# Santa Clara **County makes** cuts to tackle huge deficit

■he Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors is cutting more than 600 positions to help close a looming deficit—paving the way for the passage of a \$11.3 billion budget for 2023-24.

Supervisors have also sent money into county reserves, totaling \$218.6 million, and delaying completion of several county facility improvement and demolition projects. Among the projects placed on hold include the demolition of the former animal shelter, which was replaced by a new facility in 2021

So far, the proposed budget focuses on funding resources to expand access for behavioral health services, housing and public safety, and support for children and families.

Supervisor Joe Simitian said, "despite difficult discussions among county leaders, the finalized budget will still continue providing critical resources."



It is deep in meaning and one can do much more research, on June 19, 1865, Maj. Gen. Gordon Granger, a U.S. Army officer and Union General during the Civil War, issued an order in Galveston, Texas, announcing that all slaves were free under the Emancination Proclamation

# In the shadows slavery lived on

Why did it take Texas two years to publicly pronounce on Juneteenth that slavery was no longer a part of America and all slaves were free? In my research I have learned that many states were slow to offer freedom to slaves. Delaware did not ratify the 13th Amendment abolishing slavery until 1901.

It is stated by many that a large number of slaves remained in their current condition after the law of freedom. Adults who were slaves and their children had the same status quo in society. This helped me to understand the value of the Juneteenth federal holiday when mail is not delivered and banks are closed.

The designation of Juneteenth as a federal holiday recognizes a pivotal time in U.S. history and I have adopted this holiday as my own; irregardless of my skin color.

I'm an American, so it's my Juneteenth too: and it doesn't matter if I'm also white.

# **Evergreen Senior Citizen Property Owners Are Eligible for Measure EE Parcel Tax Exemption**

Evergreen property owners age 65 by June 30, 2024 or older are eligible to file for exemption from the annual \$125 Evergreen School District parcel tax for parcels they occupy as their principal residence.

For joint owners of a principal residence, only one owner needs to be age 65.

More information regarding the parcel tax exemption, including a form to request exemption, can be found on our District website at www.eesd.org.

To complete the exemption, the form and supporting documents may be brought into the District Office located at 3188 Quimby Road, San Jose. Call Ly Ablao or Patty Maciel at (408) 270-6863 to make an appointment.

Residents must file for the exemption in person with documents to prove their home ownership, residency, and age eligibility.

Those who have previously been granted an exemption from the Measure H Parcel Tax, their exemption will continue to be automatically renewed each year as long as you remain eligible for the exemption.



# **Juneteenth helps** fulfill the promise of July 4

s we celebrate Independence Day this year with spirited conversations, delicious food and fireworks, we reflect on the ideals of freedom and equality. The Fourth of July honors the signing of the Declaration of Independence, our founding

document that promised liberty and justice. However, the freedoms celebrated on July 4 originally excluded Black people an entire U.S. population who were enslaved, dehumanized, and disenfranchised.

Enter Juneteenth: a day that demonstrates the promise of American freedom more than any other chapter of our national story. On June 19, 1865, General Gordon Granger arrived in Galveston, Texas, and proclaimed the freedom of all enslaved people in Texas — an announcement met with cele-

bration by African Americans that was eventually memorialized as Juneteenth to honor the end of slavery. Juneteenth has come to represent the struggle, perseverance, and many contributions of our African American community. These two holidays differ in their origins and focus, but celebrating one holiday shouldn't detract from our embrace of

Juneteenth helps Independence Day fulfill its promise and live up to its greatest ideal. In this time of national division and fracture, these holidays represent our shared values, our appreciation for people from all walks of life, and our commitment to create a more inclusive society.

Back in 2020, our community demanded that Santa Clara County become the first in

California to recognize Juneteenth as a paid county holiday. The demand arrived amid a national outcry for social justice, as people took to the street to demand equal rights for Black Americans. I spearheaded the effort that created the County's Juneteenth holiday. The vote recognized the legacy of injustice to Black people and our journey for true equity and representation.

At the time, we hoped the County holiday would lead other governments to follow suit. The following year, in 2021, we were thrilled when President Biden signed legislation establishing Juneteenth as a federal holiday.

We all have a responsibility to do whatey-

er is needed to advance civil rights and justice for our Black neighbors and every person of color. On this 160th anniversary of Juneteenth, I commit to do whatever I can to support June 19th becoming a paid state holiday. Every Juneteenth people should have the opportunity to join their loved ones and attend events where they can learn about — and embrace — Black history and culture in America. The holiday deserves recognition and observance by all Cal-

ifornians. Independence Day and June-

teenth allow us to learn about our history, even the overlooked, more uncomfortable parts. These holidays remind us that the principles enshrined in our founding documents must apply to everyone, regardless of their background or race. They honor the sacrifices made by those who fought for our independence, and for the end of slavery. And they remind us to take seriously our commitment to fight for civil liberties and personal freedoms, and to do whatever we can to make life a little better for all our neigh-

# San Jose Realtors say housing advocates 'terrorized' their office

ensions between local housing advocates and realtors have boiled into threats and ugly confrontations.

A coalition of homeless and housing advocates protested at the office of the Santa Clara County Association of Realtors on June 7, six days before the San Jose City Council approved the annual budget. They yelled chants like, "Realtors you can't hide, we can see your greedy side" and "Everyone deserves homes" because of the association's support to move city dollars away from affordable housing. But now those chants could result in criminal chargesif the realtors have it their way.

Association employees described the protest as an "invasion" that "terrorized" workers. Nearly 30 protesters from various housing nonprofits entered their building after first gathering in the parking lot with megaphones and handmade signs. Association officials said they are pursuing all legal avenues to ensure protesters never enter their building again.

"We were fine with them protesting out in our parking lot, which is still trespassing, but once it escalated to them coming into our offices that was crossing the line," Jordan Nunes, association spokesperson, told San José Spotlight. "Some of our employees are really shaken up

Nunes said one employee went to the doc-

another employee Jody Souza said at a recent council meeting that she sought counseling because she was so distraught.

But the homeless and housing advocates who protested at the association's office said they were nonviolent—that this was a standard protest—but maybe the first time realtors had one on their doorstep.

Sandy Perry, one of the protesters and president of the Affordable Housing Network of Santa Clara County, said the protesters entered the building to make sure their message was heard.

"We will confess to being loud and being critical, but we were peaceful," Perry told San José Spotlight. "Also Souza told council she locked herself in her office, but failed to mention that after she came out, she got into our faces and yelled at us."

Perry said the drama is because the realtors are setting the stage to reduce dollars for affordable housing next year and the legal threats are just to scare off protesters from coming to their office again.

"I'm not surprised that the realtors are blowing this up because they lost the vote," Perry said. "They have been demonizing nonprofits for months and this is another way to do it so they can stop affordable housing development."

Tensions between the two groups have been rising for years, but reached a breaking point during budget discussions. Councilmembers

Measure E to build affordable housing—a deviation from Mayor Matt Mahan's plan to funnel the money toward interim housing.

The realtors, who didn't support Measure E in 2020, backed Mahan's plan to invest in shortterm, quick-build solutions. The protesters, who were from nonprofits including LUNA and the South Bay Community Land Trust, were opposed and wanted the dollars for affordable housing, which they believe to be the root solution to solving homelessness.

Nunes said protesters were asked to go outside several times, but refused until police arrived. However, the San Jose Police Department said there was only one protester left when they got to the offices.

"There were no arrests, or noted damage/vandalism," a police spokesperson told San José Spotlight.

Neil Collins, CEO of the Santa Clara County Association of Realtors and a columnist for San José Spotlight, said the damage was emotional. His employees were "taunted and terrorized."

which is why he emailed city officials about the protest. His employees are continuing to publicize the protest by speaking out at meetings and through emails.

"I need to protect my employees. This just  $can't\,be\,something\,that\,we\,can\,ever\,allow\,have$ to happen again," Collins told San José Spotlight. "There's limits to political discourse, and there's venues for it. This was a political theater that caused real harm to my team."

Homeless advocate Shaunn Cartwright was one of the last people at the protest and said to imply protesters terrorized the association is "laughable."

"This was by a group made up largely of people who were over 50 years old with walkers, canes, various other disabilities and others who were previously or currently homeless," Cartwright told San José Spotlight. "For the realtors to say they have compassion for the unhoused and then use the word terrorize to describe them is not compassion, it is judge-

# New and improved California campsite reservation bill passes State Assembly

A bill that would make it easier for campers at California state parks to snagacampsite reservation has passed the State Assembly with nearly unanimous support.

AB 618, opens up spaces to meet demand by deterring late cancellations and no-shows with added penalties. The bill also directs the California State Parks Department to implement a lottery system for a handful of the most coveted campsites, as well as provide a discount to low-income park visitors through the Golden Bear pass.

California has the most state park land in the country with 279 individual parks, with

nearly seven million visitors staying in one of the state's 15,000 campsites.

Nearly half of all California campers say they have experienced difficulty finding a campsite to book, according to a survey conducted by camping website "The Dyrt" — whether it's because of reserving a spot months in advance or the limited 8 a.m. window opening.

Under AB 618, a cancellation made at least seven days before a reservation will be incentivized with a credit that can be used for another reservation within five years, while those who do not show up after the first day of the reservation will forfeit the remainder of the booking.

The bill also caps the number of days that people can stay at the same campsite per year at 30, as well as limits the length of reservations during peak season to seven consecutive nights.

These provisions would apply to all state parks, including the 150 parks that do not use the Reserve California booking system.

# **Oak Grove teacher rode 430 miles to raise funds for his school's Marching Band and Color Guard**

he Oak Grove High School Marching Band and Color Guard and the Oak Grove High School Band Boosters held a fundraiser to raise \$30,000 from June 19 to June 24.

During the fundraiser, Oak Grove High School Band Director Chris Moura and a small team of cyclists, including several members of his former UCLA racing team, cycled 430 miles from the UCLA Bruins Statue to Oak Grove High School.

Oak Grove High School Band Director, Chris Moura rode 430 miles along with a few of his former UCLA racing team mates to raise funds for his school band.

This year, the band received less than \$200 from the East Side Union High School District to run its music program. The high school has a total of 94% BIPOC (Black, Indigenous and People of Color) enrollment, with 63% of students receiving free and reduced lunches

Chris, came to Oak Grove in 1995. He and his late wife, Teresa, built the band and color guard programs into champions. Such work, though, comes with a cost. In order to perform, travel, and compete at an elite

level, the program needed to raise tens of thousands of dollars every year.

Moura explained that when the coronavirus pandemic shut down large gatherings and events, Oak Grove's biggest fundraisers were among them which typically raise between \$25,000 and \$30,000, "So, we're way behind."

"The band is a cross-section of the school's population," Moura said. "A lot of these parents work two or three jobs to give their kids a better life. Many of these kids don't have the opportunity to do things like club sports. These kids find another home here. It's a family."

Maura explained that he spent a majority of his high school life in the band and volunteering with friends. "Our shared struggle had bonded us closer than family. It was this escape from my mundane filial life that taught me discipline, time management, teamwork, resilience and flexibility."

The Oak Grove High School Marching Band and Color Guard has the opportunity to once again perform in the London New Year's Parade this winter. The Ride 4 Moura Music Fundraiser is aiming to raise \$30,000 to provide for the London event and other performance opportunities. The money will fund supplies for equipment, musical instrument repair and care, transportation, uniforms, and auxiliary supplies.

Moura says long bike rides are not only a stress release for him but allow him time to think up solutions to complex problems, such as finding ways to keep the Oak Grove Marching Band funded.

# **TECH JARGON OF THE WEEK Phishing Scam**

ave you ever stumbled into a conversation where everyone is speaking around this "techie" word – and even after



you've broken in, it is difficult to understand the unfamiliar jargon and acronyms? Well, there's no need to sweat it. Let me teach you the meaning of some commonly used tech words:

### **Phishing Scam**

In 2020, when the World Health Organization classified the coronavirus infection as a global emergency, online scammers got to work and started exploiting the uncertainty and fear surrounding this disease.

A sample phishing email detected by security agencies, showed attackers disseminating malicious links and PDFs that claim to contain information on how to protect yourself from the spread of the disease. "Go through the attached document on safety measures regarding the spreading of corona virus," reads the message, which purports to come from a virologist, "This little measure can save you."

Email scammers often try to elicit a sense of fear and urgency in victims. It's not surprising that they would attempt to incorporate the coronavirus into that playbook so quickly. But the move illustrates how phishing attempts so consistently hew to certain time-tested topics and

The hackers use phishing as a scam on Internet to get hold of your valuable information. You may come across pop up messages or suspicious emails from these fraudsters. In most of the cases this scam takes place through emails. These mails may ask you to update information about your personal accounts. Asking for confirmation of the confidential information, these spam mails will guide you to visit websites, which appear to belong to legitimate and authorized organizations briefly. But these websites are fake sites, which are operated by fraudsters to take over sensitive information from you.

Phishers know all too well that during uncertain times-whether it's international conflict or coronavirus—people become desperate for information and reassurance. Protecting yourself from falling into these traps can be difficult,


but there are some helpful steps you can take. As you've probably heard countless times, take a moment to think before downloading attachments or clicking links in any email or message, especially from someone you don't personally know. If you must interact, try to confirm that the email address is valid and spelled correctly, or use another method of communication to confirm that everything is above board. Most importantly, trust your gut. If something elicits strong emotions or a sense of urgency—or just feels off—pause to reconsider.



with the political shaping of our city and quaint Evergreen area. If you bump into Burt, be sure to ask him to show you many of those in the limelight of our city and in a joyful way, he will be sure to share selfies taken with him on his phone while providing a good-natured story.

### He's Americana

Every sentence he states is solid. These qualities he owes to his mom and dad and his vast experiences including serving during times of war.

Perhaps the toughest men who walk amongst us do so with soft spoken words and quiet smiles in ways that radiate righteous truth which genuinely affect people and shore up our world in meaningful and peaceful ways. Burt transmits this powerful quality in the realm where action speaks louder than words!

This guy is Americana and of such high integrity one wonders what things he did in his past to command such a gracious limelight to all who come near or into contact with him

# **Combat on Navy ship**

He's quiet about his awards and had to be prodded to share out his battle engagement experience during the Vietnam War.

In 1966, with combat in full swing, Burt served on Naval Attack Squadron 113 aboard the U.S.S. Enterprise and a challenge presented itself to the ship. He wore a green outfit in his job as he worked on the flight deck each day. It was very dangerous. He states, "My job was to go below the plane and ensure it was correctly in place to be catapulted."

Suddenly, he began to learn there was a backlog of needed avionics equipment due to faulty electronic parts inside key components which were occasionally going out and not working due to many factors. This hindered the effective strength of attacks and it became apparent that the situation was so great that aircraft availability would soon face a problem unless some kind of action was taken immediately.

Burt states, "The shortage of avionics equipment became noticeable. In my off time I went to the avionic shops on board the ship and helped repair navigation and communication equipment. Over a short period of time our aircraft availability of fully assembled working electronic equipment became the best in the fleet." Burt states, "So for a while, I was spending time on the flightdeck and also, I began to help out in the avionics shops on the ship. As I begin fixing components, within weeks, they moved me into electronic repair full time."

# 'Petty officer Smith, front and center'

Burt explained, "Each night while serving on ship I would crawl into a kind of small box which was my bed. My belongings were kept in a compartment under the mattress and I would sleep along with all my fellow Navy sailors with a wool blanket that covered me displaying the capital initials USN. Over a bit of time, after I had been working to help the ship and all crew, one day, without notice, the entire squadron was mustered to have a meeting on the hanger deck. I was standing in a crowd of men when, without warning, the Master of Arms who stood next to the captain announced in front of the entire crew, 'Petty Officer Smith, front and center!'"

"You can see by the look on my face in the photo that when I walked out on flightdeck, I thought maybe I was in trouble and had done something wrong. I said to myself, 'Oh S\*\*\*,'

then to my surprise the following letter was read to the entire crew!"

### 'Can Do' quality of Burt

This is the actual verbatim letter from the Secretary of U.S. Navy, Vice Admiral Bringle, which explains the "Can Do!" qualities of Burt and the power inside the man.

Burton Victor SMITH, Aviation Electronics Technician First Class, "For meritorious achievement while attached to the Attack Squadron ONE HUNDRED THIRTEEN EMBARKED IN USS ENTERPRISE (CVA (N) 65) as an Electronics Technician from 14 January 1968 to 12 July 1968 during combat operations against the enemy. Petty Officer SMITH performed his duties in the Aircraft Intermediate Maintenance Department in a professional manner. He continually sought other technical and supervisory responsibilities within his parent squadron. When the squadron was faced with unique and complex problems with new IFF transponder and UHF transceiver equipment, he voluntarily researched the problem, determined the cause and expertly corrected the difficulties. His technical competence and effective management techniques were confirmed by the amount of reliable electronic equipment processed by his assigned shop during the deployment. Petty officer's SMITH devotion to duty, professionalism and effective leadership reflected great credit upon himself and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Services." Petty Officer SMITH is authorized to wear the com-

# **Taking initiative**

Burt used self-gained knowledge of all the avionics equipment which made him a unique asset to the repair facility. It was apparent that a backlog of damaged avionics equipment was in need of parts and trouble shooting. If the equipment was not to function, then aircraft availably would be diminished.

He quickly assessed the problem and took action by determining issues in the inner workings of each non functioning component. Over time he went from shop to shop to fix and train.


As an expert trouble shooter technician, he began using new repair strategies and techniques which caused the backlog to be "liquidated." In addition, he spent vast hours working with new and experienced technicians to show and train them in unique ways

of repair. His GUNG-HO attitude affected the war situation for Navy ships, helicopters and planes in a very short period of time.

Undoubtedly the direct result of his enthusiasm for working with electronic equipment resulted in key component availability in this war effort. Also, in addition to being the squadron's BULLPUP trainer (this was a missile training device that Burt maintained in the ready room), during his spare time he continued to work on and figure out



### Russian trawler

Always with a smile, Burt shared a true combat story. Not unlike today when the balloons from China fly over our country to collect information, during the Vietnam War, Russian so called fishing trawlers were seen following our ships (ghosting them) in the South China Sea. It was stated by one Vietnam veteran that, "They weren't fishing at all, they didn't even have nets, but they had all kinds of electronic gathering gear strung up on their masts so everyone knew what they were up to."

Burt explains, "One time, on a helicopter trip from the U.S.S Enterprise in the war zone, the pilot played a joke on the Russians. Before the flight, he took a waterproof tube and placed in it two rolled up Scientific American magazines, two National Geographic magazines and two magazines of models in swimsuits (a publication invented by a man named Hugh). As they were flying by the pest Russian Fishing boat the pilot asked Burt (who had no idea

what was in it) to toss the tube with red floating buoy and as it hit the water near the boat, they all pointed to the Russian so called fishermen to retrieve the gift and flew away on their trip to the Ticonderoga.

Later, they flew back to the Enterprise and as they looked down at the same Russian trawler, one of the Russians held up the magazine centerfold in the air spread out between his two hands as a gesture of war time thanks.

### **Tet Offensive begins**

A week later, he went on a secret mission aboard a C1A cargo plane. They got to the main landing strip in Danang and were resting in the EM (Enlisted Men) Club when all of a sudden, the pilot ran into the room yelling, "We got to go, let's get out of here quick!" He would find out that secret intelligence stated it was the start of the Tet offensive that day, so best to be back on ship.

Another time he went on a mission ride on the Admirals helicopter to try to solve a critical combat control component instrument issue. A top-secret instrument needed some figuring out to help the aircraft determine if "friendlies" aircraft were approaching.

Burt stated, "Each jet pilot created a secret four-digit code that was assigned before take-off. I was tasked with troubleshooting this IFF (IDENTIFICATION FRIEND OR FOE) system on the carrier Ticonderoga."

The carrier sends out a pulse to airplanes to see if the 4-digit code is sent back accordingly to know if the aircraft is friend of foe. This See BURT SMITH, next page

Editor's note: If you wish to join Burt's table for lunch at the Evergreen Community Center you can do so. Each weekday the San Jose Senior Nutritional Center offers






