

Commission to consider broadband recommendation at **July 17th meeting**

When the clock struck 2 p.m., Friday, June 30th, that was the deadline for internet service providers (ISPs) to submit bids for the Franklin County Broadband Grant, a potential \$5 million build out to provide broadband to Franklin County's unserved and underserved areas.

According to Franklin County Administrator Leah Mansell, the only ISP to submit a bid was Freedom Fiber, a company already heavily involved in broadband build out to rural Franklin County.

With only one bidder, it would seem logical that Freedom Fiber would be awarded the bid, subject to its having complied with bid specifications. But with government funds, what seems black and white often remains gray.

Based on what Franklin County Probate Judge Barry Moore said at the commission's July 10th work session, an answer should come at the commission's July 17th business meeting.

'The application period for the Franklin County Broadband closed Friday, June 30th," Moore said

Almost all Franklin businesses score satisfactory health ratings

62 of the 64 Franklin County establishments that received health ratings during the period of April 1, 2023 through June 1, 2023, had scores that fell into the "satisfactory compliance" range.

Health ratings are required to be prominently posted in all food/lodging establishments. Scores are graded by the Alabama Department of Public Health inspectors on a 100point scale.

Establishments with scores of 85 to 100 are considered to be in "satisfactory compliance" and are routinely inspected. Establishments scoring between 70 and 84 will be inspected

again in 60 days, and those scoring between 60 and 69 will have another follow-up within 48 hours. Any establishment scoring below 60 will be immediately closed.

Areas of inspection by ADPH include management and personnel; food storage, preparation and service; equipment; utensils; linen cleanliness; plumbing and waste; poisonous or toxic material storage and an inspection of the physical facility or property.

62 of the 64 Franklin County establishments listed in the most recent food and lodging establishment ratings scored 85 or above, within the satisfactory compliance range.

The high score was 99, shared by five businesses: Bay City Nutrition,



Monday. "A review team, made up of county employees and officials, is currently evaluating the application with the goal of providing a recommendation of award to the Franklin County Commission at its July 17th meeting.

"The commission will make the final decision to award grants based on the review team's recommendation," Moore added.

Moore declined to enumerate which county officials and employees comprise the review team. But when a conference call was held last week with representatives from the Investing in Alabama Counties (IAC) group, Moore, County Administrator Leah Mansell and Franklin County Commissioner Joseph Baldwin took part in the call.

Last month, the Franklin County Commission rejected IAC's request to extend the deadline until mid-July in order to allow ISPs more time to review a newly-received map of Franklin County sent to Moore on a Friday afternoon before a three-day weekend with the county commission's business meeting set for the following Tuesday at 8:30 a.m.

IAC was formed by the Association of County Commissions of Alabama as a voice to guide county commissions through the process of spending American Relief Plan federal funds for broadband expansion into unserved or underserved areas.

A consulting firm, Sain Associates, was hired by IAC to navigate through the often-cloudy waters of federal funds and the rules attached to them

The additional map sent by Sain Associates showed areas of Franklin County that were included in a bid from Charter Communications in the Federal Communications Commission's 2020 Rural Digital Opportunity Fund auction.

Although there were portions of Franklin County contained in the 2020 bid award, Charter has never followed up its 'winning' bid with any steps toward expanding affordable, reliable, last mile fiber optic broadband to the county's most rural areas.

The problem of winning RDOF auction providers not following through with build outs is not unique to Franklin County. In fact, some have

described it as the 'fatal flaw' in the entire auction process.

Some rural areas face the predicament of the auction winner never following through with their 'winning' bid, and potentially at the same time, losing the prospect of new funding because it overlaps into a previously awarded area.

The language in the county's broadband expansion grant 'questions, answers and additional information' states the county "must ensure that recipients provide funding for broadband projects that are not otherwise met by existing federal or state commitments. ARPA funds cannot be used to supplement grant funding for a project that has already received other modes of grant funding."

Applicants were also advised of their responsibility to "confirm (they) have not been awarded other grant funding for any areas (they) propose to serve with any granted ARPA funds."

While he agreed the issue of broadband expansion in Franklin County is a time-sensitive priority, Moore said the bid process was handled the same way any other bid process is conducted.

"In order to protect the integrity and fairness of the review process, I'm unable to provide additional details at this time," Moore said.

"This matter was handled like any other competitive process performed by the county and pertinent information will be presented publicly at a future commission meeting," he added.

Ainsworth: Job of eliminating grocery tax 'half-complete'

Alabamians may have felt their wallets bulge a bit last month when the Legislature approved our bill that slices the sales tax on groceries in half and implements the single largest tax cut in state history.

Alabama was one of only three states that taxed groceries at the full rate - South Dakota and Mississippi are the others - and we were one of only 13 states in the nation that levied any tax on food.

But beginning on September 1, 2023, Alabama's 4% state sales tax on groceries will be cut to 3%, and another percent will be automatically deducted when revenues in the Education Trust Fund reach a trigger point that is set in the bill, which is expected to occur as soon as the next fiscal year.

Safety provisions have been put in place to ensure that education dollars are protected as the \$300 million tax cut goes into effect, and we remain dedicated to fully funding our K-12 public schools, community colleges, and public universities at all times.

Once lawmakers were briefed on our proposal, support for it spread like wildfire. All 35 members of the Alabama Senate agreed to serve as sponsors along with 100 of the 105 members of the House. I am told by many longtime State House observers that no major bill of such significance has ever achieved the same unanimous and bipartisan support.

Our success in cutting the grocery tax demonstrates what can be accomplished if we stay true to our conservative beliefs, build consensus among lawmakers, and have the courage to attempt to accomplish what many say can't be done.

But the job is only half-complete, and work still lies ahead as I am determined and fully committed to abolishing the grocery tax altogether.

RCS board approves loan to purchase nine new b

The Russellville City Board of Education approved a \$1.055 million loan at a short meeting

July 10th.

The 10-year term loan from CB&S Bank will be used for the purchase of nine new school buses. The approved signers for the loan will be RCS

Superintendent Heath Grimes and Chief Financial Officer Lisa Witt.

Board member Greg Batchelor abstained from the vote. Funding for buses from the State of Alabama is provided for the first 10 years a new bus goes into service through a state formula used to

calculate fleet funds per school system.

After 10 years, Grimes explained, a bus rolls off fleet renewal and is no longer funded by the state, as was the case with nine buses that will be replaced.

"If you keep a bus for 11 years, the system no longer receives funds for it, so these nine buses are rolling off through the fleet renewal," Grimes said. "We may keep two or three of them and sell the other ones either to another system that needs them and doesn't have the fleet

renewal funds we have, or they could be sold to a salvage yard."

The new buses will be fuel-powered Grimes said. The school system purchased 10 propane buses a few years ago, taking advantage of grant funding and rebate incentives specifically for propane buses.

These 10 propane buses remain the only ones of their kind among the school system's 30 bus fleet.

'(Transportation Director) Alan Wilson took advantage of grants and rebates available at the time is why we purchased propane buses.

The next regular meeting of the Russellville City Board of Education will be Tuesday, July 18th at 8 a.m.





too. I need to be around more on Saturdays and spend time with my family. My oldest son is at the University of Alabama now and my younger son is a junior in high school. It was just the right time."

because no board of education has yet approved his hiring.

Barnwell's coaching record over his five years at Phil Campbell was 26-27, by far the best record since Jimmy Pounders went 6-5 in his one season as Phil Campbell head coach in 1996.

The Bobcats posted winning records the past three seasons, reaching the playoffs as well. Last season's team went 7-4, as did the 2021 Bobcats. In 2020, the team went 6-5.

Competing in Class 3A, Region 8, Barnwell's most recent region records were 3-3 (2022, 2020) and 5-1 (2021).

As an assistant coach, Barnwell said his role will be diminished from that of a head coach, which is what he wanted while his sons are still

"I'm not finished coaching. I hope my career as a head coach isn't over, but it was time for me to make that decision after this past school year ended," Barnwell said. "I literally watch film 12 months a year. We try to devise our plans based on what our players can do.
"We don't get to recruit players we get into our system so we're con-

stantly devising systems to fit the personnel we have. It's a fluid process due to injuries, graduation, kids moving to other schools and kids changing positions," he added.

As for the future of Phil Campbell football, Barnwell said he's opti-

mistic the program will continue to improve under a new head coach.

"The cupboard is not bare. There's a lot of talent out there with those kids. I poured my heart and soul into this program the past five years, and at times, I've felt I didn't have a lot more to give to the program,' Barnwell said.

'That's not fair to our players, or to everyone involved in the community with this program if I can't continue to give absolutely 100 percent. I'll always be appreciative to Mr. Hamilton and the Franklin County Board of Education for giving me this opportunity at Phil Campbell," he
