





General Rules Governing Our Fair

- The Fair will employ guards to patrol the grounds. Anyone trying to fraudulently enter the grounds by climbing fences, or any other means, will be arrested and prosecuted.
- 2. Intoxication of any person on the grounds will be just cause for their removal from the grounds.
- 3. No pets allowed on fairgrounds except service animals. No weapons, drugs, outside alcohol, or coolers allowed on fairgrounds.
- 4. Everyone entering the fairgrounds shall be subject to such rules as set by the management. Refusal to follow such rules may result in ejection from the fairgrounds and being barred from entrance to future events.
- 5. The Fair reserves the right to change or cancel any show or event.
- 6. Directors of the Lincoln County Fair shall be ineligible to win door prizes
- 7. No purchase shall be made for the Fair without prior approval. No bill will be paid unless the purchase was previously approved by the Board of Directors or Executive Board if applicable.
- 8. All protests must be made in writing to the secretary or superintendent of the respective department and must state fully and specifically upon what grounds the protest is made. The protest must be accompanied by a \$25 fee, otherwise it will not be considered. If the case in protest is sustained, the fee will be returned.
- 9. Any exhibitor who publicly expresses disapproval of the judge's decision, or who is guilty of conduct unbecoming an exhibitor, will be excluded from all exhibitions, his premiums will be forfeited, and he may be excused from the grounds. Any exhibitor who enters an article and refuses to show, without good cause, may be subject to the same treatment.
- 10. Property of privileged and concessions people or patrons will be taken on the grounds at their own risk and kept in such places as they themselves agree to or provide. The Fair will not be responsible for any loss, damage, or theft of the same. The Fair will not be responsible for failure to perform its part of the contract should officers of the law seize, or prevent any concessionaire or privileged person from operation.
- 11. No privilege or concession granted by the Fair to any privileged person or concessionaire will be construed as granting the right to sell anything or to do anything that is contrary to state or federal law.
- 12. The Fair reserves the right to cancel at any time, for reasons satisfactory to itself, any concession privilege, without reimbursement.
- 13. Right is reserved to inspect at any time any show, concession, booth, stall or animal on the grounds.
- 14. Under no condition will any freight or express charges be paid by the Fair. Articles should not be addressed to the Fair, but to the owner, in care of the Fair.
- 15. All harness races will be held according to the rules and regulations of the United States Trotting Association.
- 16. The Racetrack will be under jurisdiction of race secretary at all times, except during races. The race secretary shall determine whether the track is in proper condition.
- 17. All articles (excluding livestock) exhibited for premiums must be strictly the product of the exhibitor; either grown, made, manufactured, or owned by exhibitor.
- 18. Competent judges will be provided. No one that is entered in a section as an exhibitor will be eligible to judge that section.
- 19. Judges will carefully observe and adhere closely to the specifications and conditions in each case.
- 20. No variation from the premiums listed in the catalog shall be allowed.
- 21. All premiums will be designated by ribbons or cards of the following colors: first prize, blue ribbon; second prize, red ribbon third prize, white ribbon; champion or sweepstakes, purple ribbons.
- 22. In cases where one person makes his own competition, only one cash prize shall be awarded, to be based on the merit of the exhibit, according to the opinion of the judges.
- 23. The name of exhibitor will not be displayed on exhibits until premiums have been awarded.
- 24. Any misrepresentation in connection with any entry, by fact stated or omitted, will render such entry not eligible.
- 25. No animals will be permitted to run at large on the grounds.
- 26. Hitching of animals will be only in spaces designated for this purpose.
- 27. All animals entered for exhibition must be entered in their correct names and in the names of the owners. Certificates of registration shall be required in registered classes.
- 28. No barren or impotent animals shall be exhibited in breeding classes.
- 29. All animals exhibited in competition must be under the control of the exhibitor at all times. Failure to accomplish this will result in the animal being excused from the arena.
- 30. No animal will be allowed to leave the arena after reporting for exhibition, except by permission of the judges.
- 31. All animals or articles exhibited in the arena will be under the immediate charge of the show superintendents and subject to their orders at all times, as well as the orders of the judges.
- 32. Any exhibitor refusing to comply with instructions or requests of superintendent or judges, or refusing to give information required, may be barred from such ring or any other exhibition and the fact made known.
- 33. Should a case occur not covered by these rules, decisions will be based upon the rules of the individual Show to which the class or breed belongs.
- 34. All beef and dairy cattle should be pre-registered by entry form deadline. Registration fee will be doubled if late.
- 35. All livestock must enter grounds through Amana Street gate (back gate) to load and unload at designated area. Free admission for Exhibitor only.





- Goats must be registered by the Myotonic Goat Registry. The ORIGINAL registration certificate MUST accompany the goat during check-in. Kids under three (3) months of age must be registered for any sanctioned classes. No pending registrations will be accepted at check-in.
- 2. MGR Rules to govern and take precedence over all others.
- 3. Any issue not specifically addressed in these rules will be decided solely by the show personnel whose decisions will be final.
- 4. Age eligibility for classes will be determined by date of birth on the registration certificate.
- 5. The full correct registered name of goat must be used on the entry forms.
- 6. The name on the entry form must match the Breeder/Exhibitor name on the Reg. Certificate unless you have a signed transfer application dated 45 days or less from the show date.
- 7. The goat's permanent ID (USDA Scrapie tag, tattoo, or microchip) must be on the Certificate (as recorded by MGR) and registered with MGR.
- 8. Goats must be checked in from 3:00 to 5:00 pm on **Friday, September 15**th or 7:00 to 8:30 am on **Saturday, September 16**th. All animals must enter grounds through the Amana Street entrance (back gate) and unload in designated area. Admission is free for Exhibitor only.
- 9. Goats may arrive Friday after 3:00 pm and will be released immediately after the show.
- 10. Goats may be sold private treaty. All goats sold must be entered in the show.
- 11. All goats MUST have a health certificate dated not earlier than September 2, 2023, with the show address as the destination. Scrapie rules apply. If microchips are used the exhibitor must furnish a reader. Tattoos must be legible. Scrapie tags are acceptable. An extra copy of the health certificate MUST be provided for retention by the show secretary.
- 12. All Tennessee Health rules shall apply. Goats will be examined on the grounds by show personnel before unloading. Any goat exhibiting signs of disease including open wounds, foot rot, pink eye, sore mouth, abscesses, hair loss associated with mites, healing wounds or lumps will not be admitted.
- 13. All entries must entry from Fair Catalog, www.mytonicgoatregistry.net. Entry forms with entry fees must be received no later than August 26th or will not be accepted. Goats not on original entry form may not be added at the show. Substitutions will be allowed at Check-In within the same class only at no charge.
- 14. Entry fee \$8 per animal per show, including kids in sanctioned classes for Does, Bucks, and Platinum Wethers. No refund of entry fees.
- 15. Pen fee \$8. Pen size is 5' X 5'. Show personnel will assign pens. Feed and equipment must be furnished by the exhibitor. Shavings only. Absolutely no straw allowed.

- 1. No residency requirement (except Lincoln County Residence Race)
- 2. Current negative Coggins papers must accompany all horses admitted to the fairgrounds. Officials will be asking to see Coggins papers. If Coggins papers are not available for inspection you will be required to remove your horse from the fairgrounds. You should have your regular veterinarian draw blood for Coggins testing of your horse at least two weeks before a scheduled event where you will need these papers. A Coggins report is good for one year. Coggins must be original, no faxes.
- 3. Horses do not have to be registered in any registry.
- 4. Entry Fee of \$20.00 per horse (entry) for each race that is entered. (One horse can enter any or all races, but must pay an entry fee in each race entered). One (1) person/horse will be admitted in gate free. No fee for parking.
- 5. Entries in all races must be made by 12:00 NOON DAY OF RACE. Lincoln County Residence Race entries must be in Fair Office on day of race by 12:00 Noon. Anyone else wanting to enter after 12:00 Noon will be charged a late entry fee of \$25.00 and will be assigned to last heat.
- 6. Lincoln County Residence Race will have a flag start and may be divided into heats depending on number of entries. Prize money and entry fee will be same as other races. Any horse in this race cannot run in any other race. This is a ¼ mile race.
- 7. Races will be run in heats with not more than five horses per heat when gate started.
- 8. First and second finishers in each heat will compete to determine the final placing for each distance race.
- 9. A draw will be made by officials to determine heat and starting position for each entry. A rider or family with more than one entry in a particular race can request to split his or their entries into separate heats. A \$10.00 fee will be charged for this request.
- 10. Two false starts by any one horse will be cause for disqualification.
- 11. Five minutes will be allowed between heats and ten minutes between last heat and finals of each race. All entries not at starting position within five minutes after finish of last heat will be disqualified.
- 12. Race order subject to change as determined by the officials depending on the number of heats necessary to run each race. Decision of the officials will be final.
- 13. Prize money will be awarded to first, second, and third place finished in final races.
- 14. A ½ mile mule race will be run last. All mules will start together (flag) with same prize money as above awarded the top three (3) finishes.
- 15. A ½ mile pony race will be run with all ponies starting together with same prize money as above awarded the top three (3) finishes. All ponies must measure 13.5 hands or less and rider must be thirteen (13) years old and under.
- 16. All entries will be required to parade in front of the grandstand immediately before the heat or race to be run.
- 17. A "Dinner Bell Derby" will be run (100 yard dash) for foals that were born in the current year and are not yet weaned. In this race, foals will start approximately 100 yards from the finish line with their mothers waiting at the finish line to greet them. Position in race order for this dash (and if there will be heats and a final race or just a single race will depend on the number of entries) will be announced at approximately 1:30 P.M. on race day. All entry times, fees and prize money are the same as other races. A person to hold the foal (for the start) and a person to hold the mare (at finish line) is required. Winner is first foal to nurse the correct mother.
- 18. Children under 13 years old will be requested, but not required, to wear helmets during races.
- 19. No riding whips or crops allowed.



The Sport In History

Is the sport of harness racing of fairly recent years? Hardly. Evidence exists that men were racing horse to harness more than 3,000 years ago, even with Ben Hur and his chariot competition a fairly modern innovation in comparison.

American harness racing as we know it today, however, is generally conceded to have begun in 1806, when records of sorts began to be kept and a gelding by the name of Yankee trotted a mile in less than three minutes for the first time.

The breed itself (trotters and pacers are called Standardbreds) got its greatest shot in the arm in 1788, when a grey Thoroughbred called Messenger arrived in America from England to become the patriarch of a family of fine trotting horses that included a descendant named Hambletonian.

Hambletonian, owned by William Rysdyk of Chester, New York, rarely raced, but quickly proved himself to be history's greatest progenitor of gait and speed.

Today, with more than 470 racing meetings offered annually in the United States—from the small country fair to the giant tracks of New York City—pacers far outnumber trotters, with purists in the sport concerned about the preservation of the trotting gait.

While the entire sport of Standardbred racing has been threatened in recent years by factors such Off-Track Betting, all-sports wagering, lotteries, and casino gambling, it has thus far remained a vibrant, colorful, exciting part of American life.







The Fairs

All the Standardbred racing offered in North America is not transpiring at the scores of brightly lighted pari-mutuel tracks spread across the land.

Harness racing is also very much alive and doing very well at the fairs, thank you.

The U.S. Trotting Association services some 400 fairs that offer harness racing, with the list including big and booming state exhibitions in Illinois, Indiana and New York. Some three million fans witness harness racing in the hot afternoons of summer.

Few of the fairs offer mutuel wagering, but almost all are

rich in ferris wheels, multi-colored tents, hot dog stands, side shows, exhibition halls, produce and livestock displays, and balloon vendors. Taken as a whole, fairs offer a cornucopia of sights and sounds, with harness racing—another distinct touch of Americana—adding spice to the entire production.

The nation's most prestigious Standardbred pacing race—The Little Brown Jug—is contested annually at the Delaware County Fair in Ohio. It lures crowds of nearly 50,000 each year.

Harness racing means fun and excitement wherever it is held, but there are few more pleasant experiences than sitting in the grandstand of a country fair on a warm, summer afternoon while trotters and pacers strut their stuff on the track below.

Harness Racing Lingo



Weanling/Yearling: All horses are considered weanlings from the time they are taken from their mothers until reaching their first birthday on January 1 (all horses celebrate their birthday on January 1, regardless of when they were born). A horse is called a yearling from the time he reaches age one until age two.

Colt/Horse: A male horse is considered a colt until he reaches his fourth birthday, when he becomes a horse.

Filly/Mare: A female horse is called a filly until she reaches her fourth birthday, when she becomes a mare.

Stallion: A male horse generally retired from racing that stands at stud at a breeding farm.

Dam: A mother of horses.

Green Horse: A horse that has not raced, or has raced only a few times.

Stretch: The last eighth-mile before the finish line of a given race track.

Covered Up: A horse in a race is covered up when he has other horses in front of him.

Break: Occurs when a trotter or pacer goes off his gait and resorts to galloping.

Jogging: Slow, steady tours of a race track or training track, much as a human jogs.

Choked Down: Occurs when a trainer or driver attempts to restrain or rate a horse and the animal's breathing is inadvertently cut off. The horse "blacks out" and often falls.

Boxed In: Surrounded by horses in front, behind and to the side of him, the horse is pinned to the hub rail.

Scoring: The brief warm-up sprints taken by horses between the post parade and the time they approach the starting gate.

Brush: The brief peak or peaks of speed reached by a horse

in a race or training mile. Drivers like to preserve a horse's brush for the stretch drive.

Heat: One competitive mile in a race which requires two or more mile dashes to decide.

Maiden: Any horse, female or male, that has never won a race which carries a purse.

Lapped On: A horse is said to be lapped on another at the wire when its nose is at least opposite the hindquarters of the horse ahead.

Parked Out: A trotter or pacer is parked out when the positions of his rivals prevent him from reaching the rail. A horse forced to race on the outside must travel a longer distance and rarely manages to win.

Garden Spot: A horse racing in second position on the rail is said to have the garden spot, since the horse ahead of him is cutting the wind, yet he is close enough to the front to make a strong bid in the stretch.

Claiming Race: A contest where any horse in the field may be purchased by an authorized person or persons who must file a claiming slip and deposit a check before the race goes to post.

Blowing Out: A fairly fast training mile generally two days before a horse is scheduled to race.

Cooling Out: Walking a horse after a race or training mile until his body signs return to normal.

Morning Line: The probable odds on each horse in a race as calculated by an experienced track handicapper.

Handle: The total amount of money waged on a race, a nightly racing program or an entire season.

Punter: Someone who bets on the horses.

Shut Out: Arriving at a betting window after the wagering has closed.

Frequently Asked Questions





How fast is a harness horse?

Races usually are contested at speeds averaging 25-30 miles per hour for the mile distance. When leaving the starting gate, speeds close to 35 miles an hour are reached by top horses.

What causes horses to break stride?

Several factors can cause breaks. A horse may be going too fast to maintain his gait. He may be tired. He may be interfered with. He may also be lame.

Why do drivers sometimes hold their horses back?

If a horse can go a mile in 2:05 and no more, a driver may pull back on him to "rate" him if the pace is too fast. Coming down the stretch, a driver may hold firmly to the lines to prevent a tired horse from breaking.

Does a driver's weight make a difference in driving?

For years the experts have been saying no, except under muddy conditions. Some observers have noticed, however, that a majority of the sport's leading drivers have tended to be on the small and light side.



Is it better for a horse to race along the rail?

Definitely. Mathematicians have figured that a horse racing five feet from the rail will travel 62 feet farther than the horse at the rail at the mile distance over a half-mile track.

Is driving dangerous?

A certain amount of danger is inherent in any activity that combines great speed and split second timing in decision. Harness racing contains both speed and the need for quick decisions.

Why do some horses have their legs bandaged?

For the same reason that human athletes frequently wear tape and other bandages to help support their legs and provide protection.

What is the colored roll worn on the face of some horses?

That's a shadow roll, a large sheepskin type roll worn across the face, just below the eyes. It cuts off the horse's view of the track so he won't shy at shadows, pieces of paper or other objects.



- 1980 and newer stock automobiles. NO hearses
- Engine, transmission and rear end must match the make of the car (Ford to Ford) (GM to GM)
- 5 Jug rear ends only. No bracing. No aftermarket axles. No welding other than spider gears to make positive traction
- · No aftermarket transmission coolers.
- · You may run aftermarket shifter, gas pedal and brake pedal as long as it doesn't not strengthen the car. No slider drive shafts.
- All suspension must stay factory to that make/model. IE: no A Arm swaps, and no watts conversion. Balljoints and tie rods
 must be factory.
- Fuel tank and battery must be moved inside car body. You may cut the firewall out for clearance issues but don't remove transmission tunnel.
- At minimum, a back seat bar, extending from driver to passenger side of car Is mandatory! Although you can have a 4 point
 cage, door bars are to be no bigger than 2x6 tubing and only 60" long. Cage should be 6 inches off of any floor pan, firewall
 or trans tunnel. Roll over bar allowed, connected to cage bars only. No drop legs off cage. Floating Gas tank mount, if used,
 must be 4 inches from package tray sheet metal.
- Any year factory bumpers are allowed. No fabricated or loaded bumpers. No adding metal or welding on bumpers other than
 mounting to car. Bumpers can be welded on but must use factory mounting plate. Oem bumper shocks in factory orientation
 only.
- Doors may be chained or wired in 3 locations per vertical seam. Chain or wire cant go around frame.
- No bead locks or solid tires. All other wheel and tire combos are ok.
- You must have a 12x12 hole cut in the hood. 4 bolts allowed at hood cut out hole.
- · Cars must have freely moving suspension in front and rear.
- · You can cut as much as you want on the body of the car, just cant add back. No added bolts allowed in fenders.
- The two body bolts at core support can be changed out with 1/2" bolts. Nut and bolt only, no welding. Factory bushing must remain. 3" max washer size. This is used to bolt core support to frame only, not to be mistaken for threaded rod that protrudes through hood. No other body bolts should be touched!!
- No patch plates for pre ran or fresh cars.
- Hood can be fastened in 6 spots, with chain, wire or with single 3/8 bolts through sheet metal only. Trunk can be fastened in 4 spots with same options as hood.
- Engine cradles not allowed, factory motor mounts only. One chain per side can be used to help secure engine.
- Stock transmission, stock mount and stock cross member.
- Front windshield bar car be added for driver safety. No back window bar.
- No tilting, pitching, or cold bending allowed on frame.
- · No wire, chain or anything around the frame or body or through the frame or body.
- No creasing or pre bending of any body panels. Hood and trunk must be open during inspection
- · No welding on anything besides cage and bumper mounting





Demolition Derby Rules

Driver Eligibility and Entry Requirements • September 23, 2023

2023 Dixon Stock Rules

DO NOT READ ANYTHING INTO THESE RULES, JUST READ THE RULES!! IF IT DOESN'T SAY YOU CAN, YOU CAN'T!

- Or you will be loaded, your choice!
- NO black cars, dark cars must have contrasting letter/numbers.
- DO NOT paint anywhere on suspension or frame, we will not even inspect your car.
- Remove all glass mirrors and plastic.
- Remove all decking in wagons.
- All Drivers must pick up trophies, earnings at the completion of the event, or forfeit them. They will not be available after that date.
- There is no working on or storing cars in the camping area. All cars will be worked on and kept in the pit area. No work will be performed on cars in an enclosed tent or enclosure of any kind. Pop up tents are welcome with max of 2 sides.

COMPETITION RULES:

- Drivers must remain in the vehicle with helmet, seat belt, eye protection and steering wheel on until notified by an official that it is safe to exit the vehicle.
- Driver's door hits are illegal. If the hit is deemed by the official to be careless or intentional, you will be disqualified. If you use your driver's door as a defense, we will not enforce the rules. If you use the door defense repeatedly you will be disqualified.
- · No hot rodding in the pits. Keep it at an idle
- Any open door will be cause for disqualification, you are allowed one fire, and then second fire will be cause for disqualification. You may return in later rounds.
- Sandbagging is not tolerated and will be strictly enforced. Locking up the brakes prior to a hit for anything other than a driver's door will be a cause for disqualification. The fans pay to see a show, put one on for them! You must make AGGRESSIVE HIT every 60 seconds. You will be given ample time for restarts. We do not use the clock exclusively. We try to work with you if you are hung up. Hitters get more time than sandbaggers. This is not a team event; team driving will not be tolerated. THERE IS NO ALCOHOL IN THE PITS. This includes pit crews. If you or ANY of your crew is caught with alcohol, you will be disqualified.
- Any questions, CALL FIRST. Don't assume anything. The Officials decision is final.

RODY.

- No Sedagon, ZERO crease enhancement, ZERO sheet metal or frame shaping, forming or folding. Deck and Hood must be 100% in stock location and open for inspection. After inspection you may tuck trunk to the floor with one single 90* bend.
- Wagons ONLY if you remove your tail gate may have 6 places of wire 2 strands max must be behind axle sheet metal to sheet metal only roof to floor.
- Anything can be removed, NOTHING can be added. All cars competing must have a hood on at all times to run.
- Fasten trunks, hoods, tail gates in 6 places, 2 strands of #9 wire (Sheet metal to sheet metal only) or 6 locations using ½ bolts with store bought washers through the drip rail in the trunk. You may also use angle no longer than 2" long and a single ½" bolt to hold hoods shut.
- Door seams may have no more than 6" of weld, vertical seam only. Drivers door may be welded 12 inches total on vertical seams only. 2" x 1/4" strap. **BODY MOUNTS:**
- You may have up to a 6" core support spacer (it may not be welded if metal)
- If you choose to change your core support mounts with 2 of your threaded rods, you get 3 plates 1/4x 5"x 5" max, 7-5/8 nuts, 7-3" 0D max 1/8 thick washers per threaded rod CORE SUPPORT ONLY. If core support bolts are changed, this will count for 2 of your 6 mounts.
- Body mounts and spacers to remain stock and in place. DO NOT EVEN TOUCH THEM! Exception, You may change a total of 6 body bolts out, with 5/8 & 30 long threaded rod max with 3 nuts, 3-5/8 store bought washers and 3-5"x5" 1/4" thick plates per rod. Must be straight vertical rod only, no bends or angle pieces. Must have 1 inch rubber or metal spacer no larger than stock body pucks and all bottom nuts must be inside frame. If they are broken or rusted out, a single piece #9 wire may be substituted. ZERO welding allowed to mount this rod. Rusted out body bolts may be removed and replaced with a single strand of #9 wire.
- No attaching body bolts to any part of the cage/roll over bar.
- #9 wire or chain required in front windshield.

FRAMES

- You may dimple your rear frame rails only to achieve the frame to roll
- NO welding, bolting, wiring or adding any material/substance to strengthen frames. -At Inspectors discretion frames will be drilled, wire wheeled or wiped down. Absolutely not painting or spraying any material on frames or welds. Cars will not be inspected.
- No cold bending frames at all!! All frames will be checked with a straight edge.
- All cars get 4 4x4 x 1/4 patch plates
- Can wire in 4 locations frame to cage with #9 wire

SUSPENSION and STEERING:

- You may weld 2 straps per upper A-Arm 2"x2" to maintain ride height.
- You may change coil springs to a stiffer OEM passenger car spring.
- You may use store bought spring spacers (no homemade spacers or spacers on top of the springs)
- You may use a single strand #9 wire to hold coil spring to rear end. Leaf spring cars may use 4 single strands #9 wire as leaf clamps per spring stack.
- All suspension and steering must remain stock (unless a modification is stated).
- Aftermarket steering columns and shafts are allowed. These components may not strength car in any way at anytime.
- Tie rods maybe reinforced in only 1 of the following 2 ways; 1) sleeve maybe discarded and pipe/solid rod tapped can be put in its place. 2) Factory sleeve and ends maybe welded and reinforced with steel. Tie rod ends must be factory ends and fit the spindle and drag link without reaming the holes larger. A store bought washer maybe placed over the steam of the tie rod and welded.
- Upper A arms maybe interchanged as long as there able to be bolted on. You may cut/ trim to make fit but no welding on brackets etc. A arm must bolt on factory brackets of frame, no drilling new holes or enlarging existing holes. Example: 80-91 box ford a arms being installed on a 98-02. Cut the mounting bar

out and trim the edges of a arms to get height.

- Rear control arms may be changed but must be stock. You may shorten but max 2" overlap.
- •98 up watt links conversion will be allowed only in the following way!! Upper trailing arm brackets must be bolted in. They must be 2 separate brackets, may not be larger than 6"x 12"x 3/8" thick max. 4-5/8 bolts, nuts and 8 washers per bracket. Brackets may only be bolted to tow package and bolts may not stick thru body. Brackets may not strength frame or body. NO WELDING AT ALL OF UPPER BRACKETS. 98 up watt links LOWER BRACKET Conversion. Only 1 way will be allowed to mount lower trailing arm bracket. 1 piece of square tube 3"x 3"x 3/8"x 3" long max per side of frame maybe used. Cut the square tube to make a C channel. It must be welded to the inboard of the frame at the point you want your trailing arm mounted. Drill your hole thru the tube and only 1 thickness of the frame. Bolt your arm into place. No other bolts will be allowed to mount this bracket. No factory mounting brackets will be allowed to mount the trailing arms. DRIVETRAIN:
- ANY drive train & Days transmission (manual transmissions allowed, no aftermarket bell housings, no trans brace, no mid plates, OEM transmission case only)
- You may run a basic front plate and lower engine cradle with pulley protector, but it must be mounted to the car with OEM style mounts.
- · No engine chains, unless approved with pictures.

REAR AXLE:

- Any axle but must be hung with factory type control arms
- · Rear end brace will be allowed
- · Pinion brake is ok
- You may run 3/8 chain around rear end back to the frame with only each end of the chain welded back to the frame for ride height control. Any extra chain links or weld on the frame will cause you to run working suspension.

DRIVERS COMPARTMENT:

- 4 point square cage only, (1) down tube in the center of each front door welded to sheet metal only nothing to the frame. max 60 inch cage over all measurement. 6 inch max, Must be mounted horizontally and 6 inches off floor. Gussets only in interior of 4 point cage.
- Gas tank mount may be welded to back bar, but bar and fuel cell/tank must be 4 inches from rear sheet metal. See below for mounting fuel tank/ cell to floor.
- Halo bar allowed is allowed, 2-1/2 bolts with 1/2 washers to attach to roof. The halo bar may only be attached to the back seat bar or sidebars, not to floor.
- Drivers door must be padded.
- Gas tank and batteries must be moved and secured. Tank behind the seat, Battery centered in the passenger front floor.
- Nothing may be mounted in a way that strengthens the car.
- Trans coolers allowed. Must be mounted inside 4 point cage area. Or on cage must be tight to cage if mounted on back bar.

BUMPERS:

- · You may hardnose front and rear bumpers if desired, but no shortening rear frame. Follow rules below if using a shock.
- You may weld on any DI approved bumper(see below). Bumper brackets (in factory location) maybe weld continuously to frame 4 inches from the back of bumper only. In addition you may put 4 one inch welds on back side of bumper bracket or to weld shock inside frame(example Crown Vics).
- You may shorten 80 and newer fords up to an inch in front of the core support mount you may also be hard nosed.
- Call with special cars to mount bumper legally. Rear brackets on rear and front brackets on front. Or you may chain, 2 piece of chain per side BOLTED from the mount to mount to hold on the bumper.
- Bumper height must be 16" to 22" measured to the bottom of the frame at the back and front body mount location.
- Bumper may not exceed 9"x 9". BUMPERS are interchangeable for all cars. -IF you start with a stock/replacement bumper you are allowed to re-enforce inside of bumper.
- Bumper must appear stock from the stands with no spike or protruding items.
- If your bumper will not fit in a factory skin, it is too big.
- You may weld the outer chrome skin to the bumper inner frame Bumpers may be cut to keep them out of the tires/ no sharp ends. Bumpers may be flipped (upside down).

TIRES and BRAKES:


- No tires taller than 30 & 4 wheels max per car. No dual tires. No split rims, studded tires or 100% solid wheels, you may use aftermarket center with various bolt patterns, solid centers are fine. Welds must be approved by judges on rear tires. Stay off the area of the rim the tube touches, except to weld your center into the rim.
- Valve stem protectors allowed, Valve stem protectors may not extend more than 6 inches from valve stem. Not allowed to be a rim protector. -Inner bead locks must not extend past stock tire bead area, not to exceed 2 inches wide. 1 inch outer lip ring allowed on outside bead.
- Doubled or foam filled tires allowed. All cars must be able to demonstrate the ability to stop at any time. If your brakes do not work, you will not compete.
- You may not change tires after inspection, ride height will be measured with your competition tires only.
- Simple rules, simple build, keep it that way. Again do not get " creative" or read into these rules, let's get back to the basics. If it is not clearly described above, it is not allowed. If it doesn't say you can, YOU CAN'T!!

INSPECTION PROCEDURES:

- Official's decisions are final.
- You will be given one (1) opportunity to correct items on your car.
- Each car gets a maximum of 2 times thru inspection. (One reinspect)
- Cars will be impounded after inspection and staged in a secure location.
- You must be completely ready to bolt the hood down during inspection and then put the car in the staging area.
- No further work will be allowed and cars will not be allowed to return to their trailers.
- Do not come to the inspection line if you are not done preparing your car.
- Any added or welded metal plate/rod or material not specifically covered in the rules, will be removed completely as well as the surrounding metal. Don't do it or your car will be weakened! Call ahead!

** Don't look for gray areas and don't get creative, call with questions to save on arguing during inspection.






Enclosed is a summary of Tennessee Fair Regulations - health requirements for livestock at fairs and exhibitions.

Special Comments:

- It is expected that all exhibitors will bring only healthy animals to fairs and exhibitions. Although state and federal
 animal health officials will be performing some inspections, fair officials are responsible for ensuring that all animals
 entering fairs for exhibition are in overall good health and are accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
 Animals showing clinical signs of contagious disease should be sent home immediately. Violations should be
 reported to the state veterinarian or his agent.
- 2. Certificate(s) of Veterinary Inspection are to accompany all animal(s) to the respective shows with the exception of in-state Tennessee equine and poultry. In-state Tennessee equine six (6) months of age and older must have a negative Equine Infectious Anemia test within the preceding twelve (12) months. Poultry assembled at shows or exhibitions should be accompanied by evidence of a negative test for Pullorum-Typhoid within 90 days, or be tested on-site prior to exhibition following strict biosecurity procedures, or originate directly from a flock which has been certified as Pullorum-Typhoid Clean under the Tennessee Poultry Improvement Plan. As part of increased awareness and surveillance for Avian Influenza and other poultry diseases, all bird's physical appearance should be assessed at the time testing is conducted.
- 3. Health certificates issued in satisfaction of these Tennessee Fair Regulations shall be good for **90** days for Tennessee livestock only.
- 4. Please note that exhibition requirements for out-of-state livestock are the same as regular import requirements.
- 5. Warts and ringworm are considered contagious and infectious diseases and are permissible exclusions only if considered inactive by the issuing veterinarian and noted as such on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- 6. Scabies, contagious ecthyma (soremouth), footrot, cutaneous fungal and bacterial infections (i.e. club lamb disease, caseous lymphadenitis) are considered contagious and infectious diseases, and are permissible exclusions only if considered inactive by the issuing veterinarian and noted as such on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- 7. Avian Influenza <u>All out-of-state poultry</u> must originate directly from a Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock and a H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock, or be accompanied by evidence of a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within ninety (90) days and a negative official Avian Influenza test within twenty-one (21) days.

Also, please note that if highly pathogenic Avian Influenza is detected in Tennessee or a neighboring state, the commingling of poultry at fairs and exhibitions may be suspended.

Fair Biosecurity

Below is a summary of recommendations for fair management by the National Assembly of State Animal Health Officials and the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians to better protect fair attendees from disease:

- o Provide easy access to hand washing stations.
- o Post informational signage that includes the following messages:
 - No eating or drinking in the animal areas.
 - Wash hands frequently.
 - No pacifiers, sipping cups or strollers in the animal exhibition areas.
 - Discourage sleeping in the animal exhibition areas.
 - If human or swine influenza-like-illness is associated with the exhibition, animal health and public health officials should be notified immediately.
 - People who have influenza-like illness should leave the exhibition immediately and seek medical care. They should advise their health care provider about their fair attendance.
 - People at high risk for developing severe complications from influenza should limit their exposure to swine.

Also, be aware of the potential exposure of fair attendees to E. coli 0157 from animals exhibited on the fairgrounds.

Please retain this material for reference during the 2023 fair season.

SUMMARY: LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR FAIRS AND EXHIBITIONS

I. GENERAL:

- A. All stalls, pens, chutes, etc. located on the grounds of fairs and exhibitions shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected with a disinfectant approved by USDA, APHIS between each scheduled fair or exhibition.
- B. All livestock (except poultry and equine) which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent identification. Certificates for this purpose shall be valid for ninety (90) days from date of issue. (Tennessee livestock only out-of-state certificates are valid for thirty (30) days from the date of issue)
- C. No animal showing clinical signs of infectious or communicable disease shall be allowed to enter or remain on premises of fairs or exhibitions. It shall be the responsibility of the manager of each event to assure prompt removal of such animals.

II. LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY ORIGINATING WITHIN THE STATE OF TENNESSEE [Certificates of Veterinary Inspection Valid for a Period of Ninety (90) Days]

A. SWINE:

All swine which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent identification or sufficient description to identify each animal.

B. CATTLE:

All cattle which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent, official identification.

C. POULTRY:

- (1) Sponsors of poultry shows or exhibitions shall notify the Tennessee Department of Agriculture at least thirty (30) days prior to show or exhibition.
- (2) Poultry found not to be in apparent good health shall be removed immediately from any show or exhibition.

D. HORSES & OTHER EQUIDAE:

Horses and other Equidae six (6) months of age and older must have a negative Equine Infectious Anemia test within the preceding twelve (12) months.

E. SHEEP

- (1) All sheep imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (2) All sheep that move within the state, with the exception of wethers under the age of 18 months that are produced for slaughter only, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

F. GOATS

- (1) Goats imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (2) Goats imported into Tennessee for immediate slaughter to an approved slaughter establishment or to an approved livestock market for sale to a slaughter establishment shall only be required to have a transportation document and be in compliance with Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (3) All registered breeding goats, goats that have been commingled with sheep, goats for exhibition and dairy goats that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- G. CAMELIDS: Camelids must have an official veterinary health certificate as provided in Rule 0080-2-3-.01 (1).
- H. CAPTIVE CERVIDAE: Captive Cervidae must have an official veterinary health certificate as provided in Rule 0080-2-3-.01 (1).

III LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY ORIGINATING OUTSIDE THE STATE OF TENNESSEE

Livestock and Poultry entering fairs and exhibitions from areas outside the State of Tennessee shall be subject to current Tennessee import requirements. Please contact the state veterinarian's office regarding questions or recent changes to these rules. These interstate requirements are summarized as follows:

A. ALL SPECIES (except poultry):

Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection valid for thirty (30) days and individual permanent official identification, except for equine. Equine must have sufficient description to identify the animal.

B. CATTLE:

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and additional requirements as follows:

- (1) Tuberculosis: No requirements except for cattle originating from regions not considered free of tuberculosis.
- (2) Brucellosis: No requirements except for cattle originating from regions not considered free of brucellosis.

 Test eligible cattle Intact male or female cattle eighteen (18) months or older. (Vaccinates and non-vaccinates)

C. SWINE:

No testing requirements for swine unless originating from a region not considered free of Brucellosis and Pseudorabies.

D. HORSES AND OTHER EQUINES:

Animals six (6) months of age or older - negative equine infectious anemia (Swamp Fever) test within twelve (12) months.

E. POULTRY:

Originate directly from a Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock and an H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock, or be accompanied by evidence of a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within ninety (90) days and a negative Avian Influenza test within twenty-one (21) days.

F. SHEEP

- (1) All sheep imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (2) All sheep that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

G. GOATS

- (1) Goats imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (2) Goats imported into Tennessee for immediate slaughter to an approved slaughter establishment or to an approved livestock market for sale to a slaughter establishment shall only be required to have a transportation document and be in compliance with Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (3) All registered breeding goats, goats that have been commingled with sheep, goats for exhibition and dairy goats that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- H. CAMELIDAE: Same requirements as for cattle.

I. CERVIDAE:

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and additional requirements as follows:

- (1) Brucellosis: Same requirements as for cattle.
- (2) Tuberculosis:
 - (a) All cervidae shall originate in herds which have had a negative herd test for tuberculosis within twelve (12) months with a USDA approved single cervical test and individual imported animals shall be negative to the single cervical test within thirty (30) days of entry; or
 - (b) Animals not originating in tested herds as described above must test negative to two (2) single cervical tests at least ninety (90) days apart, the second test conducted not more than thirty (30) days prior to entry.

NOTE: (Contact an accredited veterinarian for further details of import rules).

IV Fair association or exhibition or management shall inform exhibitors of the rules of this chapter, and shall notify the State Veterinarian or his agent of any violations. Exhibitors shall present evidence of compliance with this chapter to the State Veterinarian or his agent upon request.

These rules constitute a minimum legal standard and in no way restrict the right of fair and exhibition managers to establish additional or more stringent requirements.



- 1. Open to all owners and breeders of Ayrshire, Guernsey, Holstein, Brown Swiss, Jersey, and Milking Shorthorn.

- 8. Absolutely no straw allowed.
- 9. All animals must be exhibited by competent handler. Youth exhibits must be exhibited by the registered owner. No ring assistance unless approved by judge or superintendent.
- 10. Herdsman Award: This will be awarded to the individual keeping the cleanest and neatest exhibit, observance of all rules and regulations, and cooperation with Fair Officials and Exhibitors.
- 11. No exhibitors will be allowed to have more than two monies in any one class, but may have as many entries in a class as desired.
- 12. Any concerns in regard to the show rules need to be addressed to the barn superintendent prior to the

4-H Participants may enter 2 items. Pre-4H may only enter one item. *Appropriate construction methods should be used for member's age and skill level.

*Judging will be on a grade-level basis with consideration given to the following points:

(The Clover Collection Score Sheet will be used)

- a. Appearance of Model (20 points)
- b. Outfit on model (40 points)
- c. Construction as it affects appearance (30 points)
- d. Knowledge of subject matter (10 points)

Premiums are: 1st \$50, 2nd \$30, 3rd \$20, and all other credible entries \$10.

Description should be written before contest begins at least by 11:30 A.M. *Description should be well-written, complete with a note on any special construction details or fabric choices. (Hint: pattern envelopes can provide assistance.)

Section 1

Divisions

Judging will be by grade level cluster. Remember that all garments in the outfit must be constructed by the 4-H member, with the exception of Lot 1.

- Class 1: Pre-4H any clothing item or accessory (Pre-K through 3rd grade)
- **Class 2:** Beginning Sewing grades 4 & 5- Elastic Waist garment: skirts, pants, or shorts with elastic in the waistband
- **Class 3:** Beginning Sewing grades 6-12 Complete ensemble which includes pants or shorts and skirt, and top, simple dress, etc.
- Class 4: School Wear grades 4-7 Complete ensemble which includes pants, skirt, jeans, khakis, capri pants, or knee-length shorts with shirts or tops, or a casual dress, etc.
- **Class 5:** Best Wear grades 4-7 Complete ensemble which includes nicer dress, suit, or other dressy coordinating pieces
- Class 6: School Wear grades 8-12 Complete ensemble which includes pants, skirt, jeans, khakis, capri pants or knee-length shorts with shirts or tops, or a casual dress, etc.
- **Class 7:** Best Wear grades 8-12 Complete ensemble which includes nicer dress, suit, or other dressy coordinating pieces

- Class 8: Formal Wear grades 8-12 Formal (long) or semiformal (shorter lengths) prom-type or party dresses or formal suits
- Class 9: Accessory grades 4-12 Any sewn accessory including belt, scarf, purse, wallet, backpack, travel kit or bag, headband, hat, tie or bowtie, apron, or other
- Class 10: Costume grades 4-12 Any garments considered a historic costume, cosplay ensemble or another costume
- Class 11: Upcycled Garment grades 4-12 This category includes "New" garments created by significantly altering original garments or other fabric items. Sewing by machine or hand must be part of the alteration process, but other techniques may also be included.
