Katrina hit], I just showed up at the Red Cross shelter and told them I wanted to help. That was it. I began training and worked my way to where I am today."

Today, Williams is a volunteer responding to eight Tennessee counties out of his chapter at the drop of a hat. He works part time at the Winners Circle in Shelbyville and appreciates the flexibility the owners still extend him, allowing him to go whenever he's called.

Williams said many people associate the Red Cross with blood donations, but, he said, it's about so much more. It's even about more than offering financial aid and a helping hand in a time of great loss. It's giving hope and direction in a time of shock.

"We need more volunteers. I wish people could realize and understand it's about serving others. Give of yourself, volunteer, and don't look for rewards. I feel called to serve more than any other work I do. To serve voluntarily, you have to put yourself aside and just do it," he said.

Another tie to his service life is the sense of community engrained in him from his early childhood when he lived in the Shelbyville Mills community. His father, Robert, moved to Shelbyville with his brother and sister to work in the mill during its early days. A self-sufficient community grew around the mill, and families worked, worshiped, studied, and played to-

gether. This love of caring for and serving others in the community fosters Williams's volunteer projects in the Shelbyville community today.

He's the museum curator at the Fly Arts Center, delivers meals-on-wheels, is a Bedford County Historial Society board member, and organizes the Field of Heroes Memorial Day program at Willow Mount Cemetery. He is the 2010 Shelbyville-Bedford County Chamber of Commerce Deery Eakin Volunteer of the Year. He received the 2013 Governor's 3-Star Award and the President's Volunteer Service Award by AmeriCorps in recognition of his commitment to strengthening our nation and communities through volunteer service.

He is ready to help at a moment's notice, but the depth of the devastation he sometimes sees is challenging to carry. Thankfully, he has help that enables him to be a helper to others.

Williams said, "God just lifts me up. He takes me by the hand and lifts me up—like when we went to Readyville after the tornado. People there lost everything. You walk up to these people, and it's pretty hard to handle, but God gives me the strength and words to encourage them and help brighten their day. God gives me strength, and Snoopy encourages me to do more than I'm humanly capable of doing. God has blessed me over the years."

Serving God and serving others, Williams just wants to help and fulfill God's mission and plans for his life to serve humanity. For so many, he is the face of hope. **GN**

For years, Katie Hallum sold boutique clothing and accessories more for fun than financial security. When the pandemic hit and impacted her regular job, the single mom knew it was time to make it her full-time job.


She expanded from online to a booth at North Main Marketplace in Shelbyville. Naturally, her son, Henry, went with her to stock and style her booths but was bored hanging out while she worked.

Katie had an idea — a booth for Henry. It wasn't just a booth geared to kids his age with Henry's name on it, but a booth owned and managed by Henry.

She said, "If he had something to sell, he would have something to do with me. And it became very popular because I have a group that shops with me, and many of them are just like me with kids his age."

So with Henry's feedback, Katie ordered inventory for his booth.

"I try to get his input as much as I can on what he wants to order because I think he has a better opinion of what kids his age are going to like," said Katie. "He'll go in [to his booth] and set it up, and he'll do little videos that I'll post on Facebook of him showing everybody what it is."

Henry's Fun Shop carries books, toys, graphic tees, and holiday items, among other cool things for kids his age. What began as something for him to do while his mother worked turned into a lesson in owning and managing a business.

Katie said, "We talk a lot about the money side of it so that he can understand how business works. I tell him how much his product costs and how much he'll sell it for. I remind him he's going to put on the tags or ask if he's going to ship an order out today and remind him if I'm going to do it, he will have to pay me to do the work for him. So he's learned what an expense is and what retail versus wholesale is as much as he can understand it. He knows the more work he puts in, the more money he will get in his savings account. And the more work I do, the less he will get, so it's definitely been a good teaching moment, as far as being an entrepreneur and learning how a business works," she said.

With a mission to bring you cute, affordable clothes, no matter what stage of life you're in, Katie offers clothes from small to 3X.

"I've always tried to offer super affordable casual mom clothes. I try not to make anything over \$40; usually, nothing's over \$30. I ask myself before I buy anything if I'm willing to pay this much for something. If I'm not going to do it, I won't ask anybody else to do it. And I try really hard to save people shipping by offering to put purchases in their mailbox or letting them pick them up at North Main because when I start to check out somewhere, and the shipping is over \$10, I'm not doing it," she said.

The community's support has been priceless to Katie. Customers have become lifelong friends who feel good about spending their money with her and supporting local businesses. She's found that people are trying to spend less money at large online stores and are spending their money locally to support their community. It's something she appreciates even more as a single mom.

She loves working in a business with her son while building special friendships and connections with the community, putting Katie and her son in the middle of something wonderful. The two enjoy giving back to the community, which she hopes sticks with Henry as he grows up. They've sponsored fundraisers for local organizations and made every effort to donate to auctions raising money for local needs. Henry held a fundraiser through sales in his booth for Evelyn Jefferson following her emergency brain surgery.

Katie said, "The shop has always been really special and important to me. I named it after my son, Henry, and now he gets to do his part with me. I hope we can always do it together and that someday Henry can do something with it without me. I can pass it along to him if he wants to continue doing something with it."

Katie passes along value for her customers' dollars. Her customers pass their support along to her and Henry, and a business succeeds with a chance of becoming a generational store serving customers in every season of life.

But first, college. The criminal justice major soon switched to culinary school, a good mix of everything creative she loves to do. Math and science, her favorite subjects, were also ingredients, and she knew she wanted to be her own boss.

"So it was just the perfect mix, I think. No pun intended," she laughed.

Pies at Thanksgiving while still in college kick-started her baking career. "Who doesn't like pies?" she thought. So she took orders on her Facebook page, and the response was positive. "It was amazing," she said. "So many people ordered — friends, family, family friends, people I went to school with. It was humbling to get that kind of support right out of the gate."

From there, Mouth of the South Bakery became a part of our family celebrations, special occasions, and sweet tooth cravings. She's baked in her college apartment, home, and storefronts. Today, you'll find her creative treats at North Main Marketplace.

"I really liked the idea of celebrating with people, going through life's stages with them. I started with several brides, and I've been able to do their baby showers, gender reveals, and their children's first birthday cakes. I've kind of grown up with them [and] with their kids, and I think that's a cool part of it," Bargers said.

While she loves the decorated, fancy cakes and cookies, she said it's hard to beat treats that are just homey, like chess pies. For



Bargers, these bring to mind Southern hospitality and memories of her grandmother teaching her to make mashed potatoes as a little girl. Good food is always part of our favorite memories.

Many clients have done business with her from the beginning and continue to shop with her at the marketplace.

"I've had a very, very loyal clientele, and I'm grateful for it," Bargers said.

She describes her space at the marketplace as a mini bakery, which she strives to keep stocked. As she balances the bakery and special orders, customers bear with her patiently.

Thursdays on Bargers's calendar are reserved for the highlight of her week when she trades her apron for a seat behind a desk at First Choice Pregnancy Counseling Center in Shelbyville.

"Cakes and cookies are great," Bargers said, "but I felt like God was calling me to do a little something different. About that time, Angela Rasnick, the First Choice director, happened to come in, and I asked if they needed volunteers. She said they always need volunteers. I turned in my application and started the next week."

Bargers is a client advocate, connecting clients with resources and assisting them with the center's Earn While You Learn program. The educational program covers everything from pregnancy to the baby's first year, financial practices, relationship matters, and healing from abuse. Clients earn baby bucks they can spend in the center's baby boutique as they progress through the modules.

Here, Bargers connects with families, too.

"We go over whatever the lesson was about that week, and I just talk with them and pray with them. I think that my favorite part is hearing their stories. I love catching up with them every week," she said.

Her time at the center has affirmed what she believed she heard God calling her to do. She's going back to school to become certified in biblical counseling but will continue baking.

"I feel like I've had a longing for a while to do more. I couldn't tell you the last time I had so much peace about a decision; I'm excited about it," Bargers said. "I turned 30 this year. When you're 20, you think you have everything figured out and everything will be smooth. We all know that doesn't usually happen. I think my path is more clear than ever before. Life goes by so quickly. And I don't want to get so caught up in this life that I forget about what I can be doing to serve people for eternity."

Whether through her sweet confections or counseling at the center, Bargers is at home serving others.

"I just want to brag on God. I've lived a good amount of life in my short life, and God's carried me through all of it. He's blessed me far beyond what I deserve," she said. **GN**

# COUNTDOWN TO LIFTOFF

### Shelbyville native works to return us to the moon and beyond.


OVEMBER 16, 2022. Countless viewers watched as the Artemis 1 Orion spacecraft stood at attention with an eye beyond the sky and waited patiently for the final countdown to lift off. As the countdown neared zero, Artemis launch director Charlie Blackwell-Thompson said, "The harder the climb, the better the view." Upon hearing this, Madison Martin knew in her heart today that they would launch.

Long before liftoff, Martin's climb to a seat at one of the launch control center consoles clearing the takeoff began.

She came from a household that valued brains over beauty, although Martin and her sister possessed both. She embraced their wise instruction early and kept in the back of her mind throughout her education that she'd need to be smart to make it in life. In her early days of college, her career choice began to come into focus.

"Growing up, my father did controls engineering. I had a passion for science and math at a very young age, but I never put two and two together until a career fair at the University of Memphis during my freshman year. I walked out of there thinking I could do engineering; there's no reason I can't," said Martin. "So I called my dad and said, 'Hey, Dad, how do you feel about me doing electrical engineering?' And he paused for a moment, then said, 'That's a very hard major. Do you think you can do it?' And I said, 'Well, yeah, I can do it.' I have always had high ambitions, and I've always been very competitive, so the thought of achieving something like that was kind of my driving factor, but also having a passion for science."

Her passion for science and math was ignited in ninth grade. Martin jokes that Kelly Weiss' physical science class may have

been the hardest science class she took, but she influenced the trajectory of Martin's future.

"She had such a passion for teaching, and she had a passion for us learning different things about science. And that sparked my interest in physical science and eventually led me down the path of electrical engineering," Martin said.

Melissa Barrett, her algebra one and advanced algebra teacher, advised Martin to take advanced algebra instead of calculus. The advice proved invaluable as she worked through her college courses.

"While other people were taking calculus, I felt like I was behind, but she really instilled some of the fundamentals of algebra and the advanced fundamentals that I needed to get through some of those [college] calculus and math classes.

Without the skills she really honed in on, I don't know how I would have made it through college math," said Martin. "I would love to shout out tons of others because there are tons of others that really sparked that passion for math and science and for learning in general. I love each and every one of them for it."

An internship with Carrier Corporation in Collierville during her final year led to a full-time position following graduation. As the pace of the job increased, Martin considered broader opportunities. She ran across a job at Kennedy Space Center in Florida and quickly applied.

"Within a couple of hours, the director of engineering for the contract company that I applied for contacted me personally



and asked if I wanted to set up an interview. I thought, 'Oh my gosh, I'm interviewing at Kennedy Space Center. This is so cool.' A couple of days later, they called me and told me I had been accepted. So then, of course, my life flipped upside down."

Seizing the opportunity of a lifetime, Martin never imagined her electrical engineering degree choice would take her to the Kennedy Space Center, but it quickly did.

"If it weren't for Carrier giving me the skills I needed in controls engineering and with some of the software I learned there, I wouldn't have been a fit for the job. So I always think that things happen in mysterious ways."

And what a job it turned out to be!

Martin and her teammates work on the Artemis 1 mission, the world's only spacecraft designed to carry humans to deep space and return them to the moon. She is part of a dedicated exploration ground systems team working hand in hand with launch and mission control personnel. In fact, Martin was personally responsible for making a call to scrub the April 3, 2022, wet dress rehearsal of the Artemis 1 Orion spacecraft launch.

She said, "I would have never ever dreamed I would come to be an engineer in such a small niche. You go into electrical engineering thinking you'll do power, or you might work in a manufacturing plant or be a consultant. I never once thought I might sit at a console at Kennedy Space Center for the next rocket launch for NASA."

At T minus 30 seconds and counting, the Autonomous Launch Sequencer began counting down the liftoff of Orion to its maiden voyage to the moon.

The world waited for the words the team had worked so long to hear.

"And here we go! 7... 6... 5... 4... stage engines start... 3... 2... 1! Boosters and engines and liftoff of Artemis 1! We rise together back to the moon and beyond!"

Martin sat at her console as Artemis lifted off on November 16, 2022, at 1:47 a.m.

"There were times in my college career that I wanted to give up. And I would call my mom, of course, and she'd say, 'You can do it; just keep going.' I'm very lucky that I had very supportive parents who gave me that platform as a young child to believe I can do anything I put my mind to." GN





With around 100 contestants participating in the pageant each year, Smith said the true success of the pageant lies with the contestants themselves. She added that their courage to walk on stage and prepare for their big moment while they face fears and doubts head-on is inspiring. Win or lose, she feels everyone who takes part comes away feeling inspired by their determination and perseverance.


