City Hall Ponders the Future of Tiscornia Park

What's the future of St. Joseph's Tiscornia Park—the city's 'other' beach, the one that's sometimes not crowded and has a more 'natural' feel to it? Is 'improvement' in Tiscornia's future? Or, is it more about 'preservation'? These are questions that are wrapped up in consideration of 'master plans' for all the City's parks that are under discussion at several levels of city government.

Our colleague, WSJM News Director Ken Lundberg has been talking to city officials and residents about Tiscornia Park, and shared this in-depth report with MoodyOnTheMarket.com:

When locals think of Tiscornia Park, they often refer to it as a family beach and the area's last remaining hidden gem of beach access whose character hasn't changed significantly since the 1970s. Tiscornia's 16-acres of natural dunes and wildlife are an attractive resting place for migrating birds, butterflies, and the occasional family of deer. It doesn't include the same traits that come with the large crowds regularly seen at Silver Beach and it offers easy access to the North Pier Lighthouse.

Tiscornia has a relatively modest parking area (130 spaces), a humble picnic venue with a million-dollar view of the lake (the structure was donated by the local Lions Club), and park visitors are just a dune's climb away from the beach.

Except for a few Saturdays during the peak of summer, beachgoers will often find easy parking and access to the beach and pier and little in the way of raucous activity. **Concerns Over Change**

The qualities of what Tiscornia Park is today and what people will find in the future are up for debate. What's there now could change when a new Tiscornia Master Plan recommendation is presented to the members of the St. Joseph City Commission, as early as late August/early September. With the approval of the city commission, the Parks Advisory Board has been developing a master plan for Tiscornia and proposed recommendations call on the city to budget for a larger parking lot; a new, higher capacity gathering pavilion; a maintenance shed; a paved nature

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It's a Guideline, Not a Rule

Dave Says

Dear Dave,

Is there any flexibility in your rule about not spending more than 25% of your takehome pay on rent or monthly mortgage payments? I live downtown in Washington, D.C., and I'm finding it's pretty hard to do here. I make about \$90,000 a year, but I'm spending a little over \$2,000 a month in rent. Rent is my largest expense by far, and I don't spend a lot of other money, so I'm still able to save a little and do other things. Can you give me your opinion about this approach? - Tanner

Dear Tanner,

True, I advise people to spend no more than 25% of their take-home pay on housing. Math still works in every city and state in the country. You don't get a pass on math just because you live in Washington, D.C., even though Congress and a lot of other people there think you do.

But there's really nothing magical about 25%. The purpose behind it is, I don't want you to be house poor. If you find yourself still able to save and invest because you keep other financial aspects of your lifestyle so low, then you're okay. The problem with most people starts when they've got a high cost

of housing, and those payments put a real squeeze on their budgets. It doesn't leave them enough room to save up to buy the next car, so that car becomes debt. The same thing happens with Christmas and vacations and everything else. They don't have enough extra money to save for things because a huge chunk of their income is flying out the door every month wrapped up in rent or a house payment.

Now, you're telling me your situation works for you because you've made room in your budget and live a very frugal lifestyle by choice. That's cool. I'm not mad at you about that. But here's the thing: Whatever you spend on rent disappears. And the more money you burn, the less you've got on hand for other things.

I'm not exactly sure how you adjust that in your situation. Maybe you move outside the city and commute, or perhaps you add a roommate into the equation. Or, maybe you're fine with how things are and that's the way you want to live. That's okay too. But my reasoning behind the 25% figure—which is actually more of a guideline than a rule—is so you don't become house poor. I want you to be able to save, invest and give generously. Plus, I want you to own your own home one day.

And you won't be able to do that if everything you make is going toward big payments! - Dave



path; boundary markers; and an area for food trucks.

One indication of the negative response to the draft plan, lapel buttons have started proliferating around town with green letters on a white background that simply state Keep Tiscornia Natural. Area residents are upset that the character of the park would change significantly under the Parks Advisory Board proposal and they're wondering what's driving the city to consider the projects. Further, they're wondering who will pay for the costly additions.

Public Testimony

A special public meeting to take testimony on the matter was held June 8. Dozens of people turned out from the greater St. Joe area. While there is broad support for minor updates like providing Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant access and hiding the beach-cleanup dumpster, every person testifying expressed opposition to the rest of the draft plans.

Among those testifying was Thomas Steele of Shoreham, who said he speaks for hundreds of bird watchers.

"Birders throughout Berrien County and St. Joseph treasure Tiscornia. It's probably well-known throughout the country as a hotspot for migratory birds. Any disruption of the natural environment there, it's going to cause (that to) diminish the migratory use," said Steele.

"No one wants this. I haven't talked to anyone that said, 'I can't wait till they redo the pavilion," said St. Joseph resident Mike Wilson. "The only woman that I talked to in depth (about the proposal) said, 'If they want to spend some money, fix the bathrooms. The bathrooms were horrible in the eighties."

Leading much of the Tiscornia neighborhood opposition effort is Carol Vondale. Vondale and her husband are retired attorneys who live next to the park.

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"Many of the things they're proposing really aren't necessary," said Vondale. "Why are we spending these extraordinary amounts of money, why are we hiring all these consultants to change a park where there's high satisfaction?

The city hired O'Boyle, Cowell, Blalock & Associates, Inc. (OCBA) out of Kalamazoo to design the master plans for Tiscornia and Paddler parks for \$22,500.

Vondale also raised the question of whether the parks board was sincerely taking citizen concerns into consideration for the plan.

"The city, I think, believes that it can do pretty much whatever it wants to do and I don't believe that it's really listening to the public on this."

Mapping a Plan for the Future

As part of the effort to outline the vision for what Tiscornia should evolve to in the coming years and decades, the City of St. Joseph's Parks Advisory Board, a seven-member volunteer body, has taken inputs from city staff, the landscape consultant (OCBA), and the general public. The outlined improvements have changed from their inception. No longer part of the plan is adding a playground area. Another change is reducing the size of the proposed new pavilion. Still in question are the other recommendations, including the nature path, whether to demolish the existing pavilion, and the location of the maintenance structures.

Parks Advisory Board Chairperson Jeanne Strine said the plan is still in the "tweaking process" and a proposal is expected to be finalized as early as August and submitted to the city commission for approval.

"I've always liked Tiscornia because it is quiet, it is peaceful, it is a place you can put vour feet in the sand. I don't see the changes being made changing that element of this peaceful space in any way, shape, or form," said Strine. "These changes are meant to enhance the property as it exists today and

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keep it fresh and hopefully maintained well with a vision for the future."

Asked about those who say the Parks Advisory Board is not listening to public input, Strine said the Board is doing all it can to let people know they're being heard.

"I sense that there's many people who would feel they've been heard if we completely walked away from this at this point in time, but because it's something that we've been tasked with doing through the city commission's approval, we're doing our job (by) moving forward," said Strine.

Strine said the plan has evolved from the original consultant's recommendation and that it was public input that drove the changes.

"If you could go back and see the (master plan recommendation) boards that were presented in January, the concepts that we're working through now, to make a final recommendation to the consultant to create the final concept, you can see how it has evolved over time."

When All Else Is Said, Quote the Beatles Jim Jeschke, a well-known and well-re-



garded resident of St. Joseph for 77 years, summed up his views by saying the issue was important enough for him to attend and testify just six weeks after he had open-heart surgery. His testimony echoed those who spoke before him asking the Board to reconsider the changes.

"The Beatles even made a song about Tiscornia Beach, 'Let It Be, Let It Be, Let It Be." With that, Jeschke walked away from the podium to a round of extended applause.

The St. Joseph City Commission is expected to consider whether to approve, reject, or request modifications to the master plan proposal as early as this September.

"If Vines Could Talk" focuses on the great wines of Southwest Michigan

As we wind down summer, the alluring aroma of grapes will soon fill the air in Southwest Michigan. Second only to Napa Valley for our agricultural diversity, Michigan Wine, specifically Southwest Michigan Wine, is something that has evolved and developed much like our taste buds do over time. I thought this week I'd introduce you to local wine connoisseur Steve Salisbury, who has launched his own business based on his love and roots in our local wine country.

No stranger to the southwestern Michigan wine industry, in the late 1960s and 1970s his family were among the pioneers in growing French hybrid and French Vinifera vines in the soils of Berrien County. His father was the first to plant vinifera - Chardonnay - in southwest Michigan in 1968 just before Len Olson established the first commercial Chardonnay vineyard at Tabor Hill in 1969.

Growing up neighboring Len, he and Steve's dad collaborated frequently; they discussed soil types, vines and root stocks, canopy care, fertilizing, harvesting, and of course wine making. At their peak, the Salisbury's had over 15 acres of vines on their property, but they never made wine commercially. Most of the juice grapes were sold to processors while the wine grapes were sold to the local trendsetters who were home winemakers.

It should come as no surprise that Steve's first job in high school was at Tabor Hill, starting out cleaning barrels and tanks before eventually moving to the bottling line, and ultimately to the tasting room where he conducted tours and tastings. After Tabor Hill, Steve moved to the now defunct Banholzer Winecellars, just across the border in Indiana, south of Three Oaks. In his two years there, he was the cellar master and assistant winemaker. In 1976 his Rose' won first place in the Indiana wine competition.

With the foreboding economy of the late 1970s, Steve decided to exit the wine industry and opt for a more secure future working in corporate America. He spent 30 years at Whirlpool Corporation before moving to business consulting where he worked for another 15 years before entering semi-retirement. With more free time on his hands Steve decided to go back to his roots. Recognizing that Michigan makes great wine and that it is also underappreciated on the world stage, he began doing more to promote that which he saw start 50 years earlier.

In early 2021 Steve won his WSET Level Two award in wine and began "If Vines Could Talk." His social media presence was devoted to writing reviews of wines from all over the world, but with a specific focus on Michigan, and in particular The Lake Michigan Shore AVA which encompasses most of Southwestern Michigan.

Leading up to this, Steve followed the wine industry in Michigan, and developed relationships with winemakers in the Baroda and Berrien Springs area. This served as a launchpad for him to have conversations with local wineries, winemakers, and owners which provided deeper content for his social media wine reviews.

Recently, Steve expanded the footprint of If Vines could Talk by offering a weekly podcast focused on Michigan and the Lake Michigan shore wine regions. New episodes are released every Thursday. Be sure to listen in to learn more about why Michigan is an up-and-coming wine region. The podcast is available on all major podcast platforms

Steve has also partnered with Local Pour of Sawyer to provide private wine tastings. These can be family events, group gatherings, or events for business meetings. You can select and purchase a variety of packages with Steve's assistance, and then he will attend your event with everything needed to provide a well curated wine tasting event. In a recent interview with Steve, I asked him why this is so important to him. "Michigan makes wine that easily competes on the world stage. I hope that in some small way, I can elevate the awareness and prestige of our great wines. It's a legacy that I attribute to great innovators like Len Olson and my dad."

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
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
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

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Lead Us into Temptations!

When I finished writing last week's column about Mick Jagger, I still had enough leftover factoids to construct a whole 'nutha column. I considered foisting that on you but was saved from that temptation by...the Temptations!

I just saw the hit stage show "Ain't Too Proud," based on the history of the Temptations. Afterward I googled all about for interesting info about them, and I hereby save you the trouble of googling all that yourself with this compendium of Tempt(ing)ations treats!

I fell head over heels in love with the Temptations when I was a kid – bought a bunch of their albums, sang along with all their songs, the whole bit. Well, except for the choreography; I'm not uncoordinated,

mind you, but man, I could NEVER do the Tempts nifty moves – AND sing at the same time!; I always wound up a ball of confusion.

Another thing: when I became a Temptations fan, about age 10 or 11, the Classic Five was a thing of the past. Big-time Temptations fans know what mean; the quintet that produced the group's first No. 1 hit, "My Girl," and many others, are considered the Classic Five: Otis Williams, Melvin Franklin, Paul Williams, Eddie Kendricks and David Ruffin. But the group went through a Ruffin spell, you could say, in the mid 1960s; Ruffin left, and was replaced by Dennis Edwards. When the Tempts music found me, Ruffin was a solo artist whom I didn't realize was relevant.

One of the sticking points was that Ruffin wanted to change the name of the group. He felt he was the key to their "sound," and – a la Diana Ross and the Supremes, lobbied for a new identity as "David Ruffin and the Temptations." This was after establishing immense success and renown as simply the Temptations. What's a modern-day analogy? - like Kansas City's NFL team deciding to call themselves Patrick Mahomes and the Chiefs?

It's interesting to me that the Temptations as we know them teetered on the edge of never coming to be, TWICE.

The second hurdle was that the Motown hierarchy wasn't convinced that the group should include Franklin, a bass singer. I guess because no one else had a bass. But Otis Williams convinced them that Franklin was indispensable to the Temptations sound, and this is utterly indisputable, especially when you hear his low, LOW growl in "Ball of Confusion" - "And the band played on."

Now you might be saying, "Hey, you skipped the first hurdle!" Well, here's that story: In 1958, Otis Williams formed a singing group with some classmates at Detroit's Northwestern High School.

And, good on him - he did so in order to finish high school.) To replace him, Williams remembered Melvin Franklin, a guy whose bass he'd heard and liked. One day, Williams saw Franklin on the street, rushed up to him and asked him to join. Franklin answered, "Well, I don't know. You have to ask my momma." Williams proposed the idea to Rose Franklin. After some hesitation, she agreed – Melvin could join the group. On one condition!: they MUST keep him FAR AWAY from temptations!

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
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
