Edison Middle School's fifth through eighth graders recently celebrated the opening of their new student farm and the start of an agricultural club. Edison Middle and Orangewood Elementary school students and their families are excited

to have their own campus farm where they can explore agriculture and farming outside of the classroom environment. "We're excited to be one of the only middle schools in Kern County that will have an on-campus farm and garden," says Edison School District Superintendent Erica Andrews. "There's limited access to social services in Edison so our community schools are becoming hubs for our community so that we can support the needs of our families, especially those who experience transportation insecurity."

Edison School District, with the help of Toby Tootle from West Coast Pipe Inspection, Jimmy Ehoff from Triple E Trucking, and Wasco High School agriculture department volunteers, built elevated gardens and animal pens with a donation of surplus piping material from Aera Energy last year. After a series of weather delays, the district was finally able to put the finishing touches on the farm. Students will learn garden upkeep, order supplies, keep inventory, and raise animals through an Expanded-Learning Program.

Celebrate America's Birthday with Flag Etiquette

Speaker of the House Kevin McCarthy encourages flag etiquette when celebrating America's birthday and displaying the American flag. Throughout its 246-year history, the American flag has been a beacon of hope to the world, representing our nation's enduring commitment to freedom and democracy. It also serves as a constant reminder of generations of brave patriots who have carried the flag into combat and made the ultimate sacrifice to preserve the liberties and values maintained to this day.

Section 7 and 8 of the U.S. Flag Code includes the proper display and respect of our flag, that "the flag of the United States should be at the center and at the highest point of the group when a number of flags of States or localities or pennants of societies are grouped and displayed from staffs" and that "the flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise."

Most outdoor flags can be washed in mild detergent and thoroughly rinsed. Indoor and parade flags should be dry-cleaned. Damaged flags can be repaired and utilized as long as the overall dimensions are not noticeably altered. Store your flag in a clean, well-ventilated area. Local American Legion Posts and local governments often have facilities to dispose of unserviceable flags.

Don't be Blue! Celebrate this healthy berry in July



July is National Blueberry Month! If any fruit deserves its own month of honorable recognition, the little blue beauty certainly does. July is the best time to harvest blueberries and is the peak season for this fruit. Beyond being delicious, blueberries are packed full of health benefits.

A compound known as anthocyanin gives blueberries their color but also contributes to their nutritious properties. Consumption of foods that are high in anthocyanin can help individuals lower their risk of developing coronary heart disease, according to studies noted by The Mayo Clinic. In addition, blueberries are a good source of vitamin C and dietary fiber.

Birthday Cake Bacteria



A food scientist examined what happens when someone blows out candles on a birthday cake. The results could make you think twice at your next birthday party. Paul Dawson, Professor of Food Safety at Clemson University found "about 1,000" bacteria being released in a single blow. The culprits, according

to Professor Dawson, are water droplets that come out when we blow the candles.

"My advice would be if someone's blowing the candles out, especially if they are sloppy doing it, when I get a slice I would scrape the top layer off," Professor Dawson added.

Melanoma: Vitamin D Supplements Linked to Reduced Skin Cancer Risk



A new study finds that the regular use of vitamin D supplements is associated with lower rates of melanoma skin cancer. According to researchers at University of Eastern Finland and Kuopio University Hospital, people who took vitamin D regularly were less likely to have had melanoma in the past or currently and were deemed by dermatologists to be less likely to develop melanoma in the future.

Researchers say the vitamin may protect against the cellular changes that lead to cancer. It's a good idea to consult your physician before taking supplements of any kind.

Stay Hydrated, Stay Healthy



The Dog Days of Summer mean fun in the sun, but staying hydrated to reduce the risk for heat illness is imperative. Water will almost always help people remain hydrated even when working in

the heat, but eating regular meals can also help prevent heat illness by replacing salt lost through sweat, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The CDC advises against consuming energy drinks and alcohol when spending time in the hot summer sun.

Many energy drinks contain more caffeine than standard servings of coffee, tea and soft drinks, and excessive caffeine consumption can contribute to dehydration. The CDC also reports that drinking alcohol within 24 hours of work in the heat can increase the risk of heat illness.

Brain Freeze: The Science behind an Ice Cream Headache

Technically known as cold neuralgia or sphenopalatine ganglioneuralgia (say that five times fast), the sensation widely known as "ice cream headache" likely occurs because eating something very cold can cause the temperature of the palate to drop substantially.

According to Johns Hopkins Medicine, that drop initially causes blood vessels to constrict before they ultimately open up. It's during that expansion when the painful feelings associated with ice cream headache present.

Hello, Happy Mama:

Katy Fults brings a full perspective to her view of motherhood: candor, empathy, inclusion



An artist and mother of two, Katy Fults is also the creator behind a new devotional book especially for parents.

"What you see is what you get with me. I am a mom and a wife and I do hand-lettering and I'm an artist and I just released a book with DaySpring, my publisher, called "I Thought I'd Have it All Figured Out by Now," said Katy in a single breath. "I do not have this mom thing figured out at all. Like the rest of us, I'm just doing my best. It's a hard job to make it as a woman and a mom and an artist and do all the things."

Katy and her husband, Scott, are the parents of Miles, 13, and Camden Jane, 11. The couple of 18 years met while living next door to each other at California Polytechnic State University. Scott is an engineer at a local firm.

Katy has worked as a contract artist with DaySpring since 2018 and her work is also visible on Instagram @katygirldesigns. She describes recent years as one of the loneliest parenting seasons she has experienced.

"Sometimes, moms go through periods where they don't want to talk about things and no one wants to admit they don't have it all together. We all go through seasons where we think we have it all figured out. Then something new happens and we don't. The truth is, no one actually does but no one wants to admit what they don't know," said Katy. "None of us know what we're doing and it changes every single day."

A couple of years ago, that difficult season culminated on one particular day that stands out in Katy's mind: July 4 brought noise, a party to attend and difficult behaviors.

"I remember other parents looking at my son and even in the kindness of their heart, what they were trying to do wasn't helping. I also recall thinking 'that's not what he needs right now,'," said Katy. "I remember feeling hot with embarrassment because my kid wasn't acting like every other kid and there was nothing anyone could do. I wanted a way to say 'I just need you to love us right now, to come alongside us and I love us. On my worst parenting day, I remember falling into bed and sobbing. I needed someone to be a listening ear or hold my hand."

The best book I've read lately is... The "Harry Potter" series. I am reading it for the very first time.

That feeling stayed with Katy and eventually contributed to the idea for her book. Her children were later diagnosed with attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD); anxiety and obsessive compulsive disorder (OCD) are also part of Miles's profile.

"Something that really has helped me is learning how to help my kids through their diagnoses. Neither function in the same way. I try to understand why my daughter is acting that way or why my son can't empty the dishwasher right now," said Katy. "It takes a willingness to learn how to understand my children. A lot of parents struggle to talk through different issues and seasons of life. Then, once I learned how many other people are going through similar things, I realized we are not alone. It is so much easier to root for each other and support one another."



During the same period when family issues became pressing, Katy also experienced a loss of faith.

"I have walked with the Lord almost my entire life but a couple of years ago, I went through a dark phase where I didn't know what I believed in anymore. I felt like everything was crashing in on me and it took a long time for me to come back around," said Katy. "My book is about the journey back to God and all that He had to reteach me."

Katy recalled an incident during the summer of 2021 when Miles hit his head on a

Q. What do you wish other families knew about families like yours?

A. I wish parents would teach their kids not to give up on people who are going through a difficult time because one day, they might need others. Empathy and acceptance should be part of every family's teachings, including how to accept people for who they are and love them through the difficulties. We experienced a lot of bullying in sixth grade and I think more people should be aware of that issue. There is behavior that can be helped and

Sunday. He seemed to be fine with an ice pack at home but two days later, he began complaining of a headache.

"I told him to go sit down and have some water. I gave him Advil but within a few minutes he was on the ground with no motor skills. I was on the phone with his pediatrician who told me to hang up and take him to the emergency room," said Katy. "We got CAT scans and MRIs and while we were waiting in between all the tests, we started asking Miles basic questions like his name and birthday and our address. I asked him who I was to him, expecting I would hear him say that I'm his mom. He didn't. Instead, he looked into my eyes and said 'I think I should know you but I don't.' It was hands-down the worst day of my life." Miles had experienced a delayed concussion and recovered without further incident. While on a run during that phase of spiritual questioning, Katy felt she was approaching God with similar confusion.

Today, the strangest thing in my purse is...

"It was in this season where I was asking God questions and questioning everything about God that I took a run and realized I was doing the same thing. I felt like God was saying 'Look in my eyes' and I was responding with 'I think I should know you but I don't," she explained. "Once I realized that, it made me come to terms with things and turn my life back and move forward in my relationship with the Lord."

changed and worked on; there is behavior that cannot. I would never want a family to think I am judging their choices. Families know what's best for them, whether that is choosing medication, taking a break or seeking other help.

I also believe we should respect the fact that families have a whole spectrum of issues and it is okay to admit every person needs help at one time or another. That can be especially hard for moms. If mom is not healthy, the house is not healthy. If mom is struggling with sanity, the rest of the house is also struggling. I have had to learn a lot about what that looks like: to live a balanced life, I work out daily and have a career, but I also spend a lot of time with the Lord. I try to set my day right with Him first thing and pray for



Katy pitched her project concept to Day-Spring last February. She wrote and illustrated every page, a process she describes as the hardest thing she has ever done.

"I think the Lord will use it to speak to women going through the same things," said Katy. "I love Jesus and following Him. I am a person who loves sunsets and pink clouds. Everyone knows that about me. I post cloud pictures about me and I get texts from my friends saying 'Outside there are pink clouds.' I have a cloud tattoo on my wrist. I have to remind myself to stay focused on the Lord to help my anxiety. Clouds help me remember: don't forget to look up."

Cindy and Mindy are eight-month-old puppies that live at the Kern County Animal Services shelter on Fruitvale. They were found abandoned near Malaga Road in Bakersfield. Lucky for these sisters, I was able to take them for a fun-filled doggy day out thanks to the shelter's program, the "Streets of Bakersfield," where volunteers can foster them for an afternoon. These days are held on various Saturdays where you can pick up the dogs between 10 and noon and return by 3:30 p.m., after filling out a short application online or in-person.

"The 'Streets of Bakersfield' program allows our community to participate in advocating for shelter dogs. There are far more dogs entering our shelters right now than there is kennel space to hold them, and some time out of our shelter is extremely beneficial for out shelter pets' health and wellness," says Nick Cullen, Director of Kern County Animal Services. "Taking a dog out for the day also allows for our community to advocate for these animals by showcasing them to friends and family, and posting them on social media. At the end of the day the only requirement is to fill out a report card and tell us all about the adventure! This is valuable information that we can then pass on to potential adopters."

Originally, I had planned on bringing one dog home with me for the afternoon, but that changed after visiting the shelter. As you walk through the kennel, the dogs that are participating in the "Streets of Bakersfield" program are designated with a special sign, so you know which ones to choose. At Cindy's and Mindy's kennel, they both were so eager and excited that after meeting these sisters, I knew they both had to enjoy the fun together. Cindy was the more spirited one of the two, and Mindy was more shy.

Kern County Animal Services volunteer, Meagan Allen said we picked out the most "Ying and Yang" pairing at the shelter to balance their energy. Allen says the public response to this program has been tremendous. It's really helped to get the public invested for people wanting to foster or adopt. And if they can't do that, they have really helped network the animals through social media and word of mouth. Once we arrived to my house, the girls got to play with my cute neighbor, seven-year-old Franki Boyd. Even she noticed their different personalities, but she also said that's what she liked most about them. "I like them because they are different," she says. "It's fun to meet different kinds of dogs."

My dog, Lincoln, a six-year-old black-and-white parti standard poodle was so happy to meet Cindy and Mindy. All three ran around the yard, enjoyed some bones and treats, and drank a lot because it was a warm day.

The two sisters were inseparable, and you can tell they rely on each other. Cindy was much more adventurous and explored the area more; while Mindy was more affectionate. At one point, Mindy just curled up at my feet and rested from all the excitement.

I was surprised how fast the time went with them. When it was time to take them back, I thought a Starbucks whipped cream Pup Cup would be the perfect ending for their doggy day out. Cindy didn't love the pup cup as much, so Mindy ate both of theirs. She even got a milk, doggy stache.

Admittedly, I was sad to take them back, but I know in our own small way, we gave them a happier day. Once in the entry way waiting to check the sisters back into the shelter, I met the cutest five-year-old girl named Claire Ashmore, who found her "dream" dog through this amazing program. With her mother, Brittany, they have participated in the "Streets of Bakersfield" program a handful of times, but this day they found their forever pet, Candy, a gorgeous German shepherd. Claire says, "I can't wait to play with her, give her lots of treats, and give her loves!"

Brittany was no stranger to fostering animals. She had fostered 12 puppies and was the first in line for the "Streets of Bakersfield" program. She said Candy, whose name at the shelter was Lilo, was the perfect fit for their family. According to Claire, they all voted "yes" to keep her. She told her mom, "It feels like happiness. I feel like crying happy tears but my body won't let me."

My son and I filled out the sisters' "Streets of Bakersfield" report cards, which the shelter puts into their permanent files. These reports give the shelter and prospective families more information about the dogs' temperament and activity level during certain situations. We gave both our dogs A+s. These adorable puppies would make great family pets, but I really think they would do better being adopted together.

Walking through the shelter, you realize how many animals need a loving home. This program is the perfect chance to meet a shelter pet and see him or her in your own environment.

My Doctor v. My Kids' Doctor Why I Love Visiting the Pediatrician

I was falling asleep in the exam room at my doctor's office. I just laid back and made myself comfortable. Or as comfortable as I could get with my legs hanging off the end. (Now that I think about it, it may have been worth the effort to slide out the little extension thingy.) I could hear the conversation my doctor was having with an older gentleman in the room next to mine.

confides that if he were to say yes, every one of those women in the front office would be mad at him because they would all have to stay late. (And he was already running an hour-and-a-half behind.)

This is not how things go at the pediatrician's office.

I think most of his patients are older than I am. Sometimes I feel like that should get me out of the dreaded health screenings like colonoscopies and mammograms, but my doctor knows I'm not THAT young. He has my birthdate right on my chart in case he forgets. He doesn't forget.

The man in the next room is telling my doctor all sorts of interesting things about his family and his pets and what he used to do for a living. When it becomes quiet, I suddenly sit up, aware that the doctor will be coming in at any moment. And I prefer not to be snoring when he opens that door.

He looks bedraggled. I am his last appointment of the day, and I have been waiting for an hour and twenty-seven minutes.

He walks in and smiles. "You are my favorite," he jokes. I have a feeling he is exhausted from listening to the life story of the patient before me.

As for me, well, I am all business. I am just here to renew my prescriptions, so I am hoping to be done in like five minutes.

A medical assistant enters the room, waits patiently for the doctor to take a breath, and quickly asks if he will add another appointment to his day. He says no. When she leaves, he looks at me very seriously and There is never a wait there. I guess a baby doesn't have much of a life story to tell the doctor. So the chitchat part goes fast. (Though I have occasionally seen a mom, desperate for adult conversation, get a little chatty.)

I love sitting in the waiting room at the pediatrician's office because a lot of newborns tend to go there. They come in, all tucked into car seats. Sometimes the moms cover them, so you can't see their faces. But once in a while you get a glimpse of a new baby. Sometimes I think if I am feeling a bit down, I will just sit in that waiting room and hope a baby shows up.

Looking at other people's babies is the fastest cure to remembering the sleepless nights and the vomit. (I have had sickly, senior pets who threw up less than my babies.) Also the screaming in the car. (*"Put them in the car," they said. "They'll sleep," they said. Not mine. They just screamed.*) But one look at someone ELSE's newborn, looking up with big, wondering eyes and giving no indication that either screaming or vomit is on the way, just makes me forget the tough times.

But the absolute best part of going to the pediatrician's office-better than the cute babies and better than the short wait time-is that I am not the one getting on the scale. I get to just hold the shoes.

Blueberry Biscuits

Biscuits Ingredients:

- 2 cups flour
- 2 tsp baking powder 2 Tbsp. sugar 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp nutmeg
- 1 1/2 cups whipping cream
- 18 ounces fresh blueberries
- (1 cup for biscuits, 2 cups for compote)

Biscuits Instructions:

- **1.** Preheat oven to 425°F.
- **2.** In a large mixing bowl, sift together: flour, baking powder, sugar, salt, and nutmeg.
- **3.** Add one cup of blueberries and toss in flour.
- Gently fold in cream, just until mixed (dough should look lumpy - the key to making them light & fluffy is not overworking the dough).
- **5.** Lightly flour your counter and gently knead (4 flips) into an 8 inch square (1 inch thickness).
- **6.** Using a pizza cutter or knife divide dough into 12 portioned biscuits (making sure not to cut all the way through, leaving the square as one whole piece).
- 7. Transfer the dough onto a parchment lined baking sheet and bake (upper half of oven) for 20-25 minutes or until golden brown and toothpick comes out clean.
- 8. Serve with fresh blueberry compote.

Compote Ingredients: (prepare while biscuits bake)

1/4 cup sugar

- 2 Tbsp. water
- 1/2 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice
- 2 cups blueberries
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

Compote Instructions:

- 1. In a small saucepan combine: 1 cup blueberries, water, lemon juice, and sugar. Turn stove to medium-high heat.
- 2. Stir constantly and bring to a boil. Boil until blueberries burst.
- **3.** Reduce heat to medium-low, stirring continuously. Simmer until sauce thickens.
- **4.** Remove from heat and stir in 1 cup fresh blueberries and the vanilla extract.
- 5. Serve warm with the biscuits.
