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Commission awards \$5 million broadband grant to **Freedom Fiber**

The Franklin County Commission unanimously approved a resolution that incorporates a bid from Freedom Fiber to complete broadband build out across the county's unserved and underserved areas at the commission's July 17th meeting.

Freedom Fiber, a subsidiary of Tombigbee Electric Cooperative, is already heavily involved in broadband build out to rural Franklin County. The \$5 million grant allocated by the Franklin County

Commission comes from funds received through the American Rescue Plan Act, a federal COVID-19 grant program that injected billions into local and state governments.

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> The commission followed the recommendation of a review team, comprised of Commissioners Chris Wallace, Joseph Baldwin, County Administrator Leah Mansell and Franklin County IT Director Jim Hill.

> Moore thanked the members of the review team, along with Investing in Alabama Counties, a subsidiary of the Association of County

County coaching changes aplenty for new school year

With four resignations recently from varsity head coaches at Franklin County Schools, Superintendent Greg Hamilton and the principals at the system's high schools have been busy conducting interviews to fill the vacancies as the school year approaches.

Phil Campbell coaches Greg Winstead (softball) and Kevin Barnwell (football), along with Vina's Childers Luke (football) and Tharptown's Jacob Hamilton (football) all had their resignations approved by the Franklin County Board of Education at its July 11th meeting.

While Jacob Hamilton's resignation and transfer to a teaching position at Phil Campbell High School was a precursor to his being named the Bobcats' new varsity football coach, both Childers' and Barnwell's resignations were unexpected according to Hamilton.


"Any time you get a resignation in July, especially for a football coach, it's unexpected," Hamilton said. "We'll have someone in place next week in both positions at Vina and Phil Campbell, subject to board approval.'

Hamilton said he expected to have 'several qualified candidates' for the three positions, with a priority on promoting from within Franklin County Schools faculty.

"In today's climate, you just try to find the best leader you can for your program. It's always good to promote from within if you can," Hamilton said.

Hamilton disputed a statement published in the July 12th Franklin Free Press from Barnwell saying he told Hamilton of his intention to resign at the end of the spring 2023 semester. But the focus now is to fill the vacancies vacancies with qualified candidates who want to be there.

On Monday, Hamilton was named varsity football coach at Phil Campbell. Hamilton will also serve as the school's strength and conditioning coach across all athletic programs.

His coaching experience includes football and track and field coach at Tharptown, and he was an assistant football coach at Phil Campbell, Deshler and Carbon Hill High Schools. He is a Phil Campbell native.

After the vacant Phil Campbell softball position was posted for the required period, the board hired Jason Lindsey to lead the program. Lindsey, a sixth grade math teacher at Phil Campbell Elementary School, also coaches junior high boys basketball.

He previously coached softball at Cherokee High School and has experience coaching travel softball with the Kraze/Vexus organization, according to PCHS Principal Bart Moss.

Lindsey and his wife Heather have two children, Jaci and Judson.

Phil Campbell special education teacher and former assistant baseball coach Griffin Harris was hired to lead the Bobcat varsity baseball team. He succeeds Jonathan Raper, who resigned last month and was tabbed as Belgreen High School's first varsity football coach.

As a dominant pitcher at Phil Campbell, Harris was an integral part of a team that reached consecutive Class 3A state championships, finishing both as runner-up.

Harris previously served as varsity baseball coach at Tharptown High School, where he led the Wildcats to a Franklin County Championship. He served as assistant coach to Raper and was part of the coaching staff of the 2021 Class 3A state championship team that has four consecutive trips to the Final Four.

Harris also played baseball at the collegiate level for Northwest-Shoals Community College.

Several Franklin County varsity baseball coaches, Donovan Hand (Red Bay) and Nathan Vincent (Belgreen) and Harris continued their playing careers beyond the high school level.

"If you look at our baseball coaches across the country, the pedigree is pretty high. Several played college baseball, with one playing professionally," Hamilton said.

Red Bay's new varsity softball coach is Gary Blackburn. Julianna Potts takes over the Belgreen varsity volleyball program. Joseph Brown is the new varsity boys and girls soccer coach at Tharptown, where the soccer program is fast building a winning tradition.

Julianna Taylor is the new Phil Campbell varsity volleyball coach and assistant softball coach. She will teach Physical Education at Phil Campbell High School.

Taylor comes to Phil Campbell from Class 7A Austin High School, where she was head middle school volleyball coach and assistant varsity volleyball coach. She's also coached travel softball in the Huntsville/Decatur area.

She played college volleyball at Blue Mountain College in Mississippi. She's a graduate of Phillips High School where she was a standout athlete and cheerleader.

Taylor's grandfather, the late Kenneth Taylor, was a former PCHS principal, according to Moss.

Commissions of Alabama, and Sain & Associates, a consulting firm hired to work with the IAC to help county commissions navigate the use of federal grant funds for broadband.

When the application period for internet service providers to submit bids for the ARPA funds ended, the only bid received was from Freedom Fiber.

Commissioners voted last year to commit \$5 million to broadband expansion in Franklin County. The commission was guided through the process of spending ARPA funds on broadband by the Investing in Alabama Counties, or IAC, formed by the Association of County Commissions of Alabama.

Franklin County Probate Judge Barry Moore said the bid process was consistent with the way other services are bid out.

"This matter was handled like any other competitive process performed by the county," Moore said last week.

Freedom Fiber's unique business model includes last-mile, reliable, affordable broadband internet. What separates the company from other ISPs is its willingness to build infrastructure to supply even the most remote addresses in its service area.

"The county commission has had the goal of broadband coverage across Franklin County for a long time," Moore said. "Today, we are getting closer to that goal. This will benefit our citizens for many years to come. This is an investment for the future of Franklin County."

Freedom Fiber Operations Manager, Nick Tucker, attended Monday's meeting along with Tombigbee CFO Matilda Harrison. With the \$5 million grant award, Tucker said his company will complete its broadband build out to all of Franklin County with the exception of the City of Russellville and a small area of northwest Franklin County, including Pleasant Site, although there is a grant application pending that would take care of that northwest section if awarded.

Tucker said Freedom Fiber has the 'vision and desire' to come to the City of Russellville, the most densely populated part of Franklin County, but there would have to be 'some discussions' before that can be done.





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The company is averaging 600-650 new Franklin County customers per month. All other municipalities (Phil Campbell, Red Bay, Hodges and Vina) are or will soon be serviced by Freedom Fiber.

The commission's resolution calls for a funding agreement to be drafted that will stagger payments as additional parts of the county broadband build out are completed. That funding agreement will be presented at a later meeting to the commission for its consideration.

In other agenda items, the commission:

--reappointed Commissioner Joseph Baldwin to be the county's ACCA legislative committee member.

--approved a quote for a loan from Valley State Bank for the purchase of two dump trucks for the Franklin County Solid Waste Department. The loan amount is \$427,000, at 4.04% interest over 60 months.

--tabled the hiring of a Corrections Officer/Dispatcher with the Franklin County Sheriff's Office.

--heard a report that the Franklin County Solid Waste Management Plan, after a legal review, is in compliance with state law. The review was made by the law firm of Balch and Bingham.

--submitted the name of Brent Jeffreys to serve on the Franklin County Board of Equalization.

--heard a presentation from Passion Human Resources Consulting regarding a compensation study, including job descriptions and updated personnel policies. The matter was tabled due to there being other proposals for the commission to consider.

Inaugural Belgreen FB schedule has six games, with possibility of more

The inaugural season of Belgreen High School football features a schedule with six games, and the possibility of two additional ones.

Coach Jonathan Raper's Bulldogs are currently involved in summer workouts, with an average of 16-20 players participating in the voluntary workouts.

With a team consisting primarily of 7th, 8th and 9th graders, Raper hopes an additional 10-15 players will come out for football once the school year begins on August 8th.

"Most of our kids are not yet at the age where they drive. And you have parents who work, so it's difficult for them to get here for summer workouts in the morning or evening," Raper said.

As a new football program, Belgreen's first two seasons are mandated to be non-varsity. Region realignment will be announced later this year for the 2024 and 2025 seasons, but Belgreen will play a schedule primarily consisting of junior high games.

Raper said his junior varsity games would include a portion of the Shoals Christian Jamboree and the Vina game. But with Shoals Christian hiring a new football coach last week, Raper isn't sure if that will change.

"We're looking at possibly adding two games to this year's schedule, and I really

Hamilton named varsity football coach at Phil Campbell

The July 11th Franklin County Board of Education meeting proved to be a personnel bonanza full of new hires and moves. One of those moves involved former Tharptown varsity football coach Jacob Hamilton, who was transferred to Phil Campbell High School

Hamilton was Tharptown's varsity football coach last season. Hamilton has now taken over as the head football coaching job at Phil Campbell High School, a move that was formally announced Monday evening.

"It's always hard leaving a place because you develop so many relationships with kids and you really start to get things going your way. I always try to work as hard as I can," Hamilton said.

Hamilton has served as an assistant football coach at Phil Campbell, Deshler and Carbon Hill High Schools. He's a Phil Campbell native and he attended Phil Campbell High School.



He knows the game and one of the things I was most impressed by was his knowledge of strength and conditioning. He prepares the kids for the season well," Moss said.

In other agenda items, the board:

--recognized the Tharptown High School Rocketry Team for its second-place finish at the American Rocketry Challenge in May.

--approved a Student Code of Conduct/Handbook for the 2023-24 school year.

--approved a policy change in the Admittance Enrollment Requirements for the Franklin County Board of Education to require TWO proofs of residency before a child may be enrolled into Franklin County Schools. These may include copies of a power bill, water bill, official rent receipt/deed in the name of parents, legal custodian or legal guardian. Franklin County Schools' enrollment policy is governed by school bus transportation. Franklin County Schools does not have open enrollment unless deemed necessary by the Superintendent.

The Alabama State Department of Education pays foundation units to schools based on enrollment. District lines prevent schools from being underfunded by preventing enrollment of students not zoned for that school.

--heard a report from Lori Hardin, Federal Programs Director, Title IV, about how the system's Title IV funds were spent last year. Those expenditures included two college tours per school juniors and seniors (\$3,500), music instruments and art supplies (\$9,600), social emotional learning supplies (\$7,986.74), school safety supplementary salary and benefits for a School Resource Officer (\$49,000), six Aiphone keypad access door entry stations for Belgreen, Red Bay Elementary, Tharptown Elementary, Tharptown High School and Vina High School (\$15,747) and purchase of STEM Robotic Kits, STEM Classroom set of drones, Chromebooks and IPADS (\$15,000).

--approved School Incident Reports for the period of August 8, 2022 through May 26, 2023.

--approved a rollover bid for bread for the 2023-24 school year to Flowers Bread/Baking Company and milk and ice cream to Purity Dairy

--approved increase in Visitor Meal Price and A la Carte Prices for the 2023-24 school year. Employee lunches will be \$4.25, visitor lunches \$5 and holiday meals/guests \$6.

--approved compensation agreement paying Ashley Grimes, Yearbook Sponsor at Phil Campbell Elementary School, \$500 in compensation for yearbook supplement for 2022-23 year, per recommendation by PCES Principal Dawn Rogers. The school will reimburse the Franklin County BOE the \$500 plus applicable benefits.

The next board meeting is scheduled for August 1, 2023, with work session at 5 p.m., and meeting to follow.



Britton asks commission to pave Jacinto Road

The owner of a residential community on Cedar Creek Lake is asking the Franklin County Commission to pave a two-mile dirt road that provides the

only access to the property.

Eddie Britton addressed the commission at its July 10th work session to ask commissioners to consider paving one mile of Jacinto Road this year and the other mile the following year. He appeared with Cade Boyd, a property owner in Cedar Cove, Britton's lakeside development.

Most of Cedar Cove's 11 lots border the lake. Britton continues to work with the Tennessee Valley Authority to obtain pier permits for individual boat houses.

"I'm asking you to do the first half The two-mile Jacinto Road ends in Eddie of (Jacinto Road) one year because of the costs and finish up Britton's Cedar Cove subdivision. in the successive year," Britton

told commissioners. "We have permission from all landowners along Jacinto Road to access their properties to pave the road."

There are eight homes along Jacinto Road on the way to Cedar Cove. Britton said there's one home built and construction is about to begin on a second. He's sold seven of the 11 available lots. He describes this project the 'first phase' of the subdivision.

Subdivision covenants call for a minimum of 1,500-square foot homes. This is not the first time Britton has appeared before the commission. His argument to commissioners to justify paving the road is the increased value the land will have and the additional lots that will be purchased where homes will be constructed, all increasing ad valorem tax revenue for Franklin County. Britton has also met with Franklin County Engineer Jason Baggett to discuss the possibility of paving Jacinto Road.

"When we met with Mr. Baggett, nothing personal, but he did not seem real encouraging," Britton said.

Boyd said the unpaved road causes significant wear and tear on vehicles as well as being a hazard.

'You fight the dust every day. We just want the same thing everyone else wants and if you've ever met another vehicle on a dirt road, it's not pleasant," Boyd said.

Baggett said work will soon begin on Franklin County's Rebuild Alabama Grant road project, which will see 4.71 miles of road paved at a cost of \$778,435.26. That's a cost of \$165,272.88 per mile. That per mile cost includes additional improvements, including striping and traffic control signage.

He added that a just 20-foot wide road, with a 1.5 inch overlay, would cost approximately \$110,000 to pave one mile. Baggett said he planned to do some measurements on Jacinto Road to estimate the cost of paving it.

Boyd said if commissioners committed to paving Jacinto Road, he would cut down trees and move fences needed to have the requisite space for shoulders. He estimated approximately 50 trees would need to be cut down, and both Boyd and Britton said they 'were willing to do our part' to get the paving done.

To find Jacinto Road, take Hwy. 24 west to Belgreen, turn right onto 187, then turn right at the stop sign and after one block, turn left onto Hwy. 49 for half a mile. Turn right onto Jacinto Road and you'll travel two miles to the entrance of Cedar Cove.

Franklin County Probate Judge Barry Moore said the commission would soon be conducting budget meetings and would meet with Baggett to see if paving a portion of Jacinto Road 'is feasible.'

Commissioner Chris Wallace mentioned the possibility of calcium chloride being applied to the road as a less expensive alternative.

Calcium chloride is a hygroscopic salt that draws moisture from the air to keep gravel roads damp, even in hot weather conditions. This helps the gravel create a hard and compact road surface.

With a limited budget and no shortage of roads needing to be paved or repaired, a commitment to pave a two-mile road not classified as a major collector seems unlikely.

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
