City preparing for start of commercial solid waste pickup

The City of Russellville will begin dumpster leasing and pickup on October 1st, and the Russellville City Council approved the purchase of 45 new dumpsters at its August 21st meeting.

The dumpsters were purchased from Box Gang Manufacturing in the amount of \$48,024. That price includes 18 8-yard, 18 6-yard and nine 4-yard dumpsters.

In February, the council approved the purchase of 185 used in-place dumpsters from the Franklin County Solid Waste Department at a cost of \$500 per dumpster.

That was the first step toward the

City of Russellville's effort to take over exclusive commercial solid waste operation inside city limits.

Mayor David Grissom said preparation continues toward the October 1st date, including the city receiving contracts from local businesses.

"We sent out contracts to all business owners in the city. We started with the Franklin County list, then others, and we've got 60 back already," Grissom said. "We still needed additional dumpsters on top of what we purchased from Franklin County.

October 1st will be here before we know it. The only thing we're lacking is a spare truck. We have one new truck in and we're searching for a spare," he added.

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In other agenda items the council:

--approved a resolution to adopt the FY 2024 Rebuild Alabama Transportation Plan with tentative plans to mill, restripe and resurface a portion of Coffee Avenue between Franklin and Lawrence Streets, using funds the city receives from Alabama's gas tax. Those plans to redo Coffee could change though, as Councilman David Palmer said he was going to prepare a list of roads across the city that could be improved and/or repaved by Street Department workers, which would allow the approximately \$1.5 million in funds to be used to pave twice as much roadway distance than a paid contractor would do with the same money.

--authorized Councilman Gary Cummings to sign acceptance of an award letter for an Alabama Tourism grant in the amount of \$2,600 to be used for expenses for the annual July 4th Jam on Sloss Lake.

--approved a matching retirement payment for Russellville Police Officer Captain Jake Tompkins in the amount of \$1,317.20 to Retirement Systems of Alabama.

--accepted a resignation letter from Firefighter Johnathan Pace in the Russellville Fire Department and authorized advertisement of the same.

--declared a vacancy for Heavy Equipment Operator II with paving experience and a Heavy Equipment Driver/Operator and authorized advertisement of the same.

--accepted a letter of resignation from Chris Burrell in the Russellville Street Department.

--heard a report from Grissom about the job done by the city's Street, Police and Fire Departments at the 42nd annual Franklin County Watermelon Festival, including clean up late Saturday night.

--heard an update from Grissom about a call he received from Sen. Tommy Tuberville's office informing him that \$500,000 has been earmarked in an appropriations bill that would allow the Russellville Police Department to purchase vehicles and equipment, and that \$3.892 million is included in an appropriations bill that would be used to construct a new library/media center. Both bills must clear the House and Senate and then be signed by the President.

The next regular meeting of the Russellville City Council will be September 5, 2023, with work session at 6 p.m., and meeting to follow.

might be 'too strange or weird' to be a good performer.

After sharing his concerns to RHS teachers Patrice Smith and Emily Rush, the two veteran educators told their future star that being strange was typically how actors become successful.

"They told me don't worry how others might view you when you're onstage because you are trying to get them to see the character, not you," Guinn said. "So I gave it a shot. I remember walking on stage for the first time, and feeling all emotions of doubt, sadness and uncertainty that I frequently felt during that period of my life wash away. It gave me a character I could use to take an audience out of reality even if just for a little while."

That newfound confidence helped Guinn, the son of Tim and Sandy Guinn, begin what now looks like a promising career in the performing arts.

A gifted vocalist as well as award-winning stage performer, Guinn recently advanced through the first three rounds of Idol auditions on Zoom, catching the eye of the show's producers with each performance. It was Guinn's first time to audition, and it couldn't have gone any better.

There are some parts of the Idol audition process contestants are prohibited from discussing, including where they will go for the celebrity judge auditions and what song they plan to perform.

Guin made a Facebook post Friday announcing he was called by producers Wednesday and told he made it onto the show. American Idol is slated to begin its seventh season on ABC in early 2024.

One of the show's frequent story lines is to focus on a contestant's 'day job,' particularly when it's something unusual. If that's the criteria, Guinn has a great one.

He works at Arx Mortis, a popular haunted house in Killen. Guinn builds sets, helps set up new attractions and when Halloween season rolls around, he can be found walking the halls of the haunted house playing scary music on his accordion.

Remember, 'strange and weird' is what builds performing arts careers.

Guinn was presented with the Best Performance By An Actor in a Supporting Role in Community Theatre/College Musical August 5th at the Stanley Awards.

The Stanley Awards are presented to those who help promote excellence in the theater arts in the Shoals area. Guinn's performance as the Villain (the Man in the Yellow Suit) in Shoals Theatre's Tuck Everlasting earned him his Stanley.

Guinn has taken the stage to sing some 80's Rock mainstays with the Velcro Pygmies, a high energy rock band who headlined the August 18th

entertainment at this year's Watermelon Festival. Guinn also performed the Bon Jovi classic Wanted: Dead or Alive with the band August 17th in a show in Florence.

Guinn sings a very different style of music each Sunday at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Florence, where he's one of two musicians who perform hymns for the congregation. Guinn plays piano as well during Sunday services.

Guinn was the central character in the Roxy's Christmas Spectacular for two years. And he's done numerous shows at the Ritz in Sheffield and Shoals Theatre.

He's currently working as assistant director of a show, but he can't say what show it is yet, calling that future tidbit a 'little bit of a surprise.'

And if his American Idol audition goes well, Guinn's entire schedule, from haunting accordion music to hair band rock, could change entirely.

"I've spoken with some people who've done this and if my auditions on American Idol go well, it can keep you pretty busy for a while," Guinn said. Whether it's music or acting, Avery Guinn performs in a way that showcases his unique style.

"In acting you have a written character you have to bring to life and the way I like to do that is to bring the character to life a little different than how others have done it in the past, using my own spin on the role or song," Guinn said.

Guinn's musical tastes are for songs well beyond his years. He loves the crooning side of music, with songs from the Rat Pack, Frank Sinatra, Sammy Davis, Jr., to name a few.

"I like to perform music of musicians who have inspired me. From what I've seen, a lot of those people don't mind getting an outside perspective or a different type of cover of their song because that inspires different people in different ways. I like to interpret music in the way it means the most to me," Guinn said.

Two years out of high school, Guinn says he's pleased with how his young career is going.

"I'm very thankful for those who have supported me in times where I was doubting myself quite a bit," Guinn said. "They really helped me and my goal is that I want to perform the rest of my life because that's where I feel like the genuine me lies."

And thanks to the encouragement of two RHS teachers six years ago, Guinn is completely comfortable with the genuine version of himself, even if it's a little strange or weird.

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

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

Golden Tigers, Phinizee, run past Grissom in season opener

Friday was a great night to open up the 2023 Russellville Golden Tigers' football season, with the team playing at home and beating the Grissom Tigers 35-12, led by sophomore running back Cam Phinizee.

Though it was extremely hot and humid (temperature at kickoff was 91 degrees), the Russellville fans came out in large numbers for Senior Night.

Russellville opened up the season with a 40yard drive which ended with the Golden Tigers going for it on fourth down and turning the ball

Grissom had a shaky start to the game, losing yards on a three and out possession, and punted back to the Golden Tigers.

Russellville's second possession, a 46-yard drive, ended in a ten-yard touchdown run from Phinizee, making the score 7-0.

At the start of the second quarter, the

Golden Tigers scored on a one-yard run again by Phinizee, making it 14-0 with 11:14 left in the first half.

Just before the half came to a close,

Russellville was able to punch in another touchdown from Phinizee, making the score 21-0 at the half.

As poorly as Grissom played in the first half, the Tigers rebounded in the second half and ran the opening kick back for a touchdown.

On Russellville's next possession, Grissom intercepted a Harrison Burch pass and took it back to the end zone making the game 21-12, shocking the Golden Tigers crowd.

After Russellville shock off the nerves of giving up 12 consecutive points, the team bounced back with a big kick return across mid-field and drove the ball all the way to the end zone which extended their lead to 28-12.

With a mostly quiet remainder of the second half, the Golden Tigers managed to tack on one last touchdown extending their lead to 35-12. That score came on a Zaye Eggleston run inside the final two minutes.

Phinizee led all players with four touchdowns and over 250 yards rushing on a night when the Golden Tigers relied primarily on the ground game. Kicker Manny Martinez was a perfect 5-5 on extra points against Grissom.

"It was some very old school football tonight, more like the style we played my first three years (at RHS)," RHS Coach John Ritter said. "To Harrison's credit, he took what the defense gave him. With those run-pass-options (RPOs) it's easy to get frustrated but he did a great job managing the game and not making the situation bigger than it was."

While it's unusual to hold Senior Night during your home opener, Ritter said he didn't want to have Homecoming and Senior Night in consecutive weeks late in the season, because each event is special for students and their families.

"We didn't want to do Homecoming and Senior Night back-to-back weeks. It's a lot of work preparing for those events and we didn't want to have them in consecutive games," Ritter said. "It actually turned out to be a heck of a way to kick off the season."

Ritter has been impressed with his 26-player senior class since off-season workouts began last November.

"They're a great group and are very close and unselfish when it comes to stats and positions played," Ritter said. "They want to be successful and want eahc other to succeed. They had a great off-season and fall camp and we came out of the gate hot and that's a testament to our seniors '

"They bounce back from thins a lot faster than we do. There won't be any issues getting these guys ready to practice Monday and Tuesday. They're looking forward to it."

The Franklin County Commission approved the purchase of two new dump trucks for the Highway Department at its August 21st meeting.

Commissioners authorized buying two dump trucks at a total cost of \$427,000. Two used dump trucks were declared surplus property and will be listed for sale with J.M. Wood.

The purchase will restore the Highway Department back to a full inventory of four dump trucks.

In other agenda items, the commission:

--approved the removal of Rhonda Frank as secretary for the Franklin County Coroner and approved Debra Baker as the new secretary.

--approved the resignation of Caden Watts as a temporary employee with the Highway Department.



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

Bulldog football program embarks on initial season

For the first time in decades, Belgreen High School will trot out a football squad. After years of rumors of the Bulldogs returning to the gridiron, those rumors will become a reality this season.

At the helm of the program is Jonathan Raper, who left Phil Campbell High School after a historic run as the school's baseball coach, leading the Bobcats to their first baseball state title in history.

Raper now takes on the task of leading the Bulldog athletic program into a new era, as it becomes the sixth and final high school within Franklin County with a football program.

Due to AHSAA regulations for new programs, the Bulldogs will be limited to playing a junior varsity and junior high schedule for two years before they can officially compete for postseason play.

While they may not be competing for a playoff berth this year, Raper said this season will serve as a valuable learning experience as players get comfortable with playing the game, while also giving



coaches an opportunity to see what positions players excel in.

Quarterback:

Under center for the Bulldogs will be a bit of a mixed bag. Raper said the current plan it to run a dual-quarterback system for the time being, to get a look at different skillsets.

Landon Cox and Rush Berryman are scheduled to take a majority of the snaps at signal-caller for Belgreen with others potentially in the mix. **Running Back:**

In the backfield, Raper said there are "a bunch" of players who could see time at running back.

Will King figures to be the lead back with Skyler Vickry also getting a lion's share of the touches. Brayden Messer and Brayden Nelson will also slot in behind the quarterback from time to time as well. Raper also mentioned Issac Hammond as a viable option for the running game.

Raper said there will also be a healthy mix of seventh-graders who coaches will get a look at at the running back position.

Wide Receivers/Tight End:

As the Bulldogs work out the kinks to see if they'll be pass-reliant or runheavy offensively, they'll have a solid stable of weapons on the exterior to goto if they opt to go with the former.

Collin McCalpin has stood out as the top wideout thus far, with Kaleb Taylor also emerging as a top receiver for the Bulldogs. Emi Jiminez and Colton Ashton will also line up at wideout with Aaden Marsh also getting some consideration.

At tight end, Carter Raney has been working at the position with Gabrian Adcox-Wilson also getting some reps.

Offensive Line:

While there may be a bit of shuffling around at the skill positions, the offensive line for Belgreen is a little more set in stone, at least to begin the year.

Thomas McKinney, Dalton Gardner, Noah Scott, Landon Cantrell and Ty Hamilton will see a bulk of the starts on the O-line, Backing up will be Giancarlo Alban, Uriah Whitfield and Wayne Shelnutt will suit up as well.

Defensive Line:

Raper said most of the offensive line will also line up on the defensive line this year. Whitfield and Scott will lead the way in the rushing game with Cantrell and Alban also lining up on the D-line. Wayne Shelnutt will be the starting defensive tackle for the Bulldogs.

Linebackers:

Hamilton will suit up at outside linebacker as James Scott will also anchor a spot at the position. The defense will mix things up, Raper said, as Whitfield will also see snaps at linebacker when not on the defensive line with Bryant Britton working as an outside linebacker. King and Berryman will man the inside linebacker positions for Belgreen.

Secondary:

Kaleb Taylor will man one of the cornerback slots with Emi Jiminez manning the other spot. Aaden Marsh will also see time at corner. At safety, Colton Ashton will be the free safety with Brayden Nelson serving as the backup. Raynie Fuller will most-likely pull double-duty, playing both corner and safety for Raper and his staff.



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Hamilton begins PC tenure with experienced offensive line, linebacker corps

It's the dawn of a new era for the Phil Campbell Bobcats' football program as they usher in a new, yet familiar face as their leader.

Alumnus Jacob Hamilton was hired when five-year head coach Kevin Barnwell resigned after leading Phil Campbell to a 26-27 record and three playoff appearances.

Hamilton comes over from in-county rival Tharptown where he spent one season with the Wildcats, going 2-8 on the year. As he enters his first season as the coach of the Bobcats, Hamilton and his staff will rely on an experienced backfield and gritty play from upperclassmen in the trenches to lead them back to the postseason.

Quarterback:

As the Bobcats enter a new regime, they'll do so with a young quarterback at the helm. Freshman Hayston Scott has been tabbed as the starter for Phil Campbell to open up the season. While he may be on the younger side of varsity starting quarterbacks in the area, Hamilton said his signal-caller will have plenty of time to grow and adapt in the program.

"He's a really good athlete," Hamilton said. "He's young so he's got some time to grow. But he's matured every single day and he's dedicated to being a team player and working on his craft."

Running Backs:

The backfield will be an area of strength for the Bobcat offense this season, with Hamilton saying there are multiple running backs capable of shouldering the load.

"We've got four or five guys that we trust to carry the ball for us," Hamilton said. "Having that depth is huge for us."

Junior Braxton Mayfield will suit up at the fullback slot, with Hamilton labeling him as a "hard runner" whose skill set will be prioritized in short yardage situations.

6'2, 190-pound senior Gage Raper returns as the starting running back with junior Noah Raper also getting significant time at the position. Senior Isac "Rickey" Hill will also get some snaps at tailback with junior Hayden Wingo also potentially running the football some for the Bobcats. Wide Receivers/Tight End:

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Offensively Phil Campbell will run the wishbone a majority of the time. However, Hamilton said the Bobcats have the ability to spread things out if needed.

In the event they opt to go with a spread offense, Gage Baker will remain in the backfield with Hayden Wingo, and Braxton Mayfield and Noah Raper will all line up at receiver.

Others figuring to see time at receiver include Hagen Raper, Austin Elliott and Chandler Benford, who led the Bobcats in receiving during their jamboree.

"We've got three or four young guys that can catch the football and really open up the field for us," Hamilton said. "We just try to do what's best to get all our athletes the ball in the right situation."

When he's not getting carries in the backfield, Wingo will be the go-to guy at tight end most of the time.

Offensive Line:

Hamilton will have multiple returning starters along the offensive line, including three-year starting center Jackson Clark, and newcomers to work with in the trenches.

At right guard will be junior Johan Vazquez with 6'5, 230pound fellow junior Logan Wright lining up next to him at right tackle.

On the left side of the line, Kamron Thomas will slot in at guard with sophomore Russellville transfer Weston

Greenhill filling in at left tackle for the Bobcats.

Defensive Line:

Logan Cooper and Kaden Trapp will line up at defensive tackle. This will be Trapp's first year playing football with Cooper a returning sophomore. In the event Trapp is playing tackle, Cooper will simply slide over and fill one of the defensive end positions.

Playing both sides of the ball, Vazquez will slot in at one of the defensive ends positions with Gage Baker also taking one of the spots.

Sophomore Brayden Reeves could also see time at defensive end, Hamilton said.

"We've got some guys that play both sides of the ball and so if any of them get worn out, we've got guys that we're comfortable rotating in and out there," Hamilton said.

Linebackers:

Perhaps the most experienced group of players at any given position for the Bobcats will be the linebacking corps.

Hamilton said all four players who he plans to use at linebacker are defense-only players, giving them the ability to only focus on the one position.

At middle linebacker is junior Mason Weeks with fellow junior Koltin Hester also sliding in at an inside linebacker position. Sophomores Ethan Hallman and Boone Lawrimore will man both of the outside linebacking positions to round out the group.

"Having those four guys as only defensive guys is huge for us," Hamilton said. "They're able to get a breather on the sideline while the offense is on the field and get things corrected. They're vocal leaders and they understand what's going on."

Secondary:

While Hayden Wingo and Isac Hill will get a lot of reps offensively, they'll also get their fair share of defensive snaps with both slotting in as the starting cornerbacks for the Bobcats.

Hagen Raper and Zy Traywick will also fill in at the corners.

"We've got guys back there that we can trust," Hamilton said. "We've got enough depth to where if one of those guys breaks off a long run on offense and we really need them to take a rest, we've got others we can put in behind them to where we're not missing a beat.

At safety, Aiden Cleveland – another defense-only player – with Noah Raper manning the other safety spot. Sophomores Braeden Chaney and Madden Welch will be the backups at safety.

Special Teams

Gage Baker will serve as the team's kicker and punter with Noah Raper and Isac Hill returning both kickoffs and punts.



Quarterback:

For the 2023 season, inexperience will be the biggest issue to overcome for the Wildcats and the guarterback position is no different.

Junior Logan Bevis has been named the starter under center for Tharptown and not only will it be his first season at the position, it'll be his first season playing football at all, according to Johnson.

"He's been a starting pitcher for the varsity baseball team so he's used to having eyes on him so that should translate well," Johnson said.

Running Back:

In the backfield, Johnson said the Wildcats will roll with a different combination of players.

At the H-back, Jackson Clement will be the starter. Johnson said the tailback position features a 1-2 punch with seniors Dawson Higgins and Jeremy Vasquez shouldering the running game.



The lone holdover in terms of head football coaches within the Franklin County School System, Heath Childers and the Red Bay Tigers will look to make back-to-back playoff appearances.

After going 6-4 a year ago, the Tigers made the postseason where they took on the eventual 2A state champion Fyffe High School.

Quarterback:

Leading the Red Bay offense will be a familiar face. Gage Edgmon returns for his third year under center and his head coach has high expectations for the senior.

"We're expecting big things from him," Childers said. "He's really worked hard this year and has shown a lot of improvement."

Sophomore Jeremiah Thorne will be slotted as the backup to Edgmon.

Edgmon will look to build on last year's success in which he led the Tiger offense to a scoring average of 29.8 points per game.

Running Back:

Despite having to replace first-team all-state running back Brady Hardin who graduated last year, there is a plethora of experience to go around in the Red Bay running backs room.






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Russellville brings experienced defense, quarterback into 2023 season

The Russellville Golden Tigers look to improve on last year's 7-5 record that saw the team advance to the second round of the Class 5A playoffs after winning the Region 8 championship. Coach John Ritter's team once again faces a tough non-Region schedule with 7A Grissom, Deshler, Mars Hill (which routed Cullman 55-21 in its opener) and Athens High Schools.

Here's a position-by-position breakdown of the 2023 Golden Tigers including their coach's thoughts as the season begins:

Quarterback:

The Golden Tigers will have a familiar face under center this season, with Harrison Burch scheduled to take most of the reps at quarterback. The 6-foot, 170-pound senior will look to lead Russellville to its sixth consecutive winning season.

In his junior campaign, Burch threw for just over 2,700 yards with 27 touchdowns and four interceptions, leading the Golden Tigers to the 5A region 8 championship.

The past few seasons has seen the Golden Tiger offense be more reliant on the passing game. Having a quarterback like Burch, who started all 12 games for Russellville last year, returning provides a huge boost for head coach John Ritter and his squad.

"He had a great junior year," Ritter said. "Anytime you can bring your quarterback back, that opens up your offense because the install is easier than it is for other positions."

In the event Burch needs a breather or under other circumstances, freshman Tripp Cleveland has been tabbed as the backup quarterback.

"He [Tripp] is going to be a really good player," Ritter said. "He showed a lot of signs of maturity in the fall scrimmage and can throw it. He's a good runner and he's what you look for in a quarterback."

While Ritter and his staff would prefer to run Burch out there for as long as the season allows them to play this year, having two quarterbacks capable of running the offense could provide a huge boost down the stretch.

"While we don't necessarily want to play a freshman early, we've got two really good quarterbacks," Ritter said.

Running backs:

Lining up directly behind Burch and Cleveland this year will be a young, but experienced, group of running backs for Russellville.

Sophomore Cam Phinizee figures to get most of the carries out of the backfield. The 5'11, 185-pound back got valuable minutes during last year's postseason, starting the Golden Tigers second round playoff game against Boaz.

"He got a lot of carries throughout the year as the 2-punch since we really try to do things with a 1-2 punch at tailback," Ritter said. "He's got a lot of game experience even though he's just a sophomore and he's got a lot of ability. He's had a great fall camp and has shown signs he can be a complete player."

Senior Malachi Duncan and junior Zaye Eggleston will also receive a heavy workload as the second and third-string running backs this season. While Duncan has mostly made his mark as a linebacker — being named all-area at the position the last two years — Russellville is counting on him on the offensive side of the ball a bit more this year.

"Malachi is a guy who, for any other team, would probably be the starting running back and be really good for three or four years," Ritter said. "Unfortunately for him, he's kind of been behind Conner [Warhurst] and some of those guys moving up. But he's a very viable candidate for us when we need to run the football."

Cash Crumpton is another name to keep an eye on, with Ritter saying the

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junior's speed on the outside could pay dividends.

Wide Receivers/Tight End:

In terms of weapons on the outside, Russellville returns a solid core of veteran wide receivers and tight ends to help spread out the offense.

Senior Bralynn Vincent figures to be the go-to target in the receiving corps. Nick Pounders, who played mostly outside linebacker last year, will also see significant snaps at receiver. Shiloh Willis will start most games at tight end, rounding out an experienced group of players who will get most of the touches when the Golden Tigers turn to the passing game.

Crumpton is another weapon for Russellville at the receiver position. Ritter said the junior possesses plus

speed, giving the offense a weapon along the outside.

Another defense-to-offense transition was Michael Scofield, who will line up some at wideout as well.

"Both of those guys can stretch the defense vertically," Ritter said. "With those two guys, it's just a lack of experience right now. But I think they have a really high ceiling and can be really good in the passing game for us."

Öffensive Line:

One of the keys to Russellville having a successful running and passing game will rely heavily on the play of the Golden Tiger offensive line. Out of all the positions, the O-line



may prove to be one of the more experienced groups for Ritter, despite starting two new players.

Logan Lindsey returns as the starting center with Neyland Baker also returning and moving from guard to left tackle. Tait Barnes, provides versatility along the line, playing every position ranging from center, to guard to tackle last year as a sophomore.

"He [Barnes] may not have started in the same position every game, but he played a lot," Ritter said.

Eric Hernandez, who's returning from a torn ACL, will take over one of the guard spots along the line. Ritter said before Hernandez' injury, he was counting on him to be a big piece of the offensive line puzzle and is hopeful

Rounding out the offensive trench is 6'4, 250-pound junior Eddie Velasquez who will slot in at right tackle.

Defensive Line:

On the opposite side of the trenches, Ritter has high hopes for a group that returns all three starters from a year ago.

Junior Baltazar, Matthew James and Javonte Hill all started on last year's region-title winning team and led a formidable defense that allowed just 15.5 points per game a season ago.

"At some point throughout the season, there may have been a few games where Junior or Javonte might not have started, but they all played and played a lot," Ritter said. "Those three guys anchoring the defensive line will be a huge strength for our team."

Linebackers:

While noting it "feels like they've been playing forever," Ritter will also have a deep linebacking corps full of experienced players.

Martin Tomas, Malachi Duncan and Devin Green both return as two and three year starters at outside linebacker with Reece Carson taking the fourth linebacking spot. Carson showed out in the playoffs last season, totaling 16 tackles for the Golden Tigers.

"I think the defense as a whole is a strength for us because of the guys and experience we got back," Ritter said.

Secondary:

Jah Williams and Richard Scott will alternate between corner and safety as they lead the pack of returning defensive backs for the Golden Tigers.

Junior Gunner Sappington also figures to take over one of the safety positions with Braxten Goodson, Zaye Hubbard and Ben Pounders taking over the cornerback positions.

Special Teams:

Jah Williams, Cash Crumpton and Zaye Hubbard will handle most of the kick returning responsibilities with Williams also handling punt returning duties.

Doing the kicking and punting for the Golden Tigers will be Manny Martinez with Shiloh Willis taking over as the long snapper.

"I feel very confident all of those guys can do an excellent job and give us a leg up when it comes to special teams," Ritter said.
